Burglars Take Television Sets Here

Burglars took items valued at more than \$1,000 from Mosser TV in Slaton last Wednesday night, police investigated two vehicle accidents, another 10-speed bicycle was stolen in the city and three men faced charges after a dog was shot during the last week.

Two Slaton men came by the police department at 1:20 a.m. Wednesday to advise that the bus station apparently had been broken into. Officers checked and found that it was Mosser TV, 110 Texas Ave., which had been burglarized. Another Slaton man at the scene told police he saw a car leaving the scene and he gave officers a description of the car and occupants.

Hugo Mosser, owner of the firm, said three color television sets were missing, including a 23-inch RCA valued at \$400, 19-inch JVC valued at \$300 and a 16-inch Motorola valued at \$300. Also taken were three record albums described as Ringo, Hey, Let's Go Latin and Winning.

Entry was made by breaking the front door.

A collision between a pickup and a car at 5:59 a.m. Tuesday caused minor injuries to three farm laborers riding in a pickup driven by Jinks Johnson, 840 Jean. Driver of a 1964 auto involved in the wreck at 4th and Jean was Alvin Young, 240 E. Murray. The injured men were treated at Mercy Hospital.

At 4th and Lubbock last Friday a 1963 station wagon driven by Henry Remer Fondy, 225 S. 1st, and a 1965 car driven by Isaac Gonzales, 425 N. 5th, were involved in a collision. Damage

was estimated at just over \$50.

Bob Kern, 905 W. Garza, reported that a 10-speed bicycle had been stolen from the yard of his home Thursday night. The bike was valued at \$65 to \$70.

A 20-year-old Slaton man was charged with discharging a firearm in the city limits after a resident of the 1100-block on S. 2nd said the suspect had shot the complainant's dog through a window. Officers who went to the scene found the suspect hidden in a closet under a mattress, and then charged two other persons at the scene with aiding an escape from a police officer.

Pioneer Natural Gas Co. Plans To Add New Transmission Lines

LUBBOCK -- Pioneer Natural Gas Co. will start work immediately on a construction program designed to add approximately 100 miles of lines to increase the transmission capacity of Pioneer's present system, according to an announcement by K. Bert (Tex)

Watson, company president.

Speaking Friday before a group of business and civic leaders from the Lubbock area, Watson said, "Upon completion, the total project will represent

an additional investment of more than \$11 million. This figure is in addition to the more than \$2 million company expenditure for gathering lines now under construction or planned for the near future in the Anadarko and Delaware basins."

Summars Visit Europe

Rev. and Mrs. H. E. Summar of Slaton have just returned from a trip to Europe, a trip which they said they enjoyed, but they returned with a new awareness of the advantages of living in the United States.

The Summars visited their son, Rickey, his wife and two daughters. Rickey Summar plans to return to college in Canyon later this year after getting out of the Army.

During the two weeks in Europe, the Summars visited West Germany, Austria, Liechtenstein, Switzerland, France, Luxembourg and Belgium.

Rev. Summar, pastor of Bible Baptist Church, had these comments:

"As we had heard from others, there is a lot of beautiful country, from the great Alps to country as flat as West Texas. In many ways it is like another world. The habits of the people, their way of life, the buildings are so much different from ours. But, as you observe, their cares and desires are not much different. . . There is a language barrier, but even that can be overcome with a little effort.

"The people seem to be prosperous. New buildings are going up all over. . . The increase of the mark and the weakness of the dollar is causing a hardship on our servicemen and their families. . . the

latest increase of last week will hurt even more. Some servicemen will not be able to keep their families over there any longer.

"We left Europe with a determination to be a little more patient and helpful, if we should have visitors from another land who do not speak our language and our ways seem strange to them."

The Summars said they enjoyed their trip, "but how glad we were to set foot back on our own shore. . . We do have a new appreciation of our own country. . . this year the 4th of July will have a very special meaning to us."

Following Sunday evening services this weekend, Rev. Summar will show slides and movies made during the trip, with everyone invited.

Wimmer Honored For Conservation Practices

A. A. "Bus" Wimmer, who farms west of Slaton, has been named the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation Dis-

trict's Outstanding Conservation Farmer of the year. Cooper Lions Club recently honored Wimmer at a break-

fast meeting by presenting a plaque to him for his outstanding conservation work. Wimmer has stressed con-

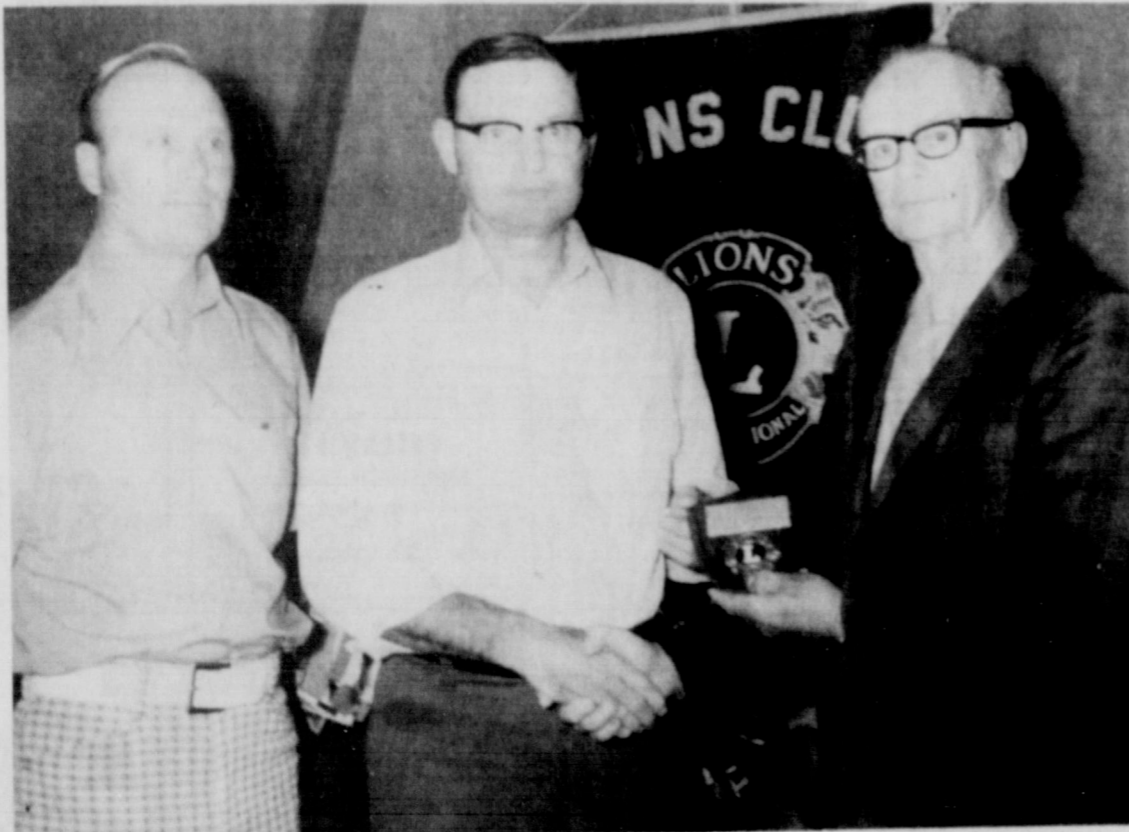
servation on the 480-acre farm he owns and operates west of Slaton plus an additional 220 acres he farms, with 320 acres of the 480 acres he owns being dryland. A total of 57,340 feet of parallel terraces have been built on the dryland portion. These terraces control the water erosion plus conserving the natural rainfall by holding it where it falls. The intervals between the terraces can be farmed with either 4, 6, or 8 row equipment.

The conservation program has been greatly enhanced on the 160-acre irrigated portion of his farm by the installation of a tailwater recovery pit. This pit is located to catch irrigation water as well as rainfall runoff. Wimmer said this pit has enabled him to make more efficient use of irrigation water and natural rainfall plus the irrigation of about 40 acres of additional land.

Wimmer is on the Board of Directors of the Slaton Co-Op Gin. He is a director of the Booster Club for Cooper School; he is also a member of the Knights of Columbus, Mr. and Mrs. Wimmer have six children, two girls and four boys. Two of the children are graduates of Texas Tech University. One son is a senior at Tech, Majoring in Business Administration; another son is a sophomore at Angelo State and a member of the varsity football team.

Two children are at home, a daughter who is a senior at Cooper High School, and the youngest son, a seventh grade student at St. Joseph's School in Slaton.

A spokesman for the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors said this: "We extend our congratulations to the entire family for their fine work in the conservation of our natural resources, as well as their contributions to the community in which they live."

Little League All-Star Team Is Announced

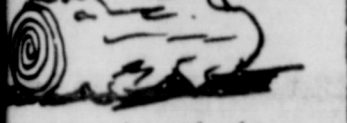

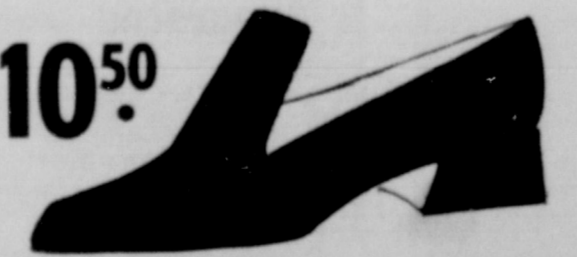

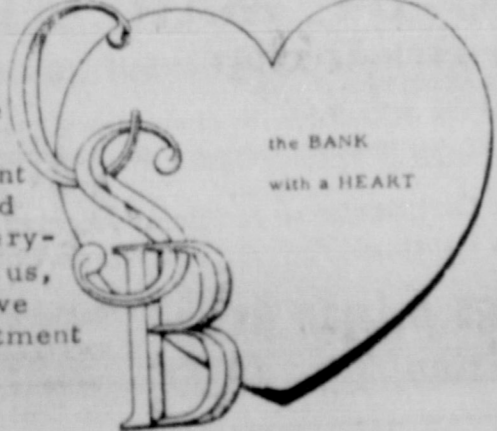

expect Him to do it. How does one listen for God's voice? In much the same way we train our ears to listen to sounds around us -- or shut the sounds out.

If you're working around machinery, you train your ears to listen to the sounds -- if everything is working correctly you can tell by the sound. If something goes haywire, you hear another kind of sound, and you can stop immediately and make the correction.

A youngster knows how to stay out of the sound of his mother's voice if he knows she's about to call him to do a task. But if she hollers to him that the chocolate cake (fresh out of the oven) is ready to eat, he hears immediately.

Have you ever been so engrossed in hearing someone speak that you lose all track of time? Ever been so wrapped up in reading your Bible that you lose all track of time? Ever been in a spirit of praise to the Father that you really don't realize anything else?

If your hobby is playing music, I know people who do this lose track of time. If you like to read, we lose track of time there. And in playing tennis, the same thing. Whatever you like to do and really enjoy doing,

Prayer is thanksgiving, praise, talking to God about everything, asking for something, etc. . . and listening! How would you feel if your best friend called you on the phone and asked about this and that, and never listened for an answer. Or not necessarily asking questions, but just blab and blab until you could not get a word in edgewise! Ever been around someone who just hogs the conversation so much that you just finally give up trying to make any kind of a remark?

Just the other day we were talking about how, when the kids were much younger, they did all the talking when the family was together at the dinner table. It was so yakyety at times that we had to tell them to shut their mouths, and eat! (That's a pretty good trick -- occur those that won't work, and sounded so gooney that everyone ended up giggling instead of yacking.) Then when the kids would go away for a weekend visit, we parents had grown so used to listening that when we did get a chance to talk, we were at a loss!

You know, when your children are very young, especially during the first few years of school, they come in from school just full of experiences they've had during the day and sharing every detail with you -- they don't especially require an answer from you -- they just want you to listen. But as they grow a little older they begin to listen for answers and comments.

I believe it's this way in our Christian growth too, in our relationship with God. When we're new in our life as a Christian maybe we do all the talking in our communication with Him. Then as we mature a little bit, we find that we need to spend much time in listening to what He has to say to us.

In the book of James, the Word tells us that He does give us answers if we ask Him and

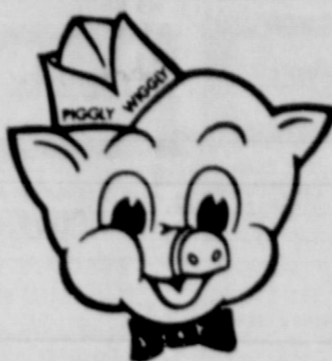
