

Another feature of the second blast is the placing of



Persons or animals which receive these powerful rays into their sys-tems are variously affected and the boarding teams upon these ships are preceded by a traind man carry-ing a "Geiger counter," a small box-like apparatus which registers radioactivity by a ticking noise. Estimate Losses Estimate Losses.

A fleet such as those which com-posed the target fleet would normal-ly carry approximately 30,000 men. It is reasonable to assume then that approximately 10 per cent, or 3,000 men, would have been killed by the atomic bomb blast and that more atomic bomb biast and that more would have been injured by radio-activity. Whether much of the dam-age to ships caused by subsequent fires aboard could have been avert-ed had crews been aboard is a moot ed had crews been aboard is a moot question. Some ships captains de-clare that damage would have been much less had the ship fire-fighting equipment been brought into play, and this seems reasonable in that most of the loss on the Independ-ence was due to fire and explosion and not the bomb blast.

There is no attempt however on the part of naval authorities to minimize the terrible power of this atomic bomb. No other single bomb ever did the dam-

Texas Peach Crop

Is Very Large

The Texas peach crop is estimated at 2,613,000 bushels despite June hails in some areas which cut down the yield.

The estimated yield in the early peach producing areas is 39 million bushels and the U. S. Crop is expected to total 81,065,000 bushels, only one percent under the alltime high sent to market in 1945. B. F. Vance, state director of the USDA Production Marketing Administration, said steady movement of fresh peaches from trees to kitchen was necessary if the big crop is to be put to best use.

He urged housewives to take full advantage of supplies now on the market and to can, dry and quickfreeze them for use later. Commercially canned fruits will notmeet consumer demand for the coming year, he said.

Potatoes, tomatoes and options are also plentiful on the market at the present time.


