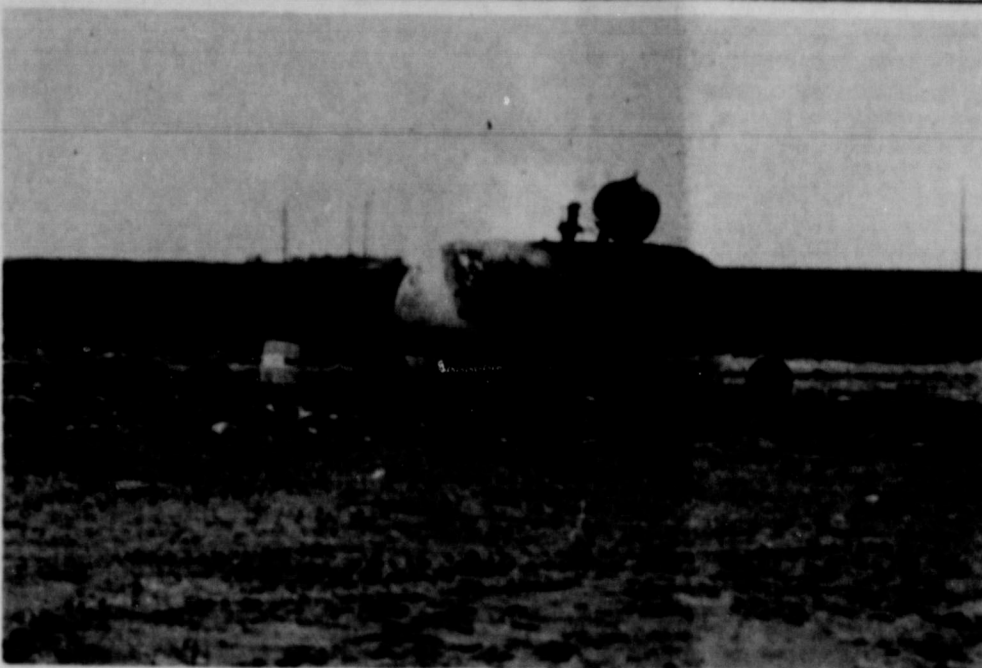

Farm Accident Injures Man

A 30-year-old man was injured last Friday in a farm accident two miles south of Slaton.

Danny Edwards, who lives at Buffalo Lakes, received first, second and some third degree burns when the propane he was cleaning a tractor with ignited. Witnesses at the scene said Edwards probably touched the battery with his propane hose, causing it to explode.

Edwards was taken immediately to Mercy Hospital in Slaton, and later trans-

ferred to Lubbock. He was released from the hospital Monday at noon, and is now staying with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Edwards Jr. of Slaton.

Edwards received burns to the upper portion of his body. Burns on his left arm seemed to be the worst, but doctors believe he may escape needing skin grafts.

The Slaton Volunteer Fire Department arrived on the scene at approximately 4:30 p.m. Friday to battle the blazing propane tank.

The firemen were able to

contain the blaze after 10 minutes, but once the fire was out, they discovered that the shut off valve of the tank was broken.

One of the firefighters said the tank was well vented, and the safest thing to do was to let it re-ignite and burn itself out, rather than try to cool the tank enough to keep the propane under control.

The tank continued to burn for approximately an hour.

At the time of the accident, Edwards was working for his father.

G&H To Expand Here

Changes in ownership of G&H Castings Corp. of Slaton were announced this week simultaneously with the announcement that the company would expand to double its present capacity and employ 35 to 50 more workers.

G&H produces gray and ductile iron castings for customers in Texas and neighboring states as well as the immediate South Plains area.

Announcement of the changes and the planned

expansion was made by James R. Hall, president of G&H and of Hall Foundries & Mfg., Inc., of Lubbock. He said that G&H Castings, jointly owned by Goulds Pumps, Inc. of Seneca Falls, N. Y. and by Hall Foundries, recently conducted a stockholders and directors meeting and then reported that Hall Foundries has agreed to accept an offer from Goulds Pumps to purchase Hall Foundries' stock in G&H Castings. Hall will remain as president and general manager.

Robert L. Tarnow, presi-

dent of Goulds Pumps, Inc., and chairman of the board of G&H Castings, announced the plans for expanding the plant "in the near future." Tarnow said the expansion would double the capacity of the present operation and that the expansion would require employment of 35 to 50 more people in addition to the approximately 75 now working for G&H.

Slaton Girl Enjoys Work In 'Texas' Production

People the world over visit Palo Duro Canyon each summer to see the musical drama "Texas". While enjoying magnificent sights and sounds of the historical production of Panhandle romance, they are surrounded by a warmth and friendliness unique to the Lone Star State.

A special group of young men and women known as the "Texas" hospitality crew is responsible for that good feeling. Always ready with a smile, a helping hand and a kind word, they make visitors feel at home. Tomi Longtin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. T. Longtin, Slaton, is beginning her third season as a member of the crew.

Tomi is a hostess in the best southern style. "When someone from out of state is there, our boss loves for us to pour on the y'all. And really, everybody gets a kick out of it."

Last year Tomi was in charge of the barbecue which is nightly from 6:45 to 8 p.m. She hasn't received her assignment for this year yet, but she said, "I'll enjoy working anywhere they need me. There's really a family feeling among all of us, so we get along great."

The requirements for being on the hospitality crew are pretty stiff, according to

Tomi. "We're the first people they meet. We have to get them in the mood. It's important that you be exceptionally polite," she said.

Tomi is well qualified for the task. She is a tall, graceful girl with long brown hair. Her blue eyes dance with pleasure when she grins, and her softly drawled "y'all" would have made Rhett Butler jealous.

The hospitality crew, dressed in the old fashion, arrives at the Pioneer Amphitheatre at 6 p.m. each night. The show usually ends around 11:15 p.m. and Tomi usually gets back to

her Canyon apartment about midnight — barring accidents such as rain.

"If it doesn't rain enough to cancel the show, we like to just hold it up awhile. Most of the people have come a long way to see the show. It's only been rained out nine times in the last eight years," she said.

To an outsider it may seem as if the routine is the same every night. But to Tomi, there is always something new. "There's something new happening every night, and there's always new people."

People are the backbone of the "Texas" production

both on and off stage. Tomi attributes the success of the show to "people. They feel like they're getting back to their grass roots. The people from Texas take a great pride in the show, and out of state visitors feel they're getting a glimpse of the past."

Tomi has had many memorable moments with "Texas", but she said the funniest was last year when the charge for the thunder and lightning didn't go off at the right time. "It was wired to go off at a certain point in the music," said Tomi. "When it didn't, we waited through the rest of

the show, afraid it would go off at a really bad time." The charge was exploded after the show, but most of the cast and crew were very nervous that night.

By day, Tomi is a student at West Texas State University, where she is a junior speech and drama major. She attends summer school and works at "Texas" also.

She first became interested in "Texas" when she worked there for a summer theater course. She applied the next year for a full time position, and she's worked ever since.

She said, "It gets in your blood after a while. And really, it's a great reference for when you get out to get a job."

Tomi's interest in the theater goes back to her high school days as a student at Slaton High. She was in the UIL one-act plays, and she made the All Star cast her senior year. Tomi recommends the

show to everyone, and she urges persons interested in seeing "Texas" to make reservations early. With groups from Australia, Japan and England attending the production, there's hardly ever an empty seat.

Tomi said she enjoys seeing people there she knows. So, if you like Texas hospitality and professional acting — go see "Texas". You just might recognize the girl behind the "Hi, y'all" and the big grin.

Holdup Attempt Thwarted Here As Attendant Fires At Pair

Two Negro men who sought to hold up Shamrock Cafe on U.S. 84 bypass early Saturday morning were thwarted when an attendant pulled a gun on them despite the fact they were threatening him with a pistol at the time.

Melvin E. Ward, a former Wilson policeman, said he was outside the building at 2:06 a.m. when someone stuck a gun in his back and told him "Don't turn around or I'll shoot you."

Ward said he re-entered the building and the man told him to give him the money from the cash register. Then, Ward said, he pulled a .38 caliber pistol from the drawer and turned.

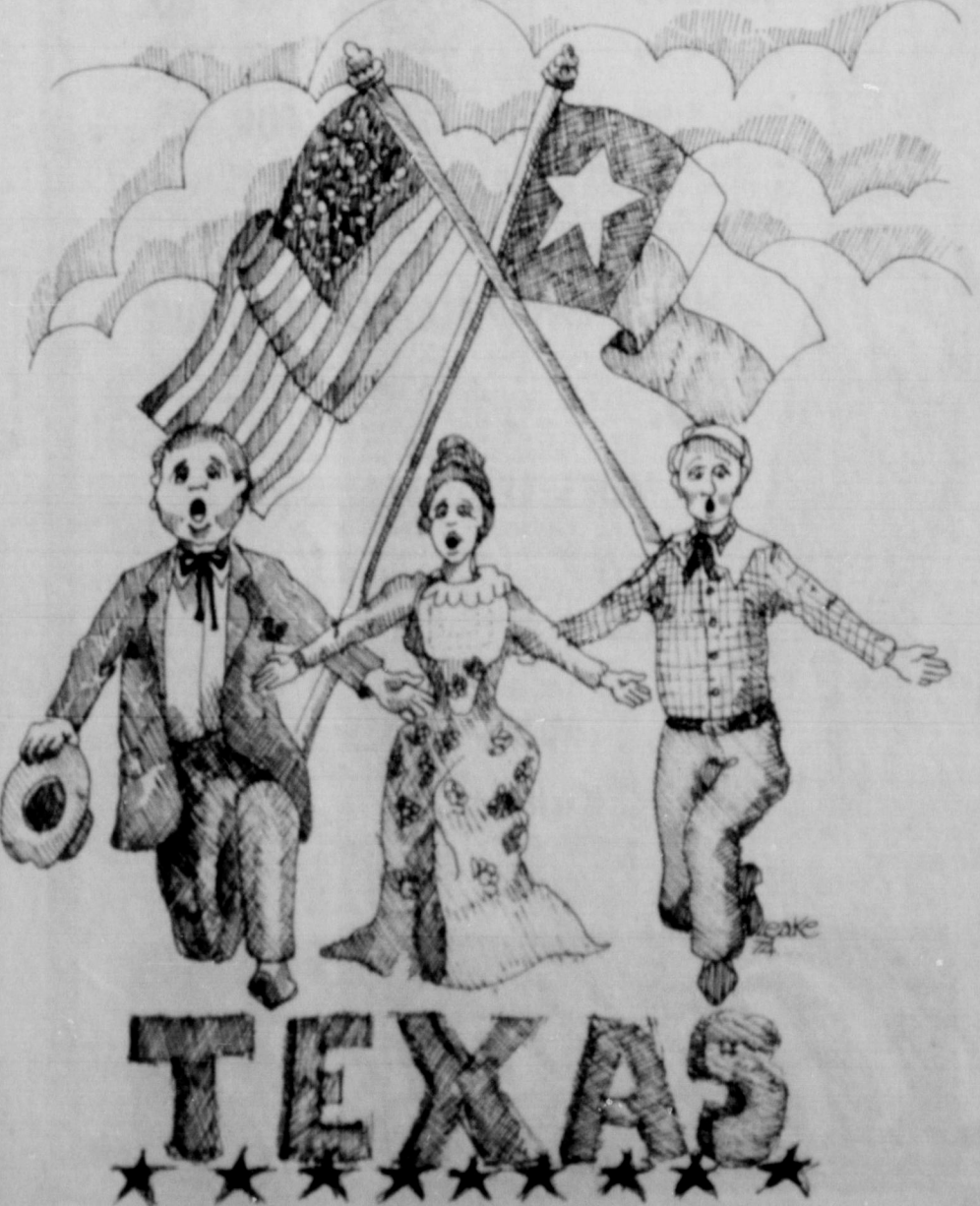
According to Ward, the man tried to fire the .22 pistol at Ward, but it would not fire. Ward said the man and his companion then ran

out the back door and that he fired two shots at them. He told police he may have hit one of the men. He said he did not see the pair get into a vehicle.

Two wrecks and a burglary rounded out the report of police activity for the week. Last Thursday a wreck at 300 S. 9th involved a 1972 car driven by Vickie Wilk Hart, Rt. 1, and a 1952 pickup, driven by Samuel Tillman Jordan of San Angelo. Estimated total damage was \$350.

Miss Beard To Tour With Gospel Group

Dru Ann Beard has been chosen to travel with the Continental Singers and Orchestra during their 1974 summer touring season as a french hornist. Continental Singers annually sends over 250 outstanding young musicians across the U.S. and around the world during the summer months to proclaim the gospel through con-

temporary Christian music. The tour on which Dru Ann will be traveling is one of seven Continental Singers tours that will cover the U.S. and several foreign countries in the summer of 1974. All tours will meet in Los Angeles on June 7 for an intensive week of rehearsals and counseling instruction classes before beginning their 75-day tour of nightly concert performances. Dru Ann's tour will travel to Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, through the South to Florida. At Miami, the group will fly to Puerto Rico, Ecuador, Guatemala, Venezuela and Trinidad before returning to Florida, returning to Los Angeles through Washington D.C., Kentucky, Tennessee, Oklahoma, Colorado and Utah. On August 26, all seven groups will combine in Los Angeles for a "grand finale" concert.

The ministry of Continental Singers, a non-profit Christian musical corporation, was founded in 1962 by its executive director and president, Cam Floria, one of America's most popular and outstanding Christian musicians. It has grown from a single tour that covered five northwestern states to seven tours that cover much of the world. The corporation has its U.S. headquarters in Los Angeles and a European office (Continental Singers Europe) in Rotterdam, Holland. Over the past several years, Continental Singers groups have toured extensively through all fifty states and nearly sixty foreign countries. Included in this year's performances is Mr. Floria's newest musical, "SHARE". Each member of the Continental Singers summer tours is responsible for

raising approximately one-half of his individual cost of the tour. The other half is raised through offerings and record sales during the tour. Although Dru Ann's tour will not be in this vicinity of West Texas, one of the groups will appear at the Monterey Baptist Church in Lubbock on June 21. Dru Ann is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lindol Beard, Slaton. She lists her musical experience as seven years of band in junior high and high school under the direction of Bill Townsend and one year of band at Texas Tech. She has also played with church choirs as a pianist for four years. Dru Ann worked last year for Briercroft Savings & Loan. She is a member of the First Baptist Church, Slaton.

Care Center Profile

Robert Lonnie Vanneman has been a resident of Slaton Care Center since 1969. Until then, he worked for Sug Robertson of Slaton. Mrs. Robertson recently gave me a story on Lonnie, which I would like to share with you.

Lonnie was born in McComb, Miss., on Sept. 21 of 1896. His sister was born four years later. Both his mother and father died when he and his sister were still young. They were put in an orphanage in Jackson, Miss. Lonnie left the orphanage in 1916.

Lonnie then went to live with the Betterman family in Mississippi. Here he lived and worked on their farm until he moved to Louisiana and went to work on a dairy farm. While in Louisiana he met Laura and soon married her.

Lonnie was in poor health at the time he and Laura married. But she soon nursed him back to good health.

The couple didn't stay in Louisiana long. In 1939 he read in the Ft. Worth paper that Gus Robertson needed a man and his wife to work on a dairy. He and Laura then moved to Hillsboro, Texas, and worked for Gus

Robertson.

In 1943 Lonnie and Laura moved to New Mexico where they went to work for Fred Whitehead. They stayed in New Mexico for two years. In 1944 they moved back to Hillsboro and worked for Gus Robertson again. Lonnie only worked six months this time before Gus Robertson died in 1945.

In 1958 Lonnie moved to Slaton and worked for Sug Robertson on his ranch.

Mrs. Vanneman died in 1963. Not many years after that Lonnie was admitted to the hospital. In 1969 Lonnie moved into Slaton Nursing Home.

In October of 1973 Vanneman was admitted to Mercy Hospital, and on Oct. 11, his right leg was amputated.

Before Lonnie's health got bad, he was one of the best dressed cowboys of Texas. Today Lonnie continues to be one of our outstanding residents. Though Lonnie is well loved by all, any friends would be most welcome to come and visit him and give him more encouragement.

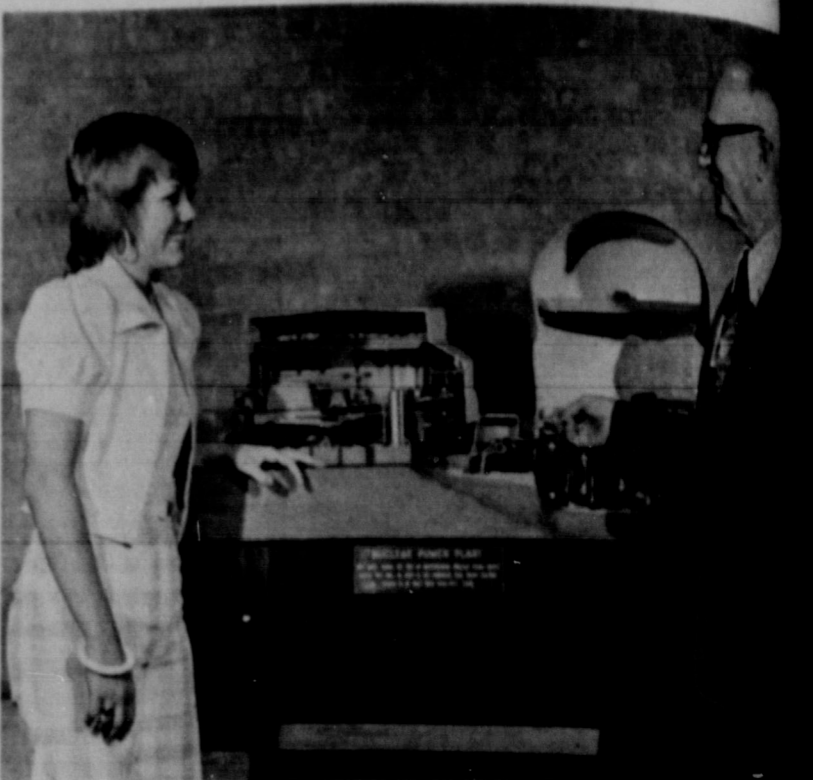

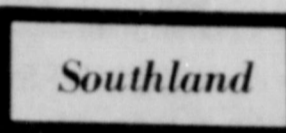

New Federal Grants Available To Students

Students who need money for their education after high school may now apply for Basic Educational Opportunity Grants for the 1974-75 academic year.

The \$475 million available is expected to provide grants ranging from \$50 to about \$800 with an average grant of \$475.

Although limited this year to full-time students who began their post-secondary education after April 1, 1973, the program is expected to benefit an estimated one million students who might otherwise be unable to continue their education. Along with other Federal programs of student financial aid, the Basic Grant Program marks significant progress toward the Administration's ultimate goal of making post-secondary education available to all young people who desire it.

Under the Basic Grant Program, students in financial need may obtain funds to help pay their educational expenses at any approved college, university, vocational school, technical institute,

or hospital school of nursing. The amount for which a student is eligible is based on a formula annually developed by the U.S. Office of Education.

To apply for a Basic Grant, an "Application for Determination of Basic Grant Eligibility" must be obtained, filled out, and mailed to BEOG, P. O. Box 2264, Washington, D. C. 20013. Within a month the student is notified of the amount of his eligibility index. He then submits this notification to the school of his choice, which calculates the amount of the Basic Grant to which he is entitled.

Application forms are now available at student financial aid offices at post-secondary institutions, high school guidance offices, Talent Search, Upward Bound, Student Special Services projects, and public libraries. Slaton Branch Library has copies.

Short Course Set For Adult Farmers

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held June 10-13 under the sponsorship of the Cooper High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Mr. H. C. Carpenter, Superintendent, and Daniel Taylor and Wayne Kahlich, Teachers of Vocational Agriculture.

Frank C. Litterst, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University will be the instructor for the course.

Litterst is a graduate of Texas A&M University with a degree in Animal Science. Much of his work was done in livestock production. After three years of service in the U.S. Army, Litterst served as instructor in the Veterans Agriculture Program in Hays County four years and was District Sales Manager for Burrus Feed Mills, Ft. Worth, Texas four years.

He then served as Manager, Baldwin Land & Cattle Company, with ranches in Travis and Shelby Counties until 1964. This included operation of a ranch consulting business in Texas and Louisiana. He has successfully operated his own ranching and farming busi-

ness consisting of both registered and commercial cattle, sheep, Angora goats, pecans and grain farming. He is a former director in the State Shorthorn Breeders Association and a member of American Angus, and Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The short course at Cooper is scheduled to begin June 10 at 8 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held 11, 12 and 13. During the dates the short course is in progress, Litterst will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems

4-H ROUNDUP TIME

4-H Roundup time in Texas is at hand. About 1,800 4-H boys and girls will gather on the Texas A&M University campus June 4-5 to compete in some 30 contests and demonstrations ranging from livestock judging and public speaking to demonstrations in foods and nutrition and safety. NEWBORNS EXHIBIT ALCOHOL SYNDROME

Many newborn babies of alcoholic mothers exhibit "fetal alcohol syndrome." Dr. Barbara Sears noted this week, citing research by the National Foundation March of Dimes.

The health education specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said that of two million alcoholic women in the US half are child bearing age.

"Estimates indicate some 20 per cent of their children could be affected by this malady." Symptoms of fetal alcohol syndrome exhibited in children studied include growth deficiency in length, weight, head circumference and in-

telligence — with joint distortions, facial abnormalities, and heart defects present in some, the specialist continued.

"Besides physical abnormalities and poor motor and social development, affected children have I. Q.'s between 50 and 83, according to research findings.

"Normal or average intelligence ranges between 90 and 110. A person with an IQ below 70 would exhibit definite mental retardation," she added.

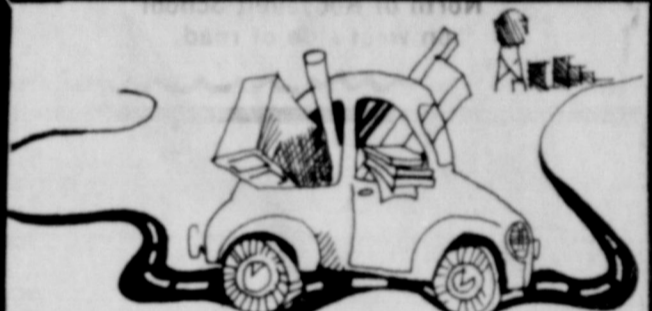
Although affected youngsters in these studies were well nourished and cared for after birth, they simply couldn't "catch up," Dr. Sears said.

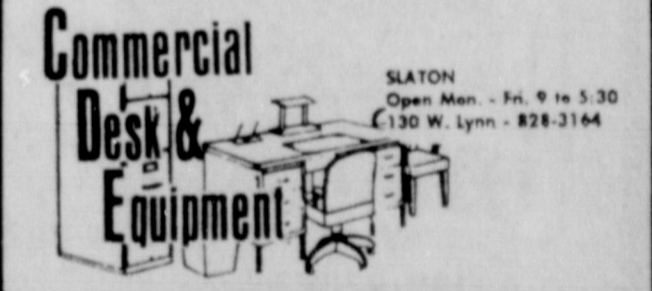
