THE LURE OF OIL.

With the striking of oil in Slaughter No. 1, in West Cochran county, by the Marland interests, the oil activity in the Plains country was given a boost. From the latest reports, the hole is 4,941 feet, oil was struck in the gray lime formation. It was reported 2,000 feet of oil was in the hole, at that time they were waiting for tankage. Since then, they have drilled on to the above depth, striking a water seam, of sulphur water. This is giving some trouble, and the final outcome cannot be told. All are pleased that oil has been found. The Marland interests have a block of 10,000 acres, and no leases obtainable within two miles. With approximately 200 feet of water in the hole and the lowering of the oil to 1,000 feet they have a problem in casing off the water. We all hope a new field may be opened and a great impetus may come to the South Plains.

WORKER EFFICIENCY.

Studies have been made in late years to determine the loss of efficiency on the part of workers caused by noise and confusion. It is found that stenographers and clerical workers whose windows are open to the din and crash of street traffic in great cities are some 25 per cent less efficient than are the same class of workers who are not subjected to similar

These studies are merely in their infancy. We feel confident that they will eventually disclose some surprising facts. We believe that they will show the extent to which business in the great city is handicapped by the nerve cension of metropolitan life.

To have this graphically illustrated suggest that you watch factory and office workers in a great city on their way home at the end of the working day. At five o'clock they make a mad rush for the subway, the elevated; or the street car. They fight and jostle their way inside, they drop into a seat, if fortunate, and with drooped heads, nervously drawn faces tell of

Two or three hours each day must be spent in fighting traffic jams, erowding into street cars, and enduring in its many forms the terrible noise and confusion of life about them. That such conditions tend to undermine efficiency requires no sci-

This is merely one of many disadvantages faced by the industrial leader who locates his business in the great city. He must also pay his workers for the high living costs that they have to meet. He must undergo the troubles incident to labor employing, he must stand for the extortion of racketeers, and the graft of ward

It is asserted that the next industrial boom in America will take place in the small towns rather than the great cities, and that industrial leaders are discovering many advantages in locating their branch or main plants in small communities like Slaton. We believe that the facts cited above have much influence in furthering this trend.

A WORD TO THE WISE.

"You want to have your earnings and your property secure. You want a free and fair opportunity to conduct your own business and make your way in the world without danger of being overcome by a Government 2 monopoly. When the Government goes into business it lays a tax on everybody else in that business and uses the money that it collects from its competitors to establish a monopoly and drive them out of business. No one can compete. When the Government really starts into a line of business that door of opportunity is closed to the people.
