Also on hand for the festivities will be Judge Rod Shaw and State Representative Pete Laney, with other local dignitaries.

Keynote speaker for the Veterans' Day celebration will be Major Joseph E. Hickox of Reese Air Force Base. He will speak from a platform at the downtown square.

Major Hickox is assigned to the 64th Flying Training Wing as the Chief of Standardization / Evaluation Division under the Deputy Commander for Operations. As such, he is responsible for evaluating the ability

Instructor Pilots and the overall proficiency and quality of the flying training program at Reese. These responsibilities cover the T-37 and T-38 flying training and the academic and ground training aspects of the program.

Hickox enlisted in the Air Force upon graduation from high school in 1954 and spent his duty tour as a radar operator in Greenland. 144 days of it located beneath the polar ice cap about 200 miles south of the

North Pole. After completing that duty tour. Hickox left the Air Force and entered Florida State University. He received a BA degree in International Relations in 1960 and was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Air Force through ROTC.

Since that time, Hickox has served as an air-to-air gunnery instructor at Pensacola Naval Air Station, as an airborne battle staff operations officer based at Da Nang Air Base, and a T-28 Instructor Pilot at Udorn Royal Thai AFB.

City Buying Two **New Police Cars**

The Slaton City Commission called a special meeting last Thursday morning to discuss a four-item agen-

Police Chief Larry Williams attended the meeting. requesting of the city two new police cars and a change of frequency for the police department's radios.

Bids on the police cars were made by Town and Country Chevrolet and by Smith Ford, both of Slaton.

The Town and Country bid was for two Chevelle police package cars. The cars have heavy duty frames, special rear ends and shocks, plus other features. Town and Country bid \$9,493.36 and allowed a trade in of \$4,400

The police are currently using two Chevrolet Bel Airs which are less than a year old and have approximately 44,000 miles on each car. The Commission discussed the advantages of going to a smaller car (such as the Torino and/or Chevelle) and were told by Williams that the gas mileage on the Bel Airs is 9 or 10 miles a gallon. Williams said the smaller cars would be able to give 14 or 15 miles to the gallon.

Suggests Comparison Commissioner Otis Neill suggested that the city buy both a Chevrolet and a Ford to see which one will give the better service. The Commission agreed and voted to buy a Chevelle and a Torino.

Both car dealers estimated the cars would arrive in six weeks and are guaranteed for 12,000 miles or 12 months, whichever comes first.

The Commission also voted to buy, if the opportunity comes up, six 37180 radios from the Lubbock Sheriff's Office for only \$1 each. The city is anticipating installing the radios in other city vehicles at a later date.

City Secretary Alex Webb asked the Commission to consider the purchase of an accounting computer for water billing and other accounting work of the city. After a discussion and explanation of the machine. the Commission voted to buy the computer. Webb explained that the

city now has the billing for water use processed out of Plainview. "They have a turnover about every 90 days up there." said Webb. "and they are constantly having to train new people. This makes for a multitude



He gained 76 of Cooper's total 91 rushing yards, scored one TD from a yard away after running 83 yards in one play to the one, threw 25 forward passes, completing 11 for a whopping 203 yards, including touchdown bombs of 60 and 45 yards to talented wide receiver Keith Stone. Offensive Show

It was an offensive duel all around, as Slaton Quarterback Mike Tumlinson also had a good passing night, hitting on 6 of 10 for 117 yards, including a 27-yard scoring strike to End Tim Bourn.

Slaton's win, coupled with Post's surprisingly uneven win over Denver City (33-0), left Slaton 4-1 in district and the other teams and Roosevelt tied at 3-1. Slaton is idle this week, while Roosevelt battles Post.

McClesky then lunged over, and also ran for two more points to make it 16-7 at 9:16.

Cooper came right back as Choban threw a perfect pass to Fields, who had broken behind everybody. and who went on to score on the 60-yard play. Houchin kicked again, and it was still close at 16-14, end of the third.

A rhubarb following an interference penalty called against Cooper cost the Pirates another 15 after Coach Pete Hurst went out on the field to protest, and this set Slaton up at the cooper 15 early in what was to be a wild fourth period. Two plays later, McClesky swept right end for 8 and the touchdown, and again added 2 points on a run. making it 24-14 at 11:21.

The irate Pirates came roaring back as Choban hit on four passes in a row, the last one going 45 yards for another TD, as Fields again got behind the defense. Choban ran for two points

Fred Walters Couple To Be Honored

An open house service and reception honoring Mr. and Mrs. Fred Walters on their fiftieth wedding anniversary will be from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday at Westview Baptist Church.

The former Cordie Irene Miller and Walters were married Nov. 8, 1925, in Wilson by the Rev. Graves Darby. The couple has lived in Slaton for 38 years. They farmed west of the city until 1946 when they moved to 840 S. 12th.

Walters and his son Ray then started a construction and contracting business. They built several homes here and were the builders of the original Westview Baptist Church which burned several years ago. Mrs. Walters was employed by King's Variety Store and Slaton Bakery.

Both were charter members of Westview Baptist Church when it was began as a mission of First Baptist Church in 1953. Members of the First Baptist Church for many years, they taught Sunday School and Walters served as deacon. He is still an active deacon at West-

After Walters suffered a heart attack in 1957, the couple moved to Beeville where they were houseparents at South Texas Children's Home. A year and a half later, they moved to Midland. Later, accepting a job as houseparents at Texas Baptist Children's Home in Round Rock, they spent nine years there before retiring in 1970 and moving back to their present address.







City Receives Drinks Tax

Comptroller Bob Bullock said today that more than \$2.7 million is being sent to 188 counties and 297 cities across Texas as their share of the mixed drinks tax for the July-September quarter of 1975.

Slaton will receive \$110.59.

The share to cities is 15 per cent of the total tax collected in each city and the 15 per cent to the counties represents tax revenues for drinks sold outside any city's limits. The remaining 70 per cent, \$6.5 million for this quarter. goes to the state general revenue fund.

The tax is 10 per cent on all gross receipts.

This quarter's total local share was up slightly from the second quarter's \$2.5 million paid out, Bullock said. The \$9.2 million total tax receipts for the third quarter represented the eighteenth consecutive quarter that the total tax receipts increased.



aimed to eliminate sex discrimination in athletic programs. The regulation became effective on July 21, 1975. A majority of the people agree that both men and women should have equal opportunity in athletics. The points in the regulation which are disagreed upon are: (1) how to achieve equal opportunity and (2) whether or not it includes equal funding for male and female teams.

School districts are obligated to perform a selfevaluation of their entire athletic program prior to July 21, 1976. Their first step of compliance should be to compare the requirements of the regulation with current policies and practices. The next step is to determine the interest of both sexes in the sports to be offered. When the sport is a contact sport they must decide whether to have single teams or teams

composed of both sexes. If a team is opened to both sexes in a contact sport and a school does not effectively accommodate both sexes, then separate teams in that sport will be required. In other words, this occurs when both men and women express interest in the sport, but the interests of both sexes are

not accommodated. The final action is to develop a plan to administer effectively the interests and abilities of both sexes. This plan is to be stated no later than July 21, 1978.

Title IX does not require equal funding for male and female teams. However, there cannot be discrimination on the basis of sex in the provision of necessary equipment, supplies, facilities, and publicity for sports programs.

The overall objective of Title IX is to provide equal opportunity for men and women. The emphasis is on the total athletic program.

Marked Items Can Mean Jail Term For Thieves

The objective of Operation Identification is to get as many citizens as possible to mark their property to discourage burglary.

A project of the Slaton Police Department Operation Identification initiates an all-out effort in crime prevention for the area. The program involves citizen participation in marking property with the individual's license number.

Suggestions to where on your property to engrave the driver's license number is included in the Operation Identification brochure, available at all engraver checkout locations and the Slaton Police Department

The brochure suggests areas of marking which will guard against your property being disfigured or devalued by the marking process. Basically numbers are engraved on an area that cannot be easily dis-

of errors in our billing." Webb estimated that Slaton experiences 400 billing errors a month, and that one employe has to check each billing before it goes out in order to catch some of the mistakes.

With the computer, Slaton would be able to do their own billing from city hall, hopefully cutting down on the errors. Webb also said the computer could be used to do the payroll and general accounting.

Money Factor

The cost of the computer is an estimated \$17,750 and Webb said there is revenue sharing money available for use. He outlined a five year payment plan which is actually less money spent than the amount the city has to pay Plainview each month for billing.

The Commission also briefly discussed, but took no action, on the possibility of codifying the city ordinances and digging another reservoir at the sewage

mantled and is generally on the bottom, inside or underneath the item being marked.

If a serial number is already affixed to the item, the engraved driver's license number should appear near there.

If a piece of property already has someone else's number on it, do not mark out the old identification number. The new owner should engrave his identification number underneath the old number.

When property that is marked is sold or given to someone else, the original owner should encourage the person receiving the item to engrave his number directly underneath the old number. Most items can be mark

ed with the engraving pen, however, fragile property such as jewelry, silver or china can be protected by taking a photograph of the items and storing it with the property listing form and other important papers for personal record keeping.

Once items are marked and the engraving pen returned, you will be given decals to put on the front and back doors and windows of your office or home. These decals warn burglars that the property inside is protected by Operation Identification and that stolen items in his personal possession would mean an almost certain jail sentence-that's how Operation Identification works for you.

Engravers and Operation Identification brochures can be checked out free at the Slaton Police Department.
