

Santa To Be In Slaton Friday With Candy, Turkeys



Santa Claus will open a three-week stand in Slaton at 4:30 p.m. Friday when youngsters of all ages are invited to be hand to meet Santa at the Chamber of Commerce building.

He will be handing out candy to the kids and turkeys to the adults Friday, and will do a repeat performance on the next two Friday afternoons before Christmas.

On each Friday, 32 turkeys will be given away by Slaton merchants who are sponsoring the giveaway as a gesture of good will to their patrons. To win a turkey, any person 16 or

over simply has to sign up at any of the firms of the participating merchants. These merchants are listed on page one of section two of this issue of the Slatonite. Slaton Girls Win Tourney

Slaton and Crosbyton split the winning trophies in the annual Slaton Invitational Basketball Tournament last weekend, as the boys and girls teams from both schools played each other in the finals, with Slaton's girls and Crosbyton's boys winning.

Coach Gay Benson's Tigerettes used Jan Davis' 29 points and Karla Kitten's 21 points in stopping the Crosbyton girls 56-43 in the finals. Mary Faye Smith led Crosbyton with 25.

Coach Ken Housden's Tigers, who have shown rapid improvement in recent games, bowed to the Chiefs 60-49, as the visitors' Bubba Walters scored 33 points. Larry Washington had 19 for Slaton.

Washington and Bruce Scott of Slaton made the all-tournament team, along with Bill Johnson and Walters of Crosbyton; Steve Hays and Reggie Moore of Post; J. E. Johnson of Littlefield; Kenneth Bobo of Roosevelt; Terry Davis of Bledsoe and George Mitchell of Muleshoe.

The girls' all-tourney team

was led by six Slaton players, including Miss Davis, Miss Kitten, Susan Conwright, Kay Stephens, Scharla Johnston and Petra Gipson; Miss Smith, Jonie Ellison, Deanna Michulka and Debbie Crump of Crosbyton; and Brenda Patton of Roosevelt.

In the boys bracket, Muleshoe won third by beating Littlefield 37-30 and Post won consolation with a 64-39 win over Bledsoe.

Post won third in the girls division by stopping Abernathy 43-35 and Roosevelt beat Tahoka 39-31 for fifth place.

In the tourney's earlier rounds, Crosbyton boys beat Slaton JV 91-30 and the Tigers nipped Roosevelt 52-51 as Washington hit 21 and Bobo 19. Muleshoe beat Post 42-40 and Littlefield ripped Bledsoe 40-36.

In the next round, Slaton beat Littlefield 57-46 as Phil Waleley scored 17; and Crosbyton nudged Muleshoe 46-40.

Slaton's girls hammered Littlefield 114-36 in the first round, and then continued the scoring rampage by clouting Abernathy 92-27. Crosbyton beat Roosevelt 45-24, Abernathy beat Tahoka 62-57 and Post topped Rails 59-25 in first round play. In second round, Crosbyton beat Post girls 64-40.

More Bales Are Counted In Area During Week

Slaton area's bale count went up approximately 9,000 bales during the past week, despite the fact that three of the 12 gins normally contacted for a bale count could not be reached because of phone line problems between Slaton and Wilson Wednesday.

Total bales counted as ginned by nine gins were 22,189, compared to 13,256 the previous week from 12 gins.

Slaton Co-Op Gin reported a total of 7,500 bales thus far, and Acuff Co-Op Gin listed 4,391. Others included: Farmers Gin, 1,343; Posey Gin, 1,480; Union Co-Op, 1,775; McClung Co-Op, 2,773; Basinger Gin, 1,080; Haxberry Co-Op, 1,547; and Gordon Gin, 300. Gatzki, Wayside and Wilson Co-Op could not be reached. Temperatures during the last week ranged from a high of 74

in Slaton Saturday to a low of 4 Wednesday morning. But Tuesday's range of 73 down to 9 was the biggest one-day change.

The temperature in Slaton was 73 degrees when the norther hit Tuesday and it dropped 36 degrees in 15 minutes according to Pioneer Gas Company's temperature chart.

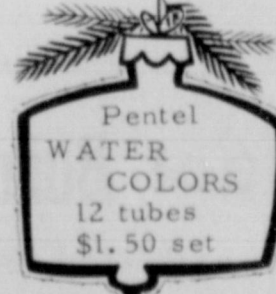
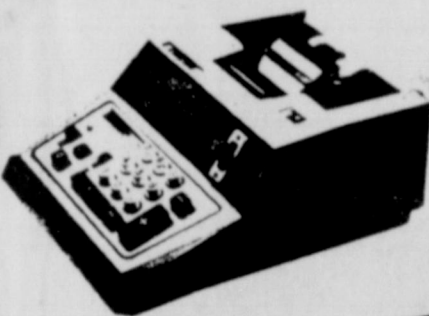
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Alpine Ends Cooper String

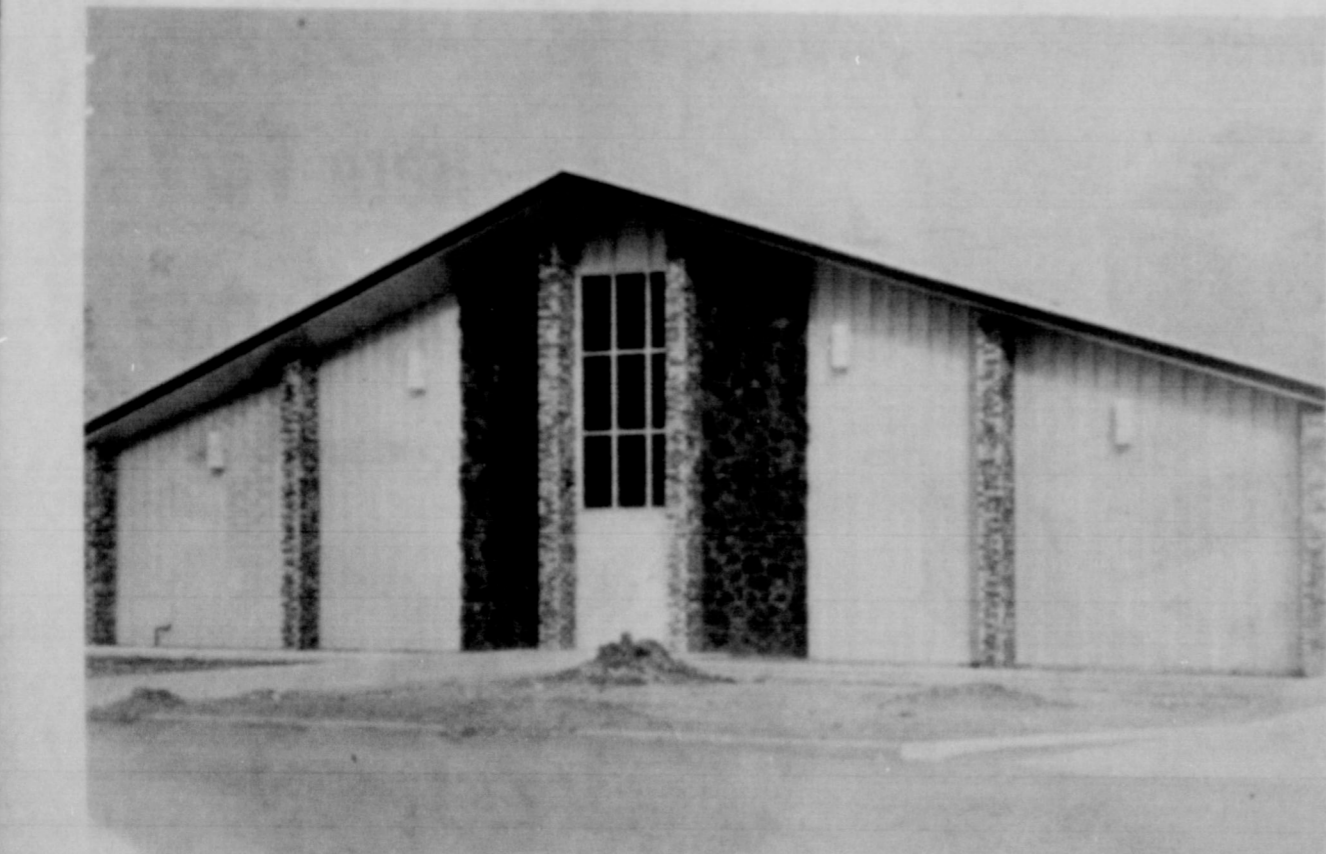

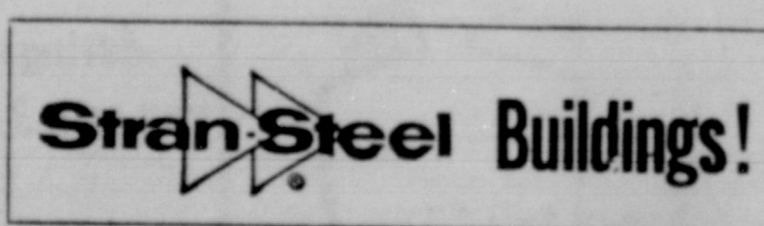

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PRaise THE LORD

Rev. 2:2-4 -- "I know how many good things you are doing. I have watched your hard work and your patience; I know you don't tolerate sin among your members. . . . You have patiently suffered for me without quitting. Yet there is one thing wrong; you don't love me as at first! Think about those times of your first love (how different now!) and turn back to me again and work as you did before; or else I will come and remove your candlestick from its place among the churches."

This church at Ephesus had so many good things about its members -- good works, labor, patience, having nothing to do with evil, etc. But Jesus said he had something against them -- they didn't love him like they did when they first accepted Him.

Ladies, when you were a new bride, do you remember how much joy you had, and how you did little "extra" things to please your husband, and how you wooed your husband and said endearing words to him? And how you talked about your lover, how perfect he was. And if you had been ordered to keep quiet about your love for him and "not said a word to anyone, you would have "busted".

The Bible has much to say about how the church is the bride of Jesus, and how He is coming for a "beautiful" bride. A beautiful bride is one who is full of love and joy, one who relies completely on her husband. When you see a woman (or man) who is not joyful, then she has lost her first love.

When a husband and wife permit problems to arise between them, they begin to lose their joy. A wife, having lost her joy, may still take care of all the work in the home, still be patient, faithful to her marriage vows and provide for her children without quitting. But if she has lost that spark of joy, she is not loving her husband as she did at first.

This is what Jesus was saying to the Ephesian church -- we have become so involved with taking care of our "good" works first, that we don't even have time to love. Same thing is true in homes sometimes -- we become so involved with the every-day-ness (if I may event such a word) of washing, cleaning, jobs, school work, studies, activities, commitments, that we don't have time to express our love to one another.

Jesus said return to your first love. . . seek FIRST the kingdom of God and ALL these things will be added to you.

When Mary and Martha invited Jesus into their home, Martha was so concerned about having everything just right -- the house cleaned and food prepared. But Mary just wanted to sit at His feet and listen to what He had to say.

When we take time out (in our private devotions each day) first to worship Jesus, tell him we love Him, say endearing words to Him, and just bask in His love, then He gives us the joy and strength to go about our tasks twice as fast.

Praise His Name!

LCC Coach Gives Drug Abuse Talk

Hugh Rhoads, athletic director and track coach of Lubbock Christian College, was the speaker at Slaton High School Thursday night on "drug abuse". He was introduced by Kenneth Burnett, minister of Slaton Church of Christ.

Sponsoring organization for the occasion was the Ladies Auxiliary of the VFW. Rhoads commented that statistics on drugs are different according to who is giving the report. In 1967 and 1968 it was reported that nearly all college students were taking drugs, which was not true, Rhoads said.

HOLIDAY REMINDERS

Following are safety suggestions when planning Christmas trees, lighting, decorations, wrappings and gifts.

TREE Select a firm, fresh one and put it at once in a cool place with its base in water. Before setting it up, cut about an inch off the base to help the tree absorb water, then place the tree in a sturdy stand containing water. Locate the tree away from heat and where it won't block exits. Take it down as soon as possible after Christmas — the more it dries out, the more of a hazard it becomes.

LIGHTING Never use lighted candles on a tree or near any evergreen decorations. Check sets of electric lights for worn insulation, broken plugs or loose bulb sockets. Use extension cords sparingly.

Home Ec. Classes Prepare Holiday Dinner

With mid-term just around the corner, homemaking classes really have been working hard to get the final touch on their home experiences. "The garments have turned out very well and have given the girls some good experience at sewing," stated Mrs. Reese.

Flared pants, vests, plaids, dresses, and boleros are just a few of the many items that have been made. To finish out the semester, the homemaking classes will begin housing units. Homemaking II will be crocheting rugs, decoupage pictures, and making pillows. Homemaking I will plan houses, decorate rooms, and also make things for their own homes.

Miss Cade's cooking classes have been busy this week, too. Many foreign foods have been made in Homemaking III, but the favorite of all was tacos, enchiladas, and sopapillas. Homemaking II classes have really been busy baking and becoming familiar with yeast breads. Miss Cade tells us that "they really stirred up the atmosphere up and down the halls. And, last but not least, the most dangerous class of all, Homemaking I, has really had fun making biscuits, muffins, cookies, and other foods. There have been a few frightening experiences. Two students tried to "pressure cook" eggs and needless to say the eggs exploded. "It has really been hard for the beginners," Miss Cade said.

All of the Homemaking I, II, and III classes will be starting child development units soon. It will all be part of a research study as all of the classroom instruction will be individualized. The results of the individualized instruction will be published in at least two professional journals. Miss Cade says that "hopefully it will all be quite exciting."

One of the newer organizations that has begun at SHS is HERO. The letters HERO stand for home economics related occupations. The students are enrolled in home economics cooperative education. Each student is required to work fifteen hours each week and to attend

school at least one-half a day. "Last week as a class project, the students learned something about quantity cooking by preparing a Thanksgiving dinner for the class and invited guests," said Mrs. Raub. She also said, "Each group planned the dinner, purchased the supplies, and prepared the food for one part of the meal. Everyone was "stuffed," especially with rolls. The group preparing the rolls went a little overboard with a triple recipe instead of a double one."

Other class projects have included learning the correct use of the telephone, improving personal appearance, and fund raising projects.

Oven-roast the almonds in a lightly oiled or buttered shallow pan for 10-15 minutes at 325 degrees, stirring several times. Remove them from the oven when they begin to turn golden.

| 1 cup dried apricots | 2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour |
| 2 cups fresh dates | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 1 cup moist dried figs | 1 teaspoon baking powder |
| 1 cup diced citron | 1 teaspoon allspice |
| 1 cup candied cherries, halved | 2 teaspoons cinnamon |
| 1 1/2 cups shivered almonds, toasted | Brandy |
| 1 cup butter or margarine | Icing |
| 1 1/2 cups brown sugar (packed) | Whole blanched almonds, roasted |
| 2 tablespoons grated lemon rind | Candied fruit |

With scissors, cut prunes, apricots and dates into small pieces. Clip off stems and dice figs. Combine prunes, apricots, dates, figs, citron, cherries and shivered almonds. Cream butter, brown sugar and lemon rind together thoroughly. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift flour with salt, baking powder and spices. Add to creamed mixture. Pour batter over fruit mixture and mix thoroughly. Turn into 2 well-greased and floured loaf pans (about 9 x 5 x

3 inches) or one tube pan (10-inch). Bake on low rack at 275 degrees about 2 1/2 hours or until cake tests done. Remove from pan to cool on wire rack. When cool, moisten cake with brandy and wrap tightly to ripen. When ready to serve or to gift-wrap, coat with icing and decorate with whole almonds and slices of candied fruit.

Icing: Blend ingredients until smooth. Makes about 5 lbs. of cake.
