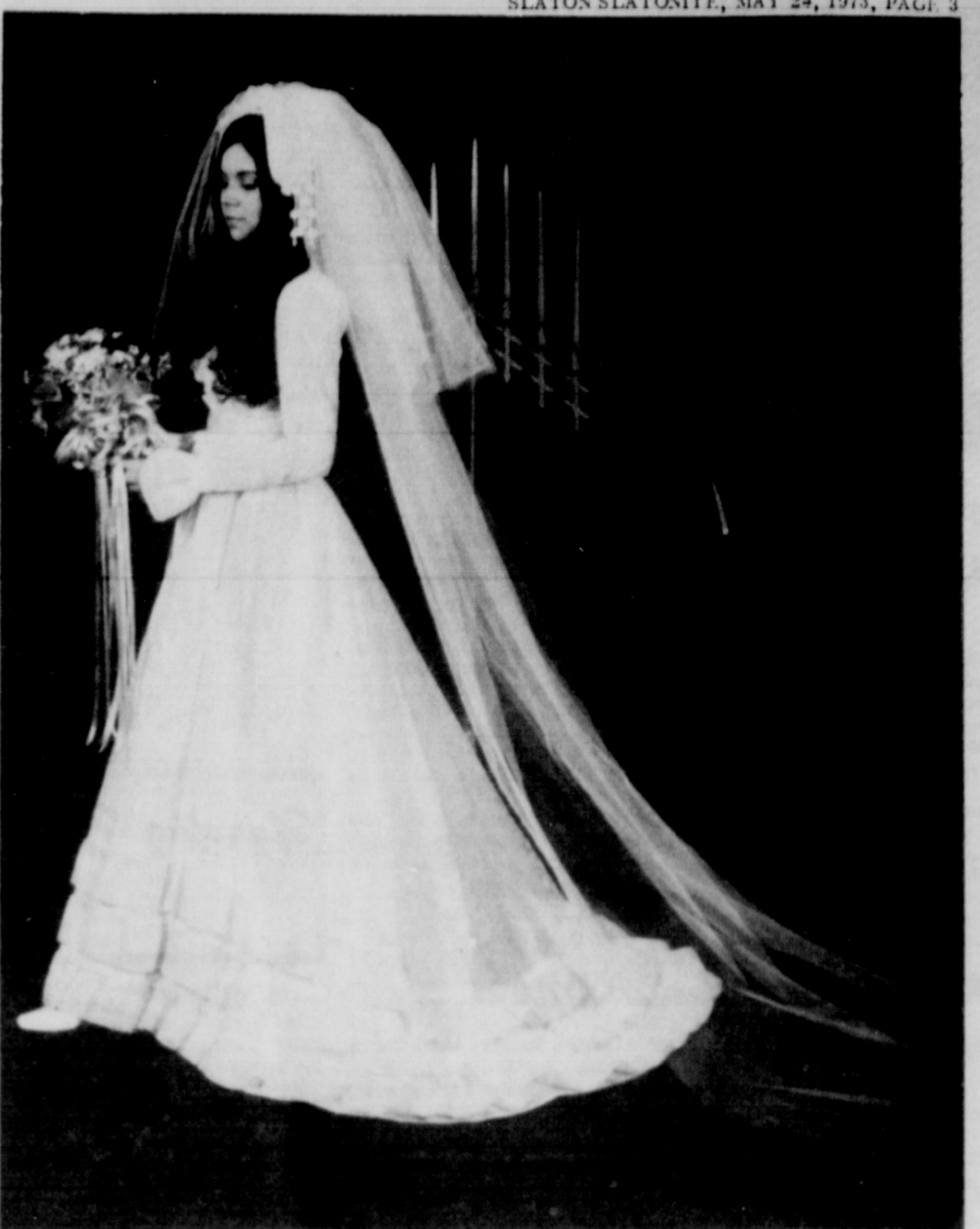

### By DALTON WOOD PRAISE THE LORD

Louis Cassels, religion writer for United Press International, criticized in his column a week or so ago what he termed "Evangelism by bumper sticker," suggesting that these "pious bumper stickers are doing far more harm than good to the cause of Christ."

The writer said the Apostle Paul warned Christians of Corinth that no souls are won by public acts which offend good taste, saying that "everything must be done in a proper and orderly way." He also quotes I Peter "Let all your behavior be such as even pagans can recognize as good."

We have no quarrel with Paul or Peter, certainly, and entirely agree that some things done in the name of Christianity these days may be offensive to some persons, and if so, should never be done publicly.

Our first reaction to Cassels' remarks was indignation. But before striking back at him, and remembering that Paul also said "Put all things to the test: keep what is good and avoid every kind of evil" (I Thess. 5:21-22), we prayed about the situation and also pondered what might be the good and bad points regarding bumper stickers.

Cassels agrees that those who use bumper stickers saying such things as "Honk If You Love Jesus" or "In Case of Rapture, This Car Will Be Unmanned" are sincere in thinking they are helping to promote the Christian faith in a pagan world. But he is not sure they are doing so, he says.

Where we believe Cassels is missing the point is in his obvious conclusion that all bumper stickers are in bad taste, and his apparent belief that most of those persons sporting the bumper stickers are trying to call attention to themselves as somebody worth emulating.

We have a couple of bumper stickers on our car, one of which says "Wave If You Love Jesus." We don't get all upset with those who don't wave; but when someone does, it warms our hearts to know that there goes a brother or sister in Christ, one who has discovered what this life is all about.

We believe that most persons who utilize the bumper stickers do so because they are not ashamed of their savior -- when you love someone, you sure want to tell others about it!

Finally, we believe this: some bumper stickers ARE offensive. We personally don't care for those with negative messages such as "What Do You Miss By Being A Christian? Hell!" We prefer the positive approach, the Good News that Jesus is alive and well and busy today!

So in conclusion we believe that the UPI writer has done a disservice to many. We notice he has no objection to team support stickers (Red Raiders, Dallas Cowboys, etc.), but only to those which glorify Christ. Certainly we ought to love and proclaim God more than our favorite athletic team.

Incidentally, one of the most offensive bumper stickers we have ever seen is the one which says "Only Love Is Better Than Schlitz." But we noticed here in Slaton that one fellow trimmed his down to read simply, "Love Is Better." We like that.

We love Louis Cassels, too. Praise the Lord!

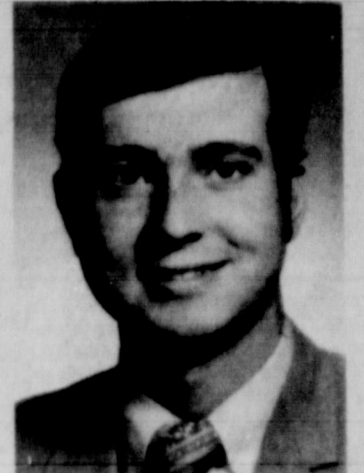

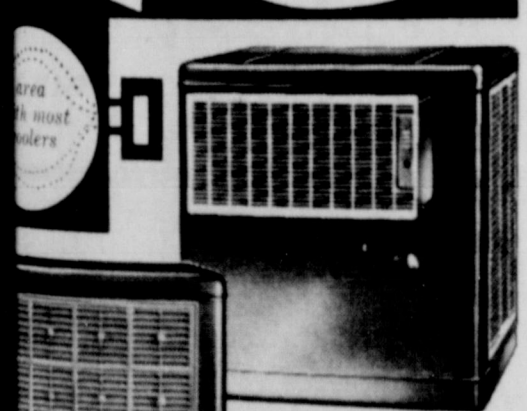

with her head nearly touching mine and she's pawing dirt and snorting. . . . At 5:30 I feed the calf another bottle.

"During the night another brahama heifer had a calf, and it doesn't look too hot, so I fix another bottle, leaving out pepto bismol and aspirin and down to the barn I go. She eyes me and I eye her and think that mama cow doesn't look any too gentle, so I lay the bottle down and climb the fence -- about that time, here she comes after me and I just fly over that fence and when I landed, I turned my ankle. . . .so I limp to the house and get a rope and standing on the fence I finally get around the calf's back part and pull it to the fence where back on my belly I stuff the bottle down the calf's throat, trying to get it to swallow. A couple of times that mama ran up to the fence trying to scare me.

"So anytime you hear someone complain about the high cost of beef, you might explain this little incident -- I'd like to see some of those women out at the barn. . . ."

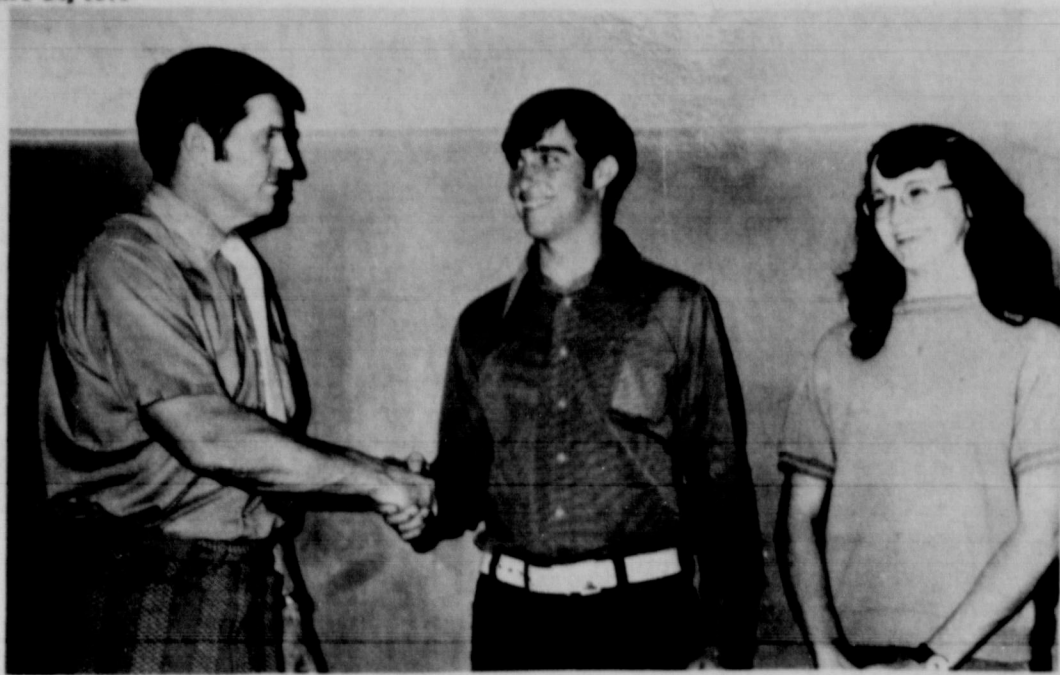

## COTTON TALKS

The Texas High Plains is well on its way to planting what is expected to be the highest acreage seeded to cotton in the last 20 years.

According to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., which covers 25 Plains counties, estimates of total acres planted to cotton for 1973 run from a minimum of 2.7 million to as high as 3 million, "and planting is expected to reach the 90 percent completion mark during the

In 1952 the area put a whopping 3.9 million acres in cotton. The next highest acreage was seen last year when an estimated 2.6 million acres were planted. The huge acreage of 1952 resulted in a harvest of only a little over 1.5 million bales, and the production record for the Plains was set in 1961 with 2,433,900 bales gathered from 2,593,440 planted acres.

"So 1973 acreage is almost a cinch to be above any crop since 1952," Johnson figures, "and with our good underground moisture and a little bit of luck there is reason to speculate on setting a new all-time production record for the Plains."

Across the cotton belt, the cotton acreage and production picture is not so rosy. According to the most recent report on acreage intentions compiled by the National Cotton Council after a survey of state extension service and USDA personnel, only Texas, Oklahoma, California, Arizona and North Carolina are expected to equal or exceed last year's plantings.

Cotton prospects, both for acreage and production, are still uncertain in the rain and flood plagued states of Mississippi, Arkansas, Missouri, Louisiana and Tennessee -- states which in 1972 accounted for 4.8 million acres and produced almost 38 percent of the total crop.

Acreage in the five states for 1973, according to the NCC report, is now not expected to be above 3.5 million and could be down to 3.3 million, even with continued good weather. Another 175,000 acres or so will be dropped by the Carolinas, Georgia, Alabama and New Mexico.

Nationwide the figures from NCC's survey indicate 1973 plantings may be from 12,388,000 to 13,070,000 acres, down 6.5 to 11.5 percent from last year.

"Not only will acreage be

down for 1973," Johnson adds, "but most of these unfortunate sections of the belt will be from two to five weeks late getting planted, greatly reducing chances for normal yields."

Another noteworthy item related to fiber supply and demand comes from the textile trade publication "Daily News Record," which stated on May 3 that "The yarn shortage is worldwide and cuts across the board in polyesters, nylons, acrylics and cellulotics. . . which means knitters frequently will be unable to obtain their yarn requirements."

Memo From Mac

TODAY'S THOUGHT: The love of justice should be more than the fear of suffering injustice -- R. B. McAlister. DOGGIE DOCTORS and Moo Medicine Men . . . The cattle and beef industry in West and North Texas has grown and with that growth has come problems. The animals need looking at from time to time and it's been recommended that Canyon be the site of a large animal diagnostic laboratory. I support this in the hope that it would be the beginning of the movement to give Texas a strong vet school. I want the House to set up an Interim Study Committee to get the panoramic view of the whole situation. It looks like to me there are a lot of vets interested in the pet population, but not too many vet school grads are getting into cows. Take that and chew on it.

LET'S HEAR IT for cotton! Texas Tech got the 100 thousand their cotton research effort. West Texas can be truly grateful for the presence of Rep. Renal Ross on the Conference Committee on Appropriations. He and Chairman Neil Caldwell made an excellent presentation for Texas Tech in securing the Committee approval of requested money. Final approval of the Appropriations Bill should take place in both Houses next week.

IT'S PUT TO BED. . . House Bill 946 passed. The public school funding bill passed resoundingly Wednesday, May 17 after weeks of hassle and hustle. It's now pending before the Senate. My own feeling is that the chances of HB 946 passing both Houses and being signed by the Governor are slim. But then again, if it does pass, it can give Texas the most qualitative and economical educational system in America.

PROFILE: Rep. Ray Hutchison. He's a Republican from Dallas, first-termer and a

fighter. He's already been made Chairman of the standing Subcommittee on Urban Affairs and that's fine with him since his main interest is the study of government control in the hands of the local folks. . . in Dallas and elsewhere. He'll be stumping for a mass transit system in Dallas (a bill for this is due a House vote next week) and says he's happy about his amendment giving city/county residents the right to vote on collective bargaining issues involving policemen and firemen. Look for him to be very visible next year at the Constitutional Convention.

REGIONALISM Resolution. Introduced today was a resolution calling for all West Texas institutions of higher learning to combine themselves under a regional concept. That includes, Texas Tech, Midwestern University, Angelo State University and Sul Ross. UT has already taken this step successfully and South Texas is considering. I like the idea and hope the rest of West Texas does too.

IT WASN'T TOLD TO ME, I only heard it. . . Said the spectator at the back of the Committee room, "They tell me that McAlister is pretty smart, but he sure don't look it! Think he's from Amarillo." I sorta hope he was in error on at least two of the three observations. THASSAWLFOKES. . . MAC

## Dear Consumer Ready to Retire?

Retirement. It's a big move—and each of us makes it differently.

Some settle back and slow down for the first time in their lives. Others look for new activity, dramatic changes, an exciting second career.

One woman I know—an ex-executive—turned to nursery school teaching. A salesman enrolled for his freshman year at his local community college.

But there's one thing we must all cope with when we retire: Change.

There's a change in income—perhaps a drastic one. So we must change the way we budget and spend our money.

We may change the place we live. Sell the house. Buy another or rent an apartment. Fit into a new community. Maybe adapt to another climate.

And obviously we face physical changes as we get older. Our bodies may need different kinds—and amounts—of food. This calls for a new approach to buying food, planning menus, cooking.

Managing all these changes is easier if you get organized and make plans. Here are a few of the questions you'll probably have to consider sooner or later:

- Exactly what income can you count on? Pension? Retirement fund payments? Social Security benefits? Income from investments?

- What expenses will you eliminate or cut back? Clothing, lunches, commutation? Perhaps your second car?

- What about health care? Do you have all the protection you need? Do you know exactly what Medicare offers?

- If you need additional income, could you find and handle a part-time job? If you're unable to work, do you know what help is available through Federal, state, local programs? Have you checked with your county government concerning old-age assistance, Medicaid, food aid programs?

• Would living be easier, pleasanter, cheaper in another part of the country? Have you compared various communities' services for older people? Check, for instance, special rates on buses and at theaters as well as local social services.

If you need help answering these questions, you may want to look into these booklets published by the Federal Government. They can be ordered from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. (Make checks or money orders payable to Supt. of Documents.)

## Air, Water Pollution Rules To Be Aired Closed Circuit

A nationwide closed-circuit teleconference on federal-state enforcement of water and air-pollution control laws will be presented in 24 cities on June 14 by the National Association of Manufacturers.

It is expected that the administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, and other top agency officials who administer air and water pollution regulations will take part in the telecast along with pollution control experts expressing industrial viewpoints.

EPA officials will explain current federal policies on administering requirements for industry under both the Clean Air Amendments of 1970 and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972. Industry rep-

resentatives will explain difficulties in achieving compliance with some interpretations of the laws. Registrants to the teleconference are submitting questions and comments for inclusion in the program.

Following the telecast from Washington, EPA Regional Administrators and State air and water pollution control officials will participate in panels and discuss compliance problems with local manufacturers. The teleconference is being co-sponsored by manufacturers' associations affiliated with the NAM in the National Industrial Council.

Among EPA officials who will appear are Robert W. Fri, deputy administrator; John R. Quarles, Jr. assistant administrator for enforce-

ment and general counsel; and Robert L. Sansom, assistant administrator for Air and Water programs.

## 1040 U.S. Individual Income Tax Return for the year ending January 1-December 31, 1972 Taxpayers Ask IR

Q. I filed my return just before the April 15th deadline. When can I expect my refund?

A. If there are no mistakes on your return that might delay

processing, it normally takes about six weeks after a return is filed. It might take a little longer to get your refund, however, due to the large volume of returns filed in April.

Q. Through my own fault, I wrecked my car. I don't have insurance to cover the damage. Can I deduct this loss on my 1973 return?

A. Yes. If you itemize your deductions, damage to your car caused by an auto accident is deductible as a casualty loss whether or not it resulted from the faulty driving of either

driver, as long as it was caused by your negligence.

Remember, a casualty loss may be only to the extent of \$100. For more information on deducting a casualty loss, see Publication 547, Information on Disaster Relief.

You One of the 24,000? . . . Harvest Slows In Nearing Peak In Another . . . Hog Cholera Strikes Sheep On Feed Is Down But Up.

Being distributed by the mailmen are 24,000 questionnaires to that many number of farmers in the state. If you get one of the questionnaires requested to fill it out as accurately as possible and as soon as possible.

The questionnaires form the basis of information on crops. The information is also used in making farm programs. None of the reports will be on an individual basis. They are compiled into county and state totals.

Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Services

urges you to fill out and return the crop questionnaire so that a complete and accurate picture of Texas agriculture can be put together.

If you are one of the 24,000, you'll be doing yourself and all other farmers in the state a good turn, too, by answering and returning the questionnaire.

**WHILE** harvest of Texas onions has peaked in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, the Winter Garden-San Antonio area is in the midst of onion harvest.

Based on May 1 reports, the Texas early spring onion crop is five percent below last year's crop; the yield is reduced 15 percent from last year due to weather.

Harvesting has also been completed in the Coastal Bend area. In the San Antonio area, the crop remains in generally excellent condition with good yields being reported.

**TEXAS** broke a nationwide 83-day free period of hog cholera recently when two counties were quarantined due to a verified case of that swine disease.

Hidalgo and Cameron counties in the Lower Rio Grande Valley are now under state and federal quarantines. They are designed to sharply limit swine movements until veterinary medical officers and livestock inspectors can

verify the health of all swine herds in the vicinity.

Hog cholera is a highly infectious virus disease usually fatal to swine, but it does not affect other animals or humans.

Federal import regulations already prohibit the entry of live hogs, fresh pork and pork products into this country from Mexico. The new quarantines restrict swine movements within the state and between Texas and other states.

Meanwhile, the national hog cholera advisory committee is currently looking at ways to speed up the eradication of hog cholera. A total of 43 states are now classified as "hog cholera free" under the nationwide eradication program.

**SHEEP** feeders with a lot capacity of 2,000 head or more had 87,000 sheep and lambs on feed as of May 1, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service reports.

Current intentions to market the 87,000 head are: May 40,000; June 29,000; and July 18,000.

The number on feed is six percent below the number a month ago but 36 percent above the number on feed last year.

Placements during April totaled 34,000 head with a total of nine feeders reporting 1,000 or more head on feed as of May 1.

Plans to improve job opportunities, community services, and the social and physical environment in rural Texas have been detailed by the Texas Rural Development Commission. The commission is a joint effort of the governor's office and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The five-point program to revive rural Texas as outlined by the commission is as follows:

1. Give people a choice of where they live by providing attractive employment opportunities, adequate community facilities and services (including health, housing, transportation, and public protection), and a more attractive living environment in rural areas which will create a better balance in the distribution of population.

2. Attract new industries and develop existing industries in rural areas.

3. Provide relevant educational opportunities for rural residents.

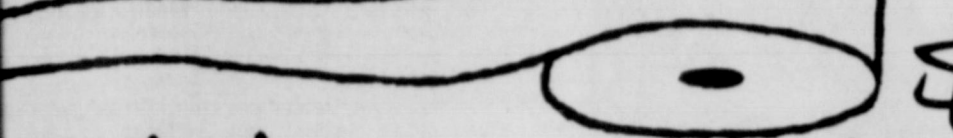
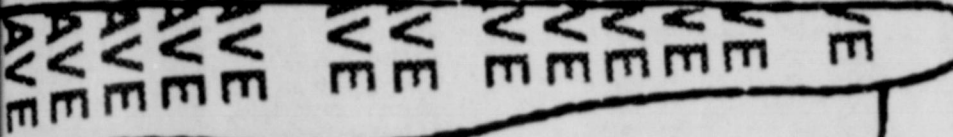
4. Provide for the orderly development and protection of the natural environment in rural areas.

5. Maintain a profitable agricultural industry as a major element of the rural economy.

The commission also recommended the establishment of a committee on rural development in each house of the Texas Legislature.

About 20 percent of the state's population now lives in rural Texas. This is more than 2,250,000 people. Texas' rural population is more than the combined populations of five states—Alaska, Delaware, Nevada, Vermont, and Wyoming.
