Slaton school board members, balancing the needs of the system for the coming school year against the bleak outlook of a huge loss in federal funds, agreed Tuesday night to try to operate on a 1973-74 budget which could put the district an

the end of that year. Supt. J. C. McClesky, who presented a tentative budget for next year for discussion, warned that operating a school system with any kind of deficit is undesirable, but that a deficit anywhere near the size of the one projected by the end of August 1974 "is bad business."

The board, however, tentatively approved the budget after authorizing some paring in specific areas, and also voted to start a building trades program in the high school this fall. Some discussion was devoted to the possibility of delaying start of the building trades program for two years -- a time when the school district anticipates a sizeable increase in tax revenue because of an increase in renditions -- but school board members agreed that the vocational building trades should be started now. A building adjacent to the school administrative offices has been purchased for use in building trades.

Another major cost area pondered Tuesday night was whether to hire 69 or 70 teachers for next year. Teacher salaries are mostly

Dance Hall Issue Still Unsettled

A Plainview resident who has been trying to open a dance hall on 20th St. here appeared before Slaton city commissioners Tuesday night to appeal their decision refusing him permission to operate the dance

Commissioners again refused to grant permission, and the man. Pete Rodriguez, who was accompanied by his attorney, Joe Cox, indicated he pursue the matter further, hinting at court action. Cox told commissioners he had researched Slaton city ordinances and found that an old ordinance prohibiting a dance hall within 600 feet of a residence had been superseded by a subsequent ordinance which did not mention any such

In other action, the commission discussed the water system, agreeing on the installation of a new pump to help equalize water pressure, and discussed remodeling which would be needed if the city purchases a building now under consideration for a new police station and jail.

It was noted that the seal coat program now has been completed, and city officials observed that the police appreciation banquet is scheduled Friday night at the VFW hall, state, and the number of teachers a system qualifies for is based on the average daily attendance in the schools. This year, with much sickness and an unusually bad winter, there was much abseteeism in the schools, and this brought the system's average daily attendance down to a point where the school only qualifies for 69 teachers.

Administrative Assistant Joe Sparkman pointed out to the board that the total enrollment is about the same, however, and that cutting out a teacher would put a terrific burden on

other teachers in the number of students they would have in the classroom. The board, consequently, agreed that the local district would have to beat the cost of hiring this teacher in


order to continue the quality of education here.

Supt. McClesky did offer hope for financial improvement over the projected \$52,000-plus deficit for 15 months from now, pointing out that any number of factors could influence what happens, especially in the area of federal funds. The reason the school is operating in the red is due partly to increases in some areas because of rising costs or needs, but is due mostly to the projected loss of federal funds because of programs which have been in effect in the past, but which either will not be operated this fall, or which

are pending action by Congress. The deficit figure mentioned for August 1974 includes an anticipated \$21,000 deficit this year, but school officials are hopeful that this figure can be reduced by what happens during the next three months, Also, if Congress funds some of the programs which now are pending action, the picture could be considerably brighter, it was

The board and administrative officials expressed hope that another look at the financial picture in early August could offer a much rosier view. Public hearing on the 1973-74 budget is scheduled in August prior to final approval by the





Cassels, religion writer for United Press International, criticized in his column a week or so ago what termed "Evangelism by bumper sticker," suggesting that these "pious bumper stickers are doing far more harm than good to the cause of Christ,"

The writer said the Apostle warned Chrisitans of Corinth that no souls are won by public acts which offend good taste, saying that "everything must be done in a proper and orderly way." He also quotes I Peter "Let all your behavior be such as even pagans can recognize as good,"

We have no quarrel with Paul or Peter, certainly, and entirely agree that some things done in the name of Chrisitianity these days may be offensive to some persons, and if so, should never be done publicly. Our first reaction to

Cassels' remarks was indignation. But before striking back at him, and remembering that Paul also said "Put all things to the test: keep what is good and avoid every kind of evil" (I Thess. 5:21-22), we prayed about the situation and also pondered what might be the good and bad points regarding bumper stickers.

Cassels agrees that those who use bumper stickers saying such things as "Honk If You Love Jesus" or "In Case of Rapture, This Car Will Be Unmanned' are sincere in thinking they are helping to promote the Christian faith in a pagan world. But he is not sure they are doing he says.

Where we belive Cassels missing the point is in his bvious conclusion that all umper stickers are in bad aste, and his apparent belief most of those persons sporting the bumper stickers are trying to call attention to emselves as somebody worth mulating. We have a couple of bumper

stickers on our car, one of which says "Wave If You Love Jesus." We don't get all upset with those who don't wave; but when someone does, it warms our earts to know that there goes brother or sister in Christ, ne who has discovered what this life is all about. We believe that most persons

tho utilize the bumper stickers to so because they are not shamed of their savior -- when u love someone, you sure want tell others about it!

Finally, we belive this; some umper stickers ARE offensive. We personally don't care for those with negative messages such as "What Do ou Miss By Being A Christian? ell!" We prefer the positive approach, the Good News that esus is alive and well and busy

So in conclusion we believe that the UPI writer has done a disservice to many. We notice he has no objection to team support stickers (Red Raiders, Dallas Cowboys, etc.), but only to those which glorify Christ. Certainly we ought to love and proclaim God more than our favorite athletic team.

Incidentally, one of the most offensive bumper stickers we have ever seen is the one which says "Only Love Is Better Than Schlitz." But we noticed here in Slaton that one fellow trimmed his down to read simply, "Love Is Better." We like that. We love Louis Cassels, too.

week of May 20." In 1952 the area put a cotton. The next highest acreage was seen last year when an esitmated 2.6 million acres were planted. The huge acreage of 1952 resulted in a harvest of only a little over 1,5 million bales, and the production record for the Plains was set in 1961 with 2,433,900 bales gathered from 2,593,440 planted acres.

"So 1973 acreage is almost a cinch to be above any crop since 1952," Johnson figures, "and with our good under ground moisture and a little bit of luck there is reason to speculate on setting a new all-time production record for the Plains."

Across the cotton belt, the cotton acreage and production picture is not so rosy. According to the most recent report on acreage intentions compiled by the National Cotton Council after a survey of state extension service and USDA personnel, only Texas, Oklahoma, California, Arizona and North Carolina are expected to equal or exceed last year's plantings.

Cotton prospects, both for acreage and production, are still uncertain in the rain and flood plagued states of Mississippi, Arkansas, Missouri, Louisiana and Tennessee -states which in 1972 accounted for 4.8 million of the nation's 13.99 million acres and produced almost 38 percent of the total crop.

Acreage in the five states for 1973, according to the NCC report, is now not expected to be above 3.5 million and could be down to 3,3 million, even Another 175,000 acres or so will be dropped by Carolinas, Georgia, Alabama and New Mexico.

Nationwide the figures from NCC's survey indicate 1973 plantings may be from 12,388,000 to 13,070,000 acres, down 6.6 to 11.5 percent from last year.

There's a change in income-perhaps a drastic one. So we must change the way we budget and spend our

We may change the place we live. Sell the house. Buy another or rent an apartment. Fit into a new community. Maybe adapt to another climate.

And obviously we face physical changes as we get lder. Our bodies may need different kinds-and amounts -of food. This calls for a new approach to buying food, planning menus, cooking.

Managing all these changes is easier if you get organized and make plans. Here are a few of the questions you'll probably have to consider sooner or later:

WHILE harvest of Texas onions has peaked in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, the Winter Garden-San Antonio area is in the midst of onion harvest.

Based on May 1 reports, the Texas early spring onion crop is five percent below last year's crop; the yield is reduced 15 percent from last year due to weather.

Harvesting has also been completed in the Coastal Bend area. In the San Antonio area, the crop remains in generally excellent condition with good yields being

TEXAS broke a nationwide 83-day free period of hog cholera recently when two counties were quarantined due to a verified case of that swine disease.

Hidalgo and Cameron counties in the Lower Rio Grande Valley are now under state and federal quarantines. They are designed to sharply limit swine movements until

verify the health of all swine herds in the vicinity.

Hog cholera is a highly infectious virus disease usually fatal to swine, but it does not affect other animals or humans.

Federal import regulations already prohibit the entry of live hogs, fresh pork and pork products into this country from Mexico. The new quarantines restrict swine movements within the state and between Texas and other

Meanwhile, the national hog cholera advisory committee is currently looking at ways to speed up the eradication of hog cholera. A total of 43 states are now classified as "hog cholera free" under the nationwide eradication program.

SHEEP feeders with a lot capacity of 2,000 head or more had 87,000 sheep and lambs on feed as of May 1, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service reports.

Current intentions to market the 87,000 head are: May 40,000; June 29,000; and July 18,000.

The number on feed is six percent below the number a month ago but 36 percent above the number on feed last

Plans to improve job opportunities, community services, and the social and physical environment in rural Texas have been detailed by the Texas Rural Development Commission. The commission is a joint effort of the governor's office and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The five-point program to revive rural Texas as outlined by the commission is as follows:

1. Give people a choice of where they live by providing attractive employment opportunities, adequate community facilities and services (including health, housing, transportation, and public protection), and a more attractive living environment in rural areas which will create a better balance in the distribution of population.

2. Attract new industries and develop existing industries in rural areas.

3. Provide relevant educational opportunities for rural residents.

4. Provide for the orderly development and protection of the natural environment in rural areas.

5. Maintain a profitable agricultural industry as a major element of the rural economy.

The commission also recommended the establishment of a committee on rural development in each house of the

Texas Legislature. About 20 percent of the state's population now lives

in rural Texas. This is more than 2,250,000 people. Texas' rural population is more than the combined populations of five states-Alaska, Delaware, Nevada, Vermont, and
