CITY WORKERS BUSY-CLEANING TOWN AFTER LONG WET SPELL

The City sanitary department has been in high gear endeavoring to make up for lost time caused by the ice and rain that has kept the garbage trucks out of the alleys. Some of the alleys are now dry enough to allow the trucks to gather the refuse but some parts of town are still so boggy that the men are unable to drive down the alleys, and on some of the streets, however if the dry weather continues all of the town will be cleaned up as rapidly as possible. Two trucks are now working at hauling off the trash and garbage.

The paved streets are being swept with the new street sweeper but the mud is so badly caked and dried on them it will take considerable time before they will be in apple pie order.

Mayor Lee Wootton reported this week that City Attorney Nat Heaton is investigating the traffic rules of other communities both larger and of the same size that Slaton is and as soon as a workable set of rules can be arranged they will be placed before the City Commissioners for consideration. Slaton has a good many problems in the way of street arrangements that are not found in other communities and the regulations when made into laws will have to take these problems into consideration.

The Southwestern Public Service Company is still working on a plan to give Slaton more and better lighting at a minimum of cost and as soon as the plan has been fully worked out the City Commissioners will take the suggestions under advisement.

There are also several petitions up for having more paving for the Slaton streets and property owners in both East and West Slaton are endeavoring to get petitions started. This kind of work cannot be done at this time of the year but if things work out as hoped there will be some paving done during the summer.

Basketball Season Nears Close With Slaton Fourth

Slaton May Soon Have Permanent License Bureau

Slaton has been tentatively selected as one of the towns in which a full-time agent of the State Highway Department would be located for the purpose of issuing automobile licenses, if a bill introduced in the Legislature is adopted. Other towns in Lubbock County which would have permanent agencies would be Lubbock, according to tentative plans submitted to Sen. W. A. Shofner of Temple by E. J. Amey, director of the motor vehicle division of the Highway Department.

Senator Shofner is the author of a bill which would transfer the duty of registering cars and handling title transfer papers from the county tax assessor-collector's office to agents of the State Highway Department.

One of the reasons for having more places that cars can be registered in is that it will save many people a trip to the courthouse and eliminate many wasted hours of standing in line.

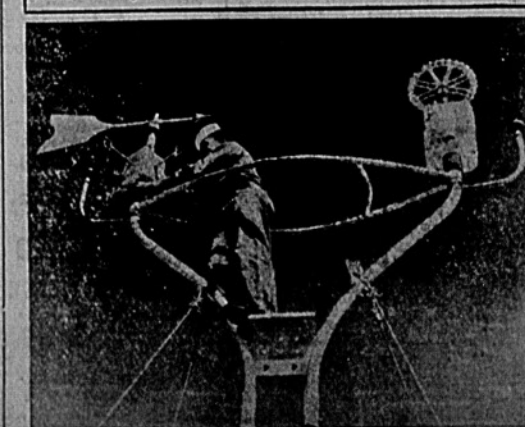

Mammoth Egg Laid

W. G. Jenkins, Slaton poultry raiser and Ralph Dickson, operator of the Dickson Hatchery here in Slaton, wish to challenge all chicken raisers to equal the size of a chicken egg that Mr. Jenkins got from his chicken house this week.

According to standards a dozen No. 1 chicken eggs should weigh 26 ounces per dozen, if Mr. Jenkins could get one dozen eggs each weighing the same as the one he found in his hen house, the dozen would weigh 72 ounces, which would be slightly less than three times as much as one dozen No. 1 eggs should weigh.

The approximate size of the egg is 9 1/2 x 7 1/2 and it might well pass for an ostrich egg.

Mr. Jenkins brought it in to the Dickson Hatchery and wanted Ralph Dickson to put it in his incubator but Ralph would not do so. He said that it might turn out to be a crocodile or an elephant egg and he did not want to have any stray wild animals leaping at him when he opens his incubator some weeks from now.

Mr. Jenkins expects to put his egg on display and he is challenging all comers. He lives on South 13th Street.

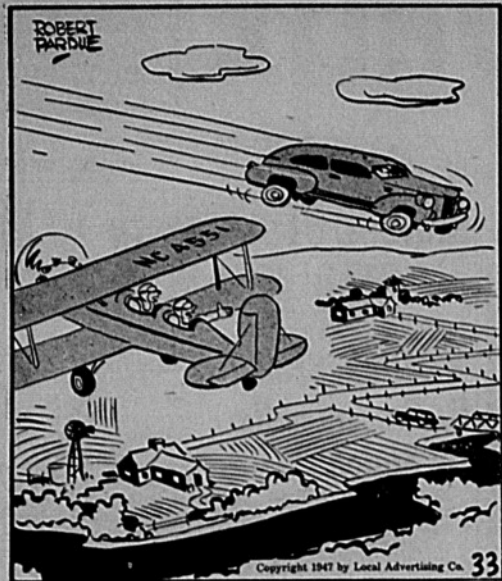

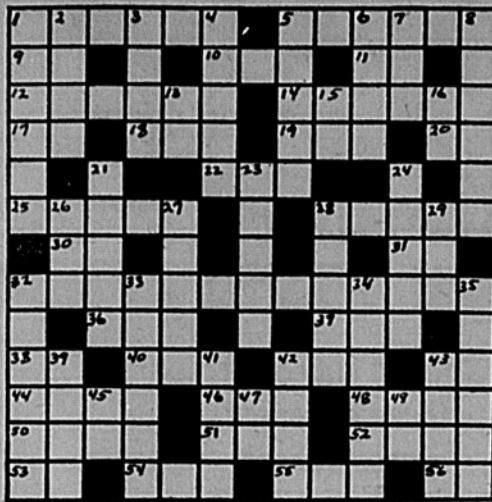

Biggest Ore Boat
Biggest and fastest Great Lakes ore carrier will be launched before 1950 by the Inland Steel company of Chicago. The new ship, designed by American Ship Building company, will be 668 feet long—over two-thirds the length of the Queen Elizabeth—and will carry an estimated 20,000 gross tons of cargo. Powered by a geared turbine delivering 7,000 horsepower, the vessel will make 13 1/4 knots when fully loaded.

At Last—Dry Salt
A tiny electric oven for drying out humid salt and sugar shakers has been patented. The oven contains an electric heater with a shallow base and vertical housing. Salt shakers and sugar bowls can be placed in the housing to dry out the contents whenever necessary.

Uninhabited Kerguelen Island
Kerguelen (frequently called "the island of desolation") lies midway between Australia and South Africa in the southern Indian ocean. It is situated in what is known as the circumpolar belt of low pressure, and a continual succession of terrific gales sweeps over it. Only four species of plants are to be found on Kerguelen—a wild tea plant, a mosslike growth, a wild cabbage and lichens.

Old Prague Clock
Old town hall clock in Prague, in operation after years of wartime silence, was first set in motion in 1490. Wooden figures of the 12 apostles march across the face of this clock, and a black cock crows three times after the hour has struck.

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Study Blood Smears

No one in the poultry industry relishes a condition which makes it necessary for the government to support the egg market. It can be avoided.

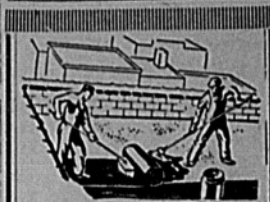
Last year the government bought 2.8 million cases of eggs in its price-supporting operations. That's only 7 eggs per person! If each person had just eaten 7 more eggs sometime during the 366 days of 1948, the government wouldn't have had to enter the market. The cost to each individual for those 7 eggs was 26.6c. The 143 million persons residing in this country paid for the eggs but they didn't eat them.

It looks like the government will have to drain off about the same number of eggs per person this year. How can we convince the public that it can avoid the \$38 million expense of an egg support program simply by eating 7 more eggs per person in 1949.

Whipping the surplus problem is as simple as that!
Better scramble some eggs tonight, hard boil some for dinner and fry a couple for breakfast in the morning. Above everything, don't let the Government monkey with the price of eggs again this year.

Casual Comment

It is gratifying to note that the Amarillo Times had the courage to throw the bright light of publicity on the service, or rather the lack of it, that is rendered by the Veteran's Hospital of that city. It is not unusual when—personally safe and snug in the financial security of a government supported job—that the arrogance, which is always inherent in the small soul of the autocrat, soon comes to the fore.

No less in need of publicity are the individual double-dealers, who surreptitiously profit on the credulity of ignorance of others. Their self-assurance and complacency would collapse like a pricked bubble, if on a ray of the light of truth, they were shown on their devious ways and dubious methods. Yes, just publicity; and its effect would probably pass as a very good substitute for "reformation." As E. W. Howe comments in his "Notes for My Biographer," "When there is unfavorable talk about me, I have observed that I am disposed to act in a manner best calculated to quiet it, and not add something new."

It is surely both unthinking and cruel to publish the pictures of those destitute people who are asking for help—as seems to be a practice of some papers. In one picture, over the caption "Waiting For More Soup," these people are seated on benches facing the camera. Some look sadly down at the floor, one covers her face with her hands, and, conspicuously well dressed and well fed, in their midst stand their "benefactors." If these soup dispensers must have their ounce of publicity, let them send their own pictures to the papers, but not shame those in need by including theirs also.

While the old saw may still be true that "He that tooteth not his own horn, the same shall not be tooted," — the "tooting" should be done in a way that hurts nobody.

The gifts in the Merci Train are really from the hearts of the French people—no red tape and no politics, just a gesture of gratitude to America.

It reminds us of another gift that came from France—the Statue

of Liberty. It, also, was a people's undertaking. French people by thousands made up the fund, and Americans in like number gave for the pedestal, in this spontaneous gesture of good will.

The world has long marveled at the dimensions of this mighty work of art—152 feet from foot to torch, and the torch 301 feet above the tide; the waist 35 feet thick, the right arm upraised 42 feet from the shoulder. That arm came over

in time for the Centennial exhibition at Philadelphia, and stood thereafter in Madison Square, the wonder of the town. The rest of the statue—210 parts weighing 100 tons—followed in a specially chartered ship, escorted by our Atlantic Squadron.

Grover Cleveland dedicated the finished monument in 1886.

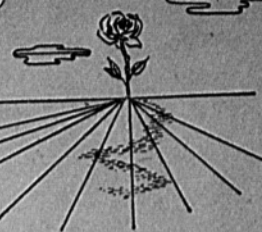

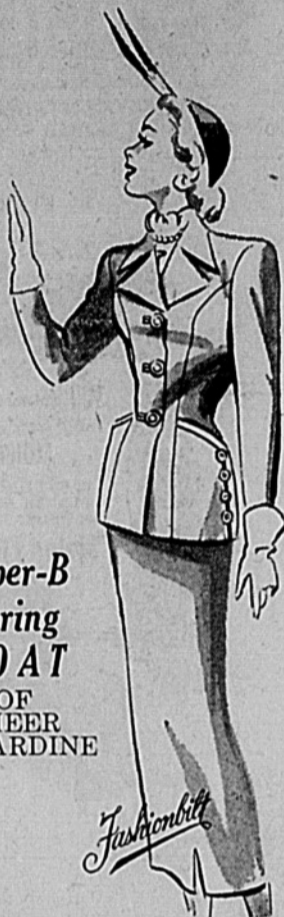

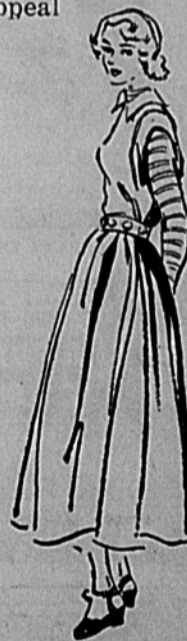

Aims for "Every Dog a Gentleman"

Life with Fido should yield added joys for many thousands of dog-owners as the result of publication by the Gaines Dog Research Center, 250 Park Avenue, New York 17, N. Y., of a free booklet called "Every Dog a Gentleman."

The booklet, issued as part of the "canine courtesy" movement fostered by the Center, essentially is a national directory of classes and clubs offering dog obedience training. It is intended primarily for those dog-owners who for any reason require help in the training of their pet. The list covers 143 clubs and classes in 23 communities in 31 states, and in each case gives the name and address of the person to be contacted. For dog-owners who live in communities where there is no active training group, or who prefer to do their own training, the Center has a list of recommended books on dog training, which is also available without cost.

In a foreword to "Every Dog a Gentleman," Harry Miller, director of the Center, attempts to clear up some common misunderstandings about dog obedience training. "The belief that discipline is punishment and may break a dog's spirit is a mistaken one," he states. "Most dogs actually enjoy their training sessions and take pride in going through the lessons they have learned. The impression that obedience work is a 'bag of tricks' is also wrong. Obedience training makes it possible for the owner to control his dog at all times, but it does not make a dog a circus performer. Nor is it necessary for the owner to have any special talent or genius in order to teach a dog the rudiments of good conduct. Patience and commonsense are required on the part of the owner, but under the direction of an experienced trainer in charge of a class, the correct methods are simple to learn and can be easily adapted to suit the individual dog."

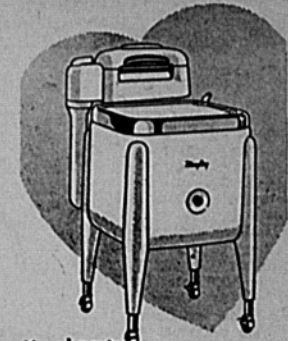

CAMERA TOPICS

by T. T. Holden

PHOTOGRAPHING THE CHRISTMAS TREE

Many readers have written to ask how they can make better pictures of the Christmas tree. This is a souvenir shot every family wants, but too often the results are disappointing.

Actually the problem is not difficult. Probably the best time to shoot the tree is Christmas eve or night and early on the great morning. You should make your picture while the presents are neatly stacked underneath and before the tree has started to dry out so that the branches begin to sag.

It will add to the interest of your picture if you get some story-telling activity in it. Have one of the youngsters sit on the floor and admire the tree, or pose Mother and the kids in the front foreground as if they were unwrapping presents.

Set up your camera on a tripod or table so that the scene just fills the viewfinder. The camera must be very steady since this will be a double exposure. Of course, you will pick the angle that shows the tree off to best advantage.

How you light the picture will be somewhat a matter of personal choice. You can throw one floodlight at the tree from the camera position, or you can hide the light behind the tree for a back-lit silhouette effect. If you have people in the picture, you should stick to a conventional lighting set-up: one light midway between camera and subject and a few feet to one side and a weaker fill light at the camera.

When your lights are set to your satisfaction, make an exposure in the conventional way, with the tree lamps turned off. Then without moving your camera or subjects, turn off the photographic lights and any other lights in the room and turn on the lamps on the tree. Now set your shutter on "time" and open it for a few seconds. How long an exposure you will need to record the tree lights will depend entirely upon how bright they are and how close you are to the tree. Two or three seconds should do the trick with a fast film and a large diaphragm opening.
