

## Slaton Teams Win Own Tournament

The Slaton boys and girls basketball teams won their own tournament — the annual Slaton Tiger Club event — here last weekend, with the state championship Tigerettes having no problems, and the Tigers winning a close one in the

finals over Crosbyton.

With Kelly Copeland netting 15 points for Slaton, Coach Jim Bales' Tigers edged the Chiefs 49-44 in a game that was close most of the way. Joe Cargill had 14 points for the losers.

Debra Montgomery tallied

20 points as Coach Gay Benson's team ripped Abernathy 58-31 in the finals.

Shallowater, beaten by Slaton earlier, won girls third place over Bledsoe 62-35 and Tahoka beat McAdoo for consolation honors. In the boys third place game, Tahoka whipped Shallowater 58-54, and McAdoo won consolation by beating Fluvanna.

Both Slaton teams beat Grady handily in the tournament opener, then the Slaton boys beat Shallowater 56-42 and the girls whammed Shallowater 49-27, as Rosemary Scott scored 16. Copeland scored 16 in the boys game.

The teams were to play at Crosbyton Monday night, and Slaton boys are to play Lubbock Christian High School here Tuesday night.

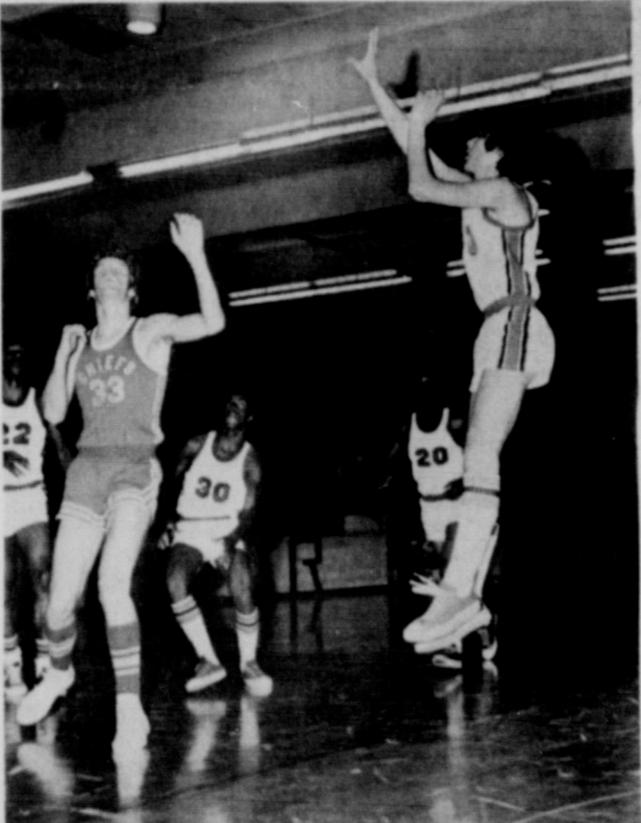

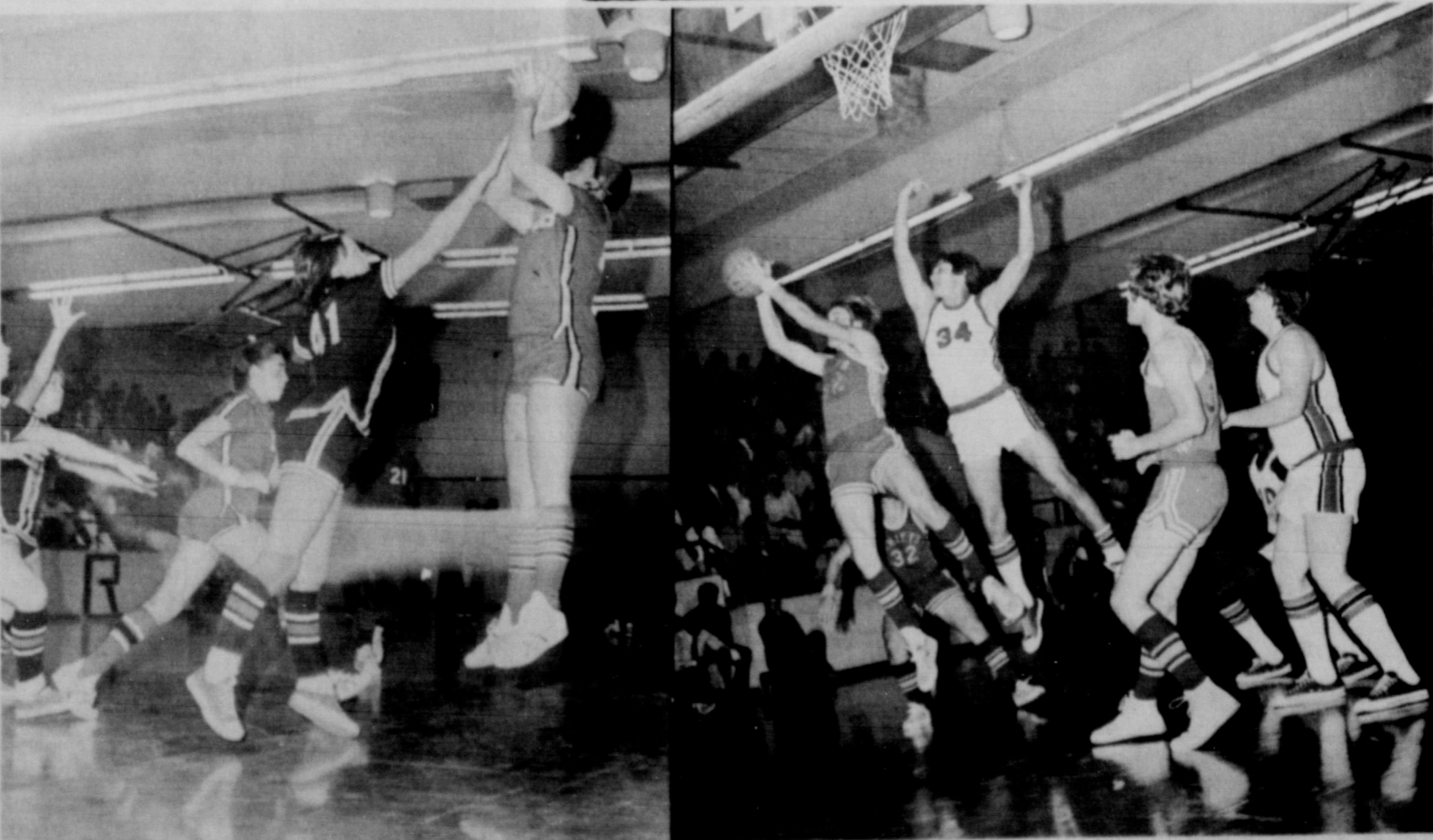

Smith formerly was executive vice president of Park Broadcasting Corp. of the Midwest. In this capacity, he managed radio stations KRSI, Minneapolis; WEBC, Duluth; and WNAX, Yankton, S.D. He has also managed WOAI in San Antonio.

The Smiths reportedly will move to Slaton to operate the station when the transaction becomes effective next year.

The Slaton Library will close Thursday for Thanksgiving Day.

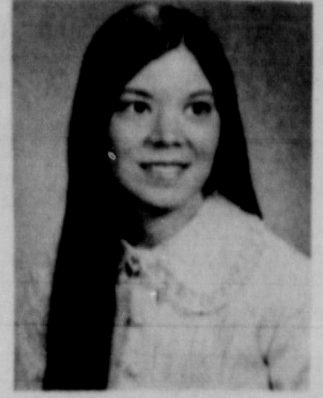

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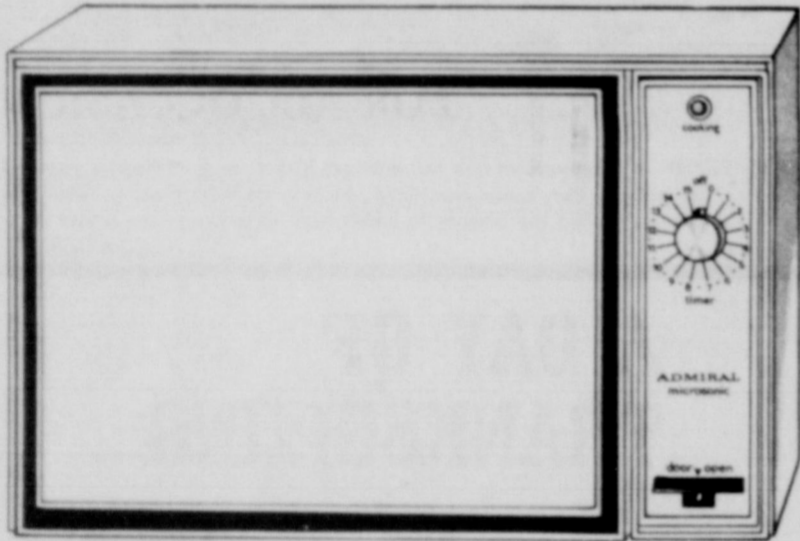
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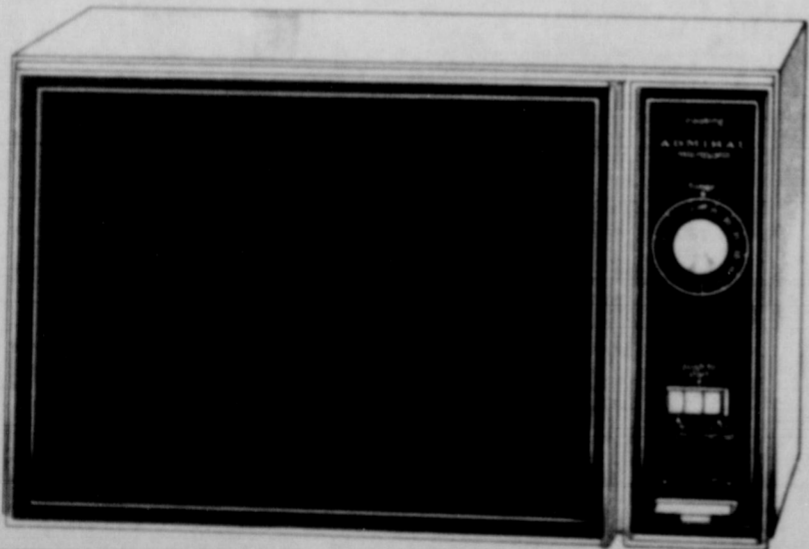

Eunice was born on Nov. 26, 1899, in Tallapoosa County Ala. She moved to Williamson County, Tex., when she was three years old. Her family then moved to the plains in 1916 and she has lived here since.

Eunice is the daughter of George and Emma Harlan. She came from a family of 17 children, and has a twin brother, who drowned when he was in his early 40s trying to save some other people. Nine of the children still live in this area.

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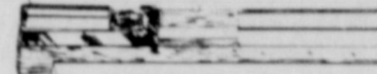

Do you want to be understanding and a source of aid to others who are troubled or in need in some way? I think each of us have at least some of this desire. We'd like to tell God: Lord just let me be understanding and loving, and helpful. And then we think it'll just happen, sort of with a snap of the fingers.

But understanding and wisdom don't come that easy. I believe every Christian would say that it starts with a desire to be this way all right, but it's more than that. It takes real life experiences.

How could one possibly give comfort to someone with a breaking heart, if you had not experienced a broken heart yourself?

Even God permitted Jesus to go through many heart-breaking experiences — "and even though Jesus was God's Son, he had to learn from experience what it was like to obey, when obeying meant suffering" (Heb. 5:8).

So maybe we've been petitioning God to give us better understanding and wisdom. And then perhaps we begin to experience some very bitter things, and wonder what happened to our prayer, and we begin to cry out, "Lord, take me out of this bitter experience." We don't even stop to think that this experience may be the very thing that God is going to use to answer that very simple prayer in the first place.

We need to be reminded again, and again (and I'm speaking to myself more

than to anyone else) that God is answering that prayer, and in order for us to grow we must experience these things, and, yes, even suffer some. We are not above our Master, the Bible says, and if He had to suffer, then we should expect to do so also.

I've been reading in Daniel the past few weeks, and was reminded again of the fact that God does hear our prayers (if we are in earnest). And He, in fact, sets things in motion to answer that prayer, at the very time we first begin to petition Him. Just because

we don't see any signs of His answering the prayer 30 minutes later, doesn't mean that He is not answering it.

"Then said he unto me, Fear not, Daniel: for from the first day that thou didst set thine heart to understand, and to chasten thyself before God, thy words were heard, and I am come for thy words." (Dan. 10:12.)

These words were spoken by an angel to Daniel, 21 days after Daniel had first petitioned the Lord.

It is with all this in mind that we can say "Thank You" to the Lord.

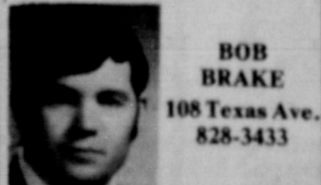

As we were working to move it, a bus driver suggested that we gather stones as a platform upon which to place a jack to raise the wheel of the bus. About that time an African family came along and stopped to help. We were instructed, "Kick every stone to make sure there is no scorpion underneath." Side by side we worked together until the tested stones made a sure foundation. The bus was soon out of the sand.

We have a lesson here that can help us solve our problems. We need to kick the stones to make sure the scorpions of lies, deceit, and all other evils do not destroy us. Together we can gather the tested stones of faith, hope, and love to make a sure foundation for our lives, "Christ Jesus himself being the chief cornerstone."

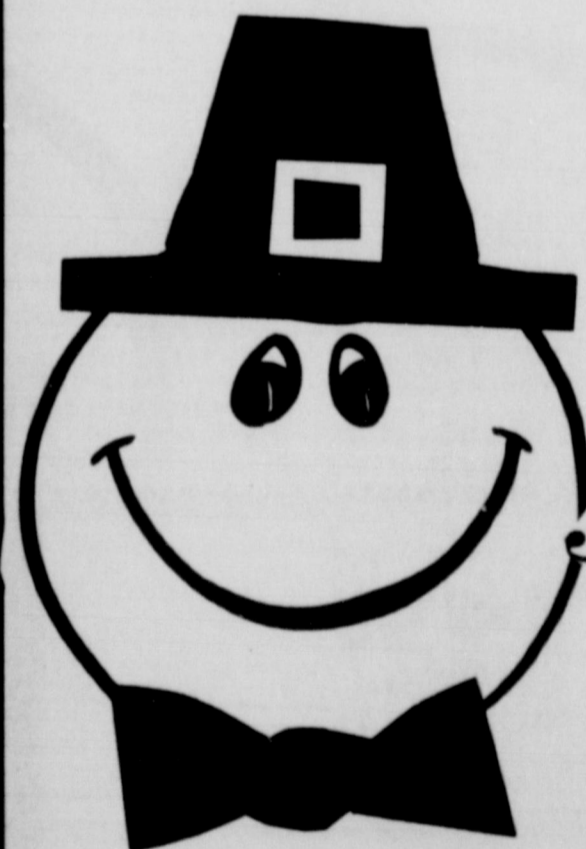

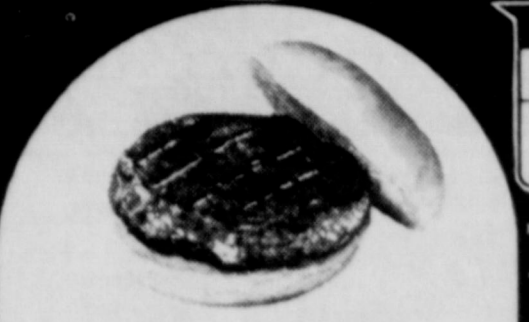
