Stock Show Set Here Saturday

Exhibitors with livestock will vie for grand champion to be awarded at Junior Livestock Show Saturday. This is an annual event by the Agricultural Committee of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce.

Chairmen for the event are Jay Gray and Glen Akin. They urge all citizens of the community to attend the show and sale. This year's show will be held Saturday, March 9, at the Steve Bourn Memorial Center, on 20th Street in Slaton. The show will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday, and the sale is scheduled for approximately 2 p.m.

Judge for the show will be Billy Joe Boyd, of Crosbyton. He is engaged in livestock production and exhibition as well as farming.

Presenting the trophies and banners will be FFA Chapter Sweetheart, Susan Hopper.

The junior stock show has been a tradition here since the school system first taught vocational agriculture, but this is the fourth year for the auction and show sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce Ag Committee.

Paul Johnson and Don Mitchell, vocational agriculture instructors at Slaton High School, feel that Slaton has one of the best local shows in the area, exceeding some of the county shows, and express thanks to the local merchants who make it possible.

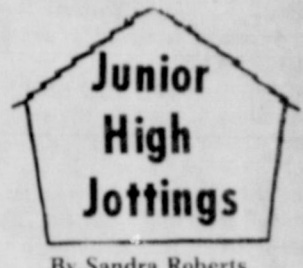

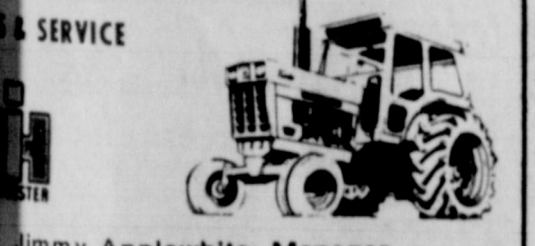

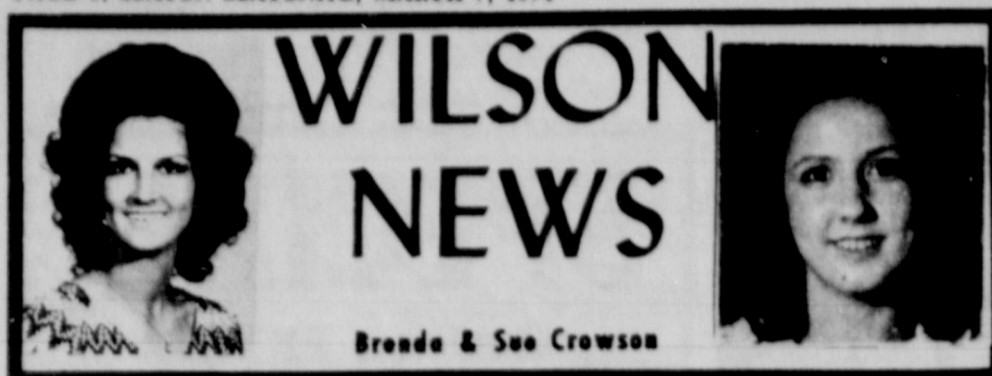

Pork In Short Supply

COLLEGE STATION -- Pork supplies should remain tight through 1974, and producers can expect prices to hold generally steady, forecasts a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Smaller red meat and poultry supplies coupled with increased demand sent pork prices to new heights during 1973," points out Ernest Davis. "Barrows and gilts at seven markets averaged \$40.61 per hundredweight last year, up 52 per cent from the 1972 average."

"Increasing exports to Japan may also keep the pressure on pork supplies." Hog numbers increased slightly from 1972 to 1973, and inventories during the first half of 1974 should be similar to those during the first six months of last year.

With current high prices, why aren't producers expanding their operations?

"Taking into account the high price of sorghum for feed, producers need to receive about \$44 per hundredweight for gilts and barrows. Since this is above current prices, many pork grain producers are holding down their swine herds and marketing their sorghum directly," points out Davis.

The specialist foresees barrow and gilt prices at \$41 to \$43 per hundredweight during the January - March quarter and a bit higher during the April - June period due to continued short supplies and high beef prices.

However, Davis expects prices to soften some during the July - September quarter to go along with the expected decline in slaughter cattle prices. If fed cattle marketings take a big jump during the last few months of 1974, as some predictions indicate, hog prices could take a sharp plunge to the \$33-36 level.

Stronger Enforcement Of 55-mph Limit Pushed

AUSTIN -- Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said this week he is disturbed by many complaints by Texas motorists about drivers refusing to obey the 55-mile-per-hour speed limit, and has directed DPS troopers to intensify their enforcement efforts.

"When the new law went into effect Jan. 20 of this year," he said, "our surveys indicated a high degree of voluntary compliance on the part of Texas drivers."

"But since that time, we have noticed that motorists, or at least many of them, have been gradually 'inching' up their speeds on Texas highways. Consequently, our troopers have been increasing their volume of speeding citations, and will have to continue to intensify their efforts until a more reasonable degree of voluntary compliance is achieved."

Speir said he has received numerous reports by motorists who are complying with the new law who are frightened and angered by others who pass them at speeds dangerously above the legal limit, and still others who "tailgate" them when they can't pass for one reason or another.


"We commend those drivers who are cooperating in the state and national effort to reduce accidents, save lives, and at the same time conserve fuel by driving within the legal limits," Speir said.

"And we solicit the cooperation of those who would forget or ignore the dangers posed to themselves and others by dangerous and illegal speeds on the highways of our state."

DECA CONFERENCE SET IN HOUSTON

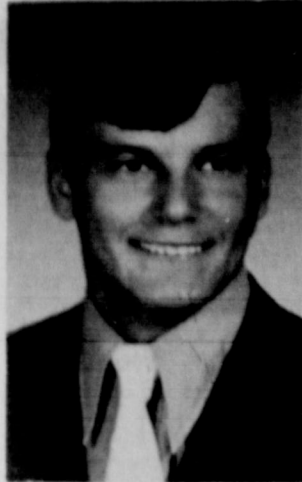

Good farm records will show which enterprises should be produced. While one enterprise might be making \$10,000, a second one might be losing \$2,000, thus reducing the total net farm income to \$8,000.

Changes in government farm programs are also making good records necessary as a borrowing tool.
