Study Club Wins In Parade

More than a thousand persons, including school children, gathered around the city square Monday to view the annual Veterans

Day Parade and to hear Jack W. Flynt of Dimmitt, past commander of the American Legion Department of Texas, speak.

Leading off the nearly 50-unit parade, along with the Slaton Police Department and Slaton fire truck, was the U. S. Marine Corps Mounted Color Guard of Albuquerque, N. M.

The \$150 prize offered for the winning float went to the Athenian Study Club, which sponsored a float bearing the theme "Train Up A Child in the Way He Should Go." (Proverbs 22:6) Riding on the float were Mrs. Edwin Knight and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Dubbin Englund and Mrs. R. C. Hall Jr.

Second place and \$100 went to the freshman ROTC for their float "For God & Country." Third place winner of the \$50 award was American Legion Auxiliary for the float entitled "A Mother's Prayer."

Frenship High School band won the \$50 for first place in the band contest and Lubbock Christian High School won second place of \$25. Wilson High School band won third. Slaton High School Band also was in the parade, but not competing for the prizes.

Bill Ball presided at the speaker's platform. Prayer was given by the Rev. Nolan Pierce, minister of First Christian Church.

In his speech, Flynt paid tribute to the millions of Americans who "stood up and were counted in time of their nation's need." He noted that the nation has been built by persons dedicated to freedom and had been preserved by soldiers two centuries apart.

"Freedom is never free and not to be taken for granted," he said. "Each generation has responded with more than 26 percent of those persons serving during the last half-century."

Flynt paid tribute to all those who had served in wartime and also to the senior citizens. He spoke of the need still to be patriotic and reminded his listeners that each individual can "stand up and be counted."

Slaton To Remain In Class AA

Slaton Tiger athletic teams will continue to compete in Class AA next year, Slaton School officials learned to their glee Monday. For the last couple of years it had been anticipated that Slaton would be moved into Class AAA, which could make it extremely hard on the athletic teams.

Slaton qualified for Class AAA under the formula which has been operating for the last several years, but the enrollment figure separating Class AAA and Class AA high schools was raised from 500 to 520 this year. And Slaton falls between those figures, with 507 average enrollment for the last two years. Slaton coaches, officials and fans had been looking forward glumly to the prospect of being at the very bottom of the AAA category, meaning that every team Slaton played would have more students from which to choose its athletes.

Roosevelt's Eagles were more like roadrunners as they didn't do much in the air, but they sure can run. The cross-county neighbors treated their Slaton kinfolk poorly last Friday night as the Eagles ran for a whopping 491 yards on the ground in pasting the Tigers 31-7. The result left Roosevelt 2-0 in district and 5-1 for the year, while Slaton stands at 0-3 and 1-6.

Roosevelt this week takes on Cooper and Slaton will journey to Tahoka seeking

Burglars and thieves hit two Slaton businesses and the junior high school safe during the last week to escape with an estimated \$2,200 in cash, plus some checks made out to the junior high school.

About \$1,600 in cash was taken from White's Auto Tuesday, the money being stolen out of a bank bag on top of the manager's desk while he was busy waiting on customers. Owner Bill Cirone said he was preparing to make a bank deposit when he had to help customers in the store. When he returned to his desk the money bag was missing. The bag, containing about \$900 in checks, but with the cash missing, later was found in the store.

Burglars at Slaton Junior High Sunday night gained entry to the building through a window, then entered several rooms by breaking open air vents in the bottoms of the doors and then unlocking the doors. Then they cut a hole in a safe in the bookroom, making the hole directly opposite the compartment of the safe where the money was kept. Taken from the safe was about \$150, some of which was in checks. Also stolen was about \$30 in change from a soft drink machine in the teacher's lounge.

Police arrested two boys age 12 and 13 early Tuesday at Piggly-Wiggly store here, and found a roll of quarters on one of the boys who had been observed forcing entry into a locked backroom where some money had been kept. Store officials advised they had set a

watch in the room after missing about \$500 in cash during the last week or so.

The two boys were handed over to juvenile officers in Lubbock. The rest of the money had not been recovered by Wednesday.

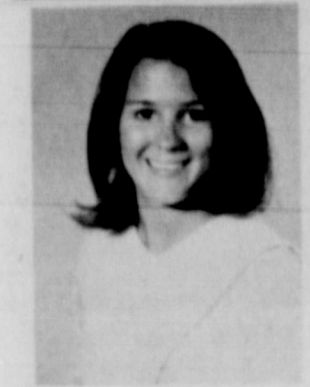

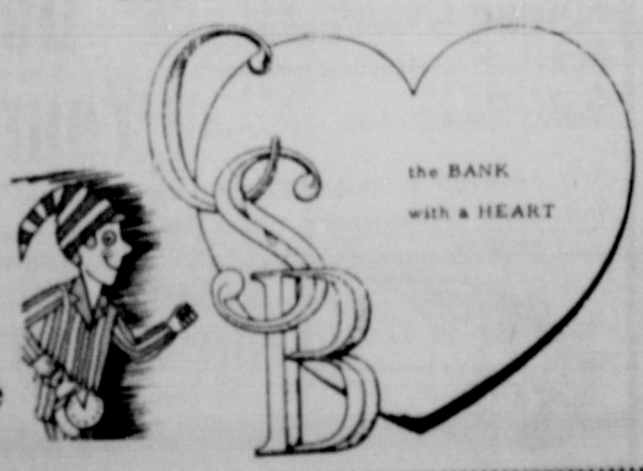

The Cooper Pirates exploded Friday night, gaining almost 400 yards, to down the Tahoka Bulldogs, 27-12. The win was Cooper's second of the season and first district win.

The Bulldogs took the initiative midway in the first period. Quarterback Weldon Warren, with the help of tailback Jimmy Bailey, led the Bulldogs from their own 20 to the Pirate 40 yard line. Bailey took the ball and sprinted 38 yards for the score. The try for the extra point went wide and the Pirates found themselves behind, 6-0. Slaton Youth Making 'Miracle' Progress Toward Recovery

David Brake of 1325 W. Crosby St. is able to do again some of the things that most persons take for granted -- things like talking, getting himself about his home and yard and wearing cowboy boots.

David, the 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie V. Brake, is recovering from critical injuries suffered in an automobile accident Jan. 16, 1972.

The recovery he has made is termed by his mother as

a "miracle" and his parents are sure he will progress more.

One of the things that he does that doctors said he would never be able to do is to wear cowboy boots. His boots have zippers up the back to enable him to get them on.

David, who is 6 feet 3 inches tall and weighs around 200 pounds, is getting exercise by use of a large frame walker made for him by his father. They hope the exercise will strengthen his leg muscles so he will be able to walk again. His walker, which is high enough to support him under his arms, is equipped with bicycle brakes and large rubber tire wheels.

He gets into the walker from his wheel chair by getting directly under the framework and pulling himself up into it by his arms. This he is able to do because of strength he has in his upper arms and shoulders.

With the assistance of his parents and grandfather, Raymond Gentry of Posey, David has continued his pig raising project that he began as a freshman in high school in the Future Farmers of America program. The pigs are kept on the grandfather's farm.

David and his father go to see his herd, which includes 35 head, whenever the father is home off his run on the Santa Fe Railroad. It is farrowing time right now for the purebred Chester Whites and already there are 20 little pigs at the farm. He has five sows and a boar.

David entertains himself by playing chess, via mail, with a player in Amarillo,

and listening to tapes on his tape player. He is a country and western music fan and his favorite singer is Charlie Pride. The tape player is equipped with ear phones so he can listen to the tapes while other members of his family watch television.

The youth has learned to talk again. "Mrs. Ernest Brownfield, speech teacher at the school, did wonders with him," Mrs. Brake said.

He graduated from high school last spring with Mrs. Nancy Felder as his home bound teacher. Mrs. Caron Hunter gave him physical therapy treatments for a time, but he has not had any treatments since March.

David was unconscious 100 days after the auto accident and spent 198 days in the Lubbock and Slaton hospitals. He also spent 88 days in Bivens Rehabilitation Center at Amarillo.

Although David suffers from a muscle disease, which affects his feet, legs, arms and hands, he was very active before the accident, his mother said. But the muscle disease has presented complications in his recovery from the auto accident.

He has received assistance from the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America, which has provided him equipment. He attended a camp in Amarillo last summer sponsored by this organization.

Just what the future holds for David, of course, no one knows, but his parents feel that his physical condition will continue to improve.

COTTON TALKS

The performance of High Plains "discount" cottons in open-end spinning tests drew high interest from a majority of 25 cotton textile mill representatives visiting Lubbock in mid-October from Europe and the Far East as guests of the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

The Lubbock stop was part of the group's orientation tour of the U. S. cotton belt sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Foreign Agriculture Service, the National Cotton Council and Cotton Council International.

Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President, was coordinator of the High Plains activities which included calls at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock and the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University.

At the Texas A&M facility the textile and trade association executives had an explanation of narrow and conventional row cotton production and the economics of once-over stripper harvesting, plus a narration on the effects of temperature on cotton quality.

Textile Research Center personnel provided a guided tour of spinning, weaving, knitting and finishing activities and a demonstration of the instrument cotton classing line in operation there.

Although open-end spinning frames ordered by TRC have not yet arrived, TRC has supervised testing of High Plains cotton on the relatively new open-end system in the Southeast, and knowledge of this fact brought a barrage of questions from the visitors.

Stressing that results were "preliminary," Jack Towery, TRC's Head of Mechanical Processing, showed charts which indicated that low micronaire cottons may actually be superior to "premium" micronaire cottons in the formation of lower count yarns on the open-end system. Greater yarn strength and better uniformity of yarns were the primary advantages shown from the low micronaire tests.

To this Albert H. Y. Chang, managing director of Nam Hwa Textiles Ltd. of Hong Kong, said "If these test results are confirmed it will call for new study by open-end mills to see if cheaper cottons can successfully replace the raw materials now in use." Similar comment was made by others of the group.

Open-end spinning requires considerably less labor than does conventional ring spinning and tour members from areas with high labor costs all expressed interest.

Towery assured the group that additional testing will soon be in progress on two open-end spinning frames due for delivery at Tech within a few weeks and that results will be widely distributed. One of the frames was donated to Tech by the Plains Cotton Cooperative Oil Mill to expedite open-end research.

PCG officials, convinced that early results will be verified and that substantial benefits can accrue to High Plains cotton producers, say they will continue to work with TRC on open-end studies. PCG also supplied the group with complete quality information on High Plains cotton and the results of previous PCG testing of area cotton on conventional spinning equipment.

TRICAP stands for the triple capabilities of major maneuver elements of armor, airmobile infantry, and air cavalry. The division is now composed of three brigades, one for each capability. Together with artillery and support units.

Combining the knock-out power of armor, the maneuverability of airmobile infantry and the firepower of air cavalry is believed to have unlimited tactical possibilities. The division is testing the experimental concept at Ft. Hood.




