School Tax Increase Appears Inevitable

...later, Slaton Independent School District is going to have to raise taxes. ... expressed with considerable belief, but with increasing frequency in months by various persons connected with the school business, was brought out with emphasis Tuesday night by an ... employed to review the school's ... by a letter from the all-powerful Education Agency, and by members of the board of trustees. ... these were looking at the rapidly growing budget deficit of the district. money this year now appears likely. He explained that the U. S. Congress has not provided the Title I funding in the amount that the state education officials had assured the district it would, and unless some new action is taken by Congress soon, some of those persons hired under the federal program would have to be dismissed at mid-term. Doyle Criswell of the Lubbock firm of Hallmark, Hearn and Criswell presented the annual audit report of school finances and expressed concern over the growth of the deficit. "You started last year \$17,000 in the hole;

you went \$22,000 further in the hole during the year, and by the end of the current year you anticipate going another \$30,000 in the hole. That's building it up too fast," Criswell observed. Criswell commented that even with an anticipated major increase in total evaluation of property in the district, the deficit could hardly be wiped out at once. Later in the meeting, after the audit report had been approved as presented, Supt. McClesky read to the board a letter from the TEA's accreditation committee which recently visited the school. One of the four items the committee advised Slaton

schools to do was to get rid of the deficit in financing. The others involved institution of a self-evaluation program and upgrading of the library and science facilities. These are advisory items, however, and the school has full accreditation at this time. Mrs. Bob Kern, coordinator of special programs for Slaton, Cooper, Roosevelt and Southland schools, reported on plans to set up a diagnostic center funded by the state and staffed by SELCO personnel working closely with Texas Tech departments of psychology, education and psychiatry. The program would involve only Spanish-

speaking students, she said, referring to state law which says that before a child can be put into a special education program, he must be tested in his own language. One classroom in each school district would be set up, utilizing Tech graduate students to assist in the testing. School board members approved participation in the program. Coming in for lengthy discussion were proposed guidelines for employing personnel, liability insurance for board members and current operational problems involving the school lunchroom and recently established lunch prices.

REQUIREMENTS MAY HURT SLATON CHANCES

Textile Mill Plans Spur Rumors In Area

...cities have been doing whatever they can to interest officials of the Japanese firm in locating the proposed plant in their respective cities. The cotton spinning mill is supposed to employ 750 persons in the first five years of operation and is envisioned as "the most modern textile plant in the United States or Asia."

In addition to the Japanese plans, which purportedly involve an initial investment of \$15 million, several other companies have expressed interest in the cotton-rich South Plains area as a general region where textile mills could be established profitably.

Monday's announcement was made jointly by Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Naoshi Seto, president of Daiwa Spinning Co., Ltd., headquartered at Osaka, Japan, the firm that will build the plant.

T. Konishi of Osaka, managing director of the company, was present for the ceremony in Austin. Also present was Roy B. Davis of Lubbock, consultant to the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University and a leader in the effort to bring textile processing to the Plains.

A specific site was not announced. Spokesmen in the governor's office, however, said the plant would be "in the Lubbock-Plainview area."

Members of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce board of directors discussed the textile plant announcement at a regular meeting of the board Tuesday morning. Chamber President J. W. Holt said he had talked with sources close to the Texas Industrial Commission in Austin and learned that although Plainview officials believe they have the inside track on landing the new industry, no definite commitment appears to have been made.

"We believe Slaton still is in the running for the plant, with the biggest stumbling block possibly Slaton's inability to deliver to the plant site the required amount of water," Holt told the board members.

Slaton city officials have said that 750,000 gallons per day is the maximum amount of water Slaton can deliver to a plant site here without affecting the a-

mount of water needed for all other purposes in the city. It was explained that this is a maximum determined by the size of a feeder line to here from the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority main line runs to Lubbock.

Representatives of the TIC first had indicated that a maximum of 700,000 gallons per day would be required. Later the daily peak requirement figures have been tossed around in varying amounts ranging all the way up to 3 million gallons per day. Slaton chamber officials said they would attempt to get a definite figure on how much water would be required.

Slaton's proposal to the company has been to donate the necessary acreage needed for the site, provide utilities to the site and give a five-year moratorium on city taxes.

Although fabrics from the plant appear to be a little way off, the project already has turned out a lot of rumors and a lot of "definite facts" which are ob-

viously contradictory. Among statements Tuesday:

"Slaton still appears to have a good chance" -- from Slaton and Lubbock officials and the source close to the TIC.

"The plant will be in Plainview." -- from a Plainview banker.

"Choice of a site definitely has been narrowed down to Floydada or Leveland." -- from a Levelland newspaperman.

Meanwhile, the long-awaited announcement of who gets the plum is expected in mid-December, and even if Slaton does not land this plant, there is a chance of landing another.

Carl Cox of Dallas, executive director of the Natural Fibers and Food Protein Committee of Texas, said there are strong prospects for additional Japanese plants to be built in Texas to use Texas cotton where it is grown.

He said the Japanese move comes as a result of a major policy change on the part of the Japanese, a decision to move more of their textile manufacturing to the source of the raw product.

Projects Listed

Cox said the Japanese, who have built 11 large textile mills in Brazil since 1966, have given him the following indications, in addition to the announced Daiwa plant:

* Kowa Textile Mill of Nagoyaa, Japan, has sent its board chairman to discuss plant location with Cox's office and the Texas Industrial Commission.

* Unitika Ltd. has started an investigation aimed at locating a plant site in Texas.

* Toyobo, Japan's largest textile firm, has requested a trading company to present a plant for a completely integrated raw-fiber-to-garments textile complex in Texas.

GARBAGE PICKUP FEE HIKED

Police Building Contracted

Slaton city commissioners during the last week awarded a contract totaling \$72,897.56 to a Lubbock firm which was low bidder on a remodeling project which will give the city a new police department and jail at the corner of Lynn and 8th streets. Commissioners also voted Tuesday to increase residential garbage collection rates as the city takes over the collection service on Dec. 15.

Residents currently are paying \$1.75 per month, added to the user's water bill, for garbage collection service now operated by Triple C Sanitation Service under contract with the city. A new rate of \$2.25 w.c. be

effective Jan. 1. Triple C, plagued by complaints on business collection rates and on garbage collection performance since beginning operations last January, is terminating its contract as of Dec. 15.

City commissioners said that after checking with some other companies which contract sanitation service with cities, they learned that most of them charge \$3 or more per resident each month. They then decided to "get back into the garbage business," but agreed that the residential fee should be raised to avoid operating the service at a loss.

The city currently is negotiating to buy three new trucks and other equipment which will be needed to operate the garbage pickup. Although some residential alleys and all of the business district were containerized by Triple C, the city will not install containers at this time, and in residential areas, citizens mostly will be using the 55-gallon barrels. There also was some discussion Tuesday night of eventually requiring barrels to be no larger than 30 gallons, and of pushing a program urging residents to use plastic garbage bags in their containers.

Lubbock was low bidder on the police department job, and this bid of \$72,897 was about \$12,000 higher than the anticipated cost. Adding the \$12,000 cost of the building itself to the project brings the total for the facility to about \$85,000. The project is to be paid for by revenue-sharing funds.

Commissioners voted to change their meeting time from the second and fourth Tuesday nights of each month to 10 a.m. on those days, on a trial basis. Pointing out that all regular commission meetings are open to the public, the group expressed hope that more persons would attend the sessions held during the day.

Chamber Starts Search For New Manager Here

Members of the board of directors of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce Tuesday morning discussed the need to hire a new chamber executive to fill the vacancy created Nov. 1 when Earl Bartley resigned.

President J. W. Holt appointed a committee to screen applicants for the job.

The group also discussed at length Slaton's chances of landing a Japanese textile mill proposed for the South Plains area.

Five new directors are to be elected to the chamber board this month.

The board agreed to have the new Christmas lights installed here, delaying installation until about Dec. 1 in deference to the energy situation.

Community Thanksgiving Service Set

First Baptist Church of Slaton will be the site of the annual community-wide Thanksgiving service scheduled for 7:30 p.m. next Wednesday night.

Rev. Merriel Abbott, pastor of First United Methodist Church, will be featured speaker, and special music will be presented by the choir of Triumph Baptist Church.

Members of all churches and all races are invited to the union thanksgiving event, it was stressed. An offering will be taken, with the money to go into a fund used to help needy transients.

The fund is administered by the Slaton Ministerial Alliance, according to Rev. Johnny Cartrite, minister of First Baptist Church, who will preside at next Wednesday's service.

10,000 Bales Ginned In Week

More than 10,000 bales of cotton were ginned by 12 gins in the Slaton area last week as the total ginnings in the area for the year climbed to 35,076 as of Monday.

Weather continued to be ideal for stripping operations, although some cotton still was too green to harvest. Continuation of good weather would assure a record crop in this area, it is believed. There still has been no killing frost.

The 12 gins surveyed and bales ginned to date: Slaton Co-Op 10,500; Acuff Co-Op 4261; McClung Co-Op 2000; Union Co-Op 2750; Posey Gin 1507; Farmers Gin 2503; Basinger Gin 850; Hackberry Co-Op 3101; Wilson Co-Op 3000; Wayside Gin 2554; Gatzki Gin 550 and Moses Gin 1500.

The four USDA cotton classing offices in the area received a total of 20,000 samples Friday, the biggest day of the season to that date. During the peak of the harvest, the volume usually reaches 50,000 to 60,000 samples per day. Classers from other areas are being transferred to the area classing offices to take care of the increasing volume.

The classing offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa, and Levelland classed 92,000 samples last week and had approximately 96,000 on hand Friday afternoon. Total classed so far this season now stands at 188,000. This is far ahead of the volume at this date last year when only 8,500 samples of the 1972 crop had been classed.

Quality of the cotton harvested continued excellent and is considerably

higher than last year.

Grades 31 and 41 continued to be the predominant grades at Lubbock, making up 72 percent of all classed. Grade 31 made up 32 percent, Grade 41, 40 percent and Grade 32, 12 percent.

Staples were predominantly 30 to 32.

Micronaire readings are an indication of fiber fineness or maturity. These readings indicate that most of the early harvested bales were fully mature. Eighty-three percent of all cotton

tested at Lubbock had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9.

The Agricultural Marketing Service reported increased trading on the Lubbock market. Prices were \$20 to \$30 per bale higher and averaged 34 cents per pound over the loan. Most lots were selling in the price range of 50 to 60 cents per pound.

Cottonseed prices were higher and farmers received an average price of \$102 per ton.

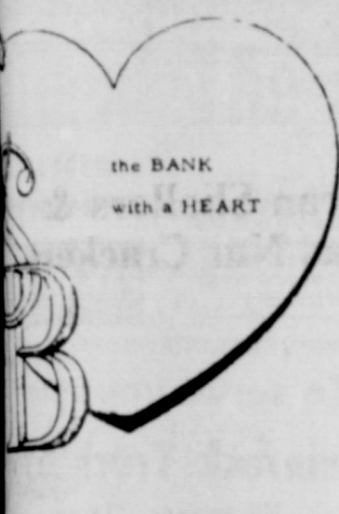

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Eagles, DC Set For District Showdown

The Roosevelt Eagles vanquished any hopes of the Post Antelopes for being District 5-AA's state playoff representative by rolling to a 28-8 victory last Friday night at Roosevelt.

The win enabled the Eagles to be able to play for being that representative this Friday night. Should the Eagles beat the Denver City Mustangs it would tie the Eagles and Mustangs with 5-1 conference marks. This would give the Eagles the district representative role by virtue of having won the game between the two. Should Denver City win, it would give the Mustangs a perfect 10-0 record and the undisputed district title.

The Eagles got on the board early, let the Antelopes get six of their 13 first downs and score on their first possession, and then shut down the Antelopes for the rest of the night.

Roosevelt established its running game from the start, as the Eagles took the opening kickoff and drove 66 yards in nine plays -- all rushing. John Blackwell was big rusher in the drive with 27 strides. Quarterback Chris Marshall went over from the 11 for the touchdown. Marshall took the snap, faked to fullback Kenneth Bobo, feinted the option pitch to Gilbert

Brown, and raced untouched into the end zone. Brown kicked the point after touchdown, and with 8:02 left in the first period, the Eagles led 7-0.

Post showed why it was eight wins, no losses before meeting Denver City last week, on their next possession. Post drove 74 yards in 13 plays to score. Biggest play of the drive was a 17-yard gain on a pass play, with 15 yards being tacked on for a personal foul by the Eagles. Quarterback Brad Davis went the final one-half yard to score. Post was not content to tie, however, and elected to try for two. QB Davis hit back Donnell Harper all alone for the bonus, and Post led 8-7 with 1:46 left in the initial stanza.

The next Eagle score came with 5:15 left in the first half. Harper fumbled on his own 10, and defensive tackle Buster Washington pounced upon the loose ball. From there Lee Anderson started off-tackle, and then shifted outside for the 10 yards to paydirt. On the extra point play Roosevelt lined up in regular kicking formation, but Blackwell came racing around behind the holder Marshall, who pitched the ball back to him. Blackwell streaked in to make the score Roosevelt 15, Post 8.

The Antelopes got only two more first downs after their opening drive in the first half. Both came with less than 0:16 remaining in the half, against Roosevelt's prevent defense. A 40-yard field goal attempt was very short on the last play of the half.

In the second half the Eagle defense let the Antelopes get only five first downs, while a fumble was the only thing that stopped the Eagles in the second half. The fumble was on the

Eagles' first possession of the half. On their next possession they drove 76 yards in 12 tries. Anderson again got the final five yards. PAT was no good, and with 10:44 left in the contest, Roosevelt led 21-8.

The final Eagle tally came following another Antelope miscue. Kenny Perry recovered a bad pitch by Davis at his own 45. End Mike Patschke caused the bad pitch. From there it took Roosevelt eight plays to tally. Bobo went the final

three yards with two minutes left. Brown again added the extra, making for the final score of 28-8.

Leading ball carrier for the Eagles was Anderson with 61 on nine totes. Blackwell gained 51 on 17. Roosevelt had 205 yards rushing, and 52 yards through the air.

Post got only 132 yards in 41 carries. They also got 37 yards via the air.

This week the Eagles play at home against the number two ranked team in the state, Denver City.

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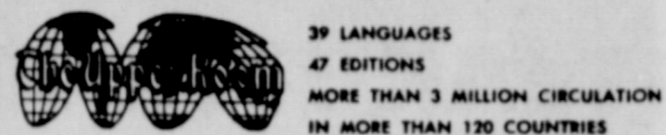
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PRaise THE LORD

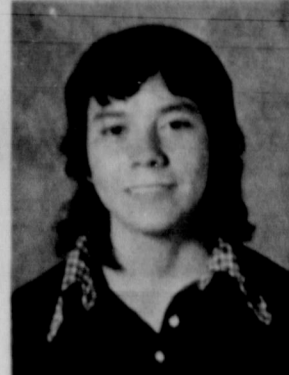

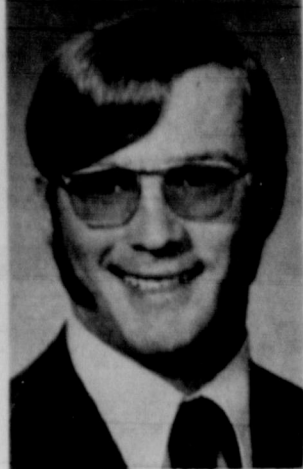
The Freshman team won against Post, 14-8, and the B-team lost to Post 6-14.
