**Baptist Workers** 


The Associational Baptist Workers of the Lubbock District met Tuesday, November 12, in the regular monthly meeting at the First Baptist church in this city.



## Been Ginned Here **On Last Saturday**

The six Slaton gins had received 5,042 bales of cotton during this season when a check-up was finished last Saturday. This was a gain of 458 bales over the previous Saturday.

In spite of the delay in cotton picking which has been caused by rain and bad weather during the past two or three weeks, the ginning total is now as great as it was last season on Jan. 26, records show. Early ginnings are due to the summer drouth and hence earlier opening of cotton than is normally seen here.

It is estimated that about 2,000 more bales will be ginned in Slaton JUSTICE OF THE PEACE this season. Three gins at Posey, Union and McClung have received about 3,000 bales so far this Fall.
