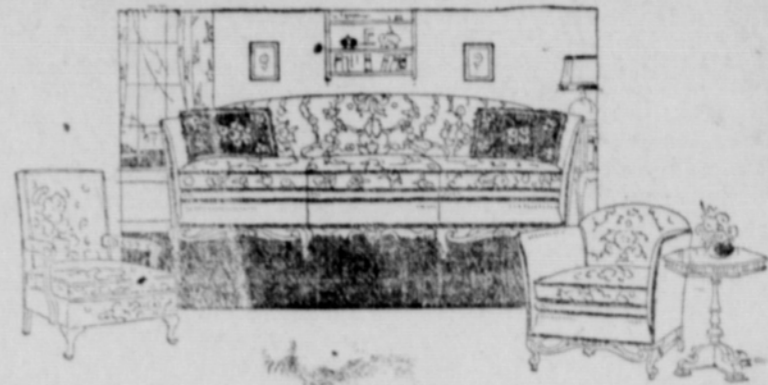

COMMISSION FORM OF GOVERNMENT

Our contemporary, the Times, expresses itself as opposed to the commission form of government for Slaton and towns of similar size, citing as reasons that the commission form is more susceptible to domination by partizan politics and not as democratic as the aldermanic form. Also, that there is too much appointive power in the commissioners.

To the informed none of the reasons assigned can hold good. The mayor and commissioners under the commission form of government are elected by the people at the ballot box. Therefore, there can be no more room for partizan politics than in the aldermanic form, for aldermen are elected in the same manner. Also, whatever officers of a city that are not elected must be appointed, and the aldermen would be obliged to do the appointing which is now done by the mayor and commissioners. The change would make no difference in the appointive offices. The same people who would elect aldermen elect the commissioners. It is entirely democratic.

One of the curses of modern day life is the excessive number of officers and laws to control the people. The tendency is away from all this, and the more progressive cities are reducing the number of their governing bodies as much as possible. Some have just one man, a city manager, and the plan is a great success. It is better to have a very few competent, responsible persons to run the city's affairs and pay them something for their time and services than to have a large number, receiving nothing, incompetent and indifferent.

Give us fewer and better officers and fewer and better laws.

er but in any event he puts up to them a puzzle worthy of their fullest consideration. That is not ordinarily a fatal malady does not make the hay fever problem less important. The fact that it seemingly is such a simple and more or less harmless affliction makes it seem that the answer to the problem should be easy to discover. Seemingly of a nature to influenza, it is not so often fatal, but it causes a great amount of suffering each year.

The very mysteriousness of the disease should be a sufficient motive to cause some physicians to determine to conquer it.

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HOGGING PARKING SPACE

Once again The Slaton Slatonite feels it proper to call attention to a matter that needs calling attention to. It is the matter of hogging parking space along the curbs in the city.

There is need for more parking space for automobiles in Slaton, and this need can be met in a measure by every person being considerate of others. Some cities force this consideration for others by passing parking ordinances compelling a driver, under penalty of fine, to park his car according to certain marks made on the curb, the object being to compel him to park close to other cars so that parking space will not be wasted. Slaton should have such an ordinance now. We urge our city officials to pass one.

Most people are considerate of others, but some just do not care. We see two cars parked, with space between them for two more cars, and then some thoughtless driver turns in to the curb right in the middle of that space, and thus his car takes up as much space as two cars need. It is thoughtlessness, mostly, but the result in every case is the same—hogging space—and inconvenience to others.

How many times have you yourself hogged parking space? And how often have you come to town looking for a place to park at the curb and lamented the fact that so much space is wasted, yet at no place a spot quite wide enough for your own car? Think it over, and begin to set a worthy example to others in this respect.

SUICIDE IS CONFESSION

Over at Los Angeles, in California, a city that seems to rival Chicago in the number of crimes committed, comes the story of a man who murdered his wife. Just what his motive was is not disclosed, but it is certain that the gentleman in choosing this particular method of ending his marital happiness, or misery, as the case may have been, thought he could escape punishment.

He was under suspicion, however, and that suspicion had gone so far as to land the gentleman in a jail cell. There he had nothing to do except to think over his life and his deeds. Solitude is a splendid thing—sometimes—and under proper circumstances. Ruskin says talents are best nurtured in solitude.

But when one is in solitude and in his soul is a great, poisonous secret, thoughts soon drift into a state of brooding. And while brooding progresses the secret grows and grows and grows, until at last it is the biggest thing in the man's mind, and finally becomes the only thing upon which he can center his thoughts. The secret becomes his master, destroys his discretion, paralyzes his judgment, and begins with irresistible force to seek expression, to burst forth and make itself known to the world.

There are some things that were not intended to find a lodging place in one's soul. Guilt is one of them. Guilt is the greatest tatter in the world. It wants to proclaim its deeds and eventually it will proclaim them.

The Los Angeles wife killer found it so. He had to confess, yet he would not. There was no other way out but to confess. He would not confess, but he did this, as an alternative: He took a small wire from a radio set that had been installed in his cell to furnish him amusement, tied the wire about his throat, placed a turniket in the wire and twisted untill the wire cut deep into the flesh and strangled him, and he died—he confessed, for, as Daniel Webster puts it, "Suicide is Confession."

Truly, Guilt is a strange, hard, inexorable master!

THEIR SERVICE

RECORD LIVES ON

Two men prominent in world affairs have passed away. One a leader of organized labor, the other the head of one of the world's greatest railroad systems.

Both rose to commanding positions by hard work and ability.

One, after 20 years as a locomotive engineer was made president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. He opened the eyes of labor to the possibilities of using its financial resources in the banking business. He was labor's first banker and labor's

greatest banker. Warren Stone would have made a success in any calling.

Julius Kruttschnitt was a railroad genius and an exceptional scholar. He was a walking encyclopedia on rail and transportation questions, and actually gave his life to upbuilding a railroad system. He was the dean of American railroad executives.

It is hard to replace such characters, and the mere fact that they lived and carried on means that they transmitted their spirit of endeavor to others who will make even greater strides in the interest of the public welfare as the result of the training they secured under such master minds.

CHILDREN AND DOGS

The average child is fond of his dog. There is something wrong with a boy who does not like a good dog. There is something, to our notion, wrong with any person who has not in his being a welcome for his faithful canine friend.

But now and then the dog is a source of danger. Word comes from Houston of eleven people being bitten by a mad dog. One dog bit nine persons. Most of the eleven were children. Investigation disclosed the fact that the dogs were afflicted with rabies.

TOO MUCH IS TOO MUCH

The Lubbock Avalanche is now publishing the daily seven days in the week, thereby showing its enterprise and energy. It is all the daily paper of the South Plains of Texas needs, all it wants and all it is able to support.

Yet announcement goes that Lubbock is soon to have another daily newspaper. Just what the reason is has not been disclosed, but it would take some exceedingly big reasons to appear to a business man's judgment. There is not room in Lubbock or on the South Plains for two daily newspapers. There is no necessity for another daily at this time, the people do not want it, and will not support it. If it gets any support at all it will to a certain extent be to the detriment of the daily now in existence, and the people would rather have one good daily than two or more excuses.

ARE YOU ONE OF THEM?

Are you one of those persons who borrows things from your neighbors and friends and then just neglect to return them? If you are not, then you are one person in fifty.

Even people claiming to be well bred have that reprehensible habit. The crime is not in borrowing, but in not promptly returning what you borrow.

If your friend or neighbor flatly refused to lend to you, that would make you peeved, wouldn't it? Dear reader, it would. It would make you boiling mad and you would probably fall out with that friend and say many mean things about him or her.

Isn't it funny the way we humans are put together?

You know, your friends are generally much more considerate than you are, for they feel a hesitancy about mentioning to you your dereliction. They just hate to ask you to bring home that book, or hammer or saw, or eggs, butter, coffee, hoe, rake, lawn mower, ladder, or some other trifling article that you borrowed weeks or months ago. It is a trifling matter, and for that reason they refrain from mentioning it. Perhaps for the same reason you think it perfectly all right just to go on neglecting to return the borrowed article. But trifling things make up life and it is by trifling things that people are judged.

To lend is an act of friendship. Unworthy, indeed, is the person who violates friendship by imposing on one's friends.

It is a mighty good plan never to borrow except in cases of necessity, and when you do borrow, if you are not sufficiently well bred to remember to return what you borrow, then for the sake of common courtesy and ordinary decency, and in the name of honesty, return it—promptly!

VIEWPOINTS

One of the chief differences in men is the difference in their viewpoints. Change in one's viewpoints often works a revolution in his life.

The difference between a grouchy person and one of even temper is generally the difference in the way they look at things.

Some people are inclined to hate all others who do not see things just as they do—do not share the same viewpoint.

We have known people belonging to a certain church denomination who actually believed everybody else was going to hell—because of their viewpoints.

It is a very common trait for folks to believe that everyone who does not agree with his view of things is wrong.

That makes it certain that if you are right the vast majority of the world are wrong. That forces the conclusion that the chances are in the majority that your present viewpoint is wrong.

Two men view and study the same thing, or the same set of principles, or the same way of doing a thing. One is optimistic over the proposition, the other is pessimistic. It's just a difference in their viewpoints.

Much depends upon a man's viewpoint as affecting his own happiness and success.

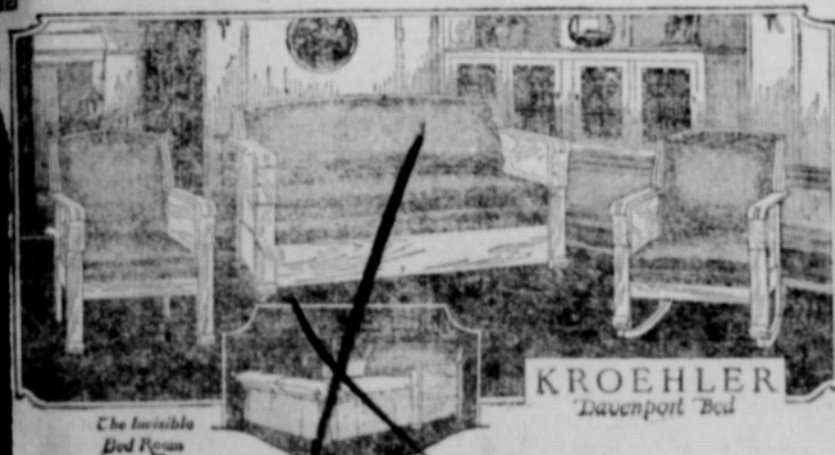
