

New! Tigerettes Barely Win Bi-District Over Coahoma, 51-49

defeat at the hands of the super-tough Coahoma Bulldogettes Monday night and win the bi-district championship. After trailing most of the game, and after being behind by nine points at the end of the third period, Slaton somehow

came back to win it 51-49 on some last-quarter heroics led by sophomore forward Sandra Mercer.

Only in the final 14 seconds as Coahoma lost the ball out of bounds was there any kind of assurance that Slaton was going to win, and after the final gun, most Slaton fans who journeyed down to Snyder Memorial Coliseum for the contest were — like Coach Gay Benson — too exhausted emotionally to do a whole lot of celebrating.

The Tigerettes will play Abernathy at 1 p.m. Friday in the first round of regional play in Lubbock Coliseum. The other first-round match will be at 11:30 a.m. between Phillips and McCamey.

Slaton walloped Abernathy 58-31 in the Slaton Tournament early in the season, but found the Abernathy girls vastly improved when they went up there in December. Slaton won that one by just two points, 55-53.

The Tigerettes now are 27-3 for the year. The finals of regional will be at 8:30 p.m. Class A regional will be held at the coliseum the same day, starting at 8:30 a.m.

Slaton schools will turn out all day Friday for the playoff game, and the first game against Abernathy will be broadcast live on Radio Station KCAS.

Show Poise
Coach Benson then sent in tall Terri Holland and Miss Mercer at forwards, to team with Miss Scott, and with the guards all putting out an extra effort, the Tigerettes demonstrated the poise of which champions are made. The guards shut down the Bulldogettes with just 6 points in the period.

For the second year in a row, Coahoma played a magnificent game against Slaton, only to lose it by a whisker in the final seconds. Senior forward Patty Hulme, whose 25 points was tops for the game, almost destroyed the Tigerettes by herself in the third period, tossing in field goals and free throws with deadly accuracy.

For Slaton, Rosemary Scott had 19 points to lead in that category, and Miss Mercer scored 11 points, all of them in the last quarter. Cool Teresa Wright also scored 11 for Slaton, and Debra Montgomery had 8.

Slaton guards Diana Dunlap, Loretta Wolf, Millie Maxwell and Virginia Whaley all did a good job, although they had their hands full containing the fired-up Coahoma forwards.

Two Ill
Two of Slaton's heroines spent the day of the game in bed with illnesses. Miss Scott and Miss Mercer missed school, but suited up for the game, with Rosemary playing the entire contest. Sandra did not get into the game until the fourth period, but made the most of that, driving hard to the basket and scoring 11 big points.

The first quarter was see-saw battle, with Scott getting the game's first two points in the first 12 seconds. Coahoma's Becky Snell tied it up, then Wright and Montgomery hit field goals to put Slaton ahead again.

Coahoma took the lead for the first time at 4:41 left in the first as Hulme scored, but with Scott and Montgomery plugging away, Slaton regained the lead at 1:30, 14-13. Teresa then added three points, but Coahoma tied it at 17 as the period ended.

In the second, Slaton had brief lead, then Coahoma pulled out to lead from 5:10 left in that period until Mercer hit a field goal with just 2:07 left in the game. Coahoma led by as many as 8 points in the second, and

held a 31-29 bulge at half-time. Slaton was outscored 12-5 in the third quarter, with the score at that point 43-34 and it appeared that the party might be over for the defending state champions.

With fans on both sides biting their nails up to their elbows, the score stayed that way until just 23 seconds remained, when Mercer hit a free throw and did a delighted leap into the air as it went in. Coahoma came back downcourt with a chance to shoot and tie it up, but lost the ball out of bounds and Slaton hung on for the final 14 seconds.

"I was looking for a combination that would click," Coach Benson said Tuesday, referring to the decision to send in Holland and Mercer in the last quarter. "Terri and Sandra both have come through for us in a clutch situation before, and they did again."

\$6,600 Holdup, More Burglaries Reported

A \$6,600 holdup of Piggly-Wiggly supermarket here Tuesday was the latest in a crime wave which includes 18 burglaries reported in the first 18 days of February in the city of Slaton.

Police Chief Fred Clark said his department has been able to come up with just one arrest in the 26 burglaries reported so far this year. He also said that his department is doing its best to patrol the city, but he had a complaint of his own to register:

"People are criticizing the police department for not stopping these burglaries, but we are faced with a situation where we are at least two men short on the force and still we're ordered by the city officials to cut out all overtime." Clark said the department now includes five officers and two supervisors, and that it is set up to operate with eight patrolmen and two supervisors.

During the last week, burglaries were recorded at Forrest Lumber Co., American Legion Hall, two private homes, the Slaton City Hall, and a package store on East Division.

Gunman Enters
Biggest loss, however, was in the armed robbery of the supermarket about 9:15 p.m. Tuesday. Assistant Manager James Stephens was alone in the front of the store when a black male about 5-11, weighing 145, came up with a 4-inch steel revolver and ordered Stephens to "give me all your

money." Manager David Elder said the bandit took \$6,600 in bills and change, leaving the checks at the request of Stephens. The man tied up the assistant manager and left. Stephens quickly freed himself and notified police. The man also took Stephens' personal wallet.

Clark said the 26 burglaries, 17 thefts and one armed robbery this year so far compares with a total of just 48 burglaries for all last year. "We're not alone in this, though," he commented.

Candidates are needed for three positions on the board of trustees of Slaton Independent School District, with March 5 deadline for filing for the posts.

Candidates must specify whether they are filing for one of the two regular expiring terms, or for the one-year remaining unexpired term of Clark Self Jr., a post now held by Skip Tumlinson, appointed to serve until the next regular election time.

Terms of R. C. Hall Jr. and Mrs. Bettye Burks are due to expire. For those running for either of these positions, the top two vote-getters will be elected.

Anyone living in the school district and qualified as a voter may file by picking up the proper materials at the school offices on S. 9th St.

Chain Saw Stolen
On the same night, Forrest lost a chain saw valued at \$160 in a break-in. On Monday, the Legion Hall was entered after a door was pried open, and \$320 cash was stolen.

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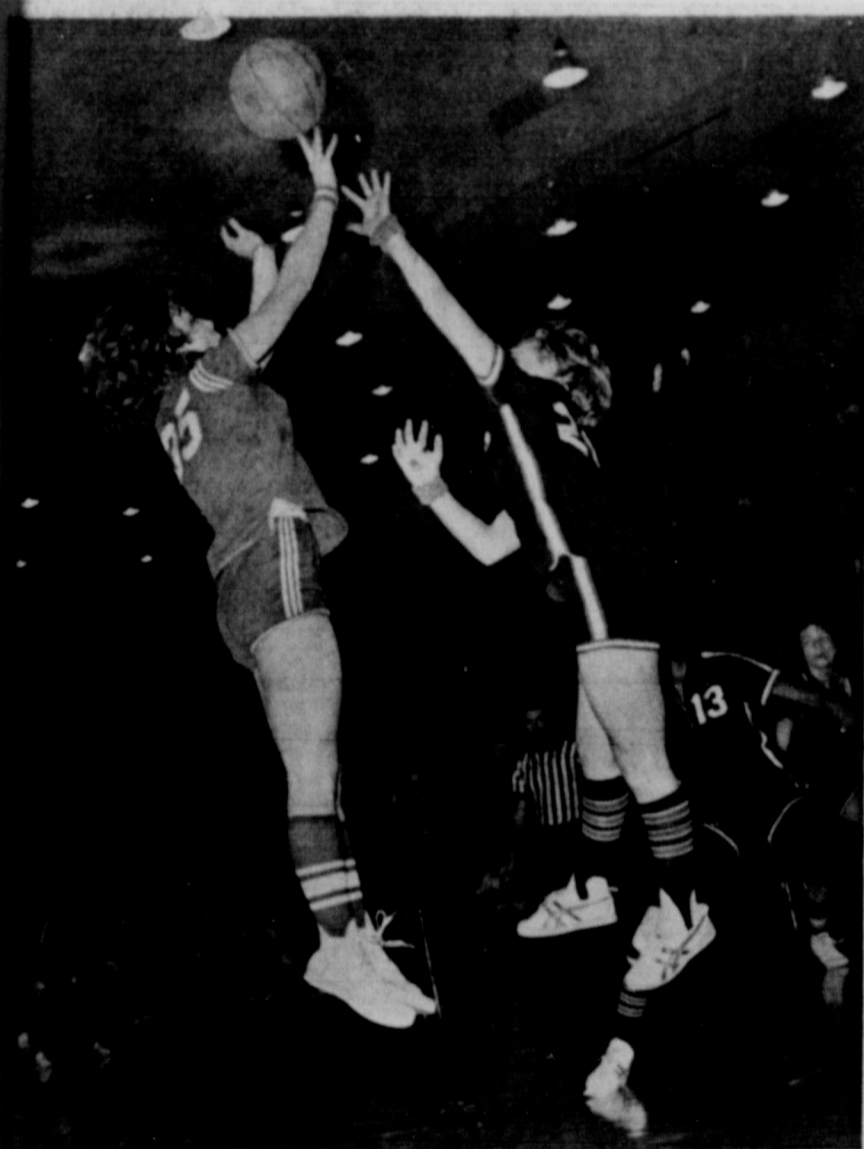

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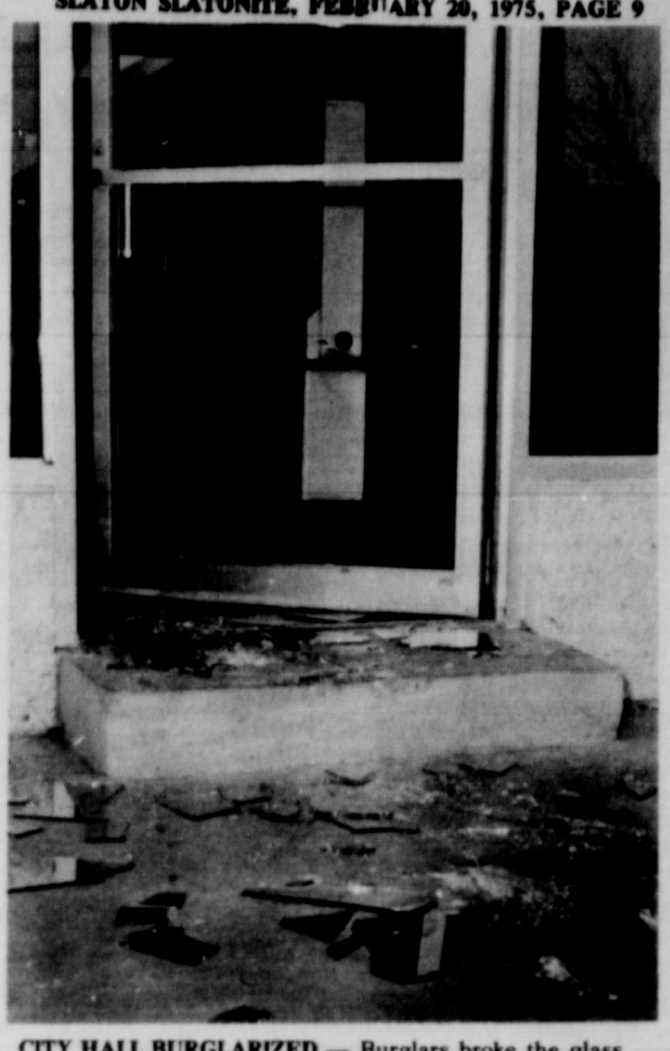
