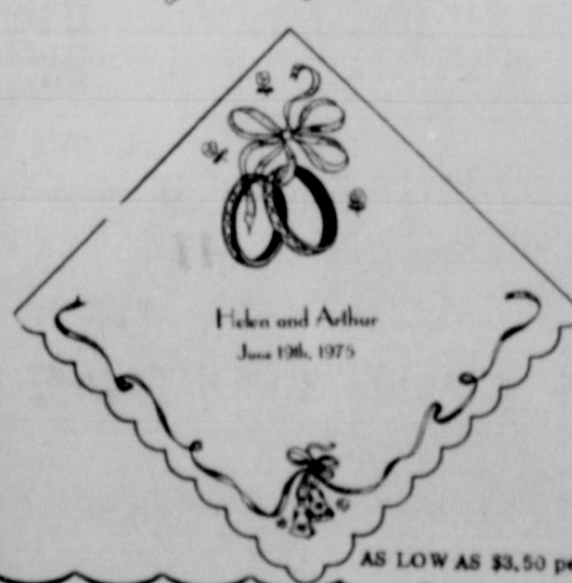

**Marsha Holloman Goes To Alaska**

The staff of an all-woman pharmacy in Anchorage, Ak., will be increased by one when Marsha Holloman receives her B. S. in pharmacy at the University of New Mexico this month.

Marsha's aunt, Mrs. Joy Donelson, a 1951 UNM pharmacy graduate, owns and operates the enterprise. She employs two pharmacists besides herself and also hires summer interns. All are female -- by prior design.

"When my aunt was in pharmacy in the fifties, it was very much a man's profession," said Marsha. "It was hard for a woman to get a job. This

was her way of helping them to get through school and find employment afterward."

Marsha said that she has suffered none of the discrimination her aunt did, either from male students or while interning at three different pharmacies. The picture for women in pharmacy has really changed all over, she said.

Female students now make up 25 per cent of the pharmacy student body nationally (it was only ten per cent in 1960) and about 20 per cent at UNM.

The former Slaton girl came to UNM three years ago when she switched from a biology major at Texas Tech in Lubbock. She cites her own reasons for choosing pharmacy as a career which also make it "an excellent choice for all women."

Marsha not only plans to work full-time, but to eventually own her own store, which by no means rules out a husband and family. "But I wouldn't want to marry a pharmacist," she adds. "Pharmacists talk shop all the time and I like to get together with other types of people and do social things. Also, when I get my own store, I want it to be mine -- with no one else to tell me how to run it!"

And with her determination, it seems likely that she'll make it. She was named Woman of the Year by the women's professional pharmacy fraternity, Kappa Epsilon (of which she was this year's president of the local chapter), and recently received the Upjohn Achievement Award in recognition of her outstanding contributions to pharmacy student affairs, professional activities, and community service.

Marsha already loves Alaska, having interned there for three summers.

She will leave for a driving trip to Anchorage with her father on May 23.

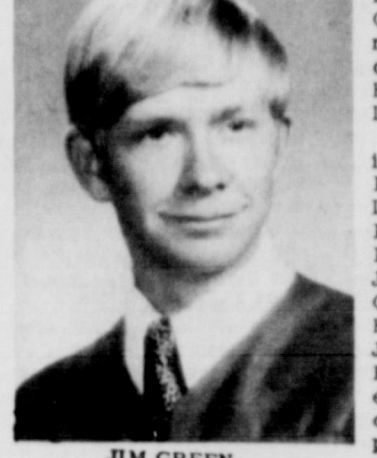

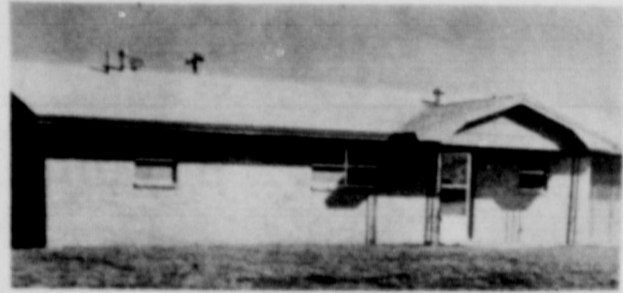

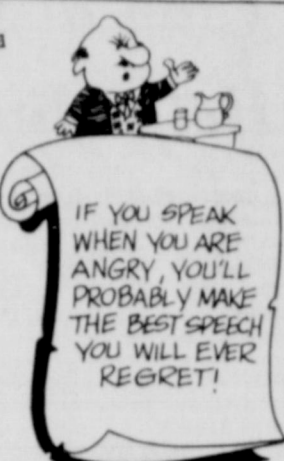

Obedience is better than sacrifice, so says the scriptures in many places.

Why do we teach our children to be obedient in the first place? Is it because we just want to be boss, or is it because we love them?

A good servant obeys without question. An obedient child of God obeys without questioning the "why".

Remember the story in the Bible about the centurion whose servant was sick and ready to die, and the centurion sent some respected Jewish elders to Jesus to ask him to come and heal the servant. Jesus went with them to go see about the sick servant, but before arriving at the house, the centurion sent word that he wasn't even worthy to have Jesus come to his home, but that if he'd just say the word, he knew that his servant would be healed.

The centurion added, "I know, because I am under the authority of my superior officers, and I have authority over my men. I only need to say 'Go!' and they go; or 'Come!' and they come; and to my slave, 'Do this or that,' and he does it. So just say, 'Be healed!' and my servant will be well again!"

Jesus marvelled at this man's faith, and said he had not found such great faith anywhere, even in Israel. And when the centurion's people returned to the home, they found the servant completely healed. (Luke, chapter 7.)

I am convinced, over and over again, that we must learn even the most simple lessons again. And that is to just simply trust Jesus -- most especially when things don't seem to be going right.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed and 28 persons injured.

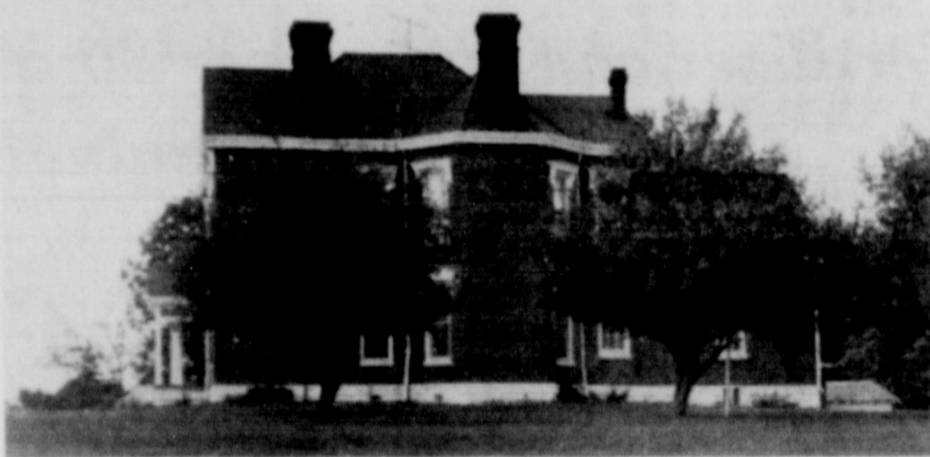
The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1973 shows a total of 170 accidents resulting in four persons killed and 76 persons injured.
