Coal Users Urged To Get Supply

Household users and industrial consumers of coal produced in the Southwestern area were urged today by J. A. Krug, Solid Fuels Administrator, to place their orders immediately and store the fuel on their own property for use next winter.

Surveys recently made by the Solid Fuels Administration show that many mines in the area serving Missouri, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Northern Texas and Southern Minnesota were idle because consumers have not placed orders. Retail coal yards report also that loading and delivery equipment is standing idle because of the lack of orders.

Slaton Rotary Club To Welcome District Governor

The Rotary Club of Slaton will welcome W. Aubrey Stephenson, Sept. 5, 1946, Governor of the 127th District of Rotary International, which includes 62 Rotary Clubs in West Texas. Mr. Stephenson is Professor of Government, and Assistant Dean at Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene, Texas, and is a member of the Rotary Club of Abilene.

Mr. Stephenson will visit the Rotary Club of Slaton to advise and assist President Allan J. Payne, Secretary J. J. Maxey, and other officers of the club on matters pertaining to Club administration and Rotary service activities. He is one of the 157 District Governors of Rotary International who are supervising the activities of some 5,800 Rotary Clubs with more than a quarter million members in 73 countries and geographical regions throughout the world.

Today, this world-wide service organization continues to grow in numbers and in strength. During the last fiscal year, 404 new Rotary Clubs were organized in 12 countries of the Americas, and in Australia, Belgium, Burma, China, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, England, Federated Malay States, Finland, France, Greece, Hong Kong, India, Ireland, Luxembourg, New England, Norway, Portugal, Straits Settlements, Sweden, The Nether-

lands, The Philippines, and Wales.

Wherever Rotary Clubs are located, their activities are similar to those of the Rotary Club of Slaton because they are based on the same general objectives—the promotion of better understanding and fellowship among business and professional men, community-betterment undertakings, raising the standards of businesses and professions, and fostering the advancement of good will, understanding and peace among the peoples of the world.

Rail Road Income Shows Decrease

Santa Fe's net Railway operating income for July, 1946, was \$5,261,217, according to a statement released by President F. G. Gurley today. This is a decrease of \$271,928 compared with July, 1945. Gross for the system was \$38,685,770, a decrease under July, 1945, of \$13,056,369. Operating expenses were \$27,676,102, a decrease under the same month of 1945. Comparative figures for the month and six months periods for three years follows:

July gross 846, -38,685,770; 1945, \$51,742,39; 1944, \$49,838,297.

July net Railway Operating income, 1946, \$5,261,217; 1945, \$5,463,145; 1944, \$4,796,876.

Seven mos. gross, 1946, \$234,895,361; 1945, \$333,830,029; 1944, \$295,253,696.

Seven mos. net Railway operating income, 1946, \$26,019,075; 1945, \$35,934,877; 1944, \$29,589,998.



Over the Wire

A wash out on the Lamesa Branch of the Santa Fe was reported. It is the first wash out in this area in over two years.

Ray Ayers says that the grain crop will likely equal last year's yield due to the large acreage devoted to grain although the yield per acre will not likely be as much. The Lamesa section will probably produce more than other parts of the South Plains.

Notices of increases in tax valuations have been received by a number of property owners in Slaton. Seems that equalization board must equalize every year.

If the present weather keeps up the soft ball spectators will be pretty well hardened to the weather for football season.

According to Mr. E. H. Rogers of the Slaton Floral Co., there are more different kinds of bugs and insects that eat on vegetation in this part of the country than in any other section.

Real estate transfers are said to be increasing in Slaton. A number of families have moved here from Lubbock where the heads of the house are employed.

John Berkley said that the only thing that he knows of that the past hot weather has been good for is that it killed off the Goat Heads on the school play grounds and that the sand berms won't be bothering the youngsters like they usually do every September.

Local stores report more lines of merchandise short than at any time since the war started and little prospect of improvement.

Members of the City Commission and representatives from the Chamber of Commerce attended a Government sponsored meeting in Lubbock Thursday on air port construction. Slaton is considerably behind on air transportation plans.

According to Mayor Wootton the water shortage should be over for this season and if pumps and piping become available the problem should be whipped by next spring.

Registration Schedule Given For Opening of Public School

The faculty for the Slaton city school system is complete with the exception of a teacher of Spanish, according to M. S. Kavanaugh, superintendent.

Supt. Kavanaugh also announces the schedule for registration as follows: Seniors will register on Tuesday, September 3; Juniors on Wednesday, September 4; Sophomores on Thursday, September 5; and Freshmen on Friday, September 6, all at 9 in the morning. Grade school pupils will register at their respective buildings on the morning of September 9. All pupils must have their book-cards in order to register.

The Texas State Teachers Association has just completed a survey to determine the number of teaching positions now vacant that must be filled by September 1 if schools are to open with the requisite number of teachers.

Replies were received from superintendents representing 75 per cent of all teachers in Texas. The replies indicated that 12.7 per cent of the total number are now vacant. The rural schools present a worse picture, 17 per cent of all positions in these schools are now vacant. The larger cities are characterized by least vacancies, as most of them have been able to provide salary increases for the coming year.

It is evident that unless salaries are increased markedly by increased local and state support that the schools of Texas may soon find one tenth of their classrooms vacant.

efits and taking claims from per-
sons who seem to be entitled to
benefits; and taking applications
for Social Security account num-
ber cards.

Employees desiring to check up
on their Social Security wage cred-
its can do so by securing an ad-
dressed post card at any post of-
fice of the Social Security Admin-
istration, completing the form on
the opposite side and mailing it. A
statement will be received within
a short period of time.
In case the wage statement fails
to agree with the worker's own re-
cords, he may advise the Social
Security Administration and im-
mediate efforts will be made to
adjust the difference.

"Spare That Wire" Pleads Phone Man

An appeal to hunters to give birds—and the telephone company, a sporting chance, was made today by Mr. C. H. Cale, manager for Southwestern Bell, following several recent instances of gun shot damage to telephone wires and long distance circuits.

"When hunters take a pot shot at a bird on a telephone wire or pole they often wind up by scoring a bull's eye on an insulator or wire," Cale said. "I don't know how many they bag the bird."

"A careless shot will often put a number of telephone lines out of service," Mr. Cale explained. "With the current critical material shortages, this type of damage to telephone equipment is more serious than ever."

With the approach of the dove season and with more ammunition expected to be available than in recent years, all hunters are asked to help eliminate this type of damage to hard-to-get telephone equipment.

NO OPEN SEASON ON PRAIRIE CHICKENS

There will be no open season on prairie chickens in Texas this year.

This was announced today by Howard Dodgen, Executive Secretary of the Games, Fish and Oyster Commission, in commenting upon reports circulating in several West Texas counties that all restrictions on hunting prairie chickens will be lifted on September 1.

Dodgen pointed out that the 47th Legislature is making it unlawful to hunt prairie chickens until September 1, 1946, repealed all existing laws pertaining to the hunting of prairie chicken, including a law which would provide for an open season. Hence, Dodgen said,

the prairie chicken on September 1 passes into the category of a game bird on which no open season is provided.

"WHO THEN CAN BE SAVED" Matthew 19:25

In Matthew 19:16 the young man asked Christ about how he might obtain eternal life. The conditions named by the Lord involved more than the young man wanted to do, and he, accordingly, turned away, in sorrow. The attitude manifested by the young man furnished Christ with an occasion for some teaching regarding those who are in possession of riches. See verses 23 and 24 and cf. the parallel passages in Mark 10 and Luke 18. The remark contained in verse 24 astonished the disciples exceedingly and led them to ask the question, "Who then shall be saved?" With this view of question in mind let us begin our study by considering—

I. Some Modern-Day Replies:

1. The moralist says that all morally good people can be saved, and that church membership and religious obedience are not necessary in order to obtain salvation. But the error of this may be seen by reading Acts 10: 1, 2; 11, 14; 4, 2.
2. The universalist says that everybody will be saved. But cf. Heb. 5:8, 9; Acts 3:22, 23, Matt. 7:21.
3. Penitent believers can be saved. Acts 22: 1-16.
4. Baptized penitent believers can be saved. Acts 2:42; Rev. 2:10, Matt. 28: 18, 19; Mark 16: 15, 16; Luke 24: 46.
5. Erring Christians can be saved. John 1:8; 2:2; James 5: 19, 20; Acts 8:4-24.

The Gospel is for all. Although plans were made where everyone could have been saved yet it is evident to all right-thinking people that not everyone will be saved. John 5:40. Then it behooves us to consider the above scriptures and accept them accordingly.

II. Examples Of Those Who Can Be Saved:

1. Unbelievers can be saved. Acts 16: 16-34.
2. Believers can be saved.

CHICK CHATS

FLOCK NEEDS GOOD HOUSE TO DO WELL

Inadequate housing for chickens often is the difference between a healthy, high-producing flock and one that brings little or no profit to the owner.

Providing a comfortable home for your birds means protecting them from wind, rain, and extreme heat or cold—and it means better economy for you because this good environment helps the birds produce more eggs through better living.

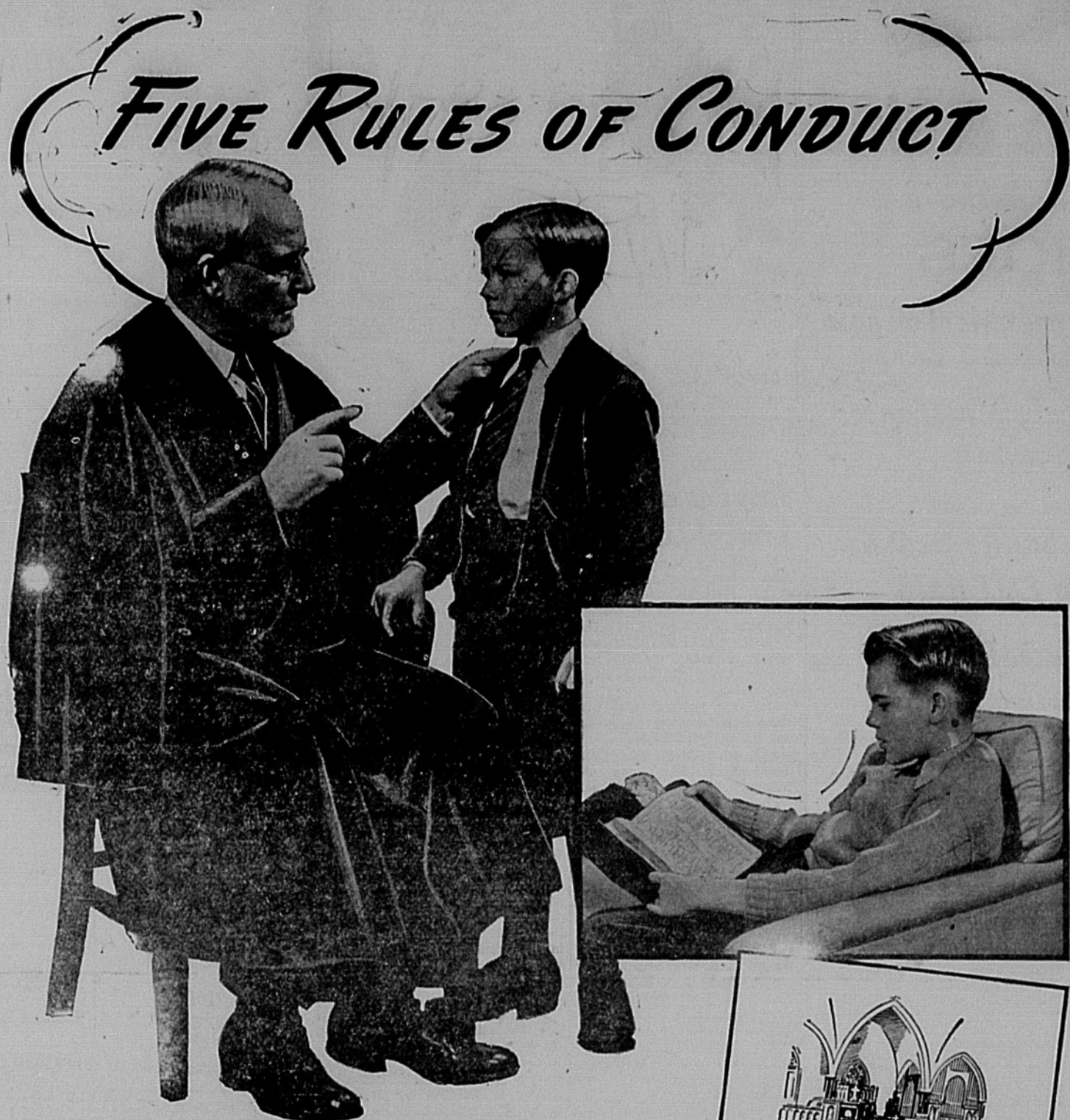
Provide Room, Light, Air
 A good poultry house provides plenty of room, light and fresh air for its tenants. It is dry at all times, free of drafts, and has enough of the various kinds of equipment so that the flock can avoid crowding around the feeders, waterers, nests and roosts.

The amount of room necessary to house a flock depends on the breed and whether the birds are confined or allowed to range. In general the light breeds require about three square feet of floor space per bird while heavier breeds need about four square feet. This amount of space should be provided when birds are confined or on restricted range; they may require slightly less when given plenty of range.

factor when deciding on the type of construction best suited for your flock. In sections which endure long, cold winters, special attention must be given to insulating the house so that the birds are protected from extreme cold, yet are allowed plenty of fresh air. A good system of ventilation provides fresh air without drafts, and helps keep the house dry.

Window Light
 Windows should be placed in the front of the house to provide a good source of light. There should be at least one square foot of window space for every 20 or 30 square feet of floor space in the house.

Equipment should be located so that it is easily reached by the birds. It should be of a type that is not difficult to clean and disinfect and there should be enough of it for all birds to use without crowding or the flock will be handicapped and profits may be lost. Crowding around feeders or waterers discourages good sanitation and may be the cause of a disease out-break.



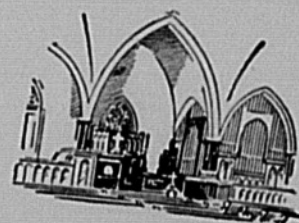
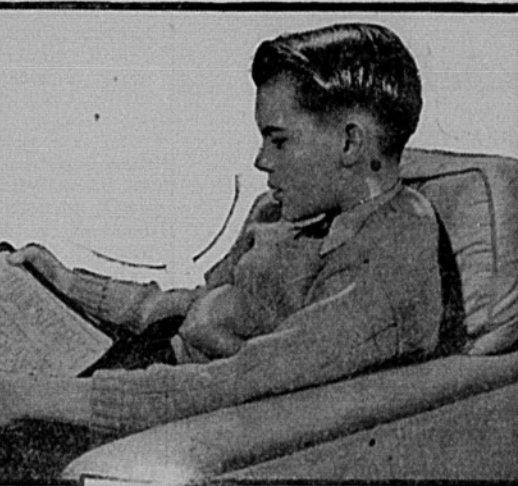
Jonathan Edwards, widely-known minister of another generation, chose for his personal guidance the following five rules of conduct:
