IS RECALLED BY LOCAL RESIDENTS

Early history of Slaton as told by W. P. Florence, Mrs. Annie Higbee, now Mrs. Gresham, Fred Higbee, R. H. Tudor, A. L. Brannon, and J. S. Edwards, and compiled by A. J. Payne, secretary Slaton Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. and Mrs Geo F Highee and son Fred came to Slaton in November, 1909. The first postoffice was established on January 10, 1910, by Mr. Highee, and he was postmaster until his death in 1913. Mrs. Highee was appointed postmistress and served as such till the year 1919. The first postoffice was located on Ninth street below where the old Baptist church was located, and was in a two room building, one room being used as a living room, while the other was used as a store selling dry goods, groceries, and meats. The mall was brought from Lubbock by a Mr. L. C. Robertson who carried the mail to and from Lubbock by a Mr. L. C. In 1911 the Highees built a new two story building back of where the Forrest hotel now is, and moved the postoffice there, where it stayed until it was moved around on the west side of the square where Harry's grocery is located. J. S. Edwards, Dr. J. Foster Scott, Bill Knight, Sam Pikin and Cash Ramey drove from Clovis, N. M., in three buggies to where Slaton is now located on April 27, 1911, taking three days to make the trip. Edwards fernished the stomach bitters, and Bill Knight entertained the crowd. The first lumber yard was located on this land at about the crossing of Ninth and division streets. The manager of the lumber yard was E. H. Petty, now of Amarillo, with the Panhandle Lumber company.

The First State Bank was organized by J. S. Edwards and P. E. Kan, and opened for business June 15th, the day of the townsite opening.

J. S. Edwards, P. E. Jordan, J. E. Eldengton, J. Foster Scott, Judge W. A. Havner and S. S. Forrest constructed nine brick business buildings on the first two years and the hotel for \$10 a month. The town was started in a cow pasture as the whole country surrounding the town was nothing but ranches, and it took about three years to convince farmers they could raise crops around hare.

The roundhouse at that time was just building. Contractor Moore was grading the yards for the Scate Fee, and also the streets in the town. There were praise chickens, qual, and coyotes in and around the town, and in the fall of the year duck shooting was good in the several lakes of the town.

H. D. Talley, came to Slaton with the first train from the south, Jesse Jones on the first train from the north. P. E. Hudgins, E. P. Nix. and P. O. Williams landed here about the first day of the opening. Floyd Williams had been pushing an Iriah burgy at the round house prior to the opening, and S. C. Then he wrapped about fifteen pounds of beef in some heavy hrown papers, afterwards covering the packages with mud and placing them in the abanes. He covered this with dirt and again built a fire over the same spot and went away to his other duties.

A short while later, a soda pop wagon came across the grounds loaded with soda pop, which was furnished to the boys by the Taboka bottling works. They formed a line and, before you could wink an eye, each boy had his share of the soda pop festival.





GROWING WITH SLATON

Monday, Slaton celebrates her 20th birthday. Now a prosperous, thriving little city, Slaton has shown a commendably steady and firm growth, and will continue to grow with the South Plains.

Electric service in Slaton began with the installation of one 25 horsepower generator, in 1920. With this step, Slaton became a modern town.
