

The Plains Are Ideal For Dairying

According to belief expressed by Professor F. R. Phillips of the agricultural department of the West Texas Teachers' College, the Plains section is rapidly developing into a dairy country. Mr. Phillips has recently completed a speaking tour of the North Plains in a better-farming cam paign, and a tour of the South Plains.

Concerning the interest shown in dairying, Mr. Phillips had the following to say: "The dairy industry is one of the profits of which cannot beforetold by the use of pencil and paper. The profits are small, but they accumulate every twenty-four hours. There is an English saying which reads, "Take care of the pence and the pounds will take care of themselves." This is true of the dairy business. I have visited many farmers who had cows which returned a very small net profit, but the total of such profits, in many instances, has meant a good bank account where otherwise one would find a bank deficiency or a note.

"Two things have impressed me favorably in regard to the dairy business in West Texas. The first is the sentiment in favor of a Sudan grass pasture in the summer to supplement other pasture. The other thing that has impresed me is the number of farmers who have sown sweet clover for their early spring pasture. It is my prediction that sweet clover and Sudan grass, with a few dairy cows, will revolutionize the farming enterprises of West Texas."-Randall County News.


