Since the chief difficulty with the water system in Slaton is the size of the main which brings the water into the city, the water pressure may not be adequate for some time.

Johnston was graduated from Texas Technological College at Lubbock, and taught school in Lubbock county for fifteen years prior to his entering the armed services. He is 39 years of age, is married, and has one child.

T. A. JOHNSON'S SONS HOME FROM ARMY

Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Johnson of Route 1, Slaton, have two of their sons home from the army. Cpl. Sidney A. Johnson arrived home Friday, after having served two and a half years in the Army, two years of which were spent in Italy. He was discharged at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio. He was awarded the Combat Badge, the Good Conduct Medal, the Victory Medal, and the Purple Heart for wounds received October 17, 1944, in the battle of Kassrine Pass, in Italy.

Pvt. James H. Johnson arrived home Saturday on a 11-day furlough from McClellan Field, Alabama. He will report for duty to Camp Stoneman, Pittsburg, California, at the end of his furlough.

Mr. and Mrs. Carl Lewis and son Carl, jr., returned Monday from a two weeks visit in Dallas and McKinney.

Johnston has had three year's experience as an administrative officer with the United States Department of Agriculture. He is a veteran of World War II, having served in the Navy for three years, receiving his discharge last December.

Johnston says, "If I am elected to this office I will carry on the business of the office to the best of my ability. I will appreciate your vote and support in the coming Democratic primary."

He continues, "I will make a strenuous effort to see everyone in the county personally, but because of the short time until July 27, this may be impossible."

The Aaron Luman Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars met Wednesday night, June 26. Six members were obligated, making a total of 56 since the local Post was instituted on April 2. A membership drive is in progress and a special effort is being made to contact every overseas veteran in this vicinity. The next regular meeting will be on July 10, in the W.O.W. Hall.

In Memoriam: Those Who Died In The Service Of Their Country

The first complete list of Army dead and missing in World War II was released recently by the War Department—a total of 310,000 men and women who gave their lives in the Nation's service. A total death and missing rate of 2.98 per cent from all causes was indicated.

Of the total casualties, 57.1 per cent were listed as killed in action; the per cent who died of wounds suffered in combat was 8.25; 0.3 per cent died of combat injuries; 27.6 per cent died in battle; and 6.3 per cent were declared dead after having been listed as missing; and 0.45 per cent constitutes the per cent missing.

In general, the states with the largest population suffered the greatest number of losses; however, there were a few exceptions. New York state, with the largest population and the largest number of men in service, suffered the greatest loss. The Texas casualty list is high—15,764—but there was a disproportionately high enlistment from Texas. The ratio of killed to number enlisted is high.

The State of Texas contains 4.78 per cent of the population of the United States and contributed 5 per cent of the population of the entire Army. Of these 2.91 per cent failed to return. This figure represents 4.72 per cent of the Army's total dead and missing. The national average was 2.98 per cent dead and missing. Other high death totals were found in Pennsylvania, Illinois, California and Ohio. King County, Texas, one of the three least populous counties of the nation, was one of the three counties of the United States to suffer no casualties.

New Mexico, which suffered heavy casualties in a National Guard Unit in the Philippines, was one of the less-densely populated states to suffer disproportionate casualties; i. e., the casualties suffered were much greater than might be expected in terms of the population. This state's death rate in the Army was 4.77 per cent as compared with the national average of 2.08 per cent. Other high death ratios were in Montana, North Dakota, and Arizona.

The lowest death ratios were in the territories. Of the states, the lowest ratios were in Mississippi,

Louisiana, Alabama, and Florida, in the order named, suffered low death ratios.

Lubbock County suffered 171 Army casualties, of which ten were from Slaton. Those from Slaton and vicinity killed in action, declared officially dead after having been missing in action, or who died while in the service of their country, include Juan Barrientos, Grady Curry, John R. Carter, George Green, William A. Haddock, Aaron Luman, Frank M. Moss, Payford Roberts, Fred E. Splawn, and Thomas R. Turner.

While the Navy and Air Corps have not issued an official list of the casualties from these branches of the armed services include Briggs Robertson, Jr., John Young Standefer and Hope Waldrip.

John Price Frye, Y-3c, was discharged from the Navy June 19, 1946, at Norman, Oklahoma, after having served overseas ten months in the Pacific theatre. He served aboard the USS Antietam (cv-36).

John Henry Mosser, MoMM-3-c, son of Mrs. Louis Mosser of 1105 South 14th Street, was discharged from the Navy June 24, 1946, at San Pedro, Cal. He enlisted September 29, 1944, at El Paso, Texas, and served 15 months in the Asiatic-Pacific and American areas, his service having been on the USS LCI 731 and 220.

He was awarded the Asiatic-Pacific, the American Theatre, and the Victory medals. He is a graduate of Slaton High school and expects to attend college.

He was secretary for a long period of time previous to his having served as vice-president during the past year.

In addition to Allan J. Payne as president, other newly-elected officers are Nat Heaton, vice-president; J. J. Maxey, secretary-treasurer; and directors Roy Mack, Luther Kirk, T. P. Kendrick, and J. M. Roddy.

The president and secretary together with the directors of the various committees Club service, Claude Anderson, vocational service, Carl Evans, community service, Lloyd Moyer, and International service, Howard Hoffman, constitute the aims and objects committee.

"Flying Eye"



PITTSBURGH, PA. — This bomb-like "flying eye," which helped win the battle of the Atlantic, will usher in a new era of oil exploration from the skies. Originated by Gulf Oil research as a magnetic detector for aircraft, it can "see" submarines hidden underwater — or "look through" the earth's crust to chart the underground magnetic structure. As the first practical airborne prospecting device, it opens to oil exploration hitherto inaccessible jungle, mountain and ocean regions; and will tremendously speed-up discovery of the world's remaining oil resources. The young lady perched on a pontoon of the exploration plane hears from E. W. Westrick, engineer who assisted in its development, how the "flying eye" trails from a cable in flight.

Most Texans are familiar with the stories, almost legend, about Reveille, the black pup which was brought to the Aggie campus in 1931, and in 12 years of parading before the equally famous 22-piece Aggie band, did about everything any pouch could ever desire to do. "Rev" had the run of the campus,

the mess halls and the dormitories, travelled all over the Southwest, appeared in the Universal picture, "We've Never Ben Licked," had a "double" in Hollywood, and had a pet aversion for T-model Fords.

In 1944, Reveille figured she had seen enough for one dog and after having her portrait painted by a well-known Texas artist and hung in the Texas A. and M. College Library, she died on January 17. She was buried on the grounds of Kyle Field, the Aggie stadium, and a marker erected by the Cadet Corps is a reminder to puppy posterity.

Evidently the Red Menace is not a new scare in this country for here is what Theodore Roosevelt wrote many years ago:

"There can be no divided allegiance here. Any man who says he is an American, but something else also, isn't an American at all. We have room for but one flag, and this excludes the Red flag, which symbolizes all wars against liberty and civilization, just as much as it excludes any foreign flag of a nation to which we are hostile."

The people of this country should be aware that the danger of the Communistic theory is even more important than it was in Theodore's day.

Just a little more proof that the farmer is always griping is evidenced by M. W. Reynolds who lives near Union. Last week after the two inch rain, Mr. Reynolds was very much disgusted, he had just finished irrigating three hundred acres when the bottom dropped out and he said if he could not get into the gram with a tractor soon he would have more weeds

than grain. It is very discouraging to me when I have been pulling for a rain so long and so hard and when I finally get a good one folks like Mr. Reynolds don't like it. I'm a good notion to just let the country go to pot.

Of course a good many businessmen will miss the trade of transient cotton pickers this fall and winter but it is probable that the farmers will make about as much money from a good feed crop as they would have from cotton if the rains had come in time to have made a good cotton crop possible.

Highway accidents, which account for approximately half of the Texas traffic casualties, are on the increase over 1945 by 34 per cent, reports N. K. Woerner, chief of the Statistical Division of the Department of Public Safety.

Those figures mean that, if the percentage remains the same, more than 2,000 persons will die in highway wrecks in Texas this year.

But we see daily news accounts of people killed in Auto accidents, and our anger is not stirred. Death on the highway has become so commonplace that we accept it as an inevitable consequence of the modern age.

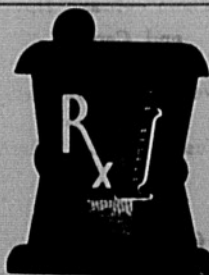

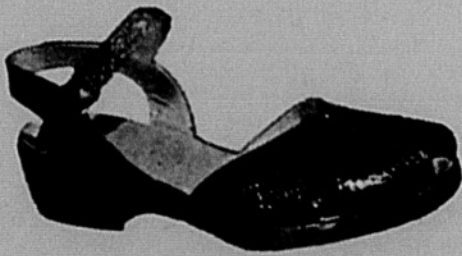

It Was Tried

By **GEORGE S. BENSON**
President of Harding College
Searcy, Arkansas

"As we all know, American doctors' care of wounded in this war has been and continues phenomenal as regards its record-breaking percentages of cures and its development of new techniques and remedies. There was considerable expectation that the German doctors . . . would have some pretty phenomenal achievements of their own to report . . . but Colonel Churchill did not find them.

Fatal . . . HIS over-all conclusion . . . was that German handling of wounded was about 20 years behind the American procedure. . . . Going into details, he reported that German army doctors as a rule just casually passed up badly wounded men on the assumption that they were going to die anyway, whereas our doctors fight to the last gasp for every wounded man's life, and frequently win. . . .

"As for professional pride in pulling off near-miracles of cure or amelioration, such pride just was not in the bulk of German military physicians and surgeons.

. . . They were victims of apathy and lack of ambition which would enrage a typical American doctor. This is a sad backslide from Germany's proud position as world leader in medicine and surgery in the pre-Hitler days.

Lessons "ARE there any lessons For Us in it for us? It began to happen soon after Hitler saddled his brand of totalitarianism on Germany. It seems reasonable to conclude that it happened because Hitler saddled Nazi totalitarianism on Germany. . . . In Nazi philosophy, your race and politics matter far more than your brains and talents.

"You might be a brilliant physician or surgeon or research scientist, but if you were a Jew or an anti-Nazi of any description, you had to get out of Germany if you could, . . . go to a concentration camp if you couldn't get out. Thus Hitler and his crew decimated German science. Their master-race convictions, too, led logically to . . . the use, in some concentration camps, of humans of 'inferior' breed as guinea pigs for . . . laboratory experiments.

"The lesson in the German experience seems clear enough. . . . There is no substitute for a free, bold and inquisitive medical profession or for generously financed and expertly staffed medical research, carried on year-in and year-out. It is devoutly to be hoped that the lesson of the German medical collapse will not be lost on us."

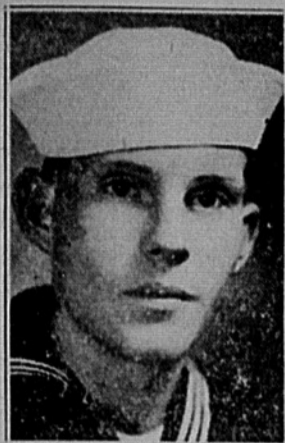

Rat Menace Going On Increase

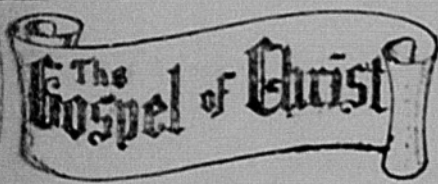
Because of the economic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have been considered a serious menace to mankind since long before their role as vectors of disease was understood. Today at least six diseases which are transmitted to man from the rat are known to medical science, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. These diseases include the dread plague, typhus, trichinosis, a form of jaundice, tapeworm, and food poisoning. The whole history of the role rats play in the transmission of disease remains as yet unknown.

"It is necessary to public health," Dr. Cox said, "that a continuous rat control program be maintained in every urban and rural area throughout Texas. This is of especial importance on farms where rats may flourish by feeding on grain and other farm products."

The doctor pointed out that rats, like other living things, require food and shelter if they are to propagate and increase in number. Destroying their shelter and breeding places includes the employing of ratproof design in buildings, the use of ratproof materials in construction, employing ratproof methods of construction and installation, and providing for periodic inspection of buildings to insure permanent safety. This program will force the rat out into the open where its destruction may be accomplished.

Of equal importance as a control measure is the elimination of all food supplies. This consists of storage and disposal of garbage, and careful feeding of stock to prevent waste feed from being picked up by the rats.

By observing these control measures, the community will benefit not only in the eradication of a nuisance and economic menace, but in improved health conditions and the prevention of rat-borne diseases.

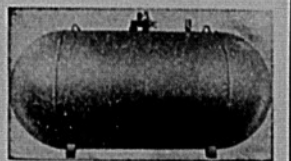

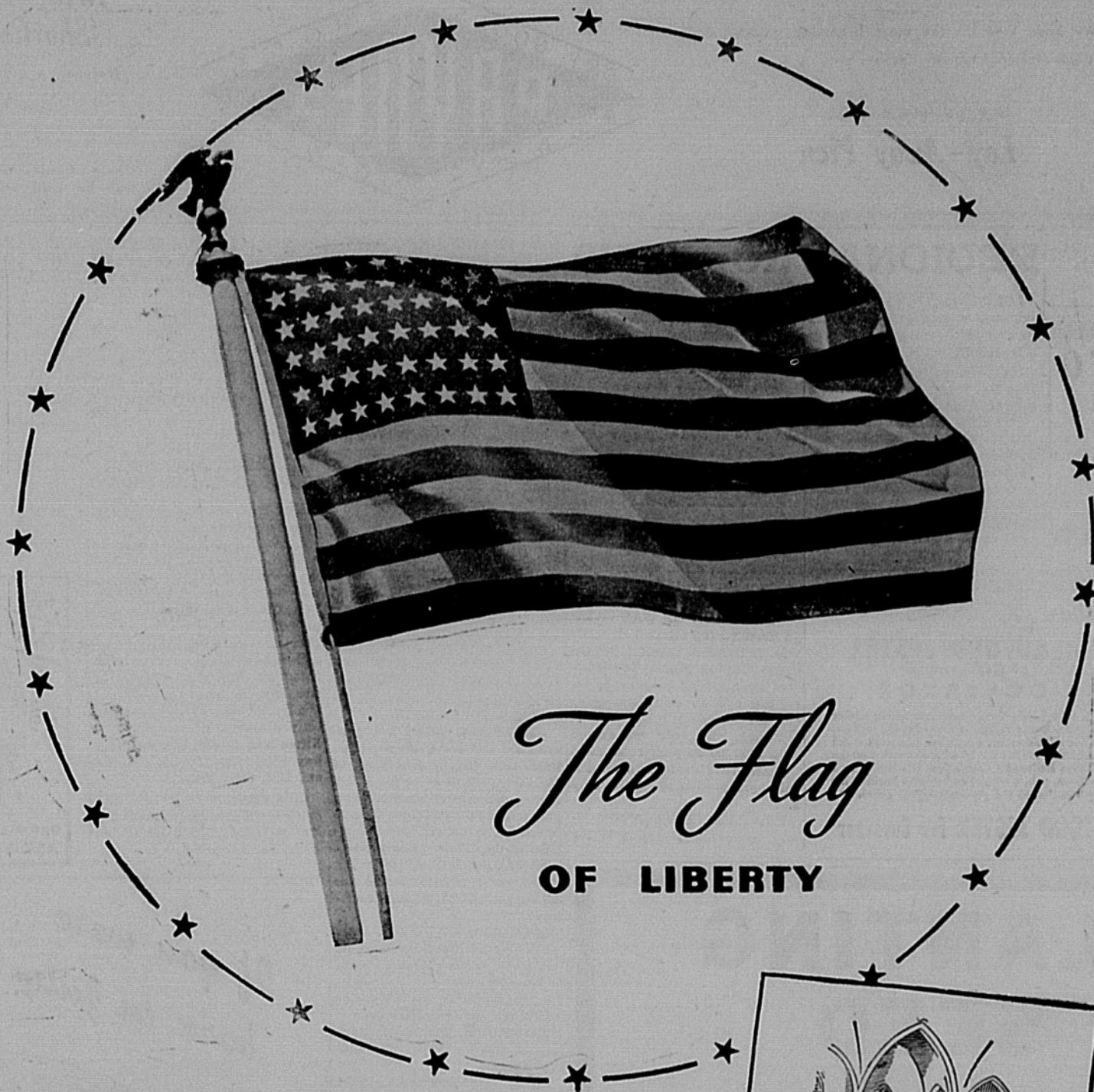
