China Missionary To Make Speech Here Next Friday

Reverend D. Kirkland West, Presbyterian Missionary on furlough from North China, will speak in Slaton next Friday evening at 7:30 at the First Presbyterian Church.

Reverend West, executive secretary of the Shantung Presbyterian Mission of the Church of Christ in China, has recently returned from this strategic area of conflict between the two dominant political ideologies of today. Through almost two decades of close contact with rural and village Chinese people, Mr. West has acquired a deep understanding of the Chinese customs, psychology and problems. He brings to American audiences first hand reports of present conditions in the Far East.

A native of Craig, Mo., Mr. West attended Park College, Parkville, Mo., and is a graduate of Coe College, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and Princeton Theological Seminary, Princeton, New Jersey.

During the Japanese invasion of North China in 1937, Mr. West assisted in the evacuation of Chinese from the besieged city of Tsin-tao. He returned to his station at Weihai where he set up refugee camps, did relief work and continued increasingly effective work for the church. In 1941 the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., transferred him to Cebu, the Philippines. Returning to the United States in the fall of 1941, he was prevented by war from returning to the mission field. For the duration, he served as pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Johnstown, Pennsylvania.

In 1946 he was re-appointed to the China Mission. Appalled by the vast destruction he found in North China, he joined with the Chinese in the work of rebuilding and rehabilitation.

World Plant Catalogue in the Making

Trustee Election To Be Held Here Saturday, April 1

Local Business People Give Opinions on Possible Price Fluctuations

Economists is one thing, but the staff members do less to be, however in order to find what some of the lo-chants think about prices asked the following ques-tions: "Do you think pri-cing is going down, or do you feel they will not fluctu-ate at all?" The following are typical of those re-quiring the investigation.

Sims, manager of the West as Company says that he thinks prices will taper off gra-dually in the next few years as they are normal again—by which he means the pre-war price level.

C. Champion gives us an interesting view point of the business. "I think we'll have a gradual decline in prices," he says, "in fact our prices are already showing it. However, I don't be-lieve there will be any drastic either up or down."

E. Fitzgerald of Fitzger-ald says that in some lines prices are going up, while in others they seem to be consider-

ably cheaper. He says that the price of steel having gone up is accounting for the rise in price of many of the smaller appliances, while larger appliances such as refrigerators are cheaper. "Steel suffered most from the coal strike," Fitzgerald explains, "therefore, the brunt of the loss will naturally come out of the pocket of the consumer who has to help make up for the time they lost."

"I've been expecting clothing prices to go down," says O. Z. Ball, "but so far they haven't; in fact, my invoices show that the wholesalers' prices are going up rather than down. However, I don't think there will be any drastic change in clothing prices, but if any—up."

Mrs. Haskel Lasater who helps manage Piggly Wiggly here in Slaton says that she can't see a great change in grocery prices either up or down. "Canned goods have gone down about a penny in the can, with the exception of fruit juices which have gone up. One thing goes up while another goes down, keeping prices just about the same."

Driver's License Application Is Recently Changed

Announcement was made this week by the State Department of Safety of the new procedure of renewing driver's licenses. Past practice of filling out a specially prepared form has been changed to merely sending in the top part of the license which contains all the needed information. The fifty-cent fee will remain the same.

Only change that should be made on the old license before sending it in to be renewed is in case of address change. One line should be drawn across the old address and the new one clearly printed directly above the old.

The new licenses which will be sent out hereafter will consist merely of a small card upon which will be printed the essential information about the driver and the expiration date rather than the date of issuance as was printed on the old ones.

Another change in the license practice will come from the safety department itself. Hereafter, thirty days before the holders license has expired, the department will send out notices with an inclosed form to be returned for renewal.

It is urged that the fifty-cent renewal fee is not forgotten upon applying for a new license.

Forrest Weimhold, publisher of The Hockley County Herald and the Sun-News and owner of Radio Station KVL and Weimhold Printing and Office Supply, Levelland and The Morton Tribune, Morton, announced Friday afternoon that he would be a candidate for State Representative in the 119th District of Texas in the Democratic Primary, July 22.

The 119th district is composed of nine counties including: Hockley, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Gaines, Lubbock, Lynn, Terry and Yoakum. At the present time the district is represented in the State Legislature by Preston Smith of Lubbock.

Weimhold, who is 36 years old and married, has been a citizen of the South Plains for the past 25 years and is a native West Texan. He graduated from Texas Technological College, Lubbock, in 1936 and owned and operated The Slaton News with his father, the late H. H. Weimhold, who was a pioneer West Texas newspaper publisher, until 1939 when he purchased The Hockley County Herald and moved to Levelland.

Since being a citizen of Hockley County, Weimhold has been active in all civic and county affairs, being a past president of both the Levelland Rotary Club and the Hockley County Board of Developments, as well as a director of these organizations and the Hockley County Fair Association, and other local organizations. He is also a past director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Weimhold is treasurer and a director of Hotel Levelland, Inc., a community enterprise.

The Levelland publisher has been active in the various professional organizations, as he is president of the West Texas Press Association, as well as a past president of the Panhandle Press Association and has served on the executive board of the Texas Press Association for the past four years. He is also a director of the Texas Technological College Alumni and Ex-Students association, and a member of the Tech Museum membership committee.

Weimhold served about three years in the United States Army Air Forces during World War II. 16 months of which time was spent overseas in the China-Burma-India theater.

"I feel that I am well acquainted with the problems and needs of the peoples of the 119th district and that I am qualified with experience and ability to capably represent this large district in the Texas State Legislature," Weimhold said in making an announcement.

Weimhold is the first candidate to publicly announce his candidacy as State Representative of the 119th district in the coming Democratic primary.

Local Woman Gives Detailed Account Of Recent Trip To Havana, Cuba

Following is an account of a recent trip to Cuba made by Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Holt:

"With all reservations made, Mr. Holt and I boarded the fifty passenger Chicago and Southern Air-Liner at Houston for Havana, Cuba.

"There were only six passengers and three of those were enroute to Caracas, Venezuela. Therefore, we received every attention from the two stewardesses. Soon a nice wholesome dinner was served, after which we settled down to a calm trip, flying at an altitude of 9,500 feet and averaging 210 miles per hour.

"It was all most romantic with a beautiful moon above and soft, white clouds below, and below those clouds the deep, blue gulf. We were met at the air port and whisked to our hotel, Presidente.

"After a few hours of sleep, we felt refreshed and ready to see the sights. We engaged a guide and car for three days. The first day was spent in seeing some of the old and picturesque city of broad avenues and beautiful parks, a city with a population of more than a million people.

"The natural wealth, beauty and strategic position have given this largest and richest island of the West Indies the name of the 'Queen of the Antilles.' It commands the entrance to the Gulf of Mexico, it helps to hem in the Caribbean Sea, and since the opening of the Panama Canal, it guards the chief route of commerce between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

"Cuba is a long narrow island, curved like a bird's tongue, with a length of 730 miles and a breadth averaging about fifty miles. The total area including the Isle of Pines and various inlets is about 44,200 square miles.

"Cuba lies just within the tropics, the humidity is great and rain fall is abundant. Between summer and winter there is only about ten degrees difference in average temperature. The natural vegetation is luxuriant and the fertile soil is favorable to agriculture. More than 30 species of palm trees are found.

"The Royal Palm which some times reaches a height of 100 feet furnishes timber for the peasant's hut, thatch for his roof, utensils for his kitchen as well as medicine and preserved delicacies. Forests of cedar, mahogany, pine, ebony, rosewood, logwood and other valuable woods cover nearly half the island.

"The banana supplies one of the most important foods of the Cuban people. The pineapple, orange, lemon, grapefruit, mango guava, alligator pear and many other fruits abound with millions of dollars worth exported every year.

"Tobacco and its manufacture is another great source of wealth; among other products are cereals, cotton, coffee, cocoa (from which cocoa is made) and market vegetables.

"The abundance of long grass makes cattle raising a successful industry. The chief mineral pro-

ducts are iron, of which there are immense deposits, asphalt, manganese and copper. But these rich resources have been little developed.

"The greater part of Cuba's trade is with the U. S. which gets most of its cane sugar from there. About sixty per cent of its people are native Cubans, descendants of the Spanish settlers, and the remainder are negroes, foreign born whites and a few Chinese.

"I paused to give a brief sketch of the island of Cuba as a whole before continuing our tour of the city.

"We visited the famous old Columbus Cathedral which is dedicated to St. Christopher. This is the most notable of all ecclesiastical buildings in Havana—almost indescribably exquisite. Near the high altar a wreath marks the place where the remains of Christopher Columbus rested during a century until they were transferred to Spain in 1898. Several other cathedrals and castles of colonial charm were visited.

"Then through Havana's most imposing and magnificent capitol building, one of the finest edifices of the Latin America—built in the brief span of three years—(1926-29) at a cost of more than twenty million dollars, of such rich materials as marble, bronze, gold, precious woods, onyx and porphyry. It is said to be larger and finer than our U. S. capitol at Washington.

"The National University has a great amphitheater and more than twenty-five buildings.

"Our second day was spent in seeing old Marro Castle, across the bay. Its construction was begun in 1589, during the reign of Phillip II to defend the city against pirates and particularly from Sir Francis Drake, favorite of Queen Elizabeth of England. It is now used as a military academy.

"Our third day was composed of a seventy mile round trip into the country, through the botanical gardens, and out to the experimental farms, seeing many species of rare plants, trees and flowers from which much of our medicine is made.

"We saw a real cock fight, etc., then on through lovely scenery to a huge sugar mill and refinery. We obtained permission to go through and see how our sugar is made from the cane to the refinery state.

"Mr. Holt used our movie camera generously.

"The peasants plow in their fields with oxen, also seeing the three-team oxen drawn carts of sugar cane was very exciting.

"The poinsettias grow to tall shrubs.

"Our guide drove us to the Caribbean sea shore on our fourth day. It was a lovely eighty mile trip. Many fishing boats were out, green lumber was being unloaded and great mahogany logs were coming in from the Isle of Pines where there is an abundance of tropical fruits and important quarries, black and gold sands. As legend goes, this was where Robert Louis Stevenson was inspired to write his famous book, 'Treasure Island.'

"Some of the streets in Havana are very narrow and quaint with their little dinkey street cars and ugly buses which are soon to be replaced with several hundred from the states and England.

"China Town—well, I shall not attempt to describe it.

"Mr. Holt and I went shopping one afternoon, and I think I was the only lady on the street wearing a hat; of course, I felt conspicuous. And I took a brand new one along which was not taken out of the box.

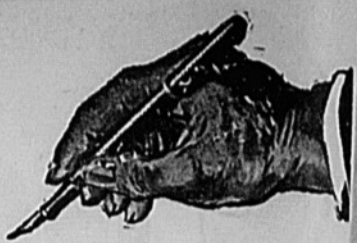

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JUST TALK

It seems to me that the state and city governments should throw away all of their traffic regulations and start over again. What has convinced me is the fact that Slaton gets along better with the sketchiest traffic rules than fewer accidents in Slaton than there are in many towns smaller and less congested. Not only do we have practically no traffic regulations but our streets are laid off so that it would be almost impossible to arrange rules that could be followed and our motorists think nothing of stopping cars in the middle of any street so that the occupants can catch up on the latest gossip. It makes little difference which side of a street one drives on, especially on the streets on the square where one may consider there are two streets running parallel or decide there are extremely wide streets where one should drive on the right side. You make your own rules and no one could successfully dispute you. This proves in my mind that it is safer to expect other drivers to run red lights, turn around in the middle of a block or to double park. If you are driving a truck it is perfectly permissible to block an entire street, especially on Texas Avenue.

One expects automobile drivers to do the most unusual things and if you are smart you'll keep both eyes and all your legs and arms ready to meet any emergency.

Well I suppose I might as well put away my spray gun, my step ladder and quit worrying about my neighbors and the school kids for I am pretty sure the freeze last Saturday night fixed up our fruit trees.

Saturday evening I saw Leonard Haral, who lives next door to us, out in his back yard counting the blooms that were on the part of our apricot tree that hangs over onto his premises. Every year he says he does not like apricots but I have noticed that when the tree bears he slips out, when he thinks that I am not looking, and picks up the ones that fall on his side. Once or twice I saw him help one or two of them fall a little to the west.

Each season I have gone out most every day and counted the blooms on the fruit trees, talked to them, slicked them down and estimated how much fruit we would have and every time the temperature got down to forty I got my blood pressure up, but this season I have my troubles over early, the freeze got them.

Saw in a magazine where some smart guy has put on the market a vine peach, some stuff that is a combination of lettuce and celery and an early maturing watermelon that is no bigger than a cantaloupe. The magazine claims that the watermelon has a delicious flavor but did not mention whether the the vine growing peach or the combination lettuce and celery were good or not.

What I'd like to see is a combination carrot and egg plant so that I would know to start with that I am not going to eat it, or a combination onion and radish so that I will know that I'm going to have a terrific pain, and how about a combination english pea and a potato so that you could balance it on a fork.

Such things as these could lead one into real danger so I'd better

stop before I begin seeing flying saucers.

How many people does Slaton have living in its city limits. Estimates run from 4500 to 7500 with most of the folks I have talked to rating it at about 6,000. Personally I believe Slaton has grown more within the past two years than it had grown during the previous past five years. Not only has Slaton grown in population but the folks who have come to Slaton are of the better class, folks with money to buy homes or to rent better homes. There have been more homes built within the past year than there were during any similar period since before the war and there is more confidence in values here now than there has been since the depression.

While there is a considerable gossip in this area about oil, Slaton does not need oil to make it one of the best towns in West Texas, as far as being a good place in which to have a home and in which to raise children.

Our schools are good and improving each year and if the Gilmer-Aiken regulations do what they were designed to do then the number and the standards of the teachers will improve so that Slaton will have as good, or a better school system, as any in the land.

Three is, it seems to me, a lacking in community cooperation and a pride in the town with many people more willing to criticize Slaton than there are those who can see Slaton's good points.

It seems to me that the larger a town gets the more difficult it is to shop, to know, and meet people and to actually feel that you are part of the community. In a big town there are a few big shots who are empowered with the privilege of spending large amounts of money, some of them are grafters, some are not competent and the ordinary citizen is not invited or even allowed to take part in the operations of the community. In a town like Slaton

we may not be as efficient as some folks in the bigger towns, but most of us are honest if for no other reason than that there is not enough big money spent to make dishonesty worth while.

While some more expansion for Slaton would be good it is worth while to stop and consider that we are doing fine as it is.

Week before last's dust storms showed signs of being as powerful as the ones that came to this country in the middle thirties. At that time we lived in Amarillo and one could easily get lost going across a street; folks went around wearing home-made contraptions that looked like diving helmets, Buck Rogers space hats and like things no one has seen or heard of since.

The air was full of rocks, cloth-

ing and newspapers and one traveler told of having seen a prairie dog digging its hole when the wind had blown it six feet off the ground.

While those two dust storms last week were not quite up to such high standards they demonstrated that we might get some later on that could be put in the top brackets. It seemed to me that I saw some copies of the Denver Post going over instead of the Amarillo News when the last dust storm was at its best, but I feel sure that the pair of long handles, that sail-

ed over our house at fifty miles per hour, were from Amarillo, for they were bow legged.

From my observations and from some inquiries I have made you might as well put the new stuff that is supposed to stop colds in the class with the other things that are supposed to do so but don't. If you get a cold and take the stuff it will take you about two weeks to get over the cold, if you do not take the supposed to be cures it will take you about fourteen days, so if you've any

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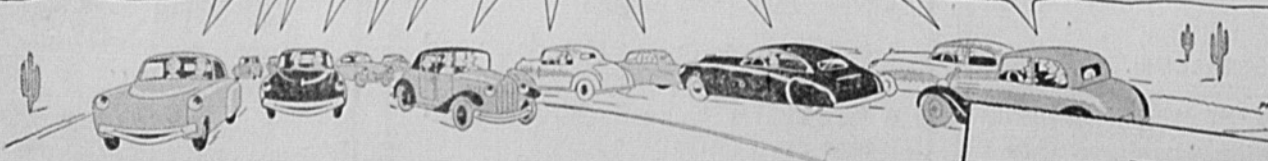

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Industrialization Of Slaton

While Slaton is a small town, and it is more or less unexpected that larger manufacturers would choose it as an advantageous location in which to build a business, there is no reason why it should not be used for such purposes.

The success of the Western Cottonoil Company here, of C. Ayers & Son, Inc., the Union Compress Company, and the Santa Fe Railroad is adequate proof that large industries can live here.

For some manufacturing, a large amount of water is necessary for the making of certain products, and the shortage of water in West Texas would be a drawback to these. However, there are enough other factory-built materials which do not require abundance of water to make it profitable to build such industry in Slaton, because of its lack of traffic congestion and city complications, would be an ideal spot for industrial concerns. And for shipping facilities, Slaton again would be perfect as it is serviced so sufficiently by the railroad.

In order to promote the idea of Slaton becoming an industrial center, some organized study should be made to determine exactly the best possibilities for manufacturing here. After such facts were definitely founded, then publicity should be promoted and published for the benefit of larger concerns which build plants in smaller, more remote locations.

Make Room For The New

Every day of the week from one to five people come to the Slatonite office inquiring about apartments and houses for rent. Far too often these people find it impossible to find a place to live in our city, and they are forced to go to nearby towns to find living quarters.

Many of these people would become permanent citizens of Slaton, but they are unable to make this their home since there are no accommodations here for them. Unless room is made for these newcomers, Slaton will miss the opportunity to add a group of middle classed people to its populace.

Since there are no large manufacturing concerns in particular section of West Texas, there are many salesmen out here who work for eastern companies representing their products. Many of these people do not like living in large cities and often they come to Slaton looking for houses in which to live. Although these people are not the wealthier class, they are the people who trade with the home merchants and they are people who make a small town prosperous. It would be far more beneficial to have this class in Slaton than it would be to have the class that follows oil booms; but unless we make room for those who are trying to move here, Slaton will become a slum for newcomers.

How this thing can be justified and how room can be made for these new citizens is necessarily a large problem for the town to solve. However, many families in town have large homes which are not utilized to the fullest. If such people would make their homes in their houses, they would have both a helpful income each month and also the satisfaction of knowing they are contributing to the welfare of the town.

Another project for the person desiring to invest his money into a productive and sure investment deal would be to build a row of apartments somewhere in Slaton. This method of investing is employed by all the larger cities; but there is no reason why the big demand for homes here, why this could not be profitably used here also.

But something should be done soon to keep new citizens coming into Slaton.

More Paving, Sewage Needed

Last week in the Slatonite "Question of the Week" we asked a few of the citizens whether or not they would be interested in seeing the city enlarge the sewage system and paving program. Most of the answers were given in the affirmative, although not an authentic poll, showed that the townsmen are interested in seeing Slaton grow and progress.

A few people might feel that they do not want to see this extension unless they will personally benefit, since taxes would be increased. This attitude is understandable to some extent, however all civic undertakings would be defeated if enough people felt this way.

It should be remembered in considering such matters is that not matter what particular section is improved, the whole city will benefit. The better the physical set-up of a town, the more prosperous it will become. If a town is neat, clean, comfortable, and sanitary, people will be more interested in moving to make their homes; and it is the populace of a town that makes for the success or failure of the merchants and businessmen.

Slaton is noted for the great amount of paving which has been done during the past few years. Slaton has more paving than any other city in West Texas its size. West Crosby, which was recently paved, is now one of the prettiest streets in Texas. It is a wide spacious street and is lined on both sides with homes.

But paving alone will not keep Slaton growing. Unless sewage is extended into the new residential sections of town, paving cannot continue. In the event that a local election is held to determine whether or not the town will continue paving, it should be the duty of the voting citizens to support such a move. By improving the town, we will improve our possibilities.

Don't Work Here Either

The British election ought to awaken us to one thing. It ought to explode the fallacy in a statement which so many of our conservatives have been repeating. This statement goes something like this: "It's no use. This is headed straight for socialism and there isn't a thing we can do to stop it." The people of Britain have demonstrated that something can be done to stop it, we can stop the socialist in this country, too.

The labor party setback is likely to be permanent. Its defeat in the House of Commons is so small that it cannot go on with its nationalization program and it is doubtful that it will remain long in power without another election. During the past few years they proceeded quite a distance along the road to socialism. In addition to socializing medicine and taking over the Bank of England, they nationalized the coal mines, the electric power, gas, electricity, cables, and wireless. They were in process of nationalizing the steel industry. During the campaign which preceded the election they promised that they were kept in power they would nationalize the sugar industry, the cement industry, all mining in addition to the production and distribution of meat, and all the insurance companies. And if they had been given a green light in the form of a smashing majority in Thursday's election they would have been only the beginning. But they didn't get a majority and they have been stopped in their tracks. If they can command a bare majority in Parliament and postpone another general election is problematic, but it can't

be very long. In any event, they cannot proceed a step further with their nationalization program. — The Southern Weekly.

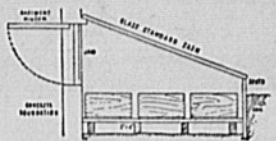

Early Tips For Anxious Gardeners

While winter winds are still howling around the door, enthusiastic gardeners can get a head start on Mother Nature, and insure garden-fresh mature crops ready for the table as much as a month earlier than usual. An easy-to-build basement window hotbed makes this possible, and saves money by allowing the home-growth of plants and sets, ordinarily bought from a nursery.

The window hotbed is simple in construction (as shown in sketch), consisting of glass sash resting

on a wooden frame, backed up against a basement window. Seeds are planted in flats placed under the sash, and the open basement window (must be Southern exposure) provides cellar warmth.

Use of the right type of glass is important in the construction of the frames. Pennvernon glass is one of the best. It transmits sunlight evenly, abundantly and directly, making the hotbed more efficient. Crops that can be started in frames with fine results include: lettuce, cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, tomatoes, peppers, egg plants, muskmelons, summer squashes, celery and cucumbers.

Here's another idea for the gardener who finds time hanging heavy while the ground is still snow or frost-bound. Prepare garden tools for the rigorous usage they'll get during the coming season. A good paint job protects them, and by using different, bright colors, makes them easy to locate against the brown and green of the earth and grass. From a safety angle that's important. It's surprising the number of twisted ankles and bruised shins that result from stumbling over dirt-camouflaged garden equipment.

Also, according to Hayes Quinn, noted color authority for Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company, science has proved that light colors have a tendency to make heavy loads seem lighter. It's worth a try, if a bright yellow wheelbarrow will take pounds off the payload.

These are just a few of the ways gardening can be made easier and safer through the use of

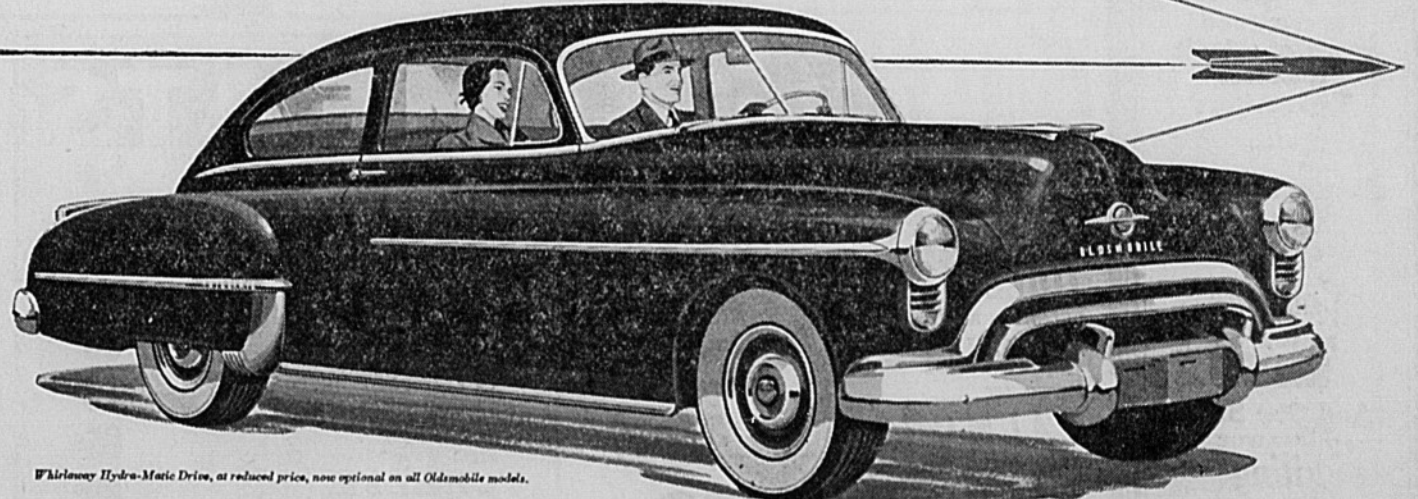

Mrs. A. R. Keys contributed to the Slatonite recipe column this week with a good one for Lemon Souffle Pie, which was our choice of four suggestions she made. They all sounded grand, but since most men love lemon pie, this one is sure to make a hit with everyone.

Ingredients for Mrs. Keys pie call for:
3 egg yolks
¼ cup lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
¼ teaspoon salt
½ cup sugar
½ cup corn syrup
3 tablespoons hot water
3 egg whites
Cook yolks, juice, rind, salt, sugar, syrup and hot water in a double boiler for 15 minutes. Cool

completely and fold into beaten egg whites. Pour in brown pie shell and bake fifteen minutes at about 350 degrees.
According to Mrs. Keys, this pie is appropriate for any occasion and is an especially good party pie. "It is so simple to make," Mrs. Keys explains, "that a person might overlook the most important point—that of allowing the pie filling to cool completely before folding into the beaten egg whites. This is the magic to making this pie really successful."
This wonderful recipe has been a "hand-me-down" for years in Mrs. Keys family. She says her grandmother gave it to her. In the Keys family there are four children, three married

daughters and one son, seventeen-year-old Russel. The daughters are Mrs. Perry Wampler who lives in Clovis, N. M., Mrs. Woody Weaver of Levelland, and Mrs. P. O. Hutchins who lives in Virginia. The Keys live in Slaton at 220 S. 5th Street.
