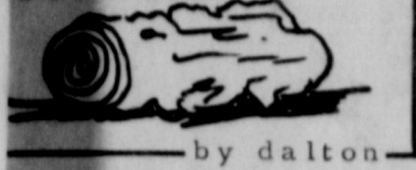

C-C Hears Views On Needs In City

Need for increased restaurant facilities large enough to accommodate meetings and parties was voted the number one priority among new projects for Slaton at a meeting here Monday night.

Approximately 40 persons met at the clubhouse for the annual idea session sponsored by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development to get citizens' views on what is needed for Slaton.

Aim of the session, explained Don Kendrick, chamber president, is to give the chamber directors ideas on what possible projects should be undertaken by the chamber during the coming year. Invited to the meeting were civic leaders, business representatives and young persons. It was noted that some of last year's important projects would be continued.

Nineteen possibilities were mentioned by those present Monday, and the group then voted on the order of priorities for the new suggested activities. It was pointed out that although Slaton has good restaurants, there is a need for larger facilities, and a place where teen-agers could meet, also.

Other suggestions, ranked in their order of importance by those present, included:

2. Further development of recreational facilities and institution of new ones wherever possible.
3. Active medical committee to promote the hospital and medical treatment availability here.
4. Further pursuit of a junior college or vocational school for Slaton.
5. Work to get Interstate 27 routed down U.S. 84 through Slaton rather than on 87 south of Lubbock.
6. Work for new central building to house law enforcement agencies.
7. Better communications between civic groups to avoid duplication of activities.
8. Community-wide youth calendar, working with all churches and schools to avoid conflict of youth activities.
9. More paving of city streets.
10. Need for highway direction markers downtown.

West Texas Water Conference Set Friday

LUBBOCK -- The status of water planning in Texas and its outlook for the future will be explained by Harry P. Burleigh, executive director of the Texas Water Development Board, at the tenth annual West Texas Water Conference Feb. 4.

The meeting will be conducted at the Red Raider Inn, Dr. William D. Miller, chairman of the Department of Geosciences at Texas Tech University and chairman of the West Texas Water Institute, will be the opening speaker at a 9 a.m. session and preside over a noon luncheon.

He also will join Texas Tech geosciences Prof. C. C. Reeves

Jr. in presenting a discussion on "Satellite Remote Sensing Possibilities in the High Plains."

The West Texas Water Institute is a regional organization "to emphasize wise use of water resources, promote more research and to encourage better educational programs related to the value and utilization of water."

Dr. William Lyle, professor of agricultural engineering at Texas Tech, is program chairman for this year's session. Leon New of the Texas A&M Extension Service is vice president for education and George McBee, superintendent of the

Three Slaton Police Officers Taking College Work In Law Enforcement

PLAINVIEW -- Three members of the Slaton Police Dept. are students in the law enforcement educational program which was begun at Wayland Baptist College last fall, according to Glenn Hunsucker,

director of the program.

The new program boasted a fall enrollment of 30 persons and has grown to more than 66 for the spring semester with students still in enrollment process.

Representing the Slaton Department are Chief Glenn Farmer, Assistant Chief Jeff Creager, and Patrolman Douglas Crabtree.

Chief Farmer was one of the original 30 students in the program, transferring more than 90 semester hours from Baylor U. Chief Farmer will be the first graduate from Wayland's new law enforcement program with a degree in Law Enforcement and minors both in religion and Spanish. During Farmer's career as a student he has achieved above a 3.4 grade average overall on the 4.0 scale and has maintained a 4.0 grade average in his major field. Farmer has logged 8 years of law enforcement experience and upon graduation will be one of the few Chiefs of Police in Texas with a degree in Law Enforcement.

Assistant Chief Creager served in the Air Police while with the United States Air Force from 1963 to 1967. Upon discharge from the military he joined the Slaton Police Department where he has advanced from patrolman, sergeant, to his present position of assistant chief. Creager entered college during the micro-term 1972 and enrolled in the Vice and Narcotics Control Class. Upon completing the three semester hour class he

achieved one of the A grades in the class of 54 students. Creager is presently enrolled in nine semester hours in which he attends night classes.

Patrolman Crabtree joined the Slaton Police Dept. about nine months ago. Crabtree served as an M.P. with the U.S. Marines for five years before coming to Slaton. Crabtree enrolled in college in the spring semester and is currently carrying nine semester hours.

Education for Law Enf. is being pushed by LEAA providing books, tuition, and fees for officers, however, due to new program at Wayland and shortage of federal funds in LEAA many officers are having to pay their own expenses.

Slaton officers drive 51 miles one way at their own expense for each class taken. All officers are taking at least three classes which will total 4890 miles per semester, Hunsucker said.

Cotton Ginning All Wrapped Up Here

Winter weather returned to the Slaton area during the last week, but farmers were finished with their harvesting anyway, so the chill winds had more effect on ears and noses than on crops.

Only a couple of the area's 11 gins reported additional bales finished during the week, with 150 more at Slaton Co-Op Gin bringing that gin's total to 12,300 for the year, while Union Co-Op Gin added 40 to up its total to 3,670. For all practical purposes, this wound up the area cotton ginnings, with a total of 51, 851 bales ginned by the 11 companies during the season.

Slaton had lows in the teens through Monday, after which it warmed up slightly, only to turn cold with new vigor Tuesday night and Wednesday.

Quality of the cotton was lower as the harvest neared completion.

Low Middling Light Spotted was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 31 per cent of all cotton classed, Strict

Low Middling Light Spotted made up 12 per cent, Strict Low Middling Spotted 10 per cent and Low Middling Spotted 24 per cent. Seventy-nine per cent of the samples was reduced in grade because of bark.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$40 to \$70 per ton with most prices in the \$48 to \$54 range.

Chicken Thefts, Wrecks Listed

Two Slaton residents complained of theft of chickens from their property during the last week, including some specially bred Bantams and blooded chickens of higher value than ordinary chickens.

Charles T. Hill, 100 N. 5th, told police he was missing 13 chickens valued at \$90, and L. B. Roberts, 1305 S. 10th, said eight Bantam chickens, six hens and one rooster, were taken from a chicken house at the rear of his residence Wednesday night. He valued them at \$2 each. Police interrogated a suspect, a 14-year-old boy.

Two accidents were investigated during the week, with no injuries reported. At 12:37 p.m. Sunday a car driven by Charles K. Earwood of Rt. 1, Wilson, was damaged when it struck a sign as the driver swerved to avoid collision with a car driven by Gustave Seal, 330 W. Scurry, at the intersection of U. S. 84 and Woodrow Road.

Last Thursday, vehicles driven by Jimmie Faye Boyd, 810 S. 13th, and Fidencio M. Valdez, 155 N. 3rd, were in collision in the 100-block of W. Lubbock.

Mayor Welch recalled how the librarian, Miss Thelma Po-test, called him when a new shipment of books arrived. He said he never forgot and has a deep sense of gratitude to those early library friends.

Not long ago one of her antique dealer friends brought her some original bells from a Rhythm Band. One person thought they were Baby Rattlers.

Her bell collection has been

interesting to all of her family and friends. Recently a friend went on vacation and brought her the Liberty Bell, a complete replica with crack. Also a glass hobnail from Dover, Del.

Many of her bells are antiques and many are new bells, perhaps copies of famous bells created in earlier years. For Christmas, she received 11 (eleven) bells. One of her packages which contained a new bell was tied with an antique bell on the bow. It was a white china bell with a red and green Christmas tree which was hand painted.

Bells are so interesting to everyone who visits in the Martin home. The family has gotten use to the bells but visitors are unable to leave without ringing many of the bells. Each has its own individual ring. Most people prefer the crystal bells for sound.

Bells have had many uses. Presiding officers, teachers, and hotel desks in yesteryears found them necessary to call meetings to order or summons a bell boy. Bells that once were so plentiful, apparently are becoming scarce.

Bell collecting is lots of fun and it doesn't require much space. Mrs. Martin displays her bells on an Eterge which she has refinished. With a bit of patience she has assembled a delightful collection without giving up a great deal of space for display. As she has watched her collection grow, she can still visualize room for many more. The picture of her bells will provide you with a fairly good idea of the diversity of shapes and sizes. Her collection includes a variety of color which contain Brass, Copper, China, Glass, Crystal, Silver, Clay, Wood, and Nickel-plated. When asked which was her favorite, she said, "I just love bells".

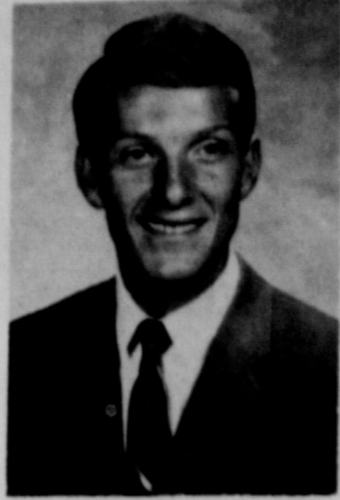

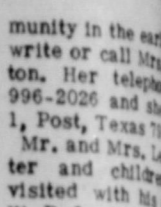

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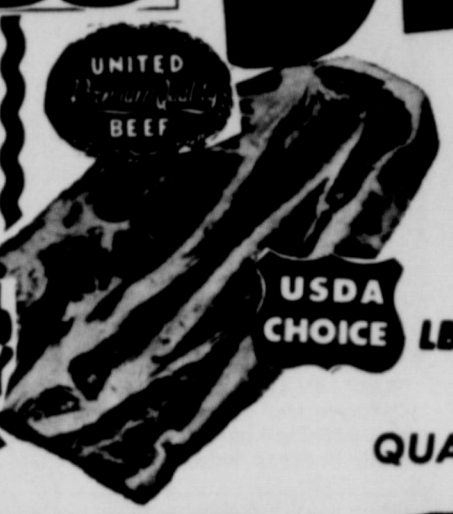
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The Named State Young Farmer President

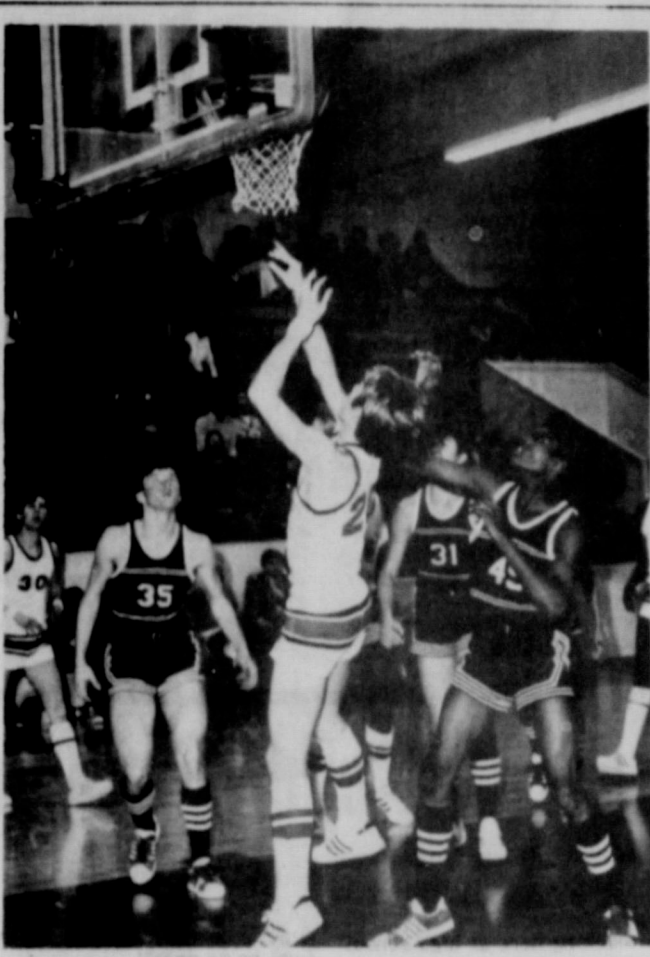

License Plates May Be Obtained By Mail

AUSTIN -- You don't have to stand in line anymore if you don't want to in order to register "Old Betsy" -- or whatever you call the faithful family car.

Texas motorists can get their 1972 license plates by mail if they send in the three-part renewal form, the registration fee and one dollar to their county tax officer prior to March 1.

This allows for the 30 days that are necessary for the application to be processed and the license plates delivered before the April 1 deadline. The plates themselves became available at the tax office or sub-station Feb. 1.

If the motorist prefers, he may register his vehicle in person by taking the handy three-part form to the county tax office. It takes the clerk only a fraction of the time it used to take to process the form, collect the fee and send the motorist on his way with new plates.

Whether the driver uses the mail or applies for his license in person -- the important thing for him to remember is to be very careful NOT to separate the three-part application form. Even though the three-part renewal form carries the warning "DO NOT Separate or Detach Any Parts of This Notice" in large letters on the reverse side, some motorists do just that.

Department officials stress that the entire form must be mailed in or brought to the county tax office or substation. A stick down strip showing the new license number is attached to all sections of the form and then the tax office separates the form, returning the license receipt to the owner.

Applications for license plates should only be sent to the county tax office. Motorists should NOT send their payments to the Texas Highway Department because this will delay their registration.

During the month of March, it will be necessary for owners to apply in person at the county tax office or sub-station to obtain the 1972 license plates. In any event, owners will save themselves time and trouble by using the new computerized forms in this third year under the new system.

With the form, a certificate of title and last year's registration receipt is not needed. So register now and display your new plates. This will remind your neighbor it is time for him to do the same.
