## Parade To Kick Off Veterans Day Celebration Here Tuesday

Slaton's eighth Veterans' Day parade is snowballing in popularity and area residents are preparing for a festive event. The parade is being organized by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, one of the three parade hosts, said there are now approximately 25 confirmed entries, with as many more pending. Both the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion local posts are parade hosts and will appear in the parade.

The theme this year is a Bicentennial one, paying homage to the 200th anniversary of the United States. Scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. Tuesday, the parade will wind from the city park down Garza Street and around the city square. Bands, floats, marching scouts and riding beauty queens will all be featured in the parade.

**Prize Money**  
Prize money of \$100, \$75, and \$50 will be awarded the first three place floats. Marching bands will compete for \$100 and \$75 prizes.

All branches of the armed services will be represented, and a color guard from Reese Air Force Base will also march in the parade.

A perennial favorite of parade watchers, the Senoritas de la Rosas from Odessa College, will be 35 strong for the parade.

The Angel Corps from West Texas State University will appear, as will Debbie Davidson, South Plains Maid of Cotton.

Other beauties riding in the parade will be Dana Wendel, Lions' Club Queen and the Bicentennial Queen.

Local entries will include dance students of Maxine Odum James, Boy Scout Troop 123, the Cub Scouts, the West Texas Wheelers, and the Slaton High School Band.

**Bands Due**  
Although the SHS band will not compete for the prize money, both the Wilson High School and

Frenship High School bands will be vying for the top money.

Also on hand for the festivities will be Judge Rod Shaw and State Representative Pete Laney, with other local dignitaries.

Keynote speaker for the Veterans' Day celebration will be Major Joseph E. Hickox of Reese Air Force Base. He will speak from a platform at the downtown square.

Major Hickox is assigned to the 64th Flying Training Wing as the Chief of Standardization / Evaluation Division under the Deputy Commander for Operations. As such, he is responsible for evaluating the ability

and proficiency of both the Instructor Pilots and the overall proficiency and quality of the flying training program at Reese. These responsibilities cover the T-37 and T-38 flying training and the academic and ground training aspects of the program.

Hickox enlisted in the Air Force upon graduation from high school in 1954 and spent his duty tour as a radar operator in Greenland, 144 days of it located beneath the polar ice cap about 200 miles south of the North Pole.

After completing that duty tour, Hickox left the Air Force and entered Florida State University. He received a BA degree in International Relations in 1960 and was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Air Force through ROTC.

**Service Jobs**  
Since that time, Hickox has served as an air-to-air gunnery instructor at Pensacola Naval Air Station, as an airborne battle staff operations officer based at Da Nang Air Base, and a T-28 Instructor Pilot at Udorn Royal Thai AFB.

After returning to the United States, Hickox spent 17 months undergoing Russian language schooling and attaché training in the Washington D.C. area. He

also received a Masters Degree in Soviet Studies from Georgetown University in D.C. in 1970. In June of 1971 he was sent to Moscow as the Assistant U.S. Air Force Attaché.

## City Buying Two New Police Cars

The Slaton City Commission called a special meeting last Thursday morning to discuss a four-item agenda.

Police Chief Larry Williams attended the meeting, requesting of the city two new police cars and a change of frequency for the police department's radios.

Bids on the police cars were made by Town and Country Chevrolet and by Smith Ford, both of Slaton.

The Town and Country bid was for two Chevelle police package cars. The cars have heavy duty frames, special rear ends and shocks, plus other features. Town and Country bid \$9,493.36 and allowed a trade in of \$4,400.

Smith Ford's bid was for two Torino police package cars. Their bid was \$9,320

and their trade in was estimated at \$3,800. The police are currently using two Chevrolet Bel Airs which are less than a year old and have approximately 44,000 miles on each car. The Commission discussed the advantages of going to a smaller car (such as the Torino and/or Chevelle) and were told by Williams that the gas mileage on the Bel Airs is 9 or 10 miles a gallon. Williams said the smaller cars would be able to give 14 or 15 miles to the gallon.

**Suggests Comparison**  
Commissioner Otis Neill suggested that the city buy both a Chevrolet and a Ford to see which one will give the better service. The Commission agreed and voted to buy a Chevelle and a Torino.

Both car dealers estimated the cars would arrive in six weeks and are guaranteed for 12,000 miles or 12 months, whichever comes first.

On the matter of changing the crystals in the police radios and putting in a private frequency, the Commission voted to table the matter until a South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) engineer could give them an estimate on the cost of the work.

Williams is requesting the change because there are five cities on one of the frequencies the police department uses, and both the Lubbock Sheriff's Office and the Idalou police can transmit on one of the frequencies and cut off Slaton.

"In effect, it would be like putting in a private telephone line and getting off the party line," said Williams.

When the Commission was first approached about the change at their last meeting, the city's cost was given at \$1,200. But Williams said he has spoken with SPAG and that the city will probably only have to fund 25 per cent of the total with SPAG paying the other three fourths.

**Radio Deal**  
The Commission also voted to buy, if the opportunity comes up, six 37180 radios from the Lubbock Sheriff's Office for only \$1 each. The city is anticipating installing the radios in other city vehicles at a later date.

City Secretary Alex Webb asked the Commission to consider the purchase of an accounting computer for water billing and other accounting work of the city. After a discussion and explanation of the machine, the Commission voted to buy the computer.

Webb explained that the city now has the billing for water use processed out of Plainview. "They have a turnover about every 90 days up there," said Webb, "and they are constantly having to train new people. This makes for a multitude

## Arson Indicated In Fire Leaving Family Homeless

A family was left homeless after their home was destroyed by a fire Monday. The fire, which started in the living room, destroyed the house and most of its contents. The family, including Bob Banks, his wife and two children, was out of town for the weekend when the burglary, with its subsequent suspected arson, occurred.

Fire Chief Bob Kern said that by the time firemen arrived around 2:30 a.m. Saturday, the house was too far gone to save, and he said that arson was a very strong possibility in the case.

"This is one of about six fires during the last month in which arson was apparently the cause," Kern said. He added that investi-

gation of this and the other suspected arson cases is continuing.

The Banks home at 920 S. 5th St., was a three-bedroom frame structure. The family stayed with relatives here for a few days before finding other quar-

ters. "We're still having problems with the people who report fires in Slaton," Kern commented. For example, some are reported to the operator in Lubbock, he noted, as people sometimes just dial "operator"

and tell them there's a fire. Even if the operator there realizes the fire is at a Slaton location, there is a delay while the Slaton Fire Dept. is notified.

"We need to get across to the public that they should call 828-3212 day or night to report a fire in Slaton," Kern said. He suggested that citizens post this number on or near the telephone.

In another fire last week, four members of the Slaton Volunteer Fire Dept. were slightly injured. Minor burns were suffered by these four firemen battling a big grass fire blaze on the Forrest Ranch north of the

Big tailback into the ground. He carried the ball an astounding 38 times for 230 yards, with runs of 24, 19, 18 and 17 his longest of the evening. In addition to his four TDs, he also ran twice for extra points, and now has a year's total of 96 points, along with 232 carries for 1,259 yards, an average of 5.4 per carry.

Kelly Choban, Pirate quarterback, had quite a night, too. He gained 76 of Cooper's total 91 rushing yards, scored one TD from a yard away after running 83 yards in one play to the one, three 25 forward passes, completing 11 for a whopping 203 yards, including touchdown bombs of 60 and 45 yards to talented wide receiver Keith Stone. Stone caught 7 of the 11 completed passes for Cooper.

**Offensive Show**  
It was an offensive duel all around, as Slaton Quarterback Mike Tumlinson also had a good passing night, hitting on 6 of 10 for 117 yards, including a 27-yard scoring strike to End Tim Bourn.

Slaton's win, coupled with Post's surprisingly uneven win over Denver City (33-0), left Slaton 4-1 in district and the other teams and Roosevelt tied at 3-1. Slaton is idle this week, while Roosevelt battles Post.

On Halloween night, Cooper sure didn't play like a team that has lost all of its games this season. The Pirates held Slaton early in the quarter and Slaton had to punt down to the Cooper 4. ### Slaton Voters Also Say No

Slaton voters also turned down the proposed eight amendments which would have given the state a new constitution, as all eight were defeated statewide Tuesday.

In all three boxes, the votes on each of the eight articles was about 225 to 20 against.

Tiger 1 before being overtaken. Two plays lost a yard, then Choban went 2 for the score to put Cooper ahead 7-0 after Tony Houckin kicked. This was at 6:33 of the first quarter, and it was exactly 12 minutes later, at 6:33 of the second, when Slaton scored first, with McClesky twisting a round left end 9 yards, topping a 31-yard drive. Tumlinson passed to Aycock for 2 points to put Slaton ahead 8-7. This was the score at halftime.

**Passes Click**  
In the third period, Slaton took the ball after Gaylon Bukemper recovered a fumble and Tumlinson hit on successive passes of 19 yards to Darrell Bednarz and 21 yards to Gary Aycock, then followed with another 12-yarder to Aycock to the Cooper 6. McClesky then lunged over, and also ran for two more points to make it 16-7 at 9:16.

Cooper came right back as Choban threw a perfect pass to Fields, who had broken behind everybody, and who went on to score on the 60-yard play. Houckin kicked again, and it was still close at 16-14, end of the third.

A rhubarb following an interference penalty called against Cooper cost the Pirates another 15 after Coach Pete Hurst went out on the field to protest, and this set Slaton up at the Cooper 15 early in what was to be a wild fourth period. Two plays later, McClesky swept right end for 8 and the touchdown, and again added 2 points on a run, making it 24-14 at 11:21.

**Pirates Score**  
The irate Pirates came roaring back as Choban hit on four passes in a row, the last one going 45 yards for another TD, as Fields again got behind the defense. Choban ran for two points

and it was close and tense at 24-22, with 8:31 left in the game.

It was Slaton's turn to do some fancy passing. Tumlinson hit Charlie Haynes for 23 yards, then came back on the next play to

The former Cordie Irene Miller and Walters were married Nov. 8, 1925, in Wilson by the Rev. Graves Darby. The couple has lived in Slaton for 38 years. They farmed west of the city until 1946 when they moved to 840 S. 12th.

Walters and his son Ray then started a construction and contracting business. They built several homes here and were the builders of the original Westview Baptist Church which burned several years ago. Mrs. Walters was employed by King's Variety Store and Slaton Bakery.

Both were charter members of Westview Baptist Church when it was begun as a mission of First Baptist Church in 1953. Members of the First Baptist Church for many years, they taught Sunday School and Walters served as deacon. He is still an active deacon at Westview.

Because children develop speech patterns as a direct result of hearing the speech of other persons, it is vitally important that hearing losses in youngsters be detected and alleviated as soon as possible, according to the Beltone Crusade for Hearing Conservation.

## City Receives Drinks Tax

Comptroller Bob Bullock said today that more than \$2.7 million is being sent to 188 counties and 297 cities across Texas as their share of the mixed drinks tax for the July-September quarter of 1975.

The share to cities is 15 per cent of the total tax collected in each city and the 15 per cent to the counties represents tax revenues for drinks sold outside any city's limits. The remaining 70 per cent, \$6.5 million for this quarter, goes to the state general revenue fund.

The tax is 10 per cent on all gross receipts.

This quarter's total local share was up slightly from the second quarter's \$2.5 million paid out, Bullock said. The \$9.2 million total tax receipts for the third quarter represented the eighteenth consecutive quarter that the total tax receipts increased.

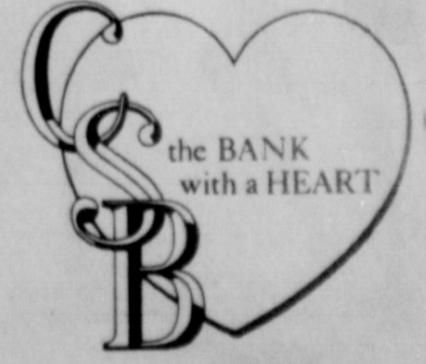

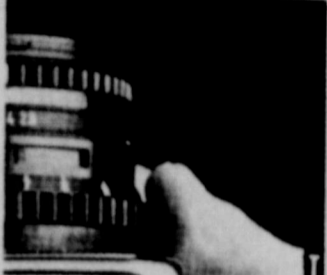

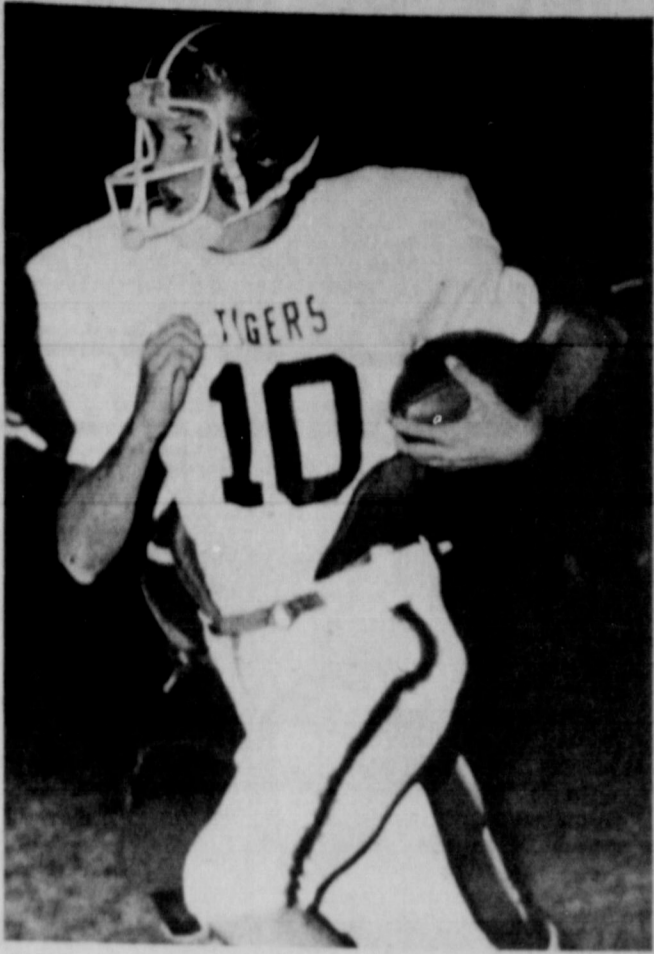

again scored from the 1, and Adams made it 35-0. Tahoka struck back with a 19-yard scoring pass from QB David Glenn to Mitch Rainld with 10:10 left. Glenn hit Jim Bragg for 2 points to make it 35-8. On the next kickoff, Tahoka tried an onside kick and missed the ball, so Roosevelt took over on the Bulldog 40.

Bridges rushed for 133 yards in just 10 efforts; Sansom had 62 yards in 12 carries; and Tension ran 43 yards in 7 tries. Doug Gentry led the Eagle defense. For Tahoka, Ernest Bailey and Danny Moore were standouts.

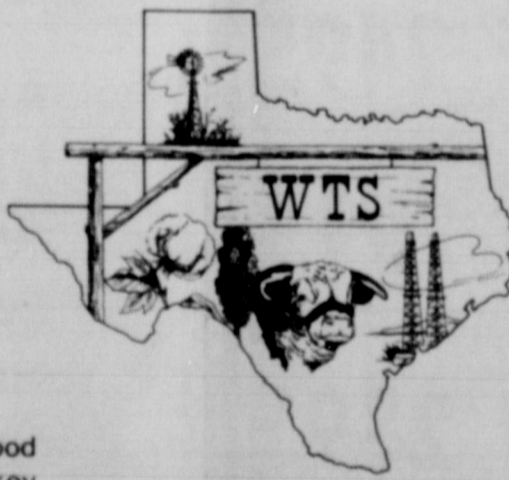

# 7 Bales Ginned So Far

Cotton Classing Office. Trading was slow. Growers offered small lots of new crop cotton in very light volume. They sold small mixed lots of mostly grades 41 and 51; staples 32 to 33; mike 3.5 through 4.9, Dickson said. These lots brought 41.00 to 42.00 cents per pound.

Staples 30, 31, 32 and 33 were predominant lengths accounting for 18 percent, 24 percent, 19 percent and 12 percent respectively.

Mike readings 3.5 through 4.9 amounted to 28 percent of the total. Mike group 3.3 through 3.4 accounted for 18 percent and 3.0 through 3.2 range 30 percent. Mike 2.7 through 2.9 was 13 percent.

Ginning increased throughout the South Plains and about 6400 samples were classed by the Lubbock Classing Office during the week. This season's total stands at 7,900 samples compared to 264 on the same date a year ago; according to the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

A newly recognized type of excessive tippler, called the intermediate alcoholic, has started to appear on the national scene.

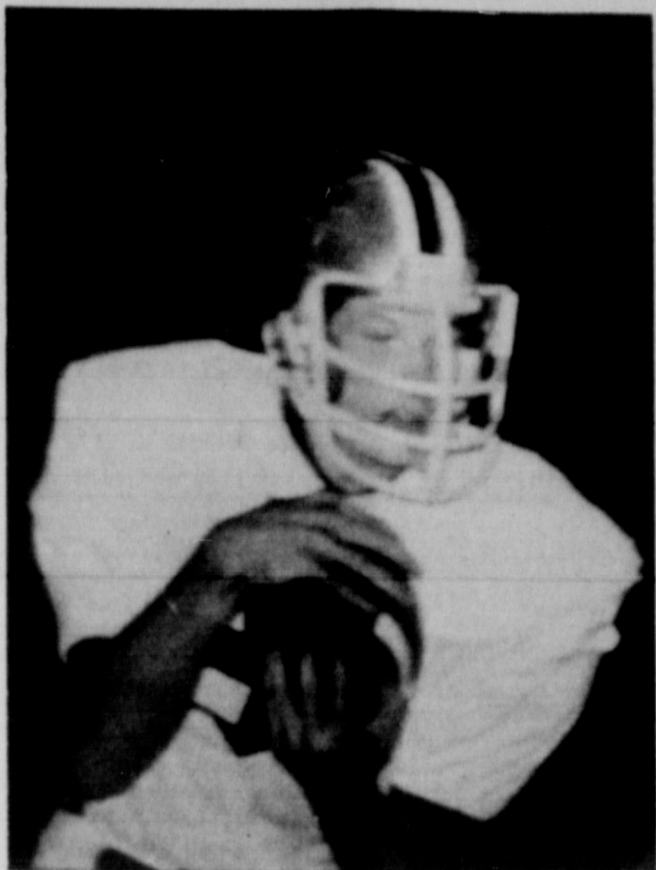
Such imbibers have moved from the social-drinking state and are heading from "chronicity" in their bouts with the bottle.

This study clarifies the cause of mysterious brain shrinkage observed in approximately 500 younger persons who underwent autopsy after death in California, he reported.

"Because alcoholism is a disease of progressive brain damage, with uncontrolled drinking the chief symptom, the treatment goal is complete abstinence," he said.

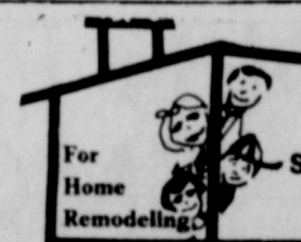

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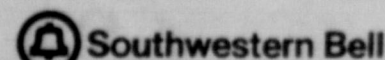

## News And Views Of St. Joseph's

Basketball season is getting underway at St. Joseph's with the girls' A and B teams both winning over the Southland teams Monday.
