The regular meeting was cancelled Thursday, October 31, to enable members to attend and assist in the presentation of the annual school carnival which was very successful.

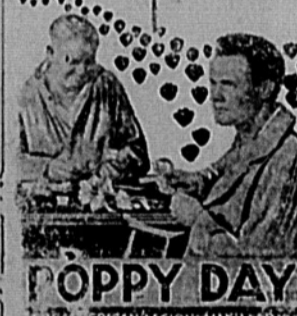
BROTHER OF LOCAL MINISTER RECEIVES BRONZE STAR AWARD

Otis H. Moyer of Childress has just been notified of the award of the Bronze Star for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from February 16 to May 8, 1945, in France and Germany.

Commanding officer was killed in combat and Sergeant Moyer took charge of the battery. The citation reads in part, "Sergeant Moyer's courageous perseverance and unflinching determination played a major role in the outstanding success of his battalion."

Special Renewal Rates On Daily Papers May Be Cancelled Soon

Many subscribers are taking advantage of the special low rates that are now available on the Lubbock Avalanche and the Fort Worth Star Telegram. Neither one of these papers will accept new subscriptions but the Slatonite is still accepting new subscribers.

Both the Star Telegram and the Lubbock papers have recently increased their rates but special bargain rates are now available at the Slatonite office on renewals either alone or in combination with the Slatonite.

According to reports the paper shortage is still stringent and will likely continue to be until the price ceilings are lifted and most all daily newspapers say it will be a considerable time before they will accept new subscriptions and a much longer time before rates are lowered. The present rates may be cancelled at any time and those whose subscriptions expire at any time within the next three months will save considerable expense by renewing now. RE-EVALUATION WORK IS PROGRESSING

The tax evaluators who have been working for the past week on the re-evaluation of all property for the Slaton Independent School district and for the City of Slaton report that the work is progressing nicely and that the cooperation of the individuals and business firms has been gratifying. They will inspect all property and grade it according to location, condition and age and recommend to the City Commissioners and to the Slaton Independent School board, the tax value that they consider fair.

Mayor Wootton and President of the School Board Roy Mack, said that when the work is done that equalization boards will be appointed to hear any complaints concerning taxes and that fair consideration will be given every one.

Statistics Prove Slaton Is Healthiest Town In Southwest

If one accepts the old saying "that figures don't lie," then one must be impressed by the overwhelming fact based on vital statistics that there has not been a death of a Slaton citizen in three or four months. The logical conclusion might be that there is

something beneficial in the locale that makes for the lack of fatal illnesses.

One naturally begins to look for the reason or reasons back of this statistical fact. Is it the water. Other communities have a very similar water supply. Is it the climate? Other nearby communities have a like or very similar climate. Are diseases less prevalent here than elsewhere? That is difficult to decide, and needs careful study. Is it that Slaton residents are naturally stronger and more able to withstand diseases? Do Slatonites go in for preventive medicine more so than do people who live elsewhere?

These are questions for serious consideration and prolonged and careful investigation. Perhaps the Chamber of Commerce would like to recommend Slaton to prospective citizens and industries on the strength of the known facts, and, if research would only ferret out as to why this is true, then other communities would pattern their living habits or any other such controllable factor on those of the citizens of Slaton.

These are only suggestions for an approach to the determining of what factor or factors are responsible, and when they have been isolated and scientifically proved to be the real and true causes or reasons for the naturally healthful conditions of the citizens of Slaton, other towns will naturally want to profit by such information.

LOWER AIR MAIL RATES POPULAR

Postmaster K. L. Scudder reports that air mail has increased considerably since the new five cent air mail stamp was put on the market however he also reports that postal receipts have decreased considerably compared with the fall and winter months of last year.

This is partially due he believes to the fact that most of the mail and packages that went to the men overseas are not going through and to the fact that there are fewer transient workers in this area than at any time in many years.

It had been hoped that a new Post Office building could be secured for Slaton when the Government building program gets into operation but our record for the past two years will be against us.

Many towns over the nation report a great increase in the air mail volume since the rates were decreased and it is expected that they will show a much greater increase in this Post Office when the folks realize the faster service that the air mail offers.

The retail stores of Slaton will be closed Monday, November 11, in observance of Armistice Day. This is one of the four holidays observed by Slaton merchants during the year, the others being Christmas, Thanksgiving, and July Fourth.

Armistice Day marks the cessation of hostilities of the First World War, and the beginning of the attempt to arrive at peace terms which would prevent future wars. The lack of success of this attempt has already been demonstrated in the Second World War. Out of this First War came the poem, "In Flanders Fields," which calls attention to the immediate springing up of poppies on the battle fields and burial grounds of this war. Since that time poppies have been associated with our war dead, and in commemoration of their sacrifice an annual Poppy Day has been designated.

Saturday will be Poppy Day in Slaton and in thousands of other cities and towns throughout the United States. Millions of Americans will pay tribute to the nation's war dead by wearing memorial poppies. Millions will make contributions to aid war's living victims, and disabled veterans, and the families of the dead and disabled.

Preparations for the observance of Poppy Day here have been completed under the leadership of Mrs. G. G. Green, Poppy Chairman of Luther Powers Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary. Volunteers from the Auxiliary will be on the streets early tomorrow morning with baskets of poppies which they will offer to be worn in honor of the dead of both world wars. They will continue to distribute the little red flowers throughout the day, endeavoring to give everyone in the city an opportunity to wear a poppy in memory of those who gave their lives for America.

No price will be asked for the poppies, but contributions will be solicited for the welfare and rehabilitation funds of the Legion and Auxiliary. All money received will be used for the benefit of disabled veterans and families in Texas during the coming year.

The local poppy workers will be part of an army of more than 100,000 volunteers who will distribute poppies in the United States tomorrow. All will donate their services for the day without pay. The only paid workers in the poppy program are the disabled veterans who make the flowers. The poppies to be distributed here Saturday have been made by disabled veterans of both wars at Legion, Texas.

WORMS CURTAIL
YIELD, GROWTH

Worms are a hindrance to
poultrymen because they often
are responsible for the reduced
egg yields as well as for pro-
longing the time required for
chickens to reach marketable
size. While the effect of worms
on poultry is not often easy to
detect, the harm done over an
extended period of time may
be of considerable importance.

Of the many types of worms
known to be poultry parasites,
there are but few that are nu-
merically important enough to
cause serious trouble. But these
few species are found almost
everywhere poultry is raised.

Large Roundworms Common

One of the commonest is
the large roundworm. This is
the worm with which most
poultrymen are familiar. It is
large—1½ to 4 inches in
length—and causes heavy dam-
age when great numbers of
them infect a flock. They are
prolific breeders, female worms
passing several thousand eggs
daily. Under favorable condi-
tions a small worm develops
in an egg in about two weeks,
and when an egg is eaten by a
chicken an adult worm devel-
ops after another five to seven
weeks. This worm then
hatches more eggs which the
chicken passes back to the soil
through the droppings. Large
roundworms in their develop-
ment in chickens cause consid-
erable damage to the intestinal
wall. This damage frequently
causes the birds to become
emaciated and stunts their
growth. If the infection is se-
vere enough the chick will die.

The cecal or pinworm is a
tiny worm between one-fourth
and one-half inch in length
that lives in the tips or blind
ends of the ceca of chickens
and turkeys. While it is not es-
pecially harmful to chickens,
the cecal worm or its egg acts
as the carrier of blackhead or-
ganisms infecting turkeys and
is often responsible for severe
losses in turkey flocks. Its life
cycle is similar to that of the
large roundworm.

Long and Threadlike
The intestinal capillaria
worm is a long threadlike
worm that may cause chickens
to become droopy and emacia-
ted, to develop diarrhea, and if
the infection is heavy enough,
to cause death losses.

The several types of tape-
worms are flattened, ribbon-
shaped, segmented worms that
are found in the intestines of
poultry. They vary consider-
ably in size, carry both sexes
in each segment and do not
have either a mouth or intes-
tinal tract. Flies, ants, grass-
hoppers and bugs serve as the
intermediate host for tape-
worm eggs, and when one of
these insects is eaten by a
chicken the tapeworm infec-
tion gains a foothold.

Better Balance In '47 Farming

"Balancing farming" is a term familiar to every farmer. For many years, County Agents, Vocational Teachers and other agricultural leaders have emphasized the importance of proper balance between crops and livestock, and other sound farming practices which make up the broad phrase, "balanced farming."

In 1947, maintaining or improving the balance between various crops and livestock enterprises will be even more important than in the past. This is because high prices offer a big temptation to "put all our eggs in one basket." This is poor business at any time. It can be disastrous in 1947.

"Balance" on any farm is a matter for the individual farmer to decide. No two farms are exactly alike. Different soils, equipment, experience, labor supplies and other factors determine the combination of crops and livestock best suited for each farm. With his knowledge of these conditions on his own farm, each individual can decide the best combination if he has the available information as to prices, supply and demand and other general conditions that influence the market outlook for the things he can produce.

To provide such information, and there by help Cotton Belt farmers plan their 1947 programs, is the purpose of this series of articles which your news paper is publishing as a service to farmers and the community. Watch for future articles in this series.

WESTERN MARKET NEWS
Easy trends showed up on most farm products at southwest markets last week, reports USDA's Production and Marketing Administration. Oats and barley had about the only strength. Livestock prices started to level off followed by sharp cotton losses and steady declines on sorghum, poultry and eggs plus an easy undertone on most vegetables.

Cotton rallied late last week after markets closed Wednesday to allow the trade to recuperate from a loss of \$22.50 a bale during the first part of the week. Prices in general dropped about 4 to 5 cents

per bale below the previous week's close but were about 7 cents above last year. Demand for cotton was slack because of the unsettled market. Farmers held nearly all current ginnings and took steps to put more cotton under government loan.

Southwest egg and poultry markets reported weaker prices and dull demand for most offerings last week. Trade was barely normal for this season of the year.

Turkeys held steady.

Last week saw hog receipts fall about 5000 head below the previous week's arrivals at principal southwest markets. Prices were steady to stronger at Ft. Worth and San Antonio but were off about a dollar a hundred at other terminals. Friday's quotations for top batchers stood at \$23.25 to \$23.35, Wichita; \$23.50, Oklahoma City, \$24, Denver and San Antonio and \$25, Ft. Worth.

Less cattle arrived at southwest markets last week compared to the week before, and prices began to decline. Common and medium steers and yearlings brought \$12 to \$15 per hundred at Houston, \$12.50 to \$16, San Antonio, and \$12 to \$18, Ft. Worth, Oklahoma City. In the common and medium steers \$13 to \$16 while Wichita quoted medium and good steers at \$17 to \$20. Denver moved medium and good shortfed steers around \$20.

THIS WEEK'S LESSON

"Adam and the Fallen Man" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon which will be read in all Churches of Christ Scientist, on Sunday, November 10.

The Golden Text is: "If by one man's offense death reigned by one; much more they which receive abundance of grace and of the gift of righteousness shall reign in life by one, Jesus Christ." (Romans 5:17).

Among the citations which comprise the Lesson-Sermon is the following from the Bible: "For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one shall many be made righteous." (Romans 5:19).

The Lesson-Sermon also includes the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy:

GOOD COOKS DO NOT BOIL FOOD ANY MORE

"Boiled" ham is not boiled by good cooks today. Neither are "boiled" eggs and fish actually cooked by boiling.

The term "boiled" as concerns these protein foods is a dated phrase that no longer means what it says, according to Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. When prepared by cooks using modern methods, these "boiled" foods are actually simmered—cooked in water just before the boiling point, Miss Lawrence says. The high heat of boiling toughens protein, and housewives will get greater tenderness by cooking longer at lower temperatures.

Even "boiled" coffee is a dated phrase, Miss Lawrence points out. Brewing tests have shown that the finest flavor in coffee is obtained by using water that is just below boiling.

The common use of "boiled" for these foods is simply a case of an old term that has lagged behind modern cooking knowledge and methods, the specialist says. She is of the opinion that the attention of housewives would be called to better methods of cooking if these dated names and phrases were changed as cooking methods change.

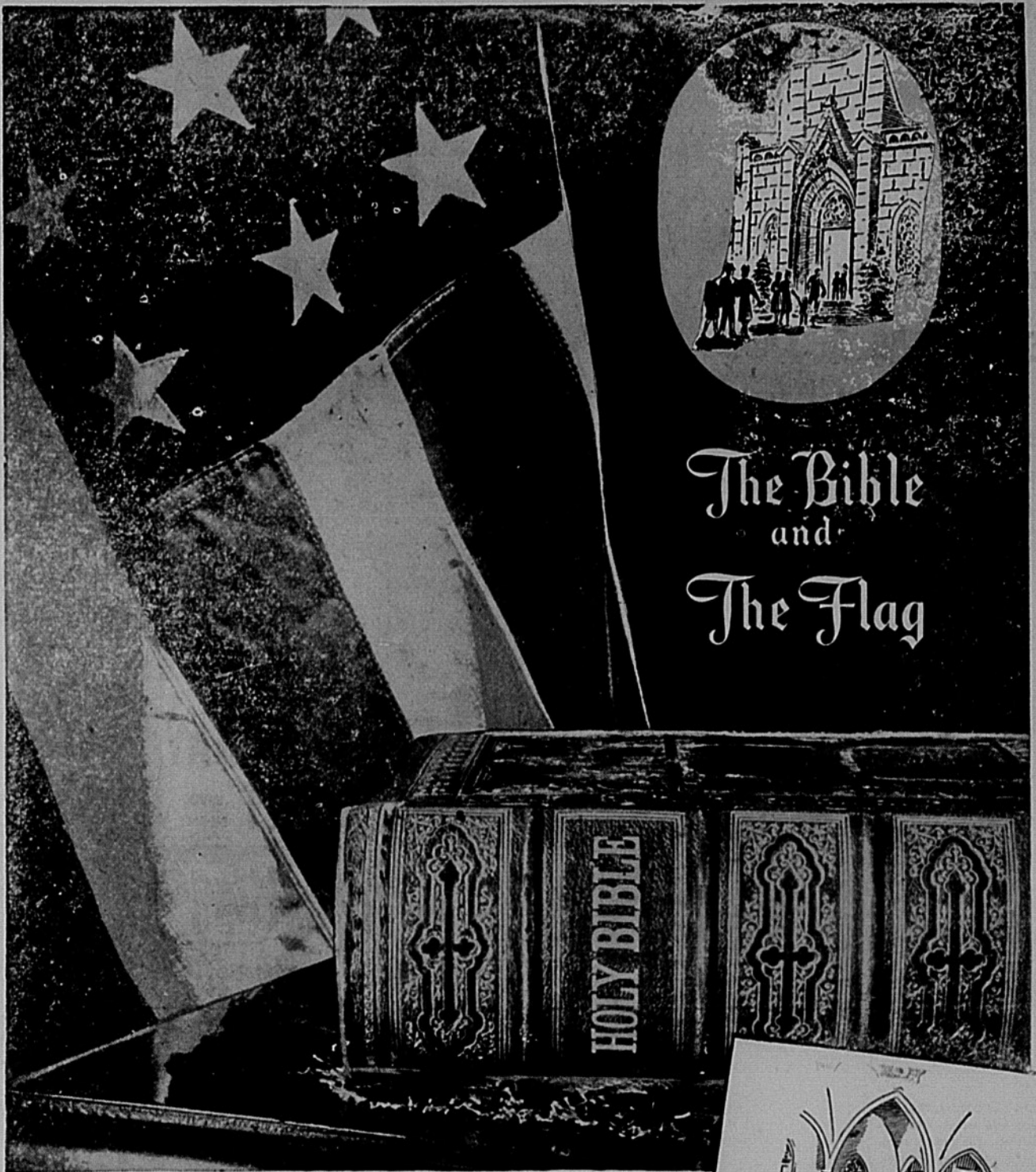

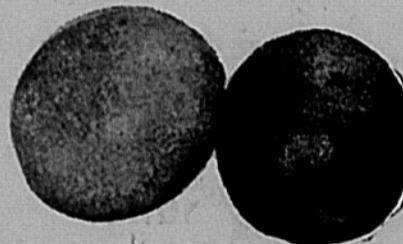
