A field party of the staff started cross sec tion work Monday on Highway 7. This is for the purpose of preparing the work that the next step of letting the contract may be consumated.



ABRAHAM LINCOLN (1809-1865)

A Lincoln's Birthday Thought.

There is always a great element of tragedy in the life of any person, if his career is cut off before he has had a chance to finish his work. If we see some young person cut off in early youth, there is special feelings of regret because of the belief that such a one could have accomplished great things if his life had been continued.

So it is with the great historic character of Abraham Lincoln. His was a case of a great man cut off before his task was finished. While it is a tremendous proposition to be at the head of a nation through any war, yet it requires almost more statesmanship to handle a country through the period following a war. War lets loose a tumult of passions. After the war is over, the most extreme and revengeful elements proceed to work out their bitterness. Whatever ill feeling followed the war between the states, was due far more to the troubles and errors of the reconstruction days, than to any bitterness created by the actual fighting. Mr. Lincoln, as soon as the war was closed, set out to hold these stormy passions of the post-war days in check. He would have worked for a prompt reconciliation between the warring states. The country needed the healing touch of his sympathy and tolerant spirit, and the constructive force of his powerful mind. It was a bitter tragedy that he had to go when his work was only half done

The country has always admired Lincoln, not merely for his statesmanship, but because he set an example to boys and girls of the most humble home. He pulled himself up out of the most obscure surroundings. Any young person who will show equal ambitton and earnestness can likewise clevate himself a long distance above his early environment.


