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Columbus barbecue, so that more profits will be realized and more money will go into the Mercy Hospital fund. All activities at the park Wednesday -- mostly in the afternoon -- will benefit the hospital fund, after the first \$500 is taken out to pay for the fireworks.

A huge display of fireworks is planned at dusk -- probably about 9 p.m. -- under supervision of the Slaton Volunteer Fire Dept. Money from the park activities goes to pay for the fireworks, then additional proceeds this year will be added to the fund to renovate Mercy Hospital, a project already underway by virtue of contributions from many groups, businesses and individuals in the Slaton area.

Jerry Kitten, Grand Knight of the Knights of Columbus, said "We're anticipating at least \$2,000 from the barbecue sales. The K of C men will make the barbecue, which will sell for \$2 per plate (adults) and \$1 for child's plate. Other organizations will assist in the barbecue sales starting at 11 a.m. and also will have other booths of sale items such as homemade ice cream by members of the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce and Athenian Study Club, which also will be in charge of children's games. The Slaton Home Demonstration Club will have a cake walk and members of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church will sell Mexican food.

The K of C barbecue also will be sold for carry-out. Also, the K of C will be selling their popular barbecue hamburgers in the afternoon, at 50 cents each. Kitten said organizations which will help in the food booth include VFW, American Legion, Tiger Club, Junior ROTC, Lions Club and Boy Scouts.

Forty youngsters are entered in the Little Miss Ideal Slaton event, according to Mrs. Wanda Hutto, chairman of the sponsoring Retail Trades Promotion Committee. A stage will be set up in the park for the presenta-

tion of the contest at 4 p.m., when all contestants will be presented on stage.

The contestants will meet with the judges at 2:30 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce meeting room. The contest will be judged on appearance, personality and talent (optional). Youngsters may present a talent at the 4 p.m. event if they desire, or may omit this part, Mrs. Hutto said. Wearing apparel will be left up to the choice of the parents, it was reported.

Noting that the response to this year's contest was very good, Mrs. Hutto said that plans are to make the competition an annual event.

Winner of the contest will receive a trophy. No runners-up will be named.

Other July 4th activities planned here include a miniature golf tournament, the annual golf tournament sponsored by O. Z. Ball & Co., a ping pong tournament in the clubhouse, a double-

header Babe Ruth baseball game.

Ping pong tournament contestants are to sign up at the club house starting at 1 p.m. with play to begin at that time.

The Lions Club dunking board, a popular attraction at the Independence Day festivities in past years, again will be operated. This crowd-pleaser features someone sitting on the board above a tank of water. For 25 cents, a customer gets three chances to dunk whoever is sitting on the board, by throwing a ball at the tripping mechanism.

Starting at 1 p.m. with Highway Patrolman Jim Dulin on the board, each victim will be the target for 30 minutes. At 1:30 p.m. Keith White will be up. Others to follow, in order, will be Lions Club Queen Rhonda Moseley, Lion Sweetheart Juanell Wood, Melvin Kinnison, Dalton Wood, Wayne Edwards, Bob Mchon, R. G. Copeland, Joe Sparkman, J. W. ## Special Summer Program Aids Youngsters

A summer program of special training for students with learning disabilities not only is helping the 32 youngsters enrolled in the program here, but also is giving teachers valuable training in working with students in this category.

Students and teachers are from Slaton, Roosevelt and Cooper school districts, as the program is being directed by Mrs. Maybelle Kern, director

of special programs for the three schools.

Mrs. Kern explained that although all of the special programs during the year in these districts are tailored to fit individual needs, this summer program is putting even more emphasis on the needs of the individual child, since the ratio of students to teachers is set up so that there are teams of four students, two teachers and one psychology student from Texas Tech working together.

This means there are eight psychology students from Tech counseling with students, parents and teachers.

Supervising the program, which runs four weeks for the students and six weeks for the teachers, are Mrs. Betty Snyder and Mrs. Martha Kirby, both of St. Christopher's School in Lubbock. Consultants taking part are Dr. Charles Jones, professor of special education at Tech, and Dr. Robert Anderson, professor of psychology. In addition there are the 16 teachers.

The program is funded by a special federal grant of \$11,300 to be used in training both teach-

ers and students in correction of students' learning disabilities and social and behavioral problems which

sometimes accompany such disabilities.

Much emphasis in the program, being conducted at

West Ward School, is put on motor development, or physical activity, since it has been determined that proper motor development is influential in learning to read, according to Mrs. Kern. But students also spend about an equal amount of time in classroom academic areas.

Children taking part in the program range from age 5 through 13, and those operating the program believe all of them will be better equipped for regular classes this fall.

Mrs. Reynolds told police that the bedroom had been ransacked after the intruders made entry, apparently through a rear door, between 2 and 7 p.m.

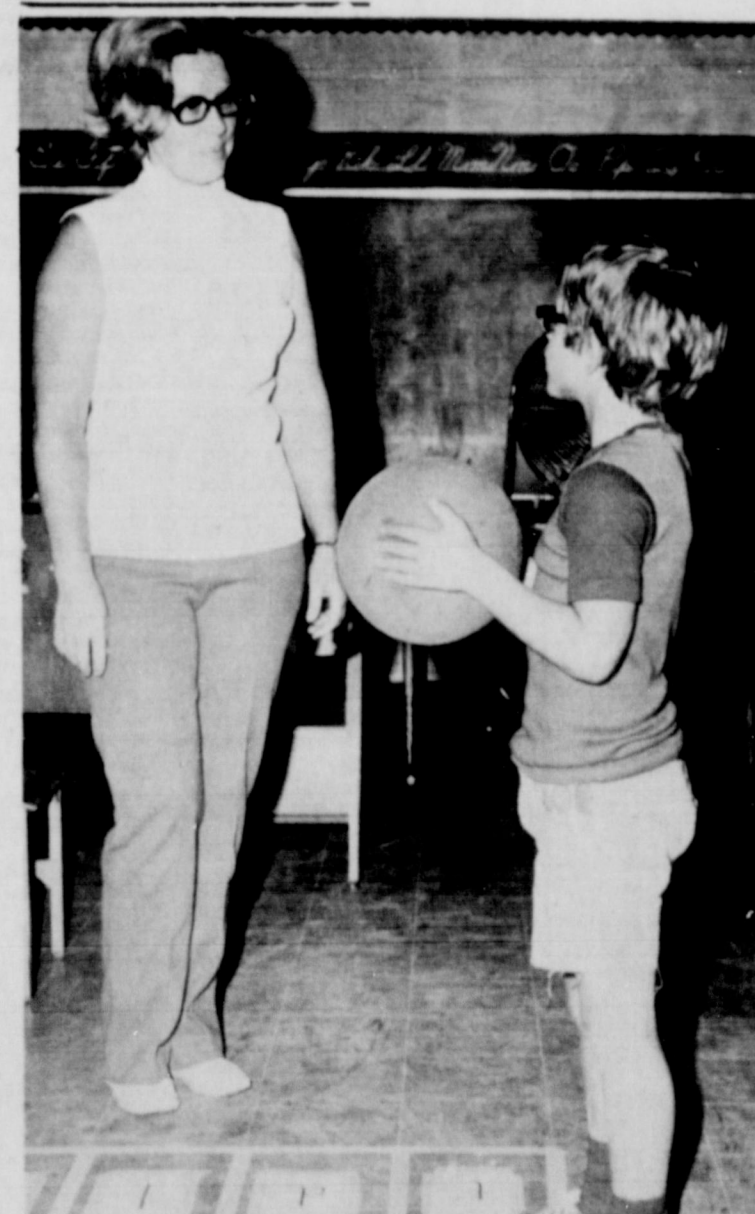

## The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN -- Several complaints filed recently with the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division indicate that there are some unscrupulous schemes to capitalize on the average person's desire to travel in the summer time.

The mailed enticements we've heard about were "congratulatory" letters, informing the complainants that they had "won a trip" to a glamour vacation spot, and all they had to do to take advantage of this opportunity was to pay a \$15 reservation fee to secure accommodations at the other end of the journey.

In the cases which have been checked out, there really wouldn't be anything to "win", unless the recipient just happened to be going to the resort mentioned, because transportation would not be furnished; gasoline would not be provided; meals would not be paid for along the way.

And once the person arrived at his destination, he could not even be sure of getting a "free" room, because if he read all the way down in the congratulatory letter, he would notice the warning that an additional charge would be assessed if it were "peak season."

A similar promotion was halted three years ago by a Federal Trade Commission cease-and-desist order. And the attorney general of Ohio very recently secured a court injunction against this deceptive practice, since the operator was incorporated in that state.

Investigators in our own Consumer Protection Division have been advised by U. S. Postal Service Investigator Allan

### Sewer Line Extension Authorized By City Commission

A sewer line extension of about one block was authorized by Slaton City Commission Tuesday night, as the group approved calling for a bid on the project. The extension would connect sewer lines on W. Panhandle with the line at 13th and Dickens, and the project is estimated to cost about \$3,000.

The city also will seek bids on a hydraulic sewer cleaning machine, expected to cost about \$5,500.

In other action Tuesday, the commission appointed Howard Hoffman to the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority Board for a two-year term starting in August.

Commissioners heard Mr. and Mrs. Bill Roach of Amarillo in regard to property owned by them in Slaton. Roach said he was posting property at the south end of 17th where there is a lake some have used for fishing. He said his fences had been damaged, and livestock set free. Roach also owns property on which the city desired to put a pumping station, and he and the commission reached a tentative agreement regarding acquisition of this property. The city has received sales tax receipts for the quarter ending March 31, totaling \$15,366.07, an increase of \$655.87 over the same quarter last year.

City officials noted that they have received calls about the taste of the water here this

**Labels Must Tell Truth**

Names and labels on food products must now be approved and meet specific USDA requirements, as a move to protect the consumer. Labels must inform the buyer how much meat is in the product, as compared to other foods added.

Some examples include: Breaded steaks, chops, etc. cannot have breading to exceed 30 percent of the finished product's weight.

Chili con carne must contain at least 40 per cent meat and Chili con carne with beans must have at least 25 per cent

meat. Deviled ham can have no more than 35 percent fat.

Frankfurters, bolonga and other cooked sausage products can contain no more than 30 per cent fat, 10 per cent water, two per cent corn syrup, 15 per cent poultry and 3.5 per cent cereal and nonfat dry milk. In addition, the product name and label must indicate that these products have been added. "All meat" products can only use muscle tissue with natural amounts of fat.

"All beef" products must contain only meat of beef animals. Canned hams can gain 8 per cent of their total weight after processing and be labeled "Ham with natural juices". If the gain is up to 10 per cent, it must be labeled, "ham, water added, with juices". Ham not canned, must be labeled "ham-water added". If it contains up to 10 per cent added weight. If the added water exceeds 10

**Physical Exam No Longer WTSU Requirement**

West Texas State University has eliminated its physical examination requirement for incoming students, Dr. T. Paige Carruth, vice president for student affairs, says.

Under new regulations adopted by the Board of Regents, only a record of a student's immunization are required for admission.

Mrs. Louise Mitchell of the University Health Center says, "In the past, a student would go to a doctor for a physical examination and the doctor would give him several test that were not required by the university, such as chest x-ray, blood tests. This practice was very expensive for the student."

Carruth says the university's only medical requirement now is that students must have had the oral polio and the combination tetanus-diphtheria immunization within the last 10 years.

"Last semester we gave more than 375 shots in one day because students had not gotten their shots."
