Inorder for the new type machine to operate economically, average 25 to 35 tons per acre, according to DeVanev.

The experimental tomatoes will According to DeVaney, tomato labor costs here last year ran about \$71/2 to \$10 per ton. With machine harvesting, costs should average \$61/2 per ton.

There was no problem in obtaining local farmers to grow the experimental tomatoes, and the experimental acres will be planted this year.

However, there was some reticence on the part of the growers to go along with the third part of the package plan. It was a proposal to grow between 200 and 250 acres of pickle type cu-

According to DeVaney, one of the major advantages in growing cucumbers is that farmers do Company experiments shown cucumbers to grow best on sloped fields which are given a "fast" drink about twice a

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
