### SAVE MONEY IN RANGE FEEDING

The range flock will get maximum nutritional benefits from its green feed supply only if there is some restriction on the amount of rations placed in the hoppers. If feed is always available in the feeders, the birds probably will get most of their food from that source and will neglect the vitamin-rich range grass.

### Up to 15% Green Feed

Unless hopper feeding is restricted, the poultry raiser's feed bill will be unnecessarily high. On the other hand, the flock may get up to 15 per cent of its feed requirements from the range grass if ration feeding is properly controlled.

Of course it would be disastrous to place too great a restriction on the flock's ration feeding. A daily "fast" of from one to four hours, depending on the condition of the range crop, seems about right. On comparatively bare soil or on range on which grass has dried up or become long, enough mash should be supplied so that the birds clean up the hoppers and they remain empty for about one hour before refilling. On range with plenty of young tender grass, the "fast" period can be increased to three or four hours with the hoppers being left empty from noon or one o'clock until about 4 p. m. During the hours of "fast" the flock will be busy eating green feed.

Such a feeding program must be varied according to the condition of the range, the quality of the grass available, and the poultryman's own judgement as to what is best for his flock.

### Other Feeding Rules

Here are some other rules of feeding to observe:  
Provide four inches of feeding space per bird. An 8-foot hopper is of adequate size for 48 birds.

Move the hoppers to clean ground at least once a day. Some poultrymen make it a practice to move feeders every time they are filled.  
To protect feed from rain, use covered hoppers. On rainy days place them near the shelters. During hot weather, put feeders in or near the shade.

## MARKET NEWS

As of July 7, 1947

Cotton and some grains dropped sharply last week, and easy spots appeared in livestock and vegetables, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Other southwest products sold steadily to strong.

Volume movement of the new crop punctured recently ballooning sorghum markets, and prices collapsed to levels 70 to 80 cents per hundred pounds lower last week. Quotation at Fort Worth and Galveston Thursday stood at \$2.61 for No. 2 milo. White corn gained 22 cents, to reach \$2.83 per bushel, and yellow corn dropped six cents, to sell at \$2.29. Other grains changed very little from a week earlier.

Spot cotton markets quoted \$2.50 to \$7.25 per bale lower prices last week. A little more activity left trading still on a small scale. High and medium grade cotton continued in demand. Most cotton areas enjoyed favorable growing conditions.

Eggs held firm last week, and even advanced slightly in some areas. Better qualities found especially good demand. Current receipts brought mostly 37 1/2 to 38 1/2 cents per dozen at Ft. Worth, 39 to 42 at Denver, and 38 1/2 with rots candled out at Dallas. High quality graded eggs sold quite a bit higher. Poultry held steady.

Most cattle sold about steady last week, but Oklahoma City paid 25 to 50 cents higher prices, while cows and bulls went lower at Houston, as did calves, bulls, and low grade cows and heifers at Denver. Common to medium cows bulked at around \$12 to \$15 at most places, and canner to cutter grades \$8 to \$12. Common to medium stocker steers and yearlings brought \$13 to \$16 at Houston, while medium and good kinds moved at \$16 to \$20 at Ft. Worth, and \$16.50 to \$18.50 at Wichita.

Texas hog markets held about steady for the week, but other southwest terminals dropped around 50 cents, more or less. Closing bulk of good and choice butcher hogs brought \$24.75 to \$25 at Ft. Worth. San Antonio's late-week top was \$24.50, Oklahoma City and Wichita \$24.75, and Denver \$25.25.

## Texas Business

Texas business activity remained 87 per cent above its prewar level in May and stood 10 per cent higher than in May a year ago, according to the index prepared by The University Bureau of Business Research.

Only sobering element in the picture was the fact that activity did turn downward slightly in May, falling 1 per cent lower than in April.

Texas business for the past 6 months has fluctuated within a narrow range but has always remained at a very high level. The postwar peak was reached in February, a month before the national peak but the February index was only 2 per cent higher than the index for May.

Trade continued high in May, as retail sales of independent stores were 6 per cent larger than in April and 17 per cent greater than in May 1946. The general dollar figures obscure the retail trade situation, however, because prices have risen and sales in some lines declined. Sales of soft goods have failed to rise as rapidly as sales of durable goods, and luxury items are feeling definite slumps.

### Sciatica and Low Back Pain

Taxation Forever! Beginning with a tariff levied on distilled spirits in 1790, says a Twentieth Century Fund report, liquor taxation in the United States has been imposed both for revenue and for control of consumption. Three-fifths of the individual states impose taxes on incomes of individuals and sales tax is in use in 22 states and two large cities. Two-fifths of the states levy special taxes on chain stores.

New Invisible Eyes Contact lenses are invisible lenses which fit under the eyelid. More than 10,000 people in the United States are wearing them, some for cosmetic reasons, others because they are the only type of lens which can be effectively used in most cases of conical cornea and some cases of corneal scars.

Texas Tech Notes

Dairymen from West Texas and Eastern New Mexico will reorganize the West Texas Branch, Texas Dairy Products association at a meeting here July 17. Specific place for the meeting has not been designated, but it will probably be on the college campus, according to L. G. Harmon, professor of dairy manufactures.

Suggestions for elimination of insects that have begun plaguing gardeners are offered by George Elle, assistant professor of plant industry.

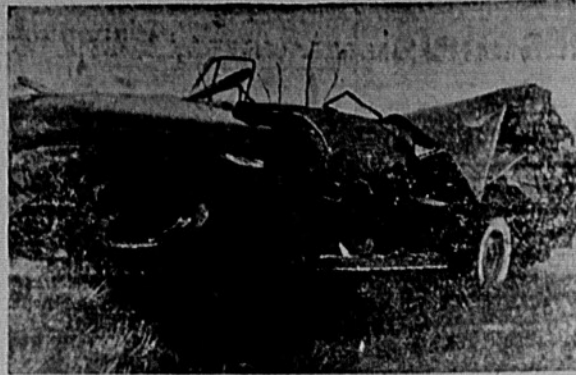
Most difficult to control are the squash bug, now appearing in droves on squash, and the harlequin cabbage bug that attacks cabbage, collards, mustard, turnips and radishes, he said. Sabadilla, a compound sold under the trade name of Sabacide, is effective on the young-bugs but not always on adults. Its use will result in some measure of control, however, since the squash bug reproduces two generations per season and the cabbage bug three.

The flea beetle, a black jumping insect about the size of the end of a lead pencil, constitutes a threat to area potato growers, he warned. This insect chews holes in leaves about the size of a pencil lead. A half mixture of cryolite and sulphur is recommended as a control, especially for home gardens. Arsenicals are satisfactory but dangerous, Elle said, while cryolite is not toxic to humans and is even more effective.

Texas Technological College will resume offering a course of study leading to a bachelor of science degree in petroleum engineering with production option, college officials have announced. The production option curriculum was discontinued during the war.

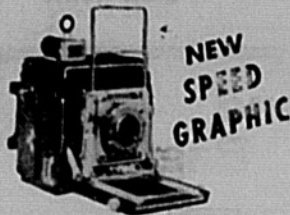

Painting Stucco Stucco may be satisfactorily painted by the use of either cement base water mixed paints or the regulation oil base paints, but the procedure differs, according to the type of paint which is used. If cement base water mixed paints are used, the surface of the stucco should be dampened first. On the other hand, if a regular oil base paint is to be used, the stucco should first be seasoned for several months to get rid of any free lime which might burn the paint, and moreover, be thoroughly dry at the time when the paint is applied.

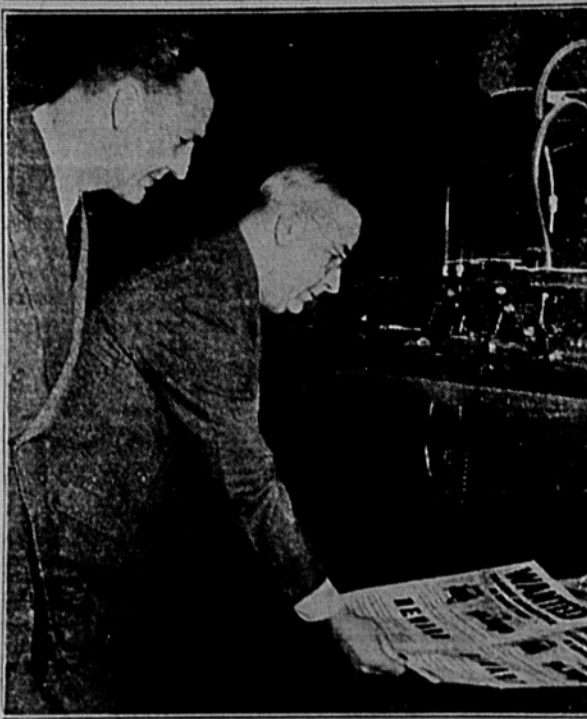

Harvesting at the right time means better vegetables on the dinner table. Good harvesting tips: summer squash is ready when about half grown, when the shell can easily be punctured with the thumbnail; beets are ready when 1½ to 2 inches in diameter; sweet corn when the silk is dried almost back to the husk.

When 100 pounds of shelled corn are harvested and shipped to market, 15.5 pounds of nitrogen, 1.5 pounds of phosphorus and 4 pounds of potash leave the farm, too. These are valuable fertilizers that need to be replaced.

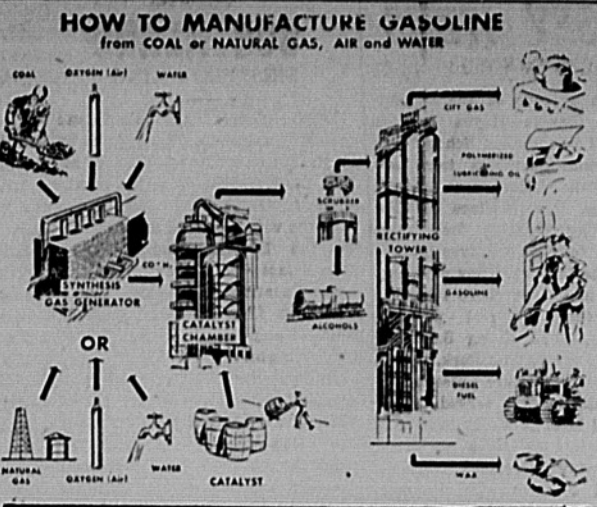

**FUEL OF THE FUTURE**

PITTSBURGH, PA.—Workings of the revolutionary process for making gasoline from coal and gas are revealed above. Originated in Germany, this fuel source of the future is being perfected by American engineering science. The diagram, as explained by Gulf research laboratories which are aiding in the development, shows the following steps:

(1) Coal—or natural gas—is mixed with air and water and converted by combustion and chemical action into synthesis gas. (2) The gas is passed through a catalyst (material causing a basic chemical reaction), which transforms it into vaporized petroleum-like materials and alcohols. (3) The alcohols are separated in a scrubber. (4) City gas is drawn off, and the petroleum materials converted into gasoline, lubricating oils, diesel fuel and wax.

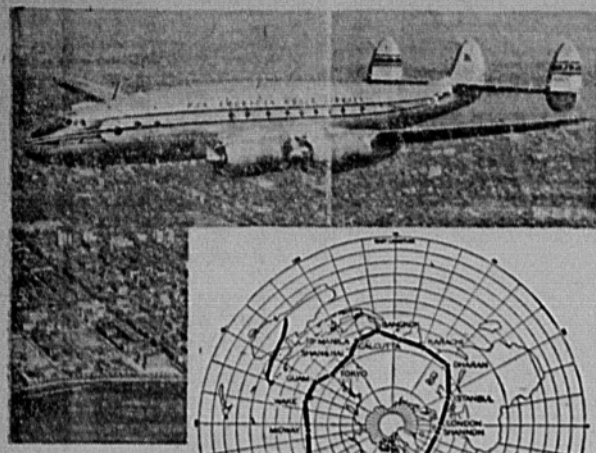

**Public Officials Join Publishers On Round-The-World Flight**



NEW YORK—Global short cuts for air travel, developed during the war, are now being adapted to commercial use with Pan American World Airways leading the way. The Clipper America with public officials, company directors and 15 leading U.S. publishers aboard circled the globe, see route on chart above, in 93 flying hours while covering 22,170 miles of airways. An elaborate series of entertainments and meetings planned by government officials of the countries visited made the elapsed time for the trip about 336 hours.

The publishers made the flight to secure on-the-scene reports from government officials and U.S. Correspondents on conditions in the countries visited. The globe-girdling route, recently certified by the Civil Aeronautics Board will begin regular round-the-world mail and passenger service the week following the flight. To close its one gap, the San Francisco to New York transcontinental hop, Pan American now awaits C.A.B. approval of its application for domestic routes.
