Street Lights, Water Cutoffs Discussed

Several items were discussed but little action was taken during Tuesday's meeting of the City Commission.

The only item voted on was the February bills, which the commission approved to pay.

A contract with Southwestern Public Service for the city's street lights was postponed until the commission could study the situation further. The new contract calls for a 14.9 per cent increase in the overall charge for street lighting. City Secretary Alex Webb said the increase would

amount to approximately \$115 more a month than the city now pays.

The commissioners decided to survey the street lights and see if there is any way to offset the increase. Commissioner Otis Neill

suggested that some of the street lights could be removed and Commissioner J. P. Spears agreed. Therefore the commission plans to investigate the situation.

Walking Beat
Another item which came up for discussion was the

hiring of a walking patrolman. The commission had previously asked a Slaton man to take the job, but he declined. They are still looking for someone to hire.

The commission is also looking into a complaint that the city traffic lights are not

timed correctly. Crown Life Insurance, which handles the city employees' insurance, is requesting a 29 per cent increase. The commission decided to look into the situation and possibly put out bids for insurance.

The final item of business came from Webb, who said he felt he should let the commission know of the current situation with water cutoffs. He said the city's customers were not treating the city with the same courtesy they gave the gas and electric companies.

According to Webb, Pioneer Natural Gas averages 20 cutoffs a month, and Southwestern Public Service averages 10.

"But," said Webb, "We are having more than 100 a month. The people just aren't paying their bills." Webb cited a list of statistics which showed the city cutoffs to be: July, 111; August, 103; Sept., 153; Oct., 152; Nov., 138; Dec., none, (the city did not make cutoffs in that month); Jan., 93; and Feb., 114.

Notices sent those months were 512, 336, 615, 448, 536, 591, 484 and 539. Webb said the cost of cutoffs and cut ons needed to be raised and he said he felt the city should start enforcing its 30-day non-payment period.

"The other utilities are not having this trouble," said Webb. "There's no reason we should. People come in here daily and threaten us and they threaten our men who go to cut off service. It's a difficult situation and I feel we need to be a little stronger in enforcing our rules."

The commission agreed with Webb, authorizing him to add an additional man to the cutoff service.

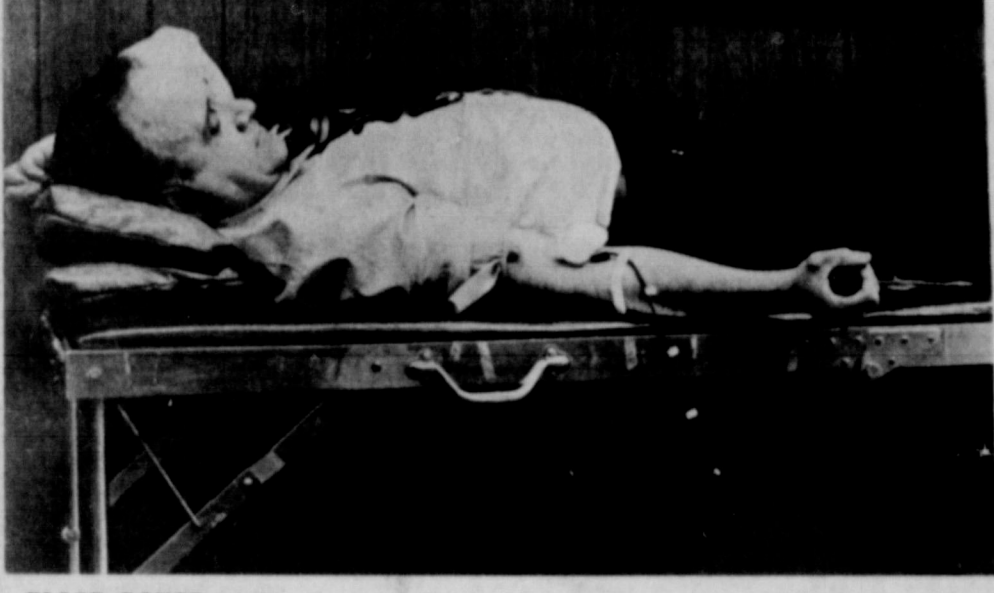
Clinic Zone Decision Due

There will be a special called meeting of the Slaton City Commission Friday at 2 p.m. in the City Hall Corporation Court Room.

The commissioners will pass on a recommendation for the rezoning of two lots east of the Handy Hut for the building of a clinic by Dr. Ernesto Maldia.

The Zoning Board voted 5-0 to recommend the rezoning from R-1 to R-3 so that the clinic can be built.

Approximately 10 citizens appeared at the first meeting of the Zoning Board to protest the rezoning petition.

Teachers Rehired; Calendar Is Set

Slaton School board Tuesday night voted to rehire teachers in the system without knowing how much they'll pay them, approved a list of textbooks for use in the schools next year, agreed to have the tax rolls computerized and conducted a five-hour session in which there was no smoking.

Salaries and assignments for teachers for next year

were left open, since the legislature currently is involved in a hassle over several proposed school financing plans, and teacher salary schedules would vary with each plan. For the same reason, Supt. J. C. McClesky told the board Tuesday, it would be difficult to set up a budget for Slaton schools at this time, since action on the financing plans still are pending.

Meeting At Lubbock

It was noted that State Sen. Kent Hance would preside over a meeting at Texas Tech's Business Administration Building beginning at 1 p.m. when all the school financing plans would be discussed. Any interested person is invited to attend.

According to local school officials, adoption of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's school financing plan would hurt the Slaton school district badly and cause taxes to double without a corresponding increase in benefits to the system. The plan reportedly would primarily benefit the large urban districts in the state.

The board voted to contract with the Education Service Center in Lubbock to prepare Slaton ISD tax roll, at a cost to the district of \$1,800 the first year and about \$750 per year thereafter.

Administrative Assistant Joe Sparkman presented recommendations for textbooks and these were adopted by the board.

A second tentative report on the Slaton schools' self-evaluation project, underway since last summer, has been completed, the board was advised, and a group of three outside educators will be in Slaton next week to make their own observations of the school setup here. After they have made their suggestions, the report will be rewritten for the third time and then recommendations will be made by the local steering committee as to what can be done to upgrade the schools in specific areas.

Visiting Committee

The members of the Self-Evaluation Visiting Committee will meet with the local steering committee and any other interested persons at 9 a.m. Monday in the Chamber of Commerce meeting room. They will be in town for three days, studying the schools and the community.

Cleanup Of Abandoned Houses Begins

With the destruction of a vacant house owned by the city, the cleanup campaign in Ward IV of abandoned houses this week

is a volunteer committee including Mary Louise Ruiz, Buddy Hoffman, Olivia Slay and Edward Gaydos.

"Most of these houses are just shacks," said Mrs. Ruiz. "No one could possibly live in them. We just want to tear them down and clean up the neighborhood."

According to Mrs. Ruiz, the plan is to demolish the houses in Ward IV and then gradually to move into other areas of the city. "We're starting in Ward IV first because it's the worst. I want to clean it up and raise the property values of the other homes."

Data Collected
Files have been prepared on approximately 40 houses in the area and now the owners of the property have to be contacted and informed that their buildings have been declared fire and health hazards.

Mary Frances Browning did the work compiling the files. Each of the houses has been inspected by a health inspector, building inspector and the fire marshal. Each file contains a picture of the house and a detailed description of its condition.

"You just wouldn't believe these houses," said Mrs. Ruiz. "Most of them have burned at one time and now there is just a shell. There's broken glass and metal and all kinds of dangerous things in them. It's not safe for the kids to be around."

According to Hoffman, the main problem now is finding the property owners or their heirs. "A lot of the owners are either out of state or they're dead and no one knows who their heirs are," said Hoffman.

First One

The city owned building was the first to be demolished because permission was easily obtained from the city. One other house is slated for destruction soon because the owner is a Lubbock attorney and he is willing to have the property cleaned.

Other owners will be contacted by letters which advise them that "the building on the lot is in such a dilapidated condition that it is a fire and health hazard and a community nuisance."

The letter further states

that the building cannot be economically reconditioned to comply with proper ordinances.

Property owners may either appeal the notice or sign a demolition lien release which authorizes the city to clean up the property and place a lien against it.

According to Mrs. Ruiz, many of the houses have back taxes against them and the owners would benefit by letting the city clean the lots. "There's absolutely no way these shacks can be repaired. They need to be torn down and cleaned up," said Mrs. Ruiz.

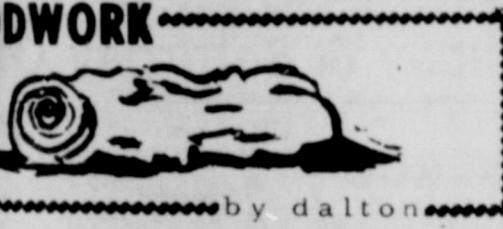
The cleanup committee met last week and discussed their plans. City commissioner Byron Crandall, county commissioner Max Ar-

rants and representatives of the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce also met with the committee. The Women's Division is considering helping with the cleanup as one of their projects.

"We're hoping this will make people proud of Slaton," said Mrs. Ruiz. "When everybody sees how clean the city can be, maybe they will start their own neighborhood cleanup."

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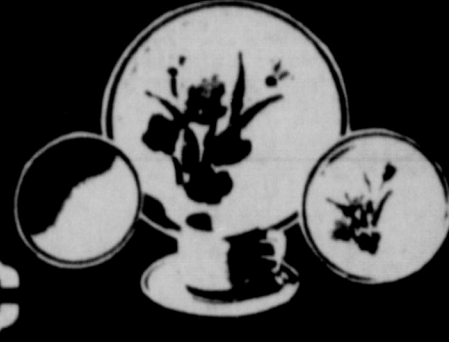
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
