

Airport Runway Work Proposed

Newly re-elected Mayor John Landreth was absent from Tuesday's City Commission meeting, leaving Mayor Pro Tem Otis Neill to preside over the short meeting.

H. R. Donaldson, who replaces Byron Crandall on the commission, was sworn in prior to the conducting of any business. Neill issued

the oath of office for Donaldson.

Earl Eblen, chairman of the Airport Board, and H. Bennett Reaves of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, consulting engineers, appeared before the board with requests for repair work and new construction at the Slaton Municipal Airport.

Eblen reminded the Commission that since the airport's completion in 1968, no work has been done on the runways. He reported that the surface is cracking and is in need of repair.

Damage Threat Seen

Reaves said that although the runway is not damaged yet, failure to repair it could cause permanent damage.

The cost of seal coating the runway and pouring all cracks with asphalt filler will cost \$31,034, which will be shared equally by the city and the Texas Aeronautical Commission.

Reaves also outlined a plan calling for the construction of a parallel taxiway and the enlarging of

the aircraft parking apron.

He stressed that the taxiway would be a safety feature and was included in the original plans for the airport.

Federal funds would be available for the new construction under an airport development program. Estimated cost of the new construction is \$116,738 and 75 percent of that may come from the Federal Aeronautics Association. TAC and the city would share the other part of the cost.

Funding Possibilities

Reaves suggested that the city make application for the funds and consider the possibility of getting the work done. The commission voted to apply for the state and federal funds.

Reaves also gave a progress report concerning the possibility of repairing the roof of City Hall. The Commission approved a \$660 estimate to repair the roof without having to completely reroof the building.

The Commission also

passed on a recommendation made by the Planning and Zoning Commission, denying a zone change for property in block 45 of the original townsite.

The zoning change request came from Bo Becker, who asked for lot 9 and the south half of lot 8 in block 45 to be rezoned from R1 to B1L, to allow him to erect a building for storing vehicles.

J. P. Spears, who was one of the protestors who appeared at the April 3 meeting of the P&Z Commission, made the motion that the city affirm the commission's denial. The commissioners voted unanimously to deny the change. No reason for the denial was given, but Spears did mention that several "widow ladies" in the area are against the change.

After removing the press and other spectators, the Commission voted to go into executive session. The final item on the agenda concerned pending litigation, and City Attorney Harvey Morton requested that the meeting be closed.

These three seniors and Kathy Eblen, who won district singles in 1973, will lead the contingent of Slaton players in the tournament at DC today. The boys district tournament will be next week.

Passage of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's school financing plan by the Legislature would mean that taxpayers in the Slaton School District would have to pay more than twice as much in local taxes as they now pay, Slaton School Board members were told Tuesday night.

The state has ruled that true market value of property in the Slaton ISD is \$108,458,619, and this figure will be used in determining the local fund assignment for Slaton schools regardless of which of several proposed school financing bills is passed. Supt. J. C. McClesky told the board.

"Local fund assignment" is the amount that the state says will be the local school

benefit Lubbock and other big city school districts such as Houston and Dallas, and would not hurt budget-balanced districts like those in the West Texas oilfield areas, but would severely cripple districts like Slaton, Cooper, Southland, Roosevelt and Wilson, it was noted.

A brighter note was sounded during discussion of a budget amendment for the current year when it was noted that Slaton has received \$62,949 in emergency funding aid from the state for this year, and there now is hope that Slaton could wind up without a budget deficit for the first time in many years.

Other Plans

Other possible school financing plans being considered by the Legislature include one by the Texas State Teachers Assn., under which Slaton's LFA would be \$379,605, and a plan by the Texas Education Agency, under which the LFA here would be \$271,146.

School Election Turnout Good

A spokesman for the Slaton Independent School District said Saturday's board election was the first contested race in three years and the voter turnout was the heaviest in several years. There were 358 votes cast.

Incumbent R. C. Hall Jr. gathered in 56.9 percent of the vote with 204 votes. Paul Mosser was elected to the other at-large position with 156 votes. Skip Tumlinson, incumbent for a one-year term, won with 192 votes. His opponent, Bill Baker, netted 131 votes.

Other candidates who were defeated were Bettye Burks, 100 votes; Bob Brake, 91, and Roxie Meeks, 53.

In the Wilson school board race, Roy L. Kahlich and Lloyd Hagens won the two positions on the board. Kahlich received 85 votes and Hagens edged out Jo Ann Cook with 70 votes to

her 68. Voting was light in the Cooper school board elections with only 37 votes going to Johnny Fredenberg, an incumbent who was re-elected to the board. Pete Choban chalked up 35 votes to win the other vacancy. Two write-in votes were cast for E. H. Breziel.

Roosevelt school board incumbents Benny Sides and James Daniel were re-elected to the board with 46 and 49 votes respectively. They defeated Leon Whetzel, 34 votes, and L. J. Williams, 20 votes.

A total of 109 votes were cast in the Southland school board balloting. Incumbents William Becker was re-elected with 67 votes and candidate Sammy Ellis won the other position with 47 votes. They defeated incumbent Robert Lee Mock and candidates Pat Adamek, Glen Klesel and Herbert Dunn.

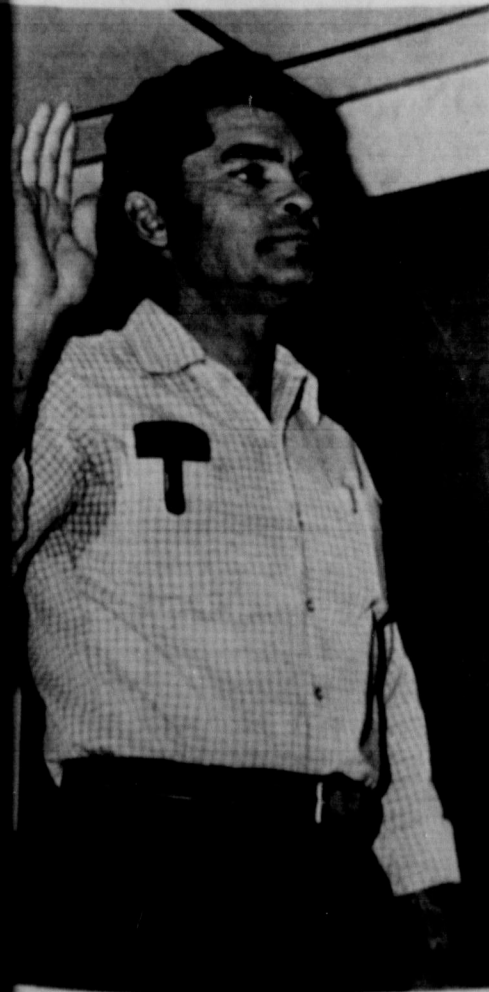

Entries will be received at the clubhouse April 25 from 6 to 9 p.m. and on April 26 from 8 to 10 a.m.

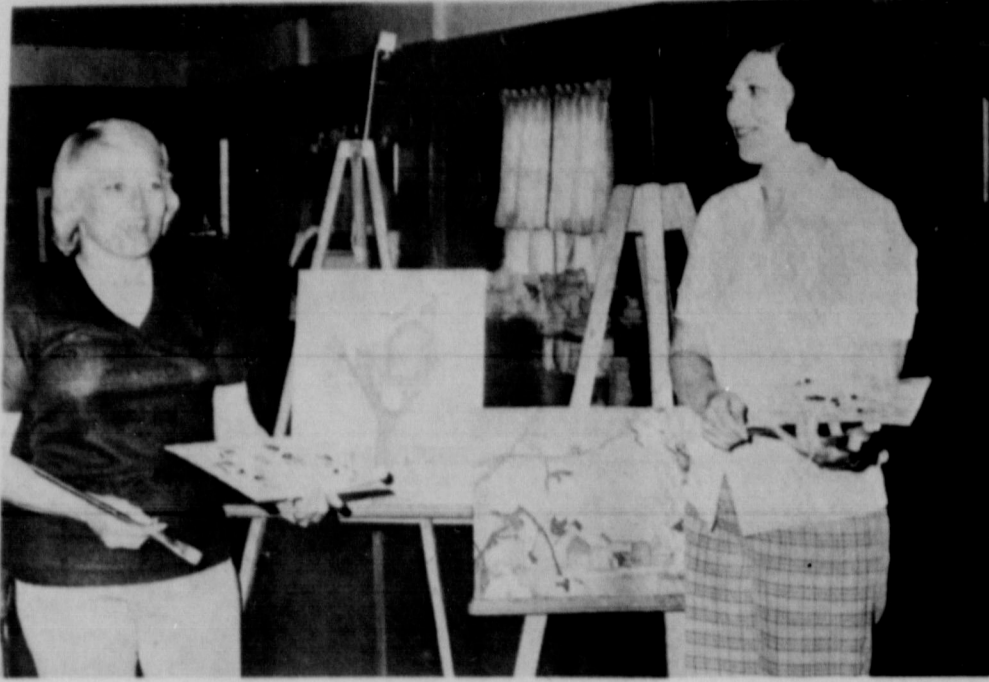

and Michael Voigt had seven for Self's.

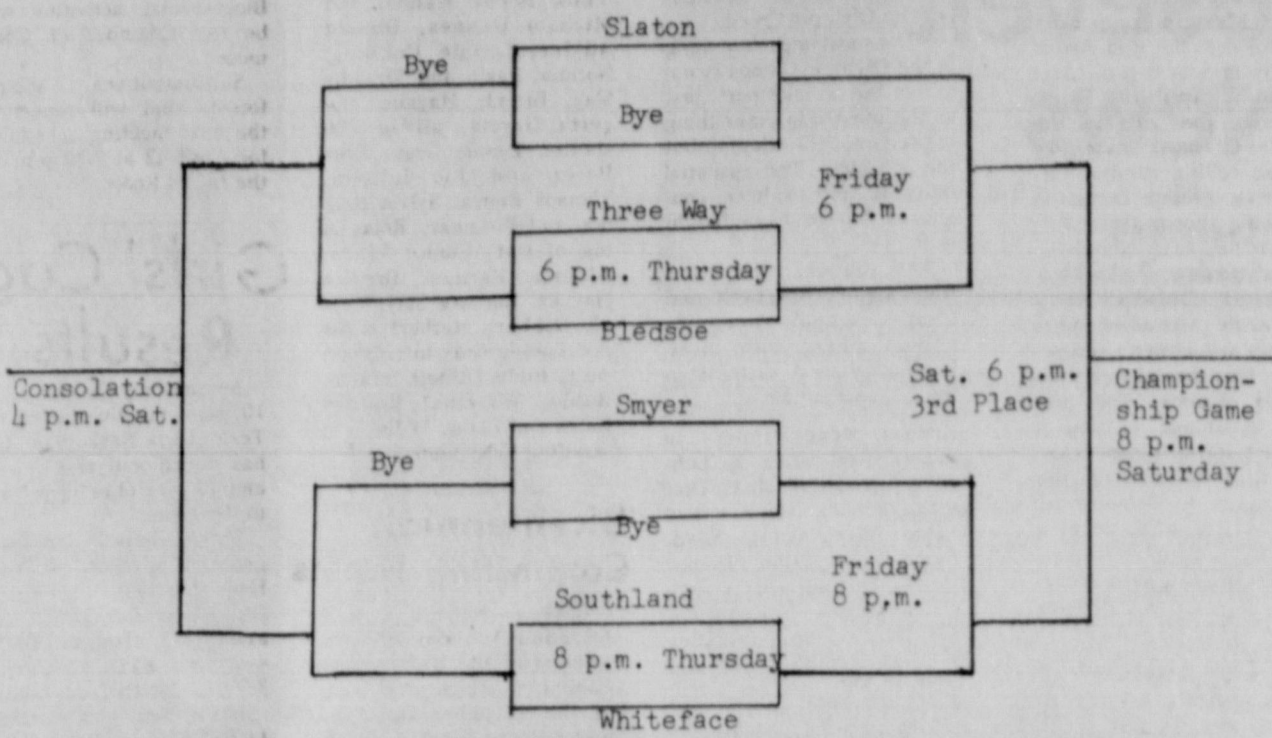

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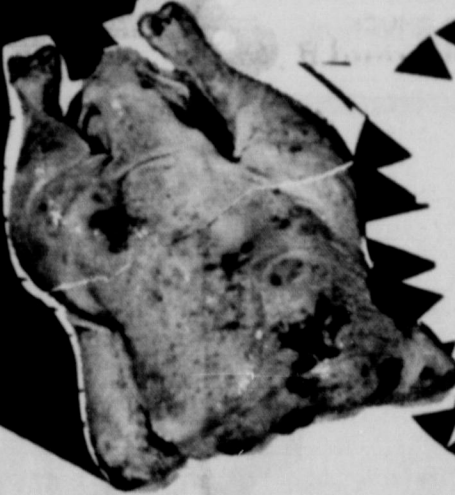

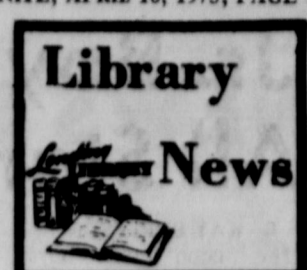

TEXAS TALK

Demand for quality cotton continues to increase. Not only is the use of natural fiber rebounding, but the by-product market is also expanding. Since average cottonseed meal is at least 41 percent protein, it is becoming increasingly important as a primary feed for cattle, sheep and horses.

Expeller, Hydraulic and Solvent are processes used to produce meal or cake from raw cottonseed. Expeller and Hydraulic processes leave about 5 percent fat content in processed meal while the Solvent process leaves less than 1-1/2 percent.

Research now underway may result in an economically feasible method of limiting Gossypol (a cottonseed toxin) content to low enough levels to make cottonseed meal a primary protein supplement for swine and poultry. Success could significantly increase this by-product demand.

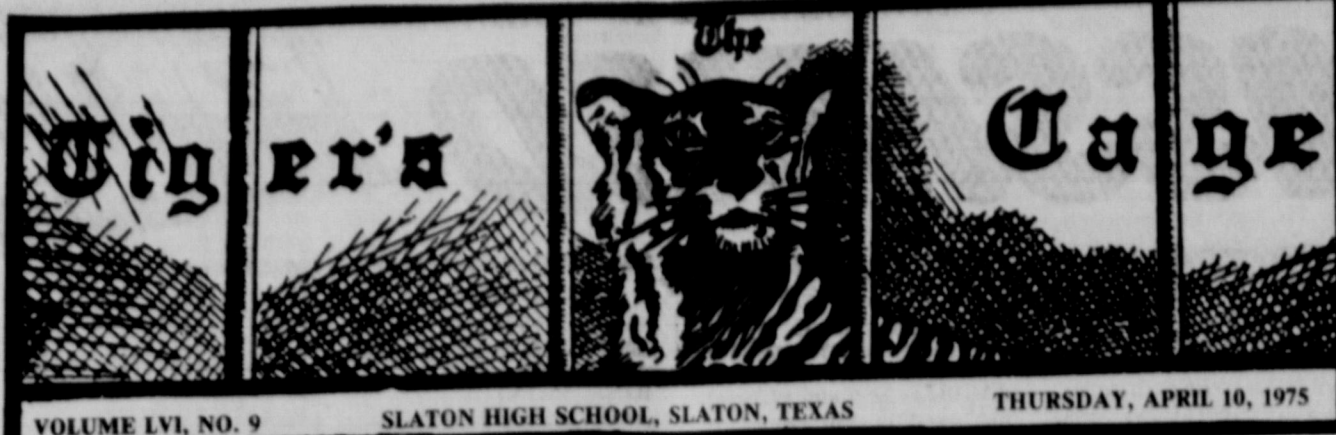

US Army Offers New College Plan

The Army considers training and education as a fundamental part of a strong and effective military force. Project AHEAD joins existing Army educational programs like actual on-post schools.

Here is an example of

how Project AHEAD works. A prospective college student visits or calls his or her Army recruiter. The recruiter will explain the details concerning the project and the surprising range of options which the all-volunteer Army has to offer.

If the prospective Project AHEAD applicant wishes to continue under the project he or she must fulfill a series of qualifications. That applicant must qualify for Army service and meet chosen Project AHEAD local school requirements. The "home" school will help set up a range plan for degree attainment. An academic credit file will be established and held by the school. The "home" school will also set up an open channel of continuing contact to continue through the period of active duty service.

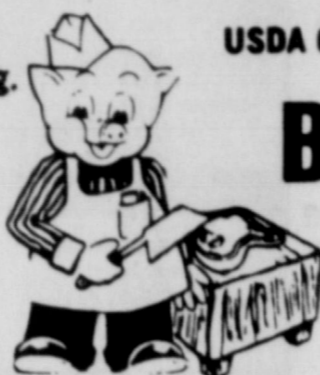

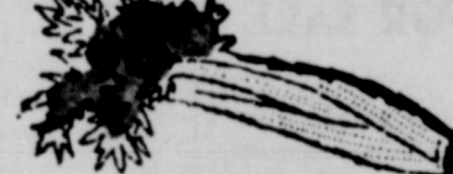
