SLATON HOSTING CONFERENCE

66 Area Lions Clubs To Be Represented In District Meet

The annual Mid-Winter Conference of District 2T2 of Lions International, which includes 66 clubs on the South Plains, will be hosted by Slaton Lions Club Saturday, Jan. 26, the first time ever for the district event to be held in Slaton.

The conference, expected to attract at least 175 Lions Club officers and their wives, will be from 8:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. in the junior high school cafeteria. Luncheon will be at 12:15 p.m. in the cafeteria, when the speaker will be J. R. Collins of Perryton, who will speak on the High Plains eye bank.

Mrs. Don Kendrick will host an afternoon tea and entertainment session for the ladies, according to Bob Mohon, Slaton Lions Club president.

Kip Cutshall of Littlefield, governor of the Lions Club district, will be the presiding officer for the entire conference. He will hear reports from all district chairmen and at the end of the conference will accept nominations for the convention city for next year.

Cutshall also will accept nominations for candidates for district governor and Crippled Children's Camp

directors. At this date, the only announced candidate for district governor is Hack Lasater, with the Slaton Lions Club pushing his candidacy.

"We believe election of Hack as governor of this large district will be of great benefit to the city of Slaton, the Slaton Lions Club and certainly to the district, because Hack knows as much about Lions Club operations as anyone in the

district," Mohon said. Lasater, a Lions Club member for 39 years, has had perfect attendance for the last 32 years. He has held practically every district office except governor.



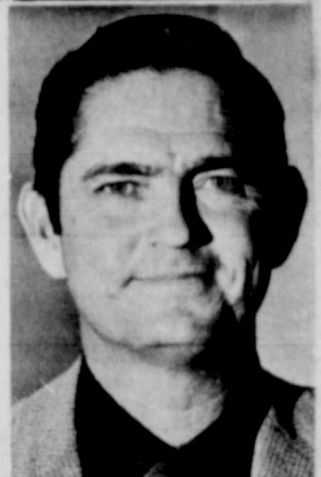

Lots Of Accidents, Assault Reported

The South Plains cotton harvest is now virtually complete, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA. However, ginning, sampling and classing continue because of the volume of cotton remaining in trailers and in ricks. Samples from 2,203,000 bales had been classed at the Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland of-

Standby Gasoline Rationing Program Set Up

Regulations for a proposed standby gasoline rationing program were published for comment Thursday, Jan. 10, in the Federal Register, according to Delbert M. Fowler, Dallas, southwest regional director for the Federal Energy Office (FEO).

Individuals may obtain copies of the Jan. 10 Federal Register by writing to the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., 20402. Cost is 75 cents. The FEO overall action plan calls for allocating 900,000 barrels per day less gasoline in the first quarter of 1974, as well as drawing

down gasoline inventories by 346,000 barrels per day to meet an estimated shortfall of 1.2 million barrels per day. FEO has proposed conservation steps to manage this shortfall of gasoline: * Voluntary 10-gallon per week consumption target. * 55 mile-per-hour speed limit. * The number of coupons

received by each individual depends on such things as (1) population density and (2) availability of alternative modes of transportation. * The rationing program will only apply to gasoline sales at retail outlets. Bulk users will receive their gasoline allotments through the mandatory allocation program, which went into effect Jan. 15.

* The coupons will be freely transferable on the open market. Those wanting more gasoline than their monthly ration will be able to buy additional coupons from those using less than their basic allotment. * Exceptions and hardship cases will be handled by state and local gasoline rationing boards. The federal government will pay the

cost of one local five-member board in each of the 3,000 counties in the United States. States may establish additional boards, if they wish. * Each driver receiving coupons will pay \$1 per month for the coupon packets. This will fully offset the estimated \$1.5 billion cost of the plan.

VFW To Put Tape On Bikes

Reflective tape will be applied to youngster's bikes in a new "Lite-A-Bike" program to be conducted here by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 6721, Slaton.

Tape will be applied to bicycles at the VFW Hall, Saturday, Jan. 19, starting at 10 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Strips of reflective tape will be put on the rear fender or high-rise bar, handlebars, frame, front fork and wheels of the bicycles, making each bike more visible after dark from all angles. The highly reflective tape -- the same type material used in reflective traffic signs and license plates, is visible in the headlights of an automobile. The shape of the bicycle at night will closely resemble its shape in daylight.

In addition to applying tape, VFW members will inspect the bikes for proper equipment; horn or other signaling device, head light, rear reflector and functioning brakes.

The extra warning provided by reflective tape can help save a child's life, according to Ells Schmid, chairman of the project.

Dear Consumer

Allowances help introduce children to the world of living on a fixed income. But an allowance given before age five will not have much training value.

When you think your child can begin to assume the responsibility for a little money, that's when you, the parents and the child need to plan the allowance together.

First, you must decide what the allowance will be for. Does it cover birthday presents and presents for family members? Is it to be used to pay for school supplies or lunches?

Then, get a fair estimate of how much money this will take by having the child keep track of the money spent on these items for a few weeks. When the expenses are totaled, add a little more for the child to spend freely.

A youngster won't get

any practice spending money and using judgement if every cent is planned in advance. The amount of the allowance needs to undergo changes as the child grows older. And sometimes, even with good management on the part of the child, emergencies will arise.

Let the child know you are willing to discuss problems. Weigh the merits of each case when deciding if the child needs extra money or not. To be successful, an allowance must be regular and in line with a child's activities and abilities.

How many of us would stay strictly at home (after work) or call in a phone number everytime we leave the house? That means not even stop 15 minutes for a cup of coffee without checking in. (With no pay!)

How many of us would leave a party, get out of bed after a hard day's work, get up from a half-finished meal go out in zero weather, rain or shine, possibly with our best clothes on? (Remember, we can't take time to change.)

How many of us would wade in mud knee-deep, crawl in and out of a car covered with mud, shattered glass, battery acid, blood, gas, oil or whatever?

How many of us would drive or ride to Lubbock as fast as an ambulance will run. (I know for a fact they go more than 50 miles and hour) and then sit back and listen silently to the citizen's criticism? All this, plus they have to service the ambulance and clean the inside equipment and ready it for the next call - all before they can go home. All this for \$5.00.

1. for one, DO think something needs to be done about it, but I think we as citizens should accept the responsibility for doing it. If we or our commissioners can't come up with some way to adequately pay these men, we could at least say "Thank you" for their efforts. If we can't or won't do either one, we should hire 24-hour professionals to be on call.

If you ARE concerned, check out the issue, and express your opinion to those who can change the rules, instead of criticizing what is more or less time donated over and over again by our off-duty patrolmen.

Read Ephesians 1:3-10

Remember that you were slaves in Egypt and the Lord your God redeemed you. (Deut. 15:15)

The Bible word "redeemed" has the meaning of a slave serving someone not his legal master. It implies, however, that his real master buys him back at great personal cost.

A missionary story illustrates beautifully the cost to God of our personal redemption. During the regrettable days of the slave trade, a translator was told that the only equivalent for the word "redeemed" in a native language was the phrase "took his neck out." This was meaningless until he was told that it came from occasions when long lines of persons to be enslaved were being marched to the coast for transportation overseas. Each one had his neck placed in a yoke of restraint. If, in passing through some village, a slave found a relative or friend who would pay the going price, that slave could be freed, and "his neck taken out."

How this graphic picture depicts the narrow escape all believers are granted as faith in Christ "takes their neck out" from the yoke of sin and death!

PRaise THE LORD

Did you ever hear anyone say, at Christmas time, "I wish it would snow, because if it doesn't, it won't even seem like Christmas!"?

Some folks carry this thought over into their relationship with Jesus, because sometimes Christians will say, "I just don't feel the assurance of His presence."

Although Christians sometimes, and probably most of the time, do "feel" that Jesus is right there with us, there are times when that special "feeling" is not evident. That's the time when we need to declare within ourselves that whether we feel like it or not, we do know that Jesus is our Lord, and that He cares for us and loves us... because the Bible declares it so. And the Bible says that God honors faith -- not feelings.

I heard an illustration regarding this just a few days ago, that I'd like to share. It seems that a young couple had just exchanged wedding vows, and as they were leaving the church, the groom said to his new bride, "Honey, I don't FEEL married." And the bride declared, "But, honey you ARE a married man, whether you feel like it or not! So you'd better adjust your feelings to the facts!"

We can't always trust our feelings -- we have to rely on faith to reach out to God. God honors our faith.

So if our feelings do not correspond with the facts, we need to adjust our feelings.

By faith, we believe that God is, and that He makes himself known to those who diligently seek him.

By faith, we believe God when he says, "I will never, never fail you nor forsake you... that is why we can say without any doubt or fear, "The Lord is my helper and I am not afraid of anything (that mere man can do to me)." (Heb. 13:5-6.)

The Lord's Table

Following the institution of the Lord's Supper (18:20), Jesus said to the apostles, "I appoint a kingdom, even as my Father appointed unto me, that I may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom." (29:30) This memorial of the death of Christ (11:26) is a continuing reminder of the sacrifice for the sins of the world (Matt. 26: 28).

It is to be observed on the Lord's day, the first of the week (Acts 20:7), by Christians who themselves and partake in a worthy manner (11:27, 28).

This weekly observance is called a communion (10:16); that is, a participation in the beneficial sacrificial body and blood of the Lord. It is the Lord's supper (1 Cor. 11:20), referring to relationship enjoyed in eating together. In a sense it is called the Lord's table (1 Cor. 10: 21) breaking of bread (Acts 2: 42; 20: 7).

Let us assemble every Sunday to keep the Lord's Table and to remember the Lord's words: "This is my body which is given for you; this do in remembrance of me... This cup is the new covenant in my blood which is poured out for you." (Lk. 22: 19-20)

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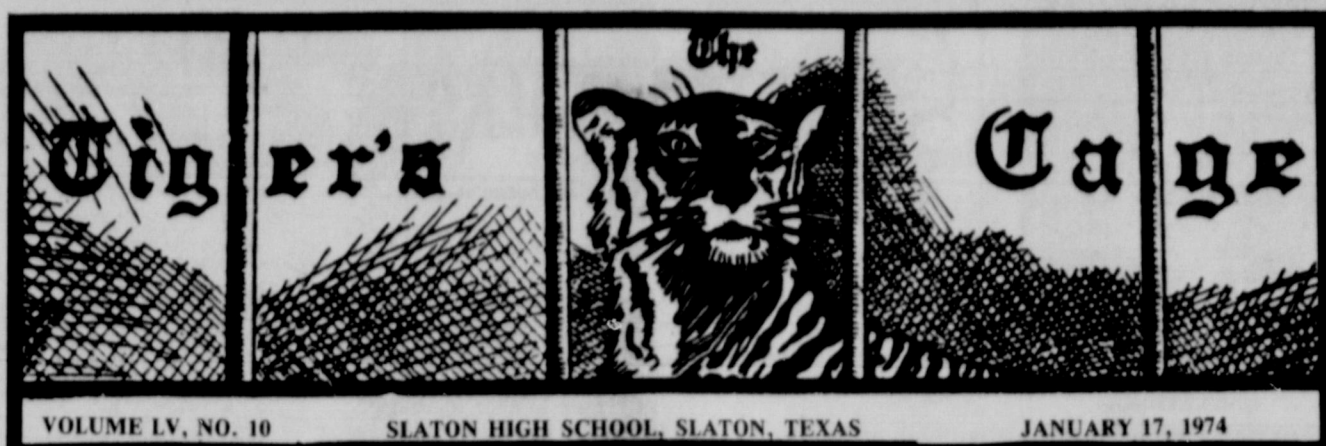
New Semester - New Students

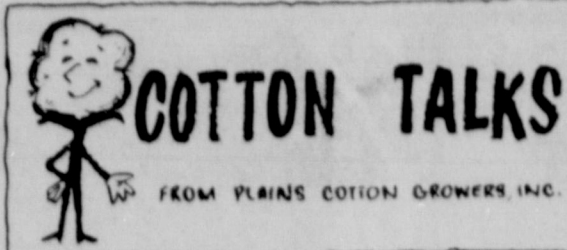

Although there are still a lot of unknowns, general expectations are that U. S. cotton production in 1974-75 will be up to 14.5 or 15 million bales from the projected 13 million bales in 1973-74, according to Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., "but for a number of reasons, this does not necessarily foretell a corresponding decrease in cotton prices," he adds. "For one thing," he notes, "there is every indication that the demand for cotton, both foreign and domestic, is on the increase."

Exports of cotton from the U. S. in the 1974-75 marketing year are now forecast at around 6 million bales, and cotton consumption by domestic mills is being projected in some quarters as high as 8 million. If these figures are realized Johnson points out, even a 15 million bale crop would add only 1 million bales to the expected U. S. carryover on August 1, 1974 of 3.8 million. "And a 4.8 million bale carryover in this country is far from excessive."

Demand in the U.S. and abroad is getting a boost from the scarcity of petrochemical stocks for the production of synthetic fibers. Also there is a noticeable return of preference for the natural fiber among consumers. And of course the increase in demand for textiles of all constructions is also of benefit.

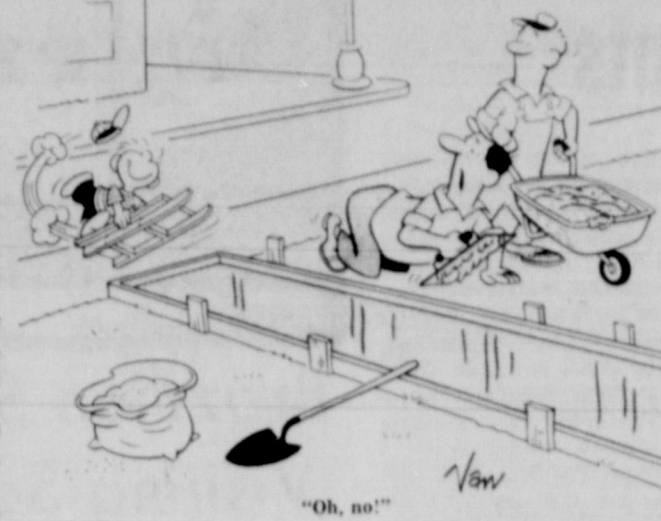

"In concentrating our telephone tax assistance employees in one central location, we not only will be able to offer more prompt and accurate answers but it will also permit greater uniformity in answers given to similar questions," Coppinger said.

The director pointed out that 74 toll lines will be manned by trained taxpayer service representatives qualified to answer questions ranging from home mortgage deductions to estimated taxes and exemptions for dependents. Walk-in tax assistance and all other normal tax transactions will continue to be offered at all IRS offices throughout the 146 counties in North Texas comprising the Dallas District.
