## School Board Views Financial Problems, Accepts Resignations

Resignations of nine persons were accepted by the board of education of Slaton Independent School District Tuesday night, and the group also heard a request for increased expenditures next year in athletics, followed by a general review of the financial status of the school district.

Supt. J. C. McClesky told the board that the district's finances are not in good shape, and explained why, pointing out various factors which have brought the district to the point that this year's deficit at the end of the school year now is projected at just over \$20,000.

Among the resignations accepted was that of Kenneth Housden, high school boys basketball coach and tennis coach for both boys and girls.

Others resigning, or returning their contracts unsigned, were Sgt. L. B. Winters, Junior ROTC; Mrs. Nancy Harlan, fourth grade; Mrs. Sue Johnston, third grade; Mrs. Peggy Nation, music; Mrs.

Elizabeth Harlan, home economics; and these teachers in the special education category: Elaine Davidson, Cooper; Barbara Vest, Cooper; and Mrs. Martha Imbriet.

Coach Bill Curry, athletic director, requested an increase in the athletic budget for next year to \$26,993, as compared to this year's \$21,334. Increases were proposed in track equipment, especially in junior high, in football equipment, in

golf since the girls have been added to the program, in tennis, and in meal allowances in several areas. The coach observed that 90 boys are expected to take part in the football program next season.

The board took no action on the request, since the overall budget must be presented first.

Also, the board is to meet next Tuesday with a representative of Southwestern Public Service

Co., biggest taxpayer in the district, regarding the amount to be paid by the utility company.

In assessing the financial situation as it now stands, McClesky noted the possibility of increasing costs in several areas, the effect of declining enrollment which will cost the school district state money, some critical needs for increased expenditures in some areas and the uncertainty regarding money which comes to the district from the state and national levels.

The superintendent observed that the budget for building maintenance was cut by \$1,500 last year "when it should have been increased by \$2,500," and that the budget for teaching supplies was cut to \$5,000 when the recommended amount for the number of teachers in this system is \$15,000.

Board members, administrators and principals, who were present Tuesday, all agreed that there are many items of maintenance in every school in Slaton which badly need attention, but for which there is no money budgeted.

The school will qualify for 69 teachers next year, instead of the present 70, posing a loss of about \$7,000 in state aid funds. The number of teachers for which a school qualifies is based on the number of students in school. Average daily attendance in all Slaton schools now is less than it was at the beginning of the year, and in high school, where enrollment for the two previous years will push Slaton into Class AAA starting in the fall of 1974 (unless the state formula is changed), the outlook is that declining enrollment could put the school back into AA after two more years.

"We'll actually be competing in Class AAA with Class AA enrollment for a couple of years," one observer commented.

Textbook for a new high school drama course to be offered in the fall was approved.

Board members present were Don Kendrick, president; Bettye Burks, R. C. Hall Jr., Rev. Emilio Abeyta and J. Martin Basinger. Not present were Tommy Davis Jr. and Clark Self Jr.

## City Settles Longtime Dispute With Citizen

The City of Slaton Tuesday finally settled a long-standing financial wrangle with a local citizen who had refused to pay back taxes until refunded an amount which he loaned to the city several years ago to construct a sewer line across what now is U. S. 84 bypass.

Harold Wilson of Slaton agreed to pay the back taxes and the city agreed to pay Wilson the amount Wilson had supplied to pay for the sewer line.

The action was part of the regular semi-monthly session of the city commission, which also voted to buy two new pickups, appointed members to boards, presented certificates of appreciation to former city officials, and heard a challenge from the attorney for a Plaintiff man who had sought to operate a dance hall in Slaton.

Attorney Joe Cox, of Plainview, representing Pete C. Rodriguez, told the commission that the only way Rodriguez can get a return on the money he has invested in the building on 20th St. (formerly a bowling alley and furniture company) would be to operate a dance hall or to sell it to a party desiring to operate a private club on the premises. Previously, Rodriguez had been refused permission to open a dance hall,

then had opened it anyway, only to be closed down by police officers following a number of complaints from residents of the area.

The commission took no action on the matter.

Also discussed Tuesday was mowing of certain lots around town and charging owners for the mowing, following notification. The commissioners also agreed to buy two pickups from Smith Ford at a total of \$5230, appointed Dr. S. H. Jaynes as City Health Officer, and named R. J. Clark, J. S. Edwards Jr., J. Dodson, Don Basinger and Clark Self Jr. to the planning and zoning board. Named to the board of adjustment were Bruce Pember Sr., Milton Davis, J. L. Benton and B. A. Hanna.

The group discussed briefly the possibility of purchasing a building at 8th and Lynn Sts. for use as a police headquarters. Action on this matter was deferred.

Commissioners approved purchase of seven western-style straw hats for use by police officers this summer. Cost of the hats is \$10 each.

## Summer Youth Program Proposed

A proposal for a summer youth program with emphasis on track for young boys and girls age 9 through high school was endorsed by the board of directors of Slaton Chamber of Commerce in the regular monthly meeting of the board shortly after daylight Tuesday.

Slaton High School Athletic Director Bill Curry explained the proposed program which would be directed by him and by Mrs. Gay Benson, high school girls basketball and track coach.

Coach Curry, who operated a similar program at Iraan, said the youngsters are divided into four age groups and compete in about five junior Olympic

track meets, on Saturdays. Also included in the program, which would be conducted from 9 a.m. to noon each day, would be basic drills in golf, basketball and tennis.

The program would cost about \$1,600, it was explained, but there will be no charge for participating youngsters.

Also at Tuesday's meeting, the board discussed negotiations with an industrial prospect whose representative has visited the city. Should the industry be located here, it is anticipated that about 150 persons would be employed.

A well-known company is considering locating 10 satellite sewing operation plants around a metropolitan area, it was reported.

Board members also voted to increase prices for swimming at the city-county park pool, operated by the chamber, to 50 cents for all swimmers under 18 and 75 cents for those 18 and over. Chamber President J. W. Holt explained that an increase is needed to pay for qualified lifeguards.

The pool will open on Saturday, May 26, it was reported.

Also discussed were requirements for entering the Blue Ribbon City competition, and this matter was referred to committee.

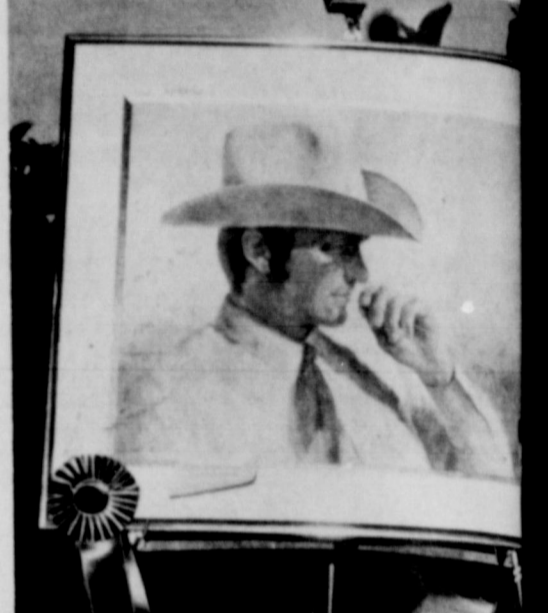

### COTTON TALKS

Processing of raw fiber into yarn by the relatively new "open end" spinning process holds distinct possibilities for increased usage of High Plains cotton, according to Ray Joe Riley of Hart, President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

Laboratory studies and commercial experience have shown, first, that the open end system is best adapted to the formation of the coarser yarns for which shorter, lower micronaire cottons are suited, and second that short staple, low micronaire cottons cause far less problems on open end spinning frames than in the conventional ring spinning process.

There is also evidence that yarns produced from low micronaire cottons on the open end system actually have greater strength and better uniformity than like yarns from the same system using higher micronaire cottons. These results came from a study supervised by the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University in a North Carolina pilot plant.

By the end of this year the Tech Center expects to have its own open end spinning frame in operation to conduct additional research.

There now are 15,000 open end spindles in the United States. The country's 19 million spindles have a portion of their open end spinning to open end spinning, Riley says. "The movement of open end spinning to open end spinning is significant because it means that more farmers are producing the open end system." The open end system produces a higher quality yarn. Labor costs are less than half of those for ring spinning. Materials can be used at a higher rate than in ring spinning. Dust and lint are less than in ring spinning. It is generally believed that open end yarns are 20 percent stronger than ring spun yarns. And this is true when the 3.5 to 4.5 micronaire range is used. Preliminary tests indicated that open end system micronaire cotton, in 3.2 readings, is just as strong as that spun in the traditional manner.

Another criticism of ring spinning is that it requires a lot of water. And this, says Riley, can be overcome by the use of micronaire cottons. Riley and other officials on the Plains the economic advantages of open end spinning can be realized by a mill located in Plains near the same raw material base as the open end system, and point out more than a little in establishing a plant of this size.

"And at PGC we are up to cooperate with the Textile Research Center, machinery makers and other companies to encourage interest," Riley says.
