ORDINANCE. NO.

An Ordinance Regulating the Opera-BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF SLA-TON, TEXAS:

Section 1. The following streets or parts of streets within the Town of Slaton, Texas, are hereby named and designated as constituting the"Business Section"of said town, to-wit: All of that portion of Garza Street between eighth and ninth streets; all that portion of Lubstreets; all that portion of Ninth Street between Garza and Lubbock Streets; all that portion of Eighth Street between Lubbock and Garza Streets; all that portion of Texas Avenue extending from the Public Square to the intersection of Texas Avenue with

Sec. 2. Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to drive or operate or cause to be driven or operated within said Business Section of the Town of Slaton any automobile at a greater rate of speed than fifteen miles an hour.

Sec. 3. Within said Business Section automobiles shall be driven and operated on the right hand side of the street; no automobile shall be turned or cross any of said designated portions of streets for his full and cheerful co operbetween street crossing, but such turn- ation at all times in our school ing shall be made only at street crossings and intersections. Any driver of any automobile desiring to pass another automobile running in same direction, of automobile he desires to pass, he shall signal his intention to the driver of the automobile ahead by blowing his



PAINT AS AN ASSET.

Bankers Say They Lend More Money on Property When Buildings Are Well Painted.

INDICATION OF THRIFT.

One Concern Advances 25 Per Cent. More if Repainting Is Done Every Five Years.

Does it pay to paint carefully farm buildings? Does it add to the selling properly kept up and regularly painted? A careful inquiry of a number of leading bankers in the Mississippi valley, including such states as Iowa, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Missouri, reveals the fact that in nearly every case the bankers did not hesiway from 5 to 50 per cent, more on land where farm buildings were well painted and kept in good condition. It is that in the states where illiteracy is most prevalent paint is least used, paint referred to is the common or barn variety, of course, for the backwoods countries have no need for the finer pigments or facial adornments. It is true, though, that in the sections of all states where white illiteracy is highest painted homes are rare and painted outbuildings and barns are ractically unknown. Probably the illiterates do not use paint on their alldings because they do not understand its value as a preservative.

Road bonds to the amount of \$1,160, 600 were authorized by Hill County voters in a recent election, as follows: Hillsboro district, \$810,000; Itasca district, \$350,000.

ACTION EXPECTED TO PAVE WAY TO SETTLEMENT OF TERRI-TORIAL LAIMS.

BELGIUM IS DISSATISFIED

Paris.-The Italian delegates to the peace conference who left Paris almost abrutly when the members of the council of four representing Great Britain, France and the United States refused to grant Italy's full claims to Fiume and the Dalmation coastal region have been invited to come back to Paris and resume their places in the peace conference.

It is believed the Italians will return to the French capital and that the negotiations of the disputed points will begin again where they were left off.

The invitation of the council of three, in view of the elimination of the personal element in the controversy. will pave the way for a territorial agreement acceptable to Italy.

In Belgium the dissatisfaction over the awards to Belgium has resulted in a petition being presented to King Albert asking him to decline to affix his signature to the peace treaty. The bombs undelivered were addressed to prominent men, including judges and cabinet members, while the six thus far delivered to addresses through the mail, reached the offices or homes of the following:

Former Senator Thomas Hardwick of Georgia, Congressman John L. Burnett of Alabama, Federal Judge K. M. Landis of Chicago, Mayor Ole Hanson of Seattle, United States District Attorney Charles M. Fickert and his assistant, Edward M. Cunha, of San Francisco.

None of these men has been injured by the bombs, but Mrs. Hardwick and a maid were severely hurt. The parcels bore similar mechanisms, arranged to explode on opening, and were sent as "novelty samples" from New York, with a fictitious tag, inenberg, socialist candidate for mayor, dicating that they came from the store of Gimbel Brothers.

The packages found in the New York postoffice were discovered by a mail clerk after reading of the bomb which exploded at the Hardwick home. They had all been held for lack of first class postage.

FARM

PROTECTION OF FEEDER HOGS

Department of Agriculture Conducts System of Vaccination Against Hog Cholera.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture.)

In an effort to protect the swine industry of the country against the possibility of introducing sick hogs into well herds, and at the same time to permit the shipment from stock yards of stocker and feeder hogs, the United States department of agriculture conducts a system of vaccination against cholera as a part of its inspection service at the various stock yard centers. name was there in the handwriting More than 324,000 hogs were immunized for shipment as stockers and feeders from stock yards of 18 cities during the six months from July to December, 1918, inclusive. To accom-

plish this without spreading disease, in the face of all the attendant dangers, required, of course, such close care that the wisdom of some phases of the inspection system may not have been always apparent to all concerned. With swine moving by carloads and

trainloads from producing areas into public stock yards of the country, says the statement, the pens of such yards are inevitably infected with the common swine diseases, of which cholera is the most important. Owing to thiscondition federal regulations formerly required the slaughter of swine received, but after the serum and virus treatment against hog cholera was standardized the possibility of reship ping immature hogs for further feeding resulted in a modification of the rules. Under the plan now in force swine properly vaccinated and disinfected may be reshipped for any purpose, including breeding.

Immunizing hogs against cholera is veterinary procedure, including the preventive-serum treatment, taking of temperatures and observing the condition of the animal during the test period. Necessarily the official regulations are of technical character, and it has come to the attention of the department of agriculture that in some cases the rules have been misinterpreted so as to make them appear responsible for fluctuation in the stock-hog market.

For the information of the public, the bureau of animal industry outlines briefly the method of inspection:

All public stock yards are considered to be infected and swine are, therefore, exposed to the contagion from the time of their entry into the yards; consequently it is important that they be immunized promptly after arrival at such yards, to protect them against contracting the disease.

For that reason the department opposes the immunization of swine that have been so exposed for more than five days. Hogs, though they may not show physical symptoms of cholera, may in some instances be affected with the disease to such an extent that immunization will not protect them.

It is not permissible to immunize swine for immediate shipment interstate if they show symptoms of contagious or infectious disease.

If a considerable percentage of the animals in a lot is found to have hightemperatures, the possible presence of such disease is indicated and the animals are not immunized or permitted to be shipped interstate. It is possible to have hogs with high temperatures as a result of conditions surrounding the shipment to market, in which case they will return to normal within a
