Participants in the Punt, Pass & Kick program compete only against others their own age. Any youngster eight through 13 years of age, accompanied by a parent or guardian, may register to compete in the PP&K at any participating Ford Dealer. this much is anticipated in subsequent months, according to local gas commanager, Ansil O'Neal. The company is limited to a certain profit margin, and in fact, the formula under which they operate could lower the rate in some months. However, this is admittedly un-

O'Neal cited increases in cost of bringing gas to the city. Commissioner Otis Nelll then noted that the charter of the franchise with the city stipulates that if the company's return on its investment drops below four per cent, a raise in rates is permitted, and if the profit is more than six per cent, a lowering of the rate is mandatory.

The amendment to the franchise ordinance permits these adjustments to be made monthly rather than annually, with the total rate of increase per year expected to be about the same as before.

AN ORDINANCE PROVID-ING FOR ADJUSTMENTS IN THE RATES CHARGED NATURAL GAS AND NAT-URAL GAS SERVICE BY PIONEER NATURAL GAS COMPANY TO ITS CUST -OMERS WHO USE NAT-URAL GAS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, heretofore Pioneer Natural Gas Company has submitted its application to place in effect a provision to adjust the rates it charges for natural gas service within the city limits, said rates being provided for by the City's Ordinance or other duly constituted Order effective from time to time; and

WHEREAS, saidapplication has been considered by the City and it is the opinion that said application should be granted and the cost of gas adjustment should be placed in effect which will provide just and reasonable rates for the sale of natural gas and natural gas service by Pioneer Natural Gas Com-

NOW, THEREFORE, beit ordained by the City Commission of the City of Slaton;

The rates charged by Pioneer Natural Gas Company for the sale of natural gas and natural gas service in the City shall be those rates as approved by ordinance or other order of the proper authority adjusted in the following manner:

Hereafter, the rates for

natural gas or natural gas service shall be adjusted upward or downward each month by the amount the current monthly average cost of gas to the Company for its West Texas Transmission System is more than or less than 17.29 per Mcf at 14.65 psia (15,97¢ at 13,6 psia). Changes per Mcf in the average cost of gas shall be computed to the nearest one-hundredth cent (.01¢ above or below 15,97¢ and such changes shall be applied to each Mcf of gas billed hereunder. Adjustments will become effec-

tive with all bills rendered on and after the determination of a new monthly average.

By March 1 of each year the Company shall furnish the City with the detail of gas purchased for its West Texas Transmission System during the previous calendar year as filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas and a summary showing the basis for the monthly adjustments. The City may, as it deems desirable, examine the books and records of the Company and make audits to determine the accuracy of the cost of gas purchased by Pioneer Natural Gas Company for its West Texas Transmission System.

The effective date of this ordinance shall be October 1, 1973, and the first adjustment shall be applied to all bills rendered on and after October 1, 1973.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict.


