Incumbents Win Most Area School, City Vote Contests

In the five communities served by The Slatonite, incumbents won most of the contested races for school board and city government spots. In Slaton, 82 persons balloted in the school board election, where there was no contest. Cornelio (Junior) Serenil got 72 votes and Carl R. (Petie) Williams had 50 for the two regular terms, and Joe Gamble received 61 votes for the post recently vacated by Rev. Emilio Abeyta. The unopposed candidates for Slaton city commission seats, both incumbents, were elected, as Otis Neill drew 99 votes in precinct 2, while Bob Kern received 17 write-ins for the post. In Ward 4, Eugene Mask won with 12 votes, as Steve Ruiz polled 3 write-ins.

At Roosevelt, where seven persons sought two school board spots, the two incumbents won. Tommy Adams had 93, Buddy Hettler 73. Others were: Mrs. S. N. Jones 47, Glen Maloney 56, Tom Ed Reynolds 45, Judge McLeod 20, Floyd Stumbo 33. Southland School patrons re-elected Robert Mock, the only incumbent running for one of the two vacancies, giving him 98 votes. Top vote-getter was Joe Basin-ger with 107. Other candidates: Sam Ellis and E. C. Smallwood, with 84 votes each. Three persons were elected in a four-man race at Wilson for school board posts. Donald Klaus had 59 votes, Curtis Wilke 57, C. W. Slone 43 and Monroe Talkmit 30. Three incumbents were re-elected from a field of six candidates for Cooper School board. Clifford Roberson polled 72 votes, James D. Smith 65 and Malcolm Pate 75. Vern Ehlo had 20, Gerard Bonner 30 and Robert Walker 32. Only 21 persons voted in the Wilson city election where two city councilmen were unopposed. Carl Gryder and George Ascher had 15 votes each, and there were several write-ins.

Slaton's Dribblers Come In Third

Slaton teams came in third in the Little Dribblers tournaments held in Crosbyton (9-10 year-olds) and Slaton (11-12) last weekend. In the 11-12-year-old tournament Lubbock American took first place honors, with Brownfield second and Slaton third.

Lubbock defeated Brownfield 42-41 Saturday night to win the title. Earlier, Lubbock defeated Snyder 40-34, Lubbock National 34-16 and Brownfield 41-34. In Slaton's first game Thursday, the hometowners pounced Kermit 55-17. Slaton players scoring in double figures were Steve Evans with 14, Glen Culver 13, Lance Bownds 10 and Mark Heinrich 10. Friday afternoon Slaton fell to Brownfield 45-27, with the winners

paced by C. Bursc's 19 points. Bownds was high for Slaton with 8. Friday night Slaton won over Seminole 35-22 as Culver scored 14. And on Saturday morning Slaton came out on top in a squeaker over Snyder 43-41, after trailing three points with 15 seconds left. Darryl Heinrich was fouled and made his first free throw, missed the second one and rebounded the ball and made the basket to tie the game. Snyder got the ball, but it was stolen by Charles Phenix, who was fouled with 3 seconds left. He made both of his free shots to win the game. Mark Heinrich had 17 and Darryl 9. Tops for Snyder was Kyle Shori with 13.

Saturday afternoon Slaton bowed out again to Brownfield, 30-21. After the game, the boys were treated to a meal at the Steak House. The team gave coaches Melvin Kinnison and Charlie Bledsoe trophies of appreciation. Littlefield stars won the 9-10-year-old tourney at Crosbyton, beating Idalou 41-37 in the finals. The Littlefield team opened with a 48-17 win over Cooper, followed by a 40-21 beating of Seymour and a 39-20 win over Slaton. Slaton opened with a 35-27 victory over Ralls, as Tom Burrow scored 14 and Michael Voigt 7. On Thursday night Slaton won a close (See DRIBBLERS, Page 10)

Sokora Only Athlete Going To Regional

Slaton High School track, tennis and golf teams competed for district honors, with the Slaton athletes coming up with lots of "almosits", but when the straining was all over, only Greg Sokora from Slaton qualified for the regional April 19-20 at Odessa. Sokora won the district 220 and 440 dash events at Denver City last Friday, while the tennis team had three players reach the finals, but no winners, and not until next year will second place finishers in tennis qualify for regional. The golf team, defending district champions, ran into penalty problems, with one player disqualified, and wound up in third place behind Denver City and Tahoka. Sokora galloped the quarter-mile in 51 seconds and the 220 in 23.2 to doubly qualify for regional. Coach Doc Mize entered Sokora in the 220 for the first time in the district event. He indicated this week that Sokora would run qualifying heats in both events at regional, and then make a decision on what to run, if such a decision is necessary. Sokora will run this weekend at Hereford in a meet for regional qualifiers in all classifications. Matt Kitten ran 4:56 for fourth place in the mile; Ricky Denzer was fourth in shot put and placed in discus; Slaton's sprint relay team was sixth, and mile relay was fifth, with first and second place winners qualifying for region. Bill McClesky was running in second place in the 120 high hurdles, when he hit the last hurdle, winding up sixth. The golfers lost out when one of their players failed to putt out and was disqualified. Another player also drew a 3-stroke penalty, adding to the disaster. Alan Lewis was alternate medalist, shooting an 81. Denver City won the overall district tennis championship, scoring 65 points to 20 for Slaton and 15 for Roosevelt. Computer Soon Will Figure City Residents' Water Bills

A computer soon will figure the water bills of Slaton residents and help locate leaks in homeowners' water lines. City commissioners Tuesday morning, in their semi-monthly meeting, voted to give City Secretary Alex Webb the go-ahead on converting meter reading and billing to a computer system operated by a Plainview firm. The action came after Bob Rott, representing the firm, PFC Computer Services, Inc., appeared before the commission to explain the procedure and to answer questions. Cost of the service to the

city will be 12 cents per customer per month, and Webb told commissioners he believes the city actually will save money, since the computerized system, once it is in operation and running smoothly, will save time of city employees in the water department. He estimated that conversion to the new system would save a third of the time now spent by one employee in working with water bills. The Plainview firm already serves the cities of Plainview, Sunray and Lockney, and Slaton officials who have checked with these cities said the govern-

ing agencies and citizens alike appear satisfied with computer billing. Commissioners voted unanimously to try the computer plan, and Webb indicated that it possibly would be put into operation in May. In other action, the city opened bids on a proposed oil lease, purchased a used duplicator for \$400, approved lease of a city-owned lot on 9th St., passed on second reading a transaction with W. L. Roche involving exchange of property in the southwest side of town, discussed status of a lawsuit involving Canadian River water, approved donation of

\$800 to a summer youth program, voted to uphold decision of the zoning board which had refused a resident permission to operate a beauty shop in her home, paid the monthly bills, and voted to buy a used ditching machine in order to expedite sewer installation and repair work in the city. The latter decision came after a lengthy discussion in which Webb and Water Supt. Jim Powell explained that a ditching machine which originally sells for \$16,000 was available for \$5,100 and that it could dig ditches up to 6 feet deep, while the one usually con-

tracted for such projects digs only 3.5 feet deep. At first commissioners appeared unwilling to buy the machine. Commissioner J. P. Spears pointed out that it is much cheaper to contract the work than to buy equipment, and Commissioner Otis Neill expressed doubt about the wisdom of buying a used machine. Also, the need for more sewer work in town came in for considerable discussion, including a pointed comment by Mayor J. N. Landreth, who said: "I think we've got to do something about these people's sewers. . . we go out

and look at sewage in people's yards, and then we don't do anything." He said he felt the city has an obligation to try to help those with critical needs in this area. The commissioners then voted on a motion by Spears, seconded by Crandall, to buy the machine on a lease-purchase plan. These two and Commissioner Eugene Mask voted for the proposal, and Mayor Landreth neglected to call for any negative votes. 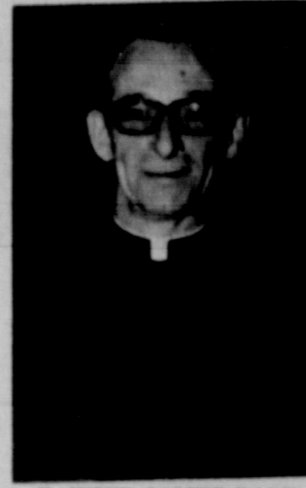

With bread prices going up, do you ever wonder what happens to the 47c you pay for a 1 1/2 lb. loaf? Here is what we're told in a report from the A & M Extension Dept.: Eight and one half cents go to the farmer for his wheat; three cents go to the miller for his expense and profit; 27 and one half cents go to the baker for his ingredients, transportation, packaging and advertising; eight cents go to the retailer, or grocer where you buy your bread, for his cost and profit. That makes 47c. It doesn't sound like much when you put it that way.

If you don't have space for a garden outside, you shouldn't let that stop you if you have a green thumb. Try a mini-garden, growing plants in containers in your window sill (green onions, parsley, herbs), or on the porch or laundry room (tomato, pepper eggplant), or anywhere else that the plants can have sun most of the day. The window plants do well in pots, but the larger plants are better in larger containers, ranging from half-gallon juice cans to tubs, plastic containers or wooden boxes. The mini-gardens usually do much better when they are transplanted, rather than seeded. But, transplant with care and use good soil. Container plants should be watered each day.

Can't afford steak this week? Try arm or blade steak, chuck steak, round steak or flank steak. When sprinkled with tenderizer or marinade, these less expensive cuts can be tender and delicious. Let the meat stand one-half hour for each one-half inch thickness of meat before cooking.

Have you waited until the last minute to get your income tax report in the mail? Then, chances are, you owe some tax money. Statistics show that most folks who wait until the last minute are the ones who owe. If you know you will receive a refund, you usually mail very early.

allow loss of a birth certificate or marriage license to deter them from applying for benefits.

Jack Coker, Waco Regional Office Director, cited a regulation in effect since October 1971 under which less formal proof of marriage and birth are acceptable in establishing claims for higher benefits.

A veteran's or widow's certified statement of marriage is sufficient on applications for compensation and education benefits for veterans, widows and orphaned children, provided neither he nor his wife has been married before, and VA has no contradictory information on file. Coker explained.

Coker noted that a certified statement now is acceptable regarding birth of a child of a veteran's marriage, and as proof of age and relationship in disability cases. Before the regulation change, Coker pointed out, VA required all statements of marriages and births to be supported by formalized documentary evidence.

Certified statements also are sufficient in death cases where a claimant's statements corroborate those of a

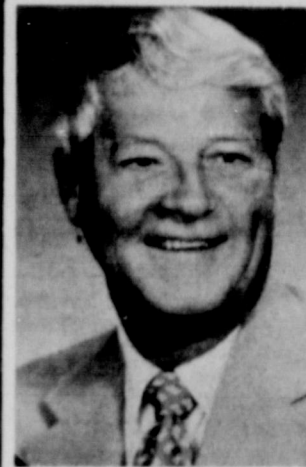

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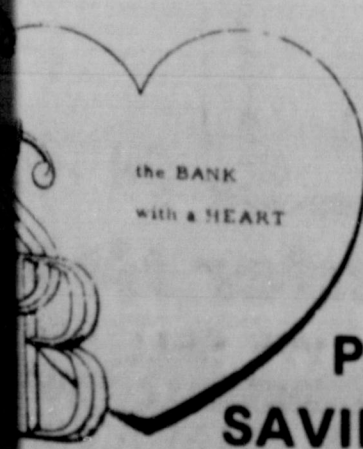

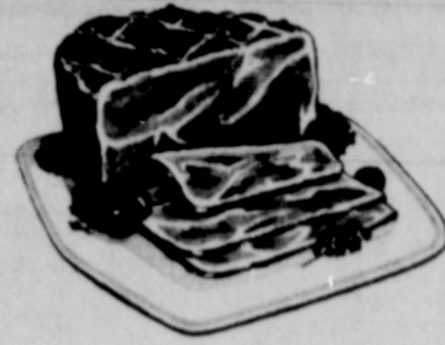
