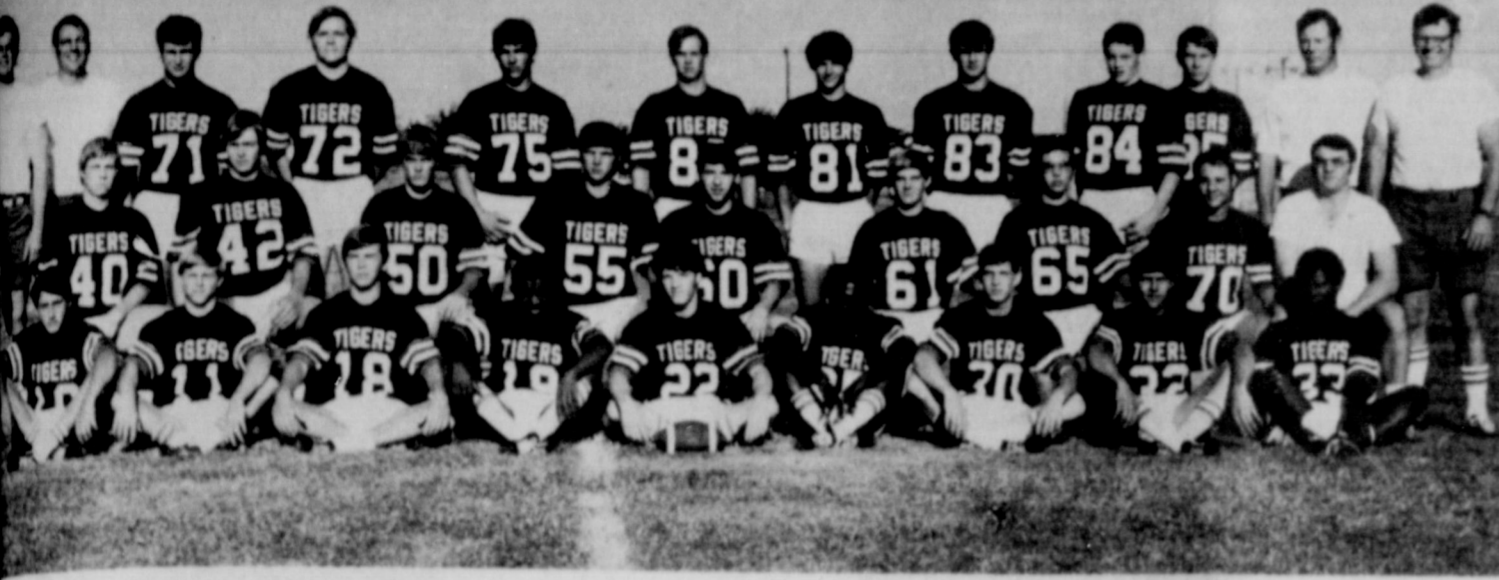

Tigers Open Season Here Against Brownfield Cubs

The 1973 football season for the Slaton Tigers begins here Friday night, when the hometowners play host to Class AAA Brownfield's Cubs, who are more like bear-sized.

Brownfield has 28 seniors -- one more than the entire total of Slaton's varsity squad -- and four players top 200 pounds.

With the Tigers looking better in last Friday night's scrimmage against Tulla, Coach Bill Curry feels that Slaton has a good chance against Brownfield, and certainly does not anticipate a repeat of last year's 45-0 trouncing at the hands of Brownfield.

"Brownfield has a big offensive line, averaging over 180," Curry said. He reported that Brownfield has scrimmaged Floydada, tying the Whirlwinds 2-2, and outscored Seminole 6-1 in a scrimmage.

Slaton and Tulla tied 1-1 in Friday's scrimmage. Curry said the Tiger defense, both first and second units, looked good 3:21, and that the offensive line "looked real good at times, with the blocking greatly improved." Greg Sokora broke on a long run to score for Slaton, going about 70 yards with the aid of a couple of good downfield blocks by Thomas Heinrich and Ricky Denzer. Tulla scored once on a pass when the receiver got behind the Tiger defensive secondary.

Gary Aycock again did a creditable job of ball-handling at quarterback, and coaches said Keith Bunniss also looked good at the man-under spot. Curry said Kenneth Riddle, Clarence Trotty and Charlie Haynes all did a

good job of running with the football. Riddle and Trotty also appeared to have landed positions in the defensive secondary.

Curry said the defense looked good, and some of the boys were tackling hard and pursuing well. At this point, Slaton's defensive front four appears to be Chris Williams, Ronnie Valadez, Bobby Breedlove and Raymond Gonzales.

Valadez and Breedlove also are being used some as running backs.

Improvement in the depth situation from last year is shown by the fact that just five boys now are being used both ways all the time, and coaches indicated that this number soon may be cut to four, and possibly three, to keep the players strong throughout the game.

Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

Punt, Pass, Kick Contest Scheduled

Local youngsters will be "dusting off" their footballs and loosening up their throwing arms soon for the 1973 Punt, Pass & Kick competition.

This year the local level of PP&K will be sponsored by Smith Ford, Inc. in conjunction with participating Ford Dealers in the area.

Nationally PP&K, now in its 13th year, is co-sponsored by the National Football League and the Ford Dealers of America. Since it was started in 1961, the program has attracted more than 9,350,000 youngsters -- and participation this year is expected to top the 1,200,000 mark.

Smith explained that each entrant, upon registering, receives a free PP&K Tips Book. In the 1973 edition, there are competition tips by NFL stars Jerrel Wilson, Norm Sneed and Chester Marcol plus all-around suggestions from head coaches Don Shala and Don Devine. The Tips Book also includes complete PP&K rules and helpful conditioning exercises

for contestants. PP&K registrations will close on Sept. 23. Participants in the Punt, Pass & Kick program compete only against others their own age. Any youngster eight through 13 years of age, accompanied by a parent or guardian, may register to compete in the PP&K at any participating Ford Dealer. There is no entrance fee and no body contact during competition. No special equipment is needed and participation does not impair a youngster's amateur standing. Scoring is based on accuracy and range with one point added for every foot of punting, passing and kicking distance, and a point subtracted for every foot off a center line.

Gas Rate Hike Given Approval By Commission

Slaton City Commission last Thursday voted to allow Pioneer Natural Gas Co. to adjust rates monthly instead of annually, an action which a company representative said likely would mean an increase of about 25 cents per average customer the first month. No increase approaching

this much is anticipated in subsequent months, according to local gas company manager, Ansil O'Neal. The company is limited to a certain profit margin, and in fact, the formula under which they operate could lower the rate in some months. However, this is admittedly unlikely.

Three Accidents Investigated By Police Here

Three accidents were investigated by Slaton Police during the last week, with thefts and burglaries rounding out the report for the week. An accident Sunday at 910 S. 10th involved a 1973 car driven by Ramona Key of that address and a 1966 station wagon driven by Darnest Deveroe Jr. of Slaton.

O'Neal cited increases in cost of bringing gas to the city. Commissioner Otis Neill then noted that the charter of the franchise with the city stipulates that if the company's return on its investment drops below four per cent, a raise in rates is permitted, and if the profit is more than six per cent, a lowering of the rate is mandatory.

Last Wednesday at U. S. 84 and Woodrow Rd. a 1968 truck-tractor driven by Hayes Elwood Barnett of Lubbock and a 1965 car driven by Curly Lee Hooker of Lubbock collided. The amendment to the franchise ordinance permits these adjustments to be made monthly rather than annually, with the total rate of increase per year expected to be about the same as before. The commission also discussed the need for better speed limit signs in school zones here, agreeing to survey the situation before taking action, and also discussed the garbage collection problems in the city, taking no action.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Clemons was the scene for a rehearsal dinner Friday evening.

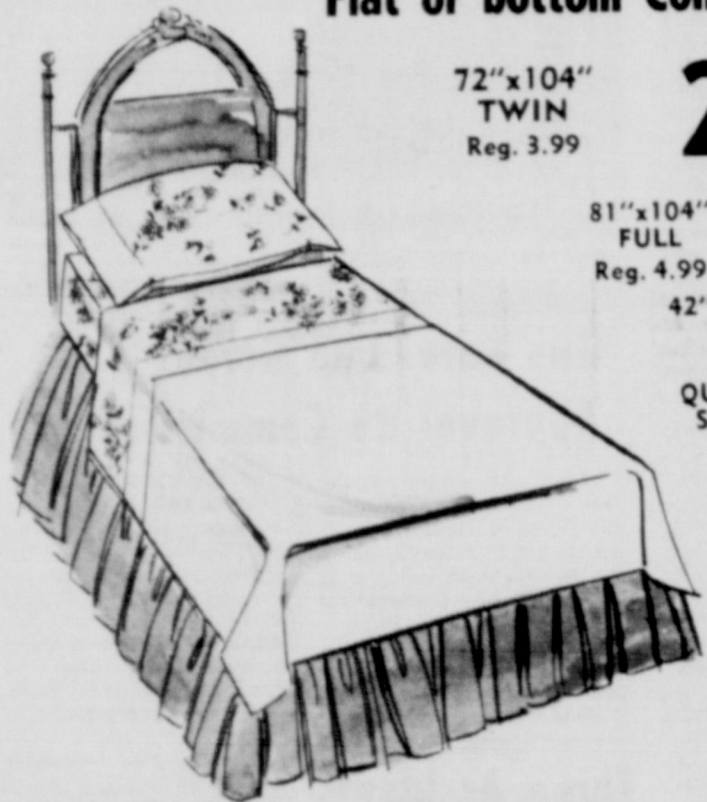

A strong demand, fluctuating prices, and short supplies were characteristic of Western Region cotton markets this week, according to the Agricultural Marketing Service, USDA. Demand was good to excellent for most qualities of cotton being ginned in South Texas. Bidding on uncontracted cotton was brisk as many merchants attempted to cover previously made sales.

Demand, particularly from foreign mills, continued to be good for cotton for forward delivery. Merchants actively sought to contract 1973 and 1974-crop cotton at most locations. Supplies of available new-crop cotton and

1973-crop acreage were short.

Many growers had previously committed all or part of their crop. Contracting activities were brisk early in the week but slackened toward the last of the week when offering prices began to

fluctuate. Domestic inquiries were more numerous this week, mostly for cotton for prompt or nearby delivery.

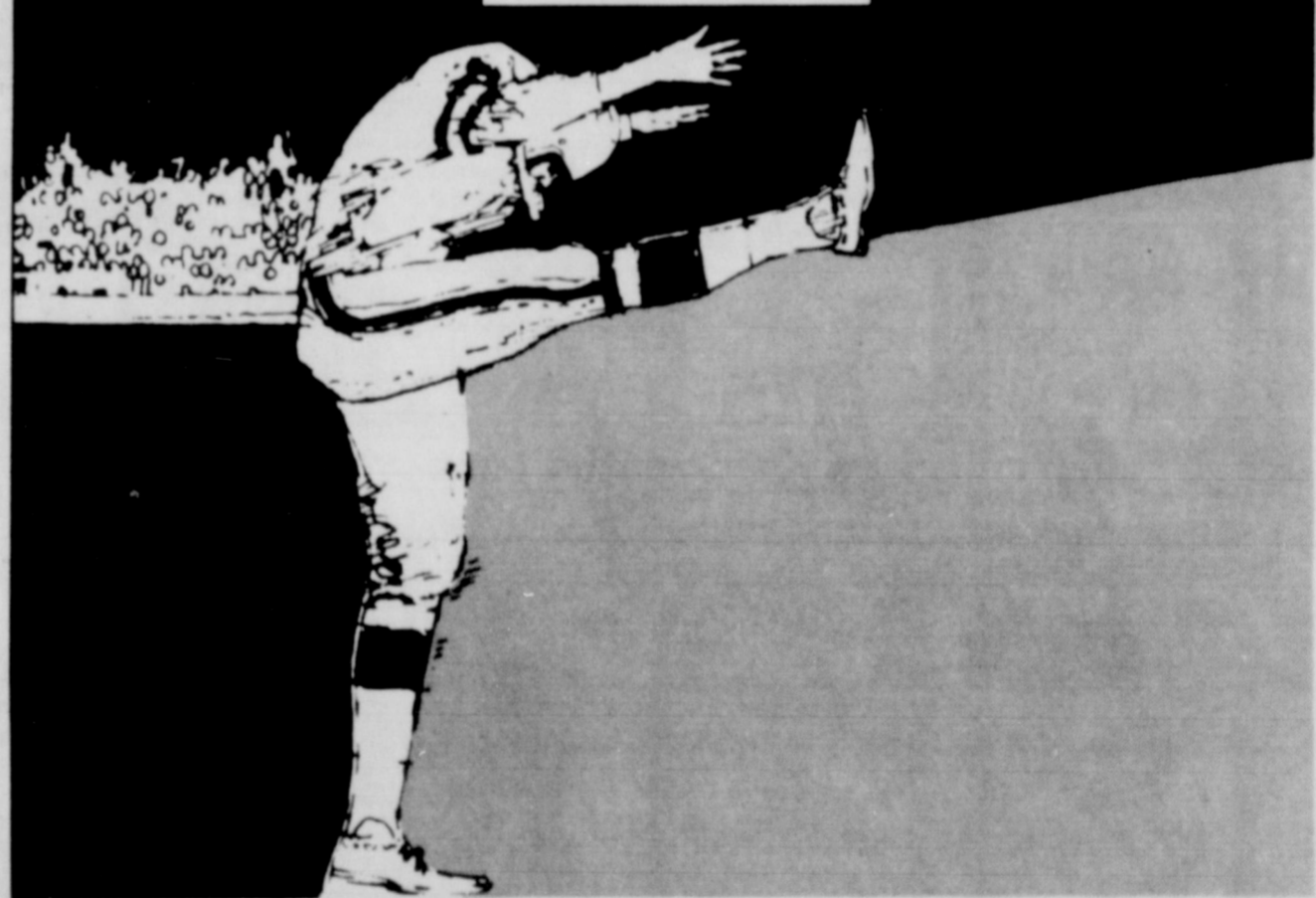

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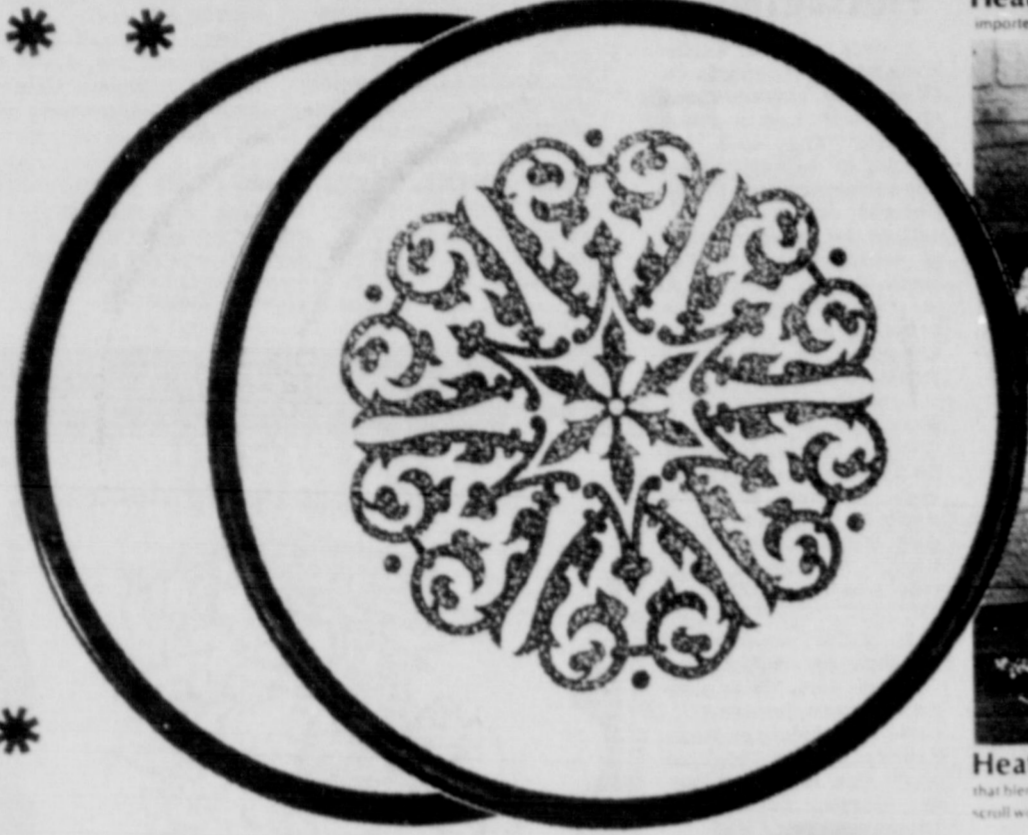
