## Asked To 'Religious Instructions' In Schools Asked

evangelical services" in the Slaton schools.

A crowd of approximately 75 persons in West Ward Cafeteria heard Mrs. LaWanda Blakeley read a prepared statement in which she repeated arguments previously presented to the board in protest of a group of Lubbock women's presentations of stories at Christmas and Easter in the classrooms.

Al Judd, minister of the Unitarian Church in Lubbock which Mrs. Blakeley attends, also spoke regarding the principle of separation of church and state. No other persons in the orderly

crowd spoke on the subject, although it appeared likely that some were prepared to give their views. At least three ministers were in the crowd.

School board president Joe Gamble and board members apparently felt it would not be proper to allow the meeting to turn into a session of debate on beliefs, and the lack of fireworks was an evident

disappointment to representatives of the Lubbock news media on hand, and possibly to some of the other spectators.

Mrs. Blakeley's petition quoted sections 6 and 7 of the Texas Constitution and quoted legal cases related to the topic. The four-page petition was signed only by Mrs. Blakeley.

Referring to a letter on the subject from Chester Ollison, legal counsel for the Texas Education Agen-

cy, Mrs. Blakeley said, "I found Mr. Ollison's letter subject to as many interpretations as the Bible." In regard to the school's offering a pupil an option of participating or not participating in the seasonal presentations, Mrs. Blakeley said "These programs for all of these years have not been voluntary...you have made the attendance voluntary only to satisfy me." She also said that if religion is to be taught in the schools, then all religions should be taught.

### To Consider Petition

Gamble told Judd and Mrs. Blakeley that the board would give an answer to her petition after consideration of the matter and consultation with the board's legal counsel. Attorney Charles Cobb of Lubbock was present Tuesday night as representative of the board.

Supt. J.C. McClesley told the board that the school's share of funds for operating the schools next year would be doubled, but that this does not mean taxes will have to be doubled on the local level. He indicated that board members likely will have to raise taxes, but just how much cannot be determined at this time. In fact, he said, no budget can be made out for next year right now because the full import of the newly-enacted school finance bill in Texas has not yet been explained to local districts.

Although an increased cost of \$132,000 per year to the school is indicated in the operating fund area,

the school apparently will get more money from the state than before for some things, and with a natural growth in the tax rolls plus the fact that autos will be taxed here next year are all factors to consider in financial planning.

### Tax Vehicles

Vehicles will go on the school tax rolls starting with statements to be sent out in October.

The board voted to accept bids on the Posey school and Evans gymnasium buildings with the structures to be razed or removed from their present locations.

Despite all the uncertainties, Supt. McClesley sounded an optimistic note on finances, commenting that "we are approaching the end of the first year in several years in which we apparently will wind up operations in the black."

A letter of resignation was read from James D. Bales, head basketball coach and tennis coach, and other resignations were received from Mrs. Diane (See SCHOOL, Page 4)

## Good Rains Fall In Slaton Area

More than two inches of rain fell in the Slaton area during the last week, boosting the year's total to 6.95 inches in the city itself, meaning that about a third of the year's rainfall so far has occurred in the last week.

In the city limits, one gauge measured 1.10 inches of rain last Saturday, .20 Monday, .30 early Tuesday and then another .50 during Tuesday night. This 2.10 inches added to the 4.85 previously recorded made the total 6.95.

Rains were general throughout the area, except a section south and south-east of Slaton did not receive much rain. Most area farmers, however, did get good rainfall, and it was just in time for some of the dryland cotton to be planted.

No hail was reported except for a region north-west of town where some very young cotton was battered.

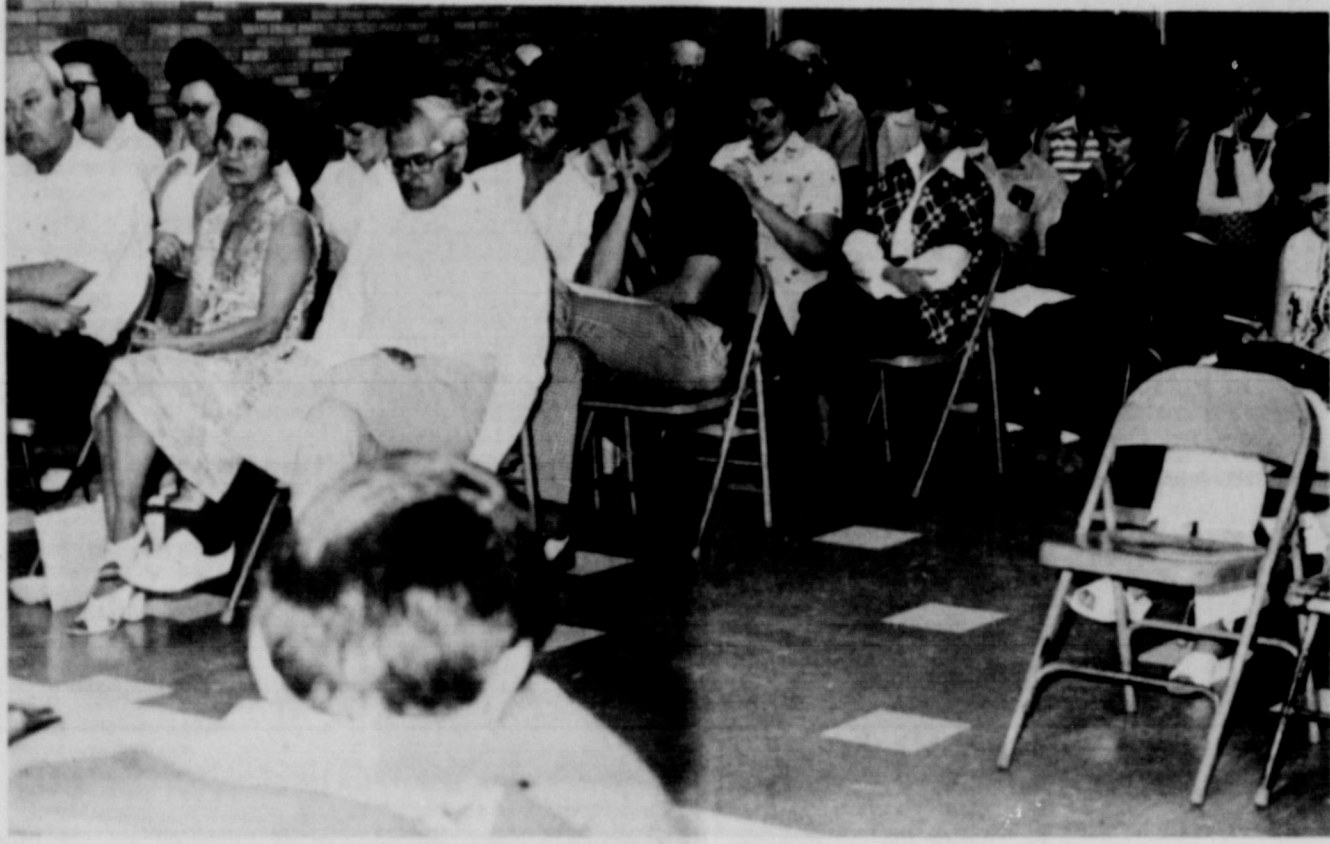

## No Chief Named; Recall Vote Set June 27

A room full of spectators and representatives of the Lubbock news media were disappointed Tuesday night when the Slaton City Commission failed to name a replacement for ousted Police Chief Fred Clark.

Mayor John Landreth said the Commission took no action during a closed meeting Monday morning. According to the agenda of that meeting, commissioners met to review applications for the position of police chief.

"The Commission is still interviewing applicants," said Landreth. According to informed sources, Lubbock County Sheriff's Deputy and former Slaton patrolman Jeff Creager was offered the job, but he turned it down because of differences in policy. Creager reportedly wanted to increase the size

of the police force, and the Commission wanted it to remain as it is.

### Temporary Help

While the chief of police position remains vacant, so do several spots for patrolmen in the department.

## Chamber Board Eyes Coin Sales

Slaton Chamber of Commerce directors took a look at sales of commemorative coins and discussed the need for a new chamber manager at the June meeting of the board Tuesday morning.

President Ernie Davis reported that only one application for manager to replace Tom Roy, who recently resigned, had been received. However, he said more applications would likely be forthcoming after the publication of this month's area chamber newsletter.

Davis reported that the swimming pool has been leased by Moffitt Pools of Lubbock and that Moffitt already is operating the pool here.

Plans to push sales of the Slaton commemorative coins at the annual Fourth of July celebration in the park here were discussed.

## Sen. Hance To Speak On School Financing

LUBBOCK — State Senator Kent Hance will give citizens a first-hand look at how the 64th Legislature arrived at the public school financing bill in a Lamesa, Texas seminar set Monday, June 16.

The public seminar begins at 1 p.m. in the Lamesa High School auditorium.

"I feel it is time we inform the public directly about the events taking place in their State Capitol," said Senator Hance.

"Public school financing was one of the most important topics discussed during this session. The

people of West Texas need to know exactly what the legislature did concerning school financing," he said.

Senator Hance noted that school superintendents, principals, board members and teachers were especially invited to the seminar.

"I think the meeting will be most informative to those people, and to others interested in public education," Senator Hance said.

The panel for the afternoon meeting will include representatives from the Texas Education Agency and the Texas State Teachers Association.

Police protection for the city is being handled in part by the Lubbock County Sheriff's Office and the Department of Public Safety.

The Commission did take positive action on the issue of recalling Otis Neill, setting June 27 as the date for the recall election.

City Secretary Alex Webb said he is trying to obtain the Clubhouse for the polling place. If it is unavailable, voting will take place at city hall.

"There are approximately 900 registered voters in Ward II. I think we'll probably have around 500 turn out to vote," said

Webb. There will be 750 ballots available to voters.

The Commission disposed of a six-item agenda in only 12 minutes Tuesday night. In other action, they voted to resolve pending litigation on the Meurer vs. City of Slaton suit, and to purchase a pickup for the cemetery.

The Commission accepted a low bid from Smith Ford for the pickup. The cemetery board earlier had voted to make the purchase and the Commission needed only to approve their decision.

New Signs Due  
The Commission also accepted a resolution concerning traffic signs in the city.

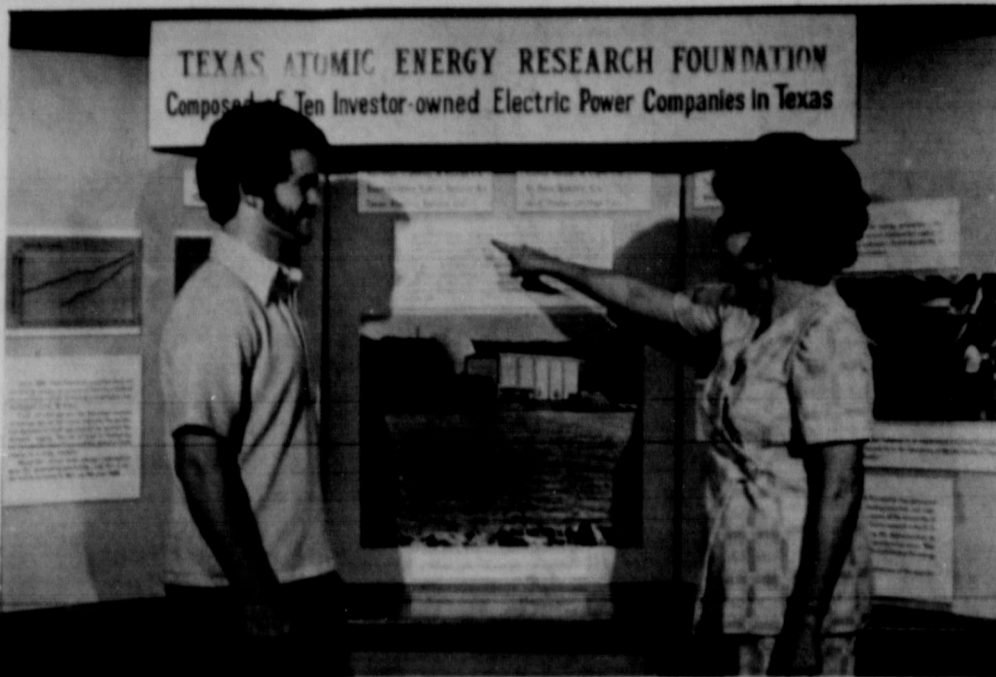
**JOLLY QUILTERS**

**Consumers' Corner**

**Certain Plastics Are Fire Hazards**  
The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) is claiming that certain plastics, which have been marketed as "non-combustible," are serious fire hazards. The charge is made in a proposed class-action complaint against a number of producers and marketers of cellular (or foamed) polyurethane and all forms of polystyrene. These plastics are commonly used in the construction and home furnishings industries for insulation, furniture cushioning and bedding, panels and siding, pipes, plumbing and lighting fixtures and furniture.

The FTC's action is not intended to remove these plastics from the market. Rather, the intent is to have producers adequately warn buyers and users that the products are combustible and that precautions should be taken in installing and using products made of these materials. Plastic foam, for instance, is used for house insulation and presents a hazard only if users do not realize that the material requires a fire-resistant covering.

This punch is a super thirst-quencher that will go along with your barbecued foods and your fabulous dessert.

- AMERI-CRAN FLAG CAKE (Makes 1 - 9 x 13 x 2 inch cake)
- 1 package (18 1/2 ounces) yellow cake mix
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 3 squares (3 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate, grated
- 1 package (9 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed
- 1 can (1 pound) Ocean Spray jellied cranberry sauce
- 1/2 cup fresh or frozen dry-pack blueberries

Prepare cake mix according to package directions adding nutmeg and grated chocolate to cake batter. Pour batter into a greased and floured 9 x 13 x 2 inch baking pan. Bake as directed on package. Remove from pan and cool on a rack. Place on a serving platter. Spread top and sides with whipped topping. Chill until ready to serve. Just before serving cut jellied cranberry sauce lengthwise into 1/2 inch thick slices. Cut slices lengthwise into strips 1 inch wide. Drain strips well on absorbent paper. Place blueberries in rows in upper left hand corner of the cake to resemble the stars on the flag. Place cranberry strips across cake to resemble stripes on the flag. **TEXAS TALK** By FRED MYERS

Sorghum planted in a field of plastic? That's one of the possibilities being studied by research groups now taking a hard look at a variety of water conservation programs. Experiments have actually been done in the Oklahoma Panhandle whereby plots were covered by large plastic sheets... holes cut in the plastic for the plants and irrigation water supplied under the plastic. Results... less than half the normal water required. Costs... terrible. So the search goes on with new attention focused on special breeding for water retention and improved plant utilization. Tests at Oklahoma State University reportedly indicated that as much as 2 inches of water a year can be saved by planting sorghum in rows running north and south rather than east to west. Direction of rows, spacing of furrows and development of new breeds are all subjects the sorghum producer will be hearing a lot more about... especially if the weather forecasters are right.

## Fiberglass May Be Hazardous

Washing fiberglass products can be disastrous if recommended care procedures are not followed, according to one clothing specialist.

Beverly Rhoades, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said that fiberglass products should always be laundered separately since fiberglass fragments are released during washing.

"These will become embedded in the fibers of any other fabrics in the same wash load. If these garments are worn, the fragments will irritate the wearer's skin."

"If a load of clothes is accidentally washed with a product containing fiberglass, there is no known way to remove the fragments. Repeated washing simply embeds the fragments further," she said.

After laundering any fiberglass product, a load of old rags should be run through the washer and dryer to absorb the fragments.

"Products containing fiberglass should have a label warning consumers about the dangers of washing fiberglass with clothing items," said Rhoades.

# Accent on Health

J.E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

If you regularly suffer with a throbbing headache, frayed nerves or even a flareup of peptic ulcer, you might blame it on "noise pollution" in your neighborhood. And state health officials agree that in some instances you might be pretty close to the truth.

Officials at the Texas State Department of Health, like their counterparts in every other state and at the federal level, see the noise problem as a mushrooming public health problem. The health officials estimate the overall loudness of environmental noise is doubling every decade. If not dealt with soon, the problem of

this "fourth pollution" will be as difficult to deal with as the other three: air, water and solid waste. Because of industrial noise alone, an estimated \$4-billion is spent each year on worker inefficiency, lost work time, accidents and compensation. As many as 16 million U.S. industrial workers may be partially or totally deafened by factory noise. This occurs when the

cilia (hairlike outgrowth) in the inner ear are destroyed, resulting in nerve sensation impairment and as a result, hearing impairment. Besides deafness, noise can cause other bodily harm. The U. S. Public Health Service reports that "physiological changes including glandular, cardiovascular and respiratory effects may reflect a generalized stress reaction" to

noise pollution. Some doctors believe there's a direct link between noise and heart disease, peptic ulcer, colitis, high blood pressure, migraine, and other health problems. In industry, health officials are chiefly concerned with hearing loss as a result of prolonged exposure to high levels of noise. In community noise problems, the hearing loss is not normally

encountered. Most often the principle problem is one of annoyance, disruption of life in the home, or a constant nuisance. Community noise problems may generally be placed in two categories (1) noises produced outside the home, including industrial, ground or air traffic, recreational, and neighborhood noise; and (2) noises produced inside the home,

including appliances. Ground noise involves commercial buses, trucks, and trains. Loudness has been given in terms of decibels of arterial blood pressure. Areas surrounding and on streets may cause serious community problems. Noises such as power mowers, barking dogs, ordinary problems sent tension to some residents may also pose a serious problem from noise pollution. One may not expect recreational activities such as cycling, hunting, fishing, bowling, etc. to be attended by noise. Inside the home, types and noise occur from such appliances as cleaner, garbage disposal, and dryer, and others. Appliances can cause problems in strength or sound in decibels. You can control sound level. Between 80 and 90 dB the noise level is some persons. 90 dB the noise level is the value is the exposure for an 8-hour workday. State health officials. For comparison, typical sounds familiar with following decibel scale: normal speech, 60; heavy city traffic, 70; clothes washer, 70; diesel train, 80; vacuum cleaner, 80; unit, 60; rock music, 108-114; industrial machine, 85; electric furnace, 100. It is easy to see from such a community noise can pose serious problems just noise exposure.
