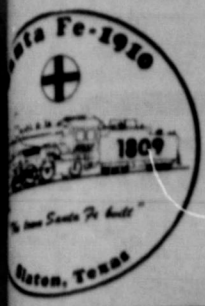

Bobcats Puncture Tiger Balloon 27-0

The Slaton Tigers found Childress tougher than raw duck and the Bobcats had scoring power to go with it handing Slaton a 27-0 whipping in the state Class AA quarterfinal football game at Plainview last Friday night. Slaton, however, still

wound up with a good 8-5 record and finished the season as the most successful Slaton High School football team in history, advancing further into the playoffs than any Slaton team ever has. Childress' defense held Bill McClesky, Slaton's

most talented running back, to just 37 yards in ten carries. Quarterback Mike Tumlinson, who played a good game for the Tigers, gained 49 yards in 7 carries to lead Slaton runners, and also hit on five of 17 passes for 72 yards, with all his completions coming in the

first half. McClesky wound up the year with 1,670 yards on 327 carries, an average of 5.1 per carry. In the 13 games, he scored 22 touchdowns and 6 extra points for a total of 138. He also completed 2 of 5 passes for 86 yards, and caught sev-

eral passes, including an 89-yarder against Post. **Haynes Runs Well**
Charlie Haynes had a good evening against Childress, gaining 40 yards in 6 carries. Darrell Bednarz caught three passes for 26 yards. Bednarz and Loran Roberts led Slaton's defense with 10 tackles each.

A couple of plays hurt Slaton considerably. In the first quarter, after Childress had driven 80 yards to score and lead 7-0 with Jody Hernandez going 5 yards, Tumlinson hit Ernest Gipson with a pass that appeared to be a sure touchdown. Gipson made a fine catch, but in the clear he dropped the ball and the Bobcats recovered at the Childress 31 after the 39-yard completion and fumble. Childress came back to drive quickly for another TD, with the big gainers being a 19-yard run by Quarterback Robert Sims, then a 37-yard touchdown run by Ricky Smith. Smith kicked the first of his three conversions for the night and Childress led 14-0 early in the second quarter.

Slaton then put on a long drive which carried 74 yards, then with third and 1 to go for a first down came the other play which hurt. A Slaton youngster was offside and Slaton was penalized 5 back to the 11.

Biggest Threat
A pass was incomplete and on fourth down, a running effort lost 5 more yards. Slaton was to get no closer to scoring than that during the game.

The Tigers were held to just three first downs in the last half. Childress pretty well put the game away with a 55-yard third quarter drive ending with Smith going 2 yards to score. Smith, who gained 126 yards on 24 carries, kicked point to make it 21-0 with 3:09 left in the quarter. Minutes later, Tumlinson's kick went awry into the wind and wound up just 13 yards downfield at the Slaton 36, and after a loss, Sims passes to Jeff Smith for a touchdown of 38 yards. Roberts blocked the extra point kick and it was 27-0 with 41 seconds left in the third.

The fourth quarter was pretty much even, but Slaton still could not get anything going. Childress will play Decatur this week in the semifinals.

Dubbin Englund was elected vice-president, and Richard Becker was re-elected as treasurer. Current Chamber President Ernie Davis announced at the board meeting that speaker for the annual banquet will be Lewis Timberlake of Austin. It was agreed that price again would be \$5 per plate.

It also was announced that new directors of the chamber have been elected, including Darris Linder, Keith White, Hack Lasater, Dillon Patterson and Ebb Stricklin was re-elected.

The directors voted to accept the bid of Town and Country Chevrolet for lease of a car for the coming year. It was noted that the bids of this firm and others were about the same, but the board tries to rotate the leases between local firms if the bids are equal.

Next board meeting will be in February.

Dog Owners Warned Of Pets Running Free

Dog owners in Slaton were reminded again this week that it is against the law to allow dogs to run loose in the city, regardless of whether they are wearing collars and tags.

Animal Warden Ken Romines pointed out that the city dog ordinance provides for a fine up to \$200 for allowing a dog to run loose. He also pointed out that all dogs in the city are supposed to have city

dog tags (available from city secretary at \$5) and that they must have current rabies vaccination tags. Rabies shots are good for one year and cost \$5 from the city veterinarian, he said. He also said plans are being made for a rabies vaccination day in the city early next year.

He said most of his business in picking up dogs is at night. The city ordinance requires that a dog be restrained. Any dog not under restraint may be picked up and taken to the animal shelter. If the dog has tags, it is kept for six days and then either sold or destroyed. If the owner claims the animal, the owner must pay \$5 plus \$1 per day.

Romines also reminded citizens that dogs may be bought at the shelter. "Right now I have some nice puppies which may be adopted," he said. He said the adoption fee is \$5.

School Officials Here Concerned About Why Johnny Can't Add

Noting that math scores of youngsters in Slaton Public Schools have steadily declined on the average over the last seven or eight years, Slaton school board Tuesday night gave its strong approval to return to more conventional and basic math in textbooks to be adopted for next year.

Assistant Supt. Joe Sparman, in submitting a proposed list of names for the textbook selection committee, told the board "we're hoping to get back to some textbooks which concentrate more on the basic math than some of this modern stuff," noting that too often students understand the concept of the new math, but can't work the problems.

The textbook committee, approved by the board, will help select spelling and math books for grades one through six. Those on the committee include William Carnes, Sparkman, Supt. J.C. McClesky, and Mmes. Shirley Thornberry, Cynthia Jackson, Donna Englund, Newma Carnes, Chloe Gipson, Ruth Longtin, Velma O'Neal, Mickie Miles and Lynne Gerhardt.

The board approved signing of a contract to purchase a lot in Russell Addition for a 1,620-square foot home, to be constructed by the Building Trades class. Plans are to have the house finished by the end of the year.

Resignation of Mrs. Nancy Felder, who has been in a coma for about six weeks with an unexplained illness, was accepted.

Supt. McClesky reported that gate receipts for the year from football totaled \$12,637.94, not counting the

Childress receipts not yet received. The school administrative offices and tax office will be closed Christmas week, Dec. 21-28, and will be open Dec. 29, 30 and 31 to accommodate those wanting to pay their taxes before the end of the calendar year.

Area Cotton Ginning Reaches 53,817 Total

The total number of cotton bales ginned in the Slaton area continued to grow rapidly during the last week as good weather for harvesting cotton continued, and many area farmers began to get close to winding up the harvest.

The bale count climbed to 53,817 in the 13 gins surveyed. Last week at the same time the count was 38,984. The total by gins:

Slaton Co-Op 13,500, A-cuff Co-Op 6500, McClung Co-Op 3207, Union Co-Op 4485, Posey 2058, Farmers Gin of Slaton 3149, Southland Gin 2300, Hackberry Co-Op 4740, Wilson Co-Op 5000, Wayside Gin 2560, Gatzki Gin 1575, Moses Gin 2260, Wilson Farmers Gin 2483.

Grower prices were \$5 to \$7.50 per bale higher during the week ending Dec. 5, according to Paul R. Dickson of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office. Farmers sold mixed new crop lots of mostly grades 32 and 42, staples 28 through 30, mikes 3.0 through 4.9 for about 41.25 cents per pound. Mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 29 through 31, mikes 3.0

through 3.4 brought about 40.25 cents.

Area Cotton Ginning Reaches 53,817 Total

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported trading was moderate and growers offered small lots of new crop cotton in moderate volume.

Demand was good, Dickson said. Prices paid growers for cottonseed ranged from \$75 to \$100 per ton, mostly \$75 to \$85.

Grades 41, 42 and 52 were the predominant grades classed this week. Grade 41 accounted for 15 percent; grade 42, 44 percent; and grade 52, 16 percent. Bark reductions were assigned to 21 percent of the samples classed.

Staples 29, 30 and 31 were the main lengths, and mike readings 2.7 through 2.9 were 40 percent of the total.

About 147,000 samples were classed by the Lubbock Classing Office during the week ending Dec. 5. This seasons total stands at 413,000 samples compared to 203,000 on the same date a year ago. Harvest was at its peak.

Airport Farm Lease Slated

The City Commission met Tuesday morning to consider a seven-item agenda which included the previously discussed airport farm contract.

Commissioners Otis Neill, B.A. Hanna and Hesikize Thomas voted to establish certain specifications and then put the contract out for bid.

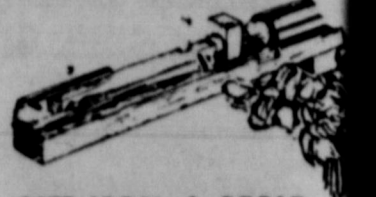

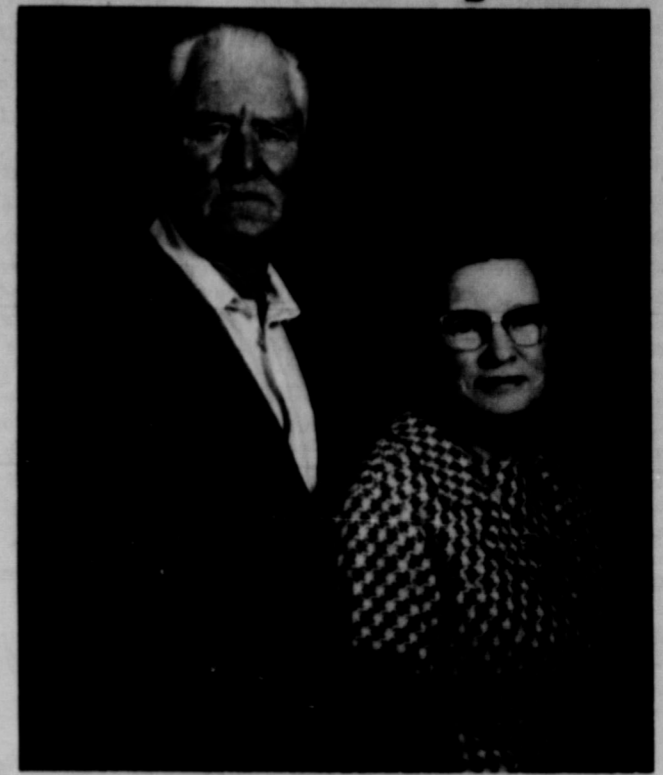
Luncheon To Honor Couple

Marvin Garrison: Man does not have the right to take the girl's life. She has committed no crime. God should decide whether or not she dies.

Juanita Garcia: Life to me is a sacred thing and to keep someone alive for as long as possible is the law of God.

Rev. Jack Maddox: I do not believe in mercy killing. It is not our choice to take away life.

Debbie Weise: If I had no trace of brain waves and doctors felt I would never recover, I would want to die.

Keith Stone: I think that God is the only one who has the right to take a person's life.

Brenda Ward: If there is no hope of recovery and only a vegetable would exist if she did live, I believe they should pull the plug.

David Toland: If she has life in its fullest meaning, then I don't believe it should be taken from her as long as she has not committed capitol murder.

Mr. J.L. Gordon: I oppose euthanasia because man

does not have the right to determine when another human's life shall end. God gave life and only He can allow death.

Rev. Clarence Collins: I don't believe pulling the plug would be mercy killing. She has no thinking and feeling of life.

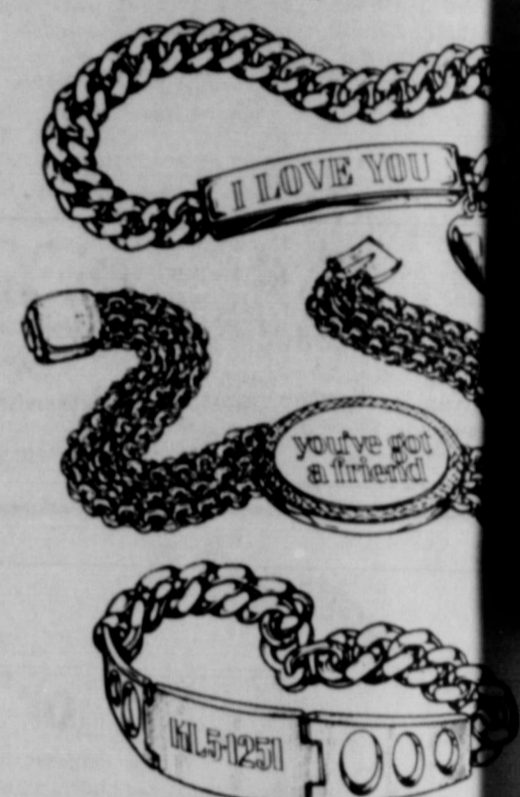

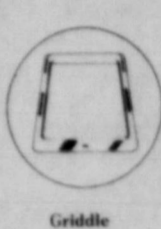

Operation ID Good For Businesses Too

"Operation Identification should be used as a crime prevention program by businesses as well as residences," according to Joe Hester and Mike Whitley, Slaton Police Department Crime Prevention Officers.

"Typewriters, calculators and other office equipment and furniture are especially

attractive to burglars and thieves," Hester and Whitley said. "Businessmen who protect their property with positive identification and let the potential criminal know that their property is marked and easily traceable will have fewer burglaries and thefts. They can do that by displaying decals warn-

ing that the property is marked.

Savings to the businessman can also come in the form of lower insurance rates by keeping replacement costs down, an expense which is included in the "deductible" portion of insurance policies.

Whenever possible, busi-

ness property should be marked with the proprietor's Texas driver's license number.

"If the proprietor does not have a driver's license," said Hester and Whitley, "he should contact the Slaton Police Department for a number to use."

Other operating instruc-

tions and procedures are outlined in material distributed through the department and at Operation Identification engraver check-out stations. Engravers may be outlined for free use in the Slaton Police Department.
