Most of the people involved in the controversy seem to forget that for all these years a city law has been violated. The fact that the law was not enforced does not change the fact that it was in effect. It was a mistake on the part of the city to permit the law to continue on its books if it was not useful enough to merit enforcement.

Most cities have laws which are not enforced. Seldom is an effort made to revise these laws or to declare them invalid. Instead they are allowed to die what seems to be a natural death by simply forgetting that they exist.

Yet when laws, even unnecessary laws, are ignored or disobeyed, a certain disrespect for all law is bred among the violators. It is far better for those charged with enforcing laws to strike outdated ones from the books than to permit them to be ignored.

ELDER STATESMAN

Former President Hoover, who turned 82 recently, offered some advice to the aging. "Keep busy," he said, "or you will degenerate into talking to everyone about your pains and pills and income tax."

Hoover is one sage who takes his own advice. He still works a daily schedule that would fatigue many men 40 years his junior. He still responds to a call of duty with the same willingness that characterized his younger years.

As a politician, Hoover was both fortunate and unfortunate. He rode a wave of immense popularity to the presidency. He was unlucky enough to be the occupant of the White House when the most severe and prolonged depression this country has ever known brought an end to an era of unprecedented prosperity. People who had cheered and voted for Herbert Hoover blamed him for their troubles.

Time has passed, and Americans are now able to look at the great depression with perspective-to see that no one man could possibly have been responsible, that any man in Hoover's position would have been faced with the same situation. Today Herbert Hoover is regarded affectionately, by all except the diehards, as an elder statesman well worth listening to.

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





For years there has been a parking ban in a certain section of a midwestern city. The ban has not been enforced, however, and during most of those years the area was considered an ideal parking place.

Recently the city officials decided to enforce the ban. The decision has resulted in a full scale debate, in indignant letters to the newspapers, in arguments before the city council.

Most of the people involved in the controversy seem to forget that for all these years a city law has been violated. The fact that the law was not enforced does not change the fact that it was in effect. It was a mistake on the part of the city to permit the law to continue on its books if it was not useful enough to merit enforcement.

Most cities have laws which are not enforced. Seldom is an effort made to revise these laws or to declare them invalid. Instead they are allowed to die what seems to be a natural death by simply forgetting that they exist.

Yet when laws, even unnecessary laws, are ignored or disobeyed, a certain disrespect for all law is bred among the violators. It is far better for those charged with enforcing laws to strike outdated ones from the books than to permit them to be ignored.

ELDER STATESMAN

Former President Hoover, who turned 82 recently, offered some advice to the aging. "Keep busy," he said, "or you will degenerate into talking to everyone about your pains and pills and income tax.'



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Weather Cycles Not Found in **Recent Study**

Predictions of rainfall cannot be nade on the basis of weather cyles of "wet and dry years."

Recent studies of 31 locations in the High and Rolling Plains of Texas show that cycles play little or no part in annual rainfall figures dating as far back as 89 years. made the studies, state that an optimist can find traces of cycles at some locations; but no statistical significance of cycles is revealed in Friday with her parents, Mr. and the records.

"Average or normal rainfall selfom occurs," Dr. Hildreth said. The records indicate that farmer and ranchers in the High and Rolling Plains should figure that mor years-52 to 69 per cent-will be below average in rainfall than years above average.

The famous drouth of the 1930's, which led to the dust bowl period, shows up in records at most locations. Another bad drouth period occurred around 1917. 

The intricate dial equipment is big contrast from the one magneto-type switchboard here in 1919, when Southwestern Bell purchased the Slaton exchange from the Western Telephone Company Growth of Slaton

The growth of Slaton is reflected in the growth of its telephone system. Back in 1919, there were only about 100 telephone lines here. By 1941, just prior to World War II, the number had climbed to 350

But the most rapid growth has come since 1941. There are five

times as many telephones here to day as then.
