## Democratic Convention Call Issued

Lubbock county Democrats, meeting Saturday at their voting boxes in precinct convention, will name delegates to the county convention at the courthouse Tuesday, May 10.

Official call for the county meeting, which will name representatives to the state convlay, has been issued by Chairman J. K. Wester. Each precinct except five in the county will be entitled to one delegate at the May 10 meeting. Precinct No. 1 of Lubbock is entitled to 17 votes; No. 4 of Lubbock to four; No. 18 of Idalou to two; No. 24 of Slaton to four; and No. 27 of Lubbock to five. The meeting opens at 2 p. m.

Ratio One To 25  
Representation is based on number of voters for governor in the last general election in each precinct, the ratio being one delegate to 25 votes cast for governor, said Mr. Wester.

At the state convention, the chairman pointed out, delegates to the national convention, which nominates candidates for president and vice president, are named.

"All Democrats may participate in the primary convention who are qualified voters under Texas laws and who will subscribe to the following pledge, 'I hereby pledge myself to support the nominees of the Democratic party for president and vice president of the United States by voting for the Democratic electors of the state of Texas,'" Mr. Wester ruled.

"Let each precinct be represented in the county convention at Lubbock," the chairman urged. "I hope the Democrats of the county will take an interest in these primary conventions and turn out and organize and elect delegates to the county convention. We hope the Democrats, not only in Lubbock, but also throughout the United States, will unite, bury their differences, and nominate a good man, who has the interest of the people at heart; and if we are united we can elect him. Lubbock county is a good place in which to start."

The pledge which Mr. Wester mentioned was adopted by the state Democratic executive committee, was sustained by the Texas supreme court, and was endorsed by the Lubbock county executive committee.

## Former Slaton Man Died At Lasara

Word has just been received of the death of one of Slaton's pioneer citizens, Andrew M. Watson, who resided in Lasara, Texas, at the time of his death a few weeks ago. Mr. Watson, who was once well known here, and whose many friends will feel sorrow at his passing, was the first to be buried in the new cemetery at Lasara, the securing of which had been one of the main objectives during the past few weeks of his life.

Mr. Watson was born in Hartwell, Georgia. He lived in Slaton for a number of years when Slaton was in its infancy. He moved to the Rio Grande Valley six years ago.

Mr. Watson was one of Lasara's most prominent and progressive citizens. He bought and ran the first store at Lasara; he built the first brick and tile building of the town; and he built and equipped the first cafe and shop and garage. He was first postmaster, and served in that capacity until his death.

His friends in the border towns were numbered by scores. Many Spanish and Mexican people came to pay their last respects to him, and to offer their services to the family.

He is survived by his widow, two sons, James O. of Chicago, and Dale, of Lasara; and three daughter, Mrs. D. H. Suite of Phoenix, Arizona, Mrs. Robert L. Sledge, of San Antonio, and Miss Fern Watson, of Lasara.

Unofficially it was reported that the superintendent's salary was cut from \$2,550 to \$2,000 a year, and that teacher's salaries of \$100 were whittled to \$85, and of \$85 to \$75.

## "Arsene Lupin" Clever Mystery Film Here Soon

John and Lionel Barrymore as Thief and Detective of Sleuth Drama

An auspicious event of the 1932 screen season is the opening Sunday at the Palace Theatre of "Arsene Lupin," presenting John Barrymore and Lionel Barrymore in the first joint appearance of the celebrated stars in a motion picture. Karen Morley, John Miljan and Tully Marshall have important supporting roles in the production, which was directed by Jack Conway, who last scored with "Paid."

The well-known mystery stories of Maurice Le Blanc which idealize the debonair French thief, Arsene Lupin, supplied the motivation for the first appearance together of the two Barrymore brothers, although the picture is more directly based on the Paris stage success on which Le Blanc collaborated with Francis de Croisset.

### Has Sophisticated Humor

The screen version, which is said to be concerned as much with sophisticated humor as with the unwinding of the clever mysteries perpetuated by the master thief of Paris, also emphasizes the romantic love affair between John Barrymore as the thief and Miss Morley as the police spy who poses as a countess in order to track down the elusive drawing room criminal, but subsequently endangers her reputation in order to protect the charming robber.

Lionel Barrymore's role as the detective is said to outshine even his effective work in "Mata Hari" and "A Free Soul," and it is his oft-baffled attempts to catch the gentleman-thief, who resorts to the most amazing disguises and tricks to elude detection, that results in most of the picture's dramatic moments.

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**THE B. C. D. ELECTION**

By the narrow margin of nine votes out of 410 the people of Slaton decided to continue the Board of City Development. The narrow margin in favor gives no ground for gloating over the result. Gloating does no good. There has been too much of it. The very narrow margin gives those who lost no cause for repining. There has been too much repining. It does no good.

And, too, the B. C. D. should take warning. Neither that organization nor any other supported by public taxation should be retained or continued a minute longer than it justifies its existence by its fruits, and by its fruits it is going to be judged. The purpose of the B. C. D. is not to afford an easy seat at the public pie counter. It is designed only for strenuous service, and only in proportion that it serves and gets results sufficient to justify its cost can its existence be justified on any ground.

Those elected as members of the B. C. D. and those conducting its activities are charged with a public trust. The principle underlying the organization is sound, but its efficiency can be nil. The vote last week was a warning. Those who advocated abolishing the Board were, without doubt, sincere, as were those who fought to save it. The fight was wholesome, and if looked upon in the proper spirit, and with a sane attitude, will result only in good for Slaton. It has focused attention on the organization. Slaton people are now better acquainted with its work, its object and its purpose. It is well that the matter was brought into the limelight.

Furthermore, we saw no evidence of ill feeling during the period of the contest, on election day, or since. That was all as it should be, and evidences that Slaton is making progress toward sanity. There were rumors, it is true, that the petition for the election was insufficient in that it bore many names of persons who were not residents of Slaton at the time the petition was acted on and the election ordered. However, while the Slatonite fought for retention of the Board, it did not choose to raise matters that might seem technical. We welcomed the opportunity for the people to vote on the merits of the B. C. D. We welcomed the opportunity for citizens of Slaton to become better acquainted with their own home town. We believe such education was needful and that it was profitable.

We hope that the future work and accomplishments of the Board will justify the action of the voters in retaining it. Whether the result of the election was what it should have been only time can tell, and it will be up to the Board in the future to enable those who fought for its life to justify the wisdom of the course. But not entirely up to the Board, because with public hostility and lack of public cooperation that Board nor any other can make headway. Every citizen of the town has the same interest that we have. The Board is a Slaton institution, of, by and for the whole Slaton territory. It works for Slaton, craves harmony and requires our cooperation. Let us pull together. Let each refrain from doing and saying those things that injure, hold back and handicap our very excellent little city. There is nothing to be gained by any such course, and harm is certain to result, to each individual and to the entire community.

**MOTHERS' DAY**

Next Sunday, May 8th, is Mothers' Day. It is a day unofficially set apart and voluntarily observed by all right thinking and duly appreciative people out of respect to motherhood in general, and to each individual's mother in particular.

The world scarcely knows or is able to calculate what it owes to the mothers of men. Few children know or are able to calculate or fully appreciate the magnitude and extent of the debt they owe to their mothers. It is safe to say that, with the rarest of exceptions, no boy or girl would go astray if he or she followed the counsels and admonitions of mother. There is no sacrifice a true mother will not make

It is fitting and proper that the world should set apart one day in the year and dedicate it as Mothers' Day. Father and husband supports the home, but it is Mother who makes and maintains the home. It is mother who comes most intimately in contact with the children, and as a consequence has the bigger responsibility in moulding their characters, just as she generally has the great influence. "The hand that rocks the cradle rules the world." Man's ingenuity has found substitutes for virtually everything in life, but no substitute has ever been found, or will ever be found, for a good mother. There is no calamity can befall one so great as being bereft of the influence, counsels and companionship of a good mother. Without the influence of mother, man would be a savage. Art has not been able to produce a painting so beautiful, so sublime, so appealing, as Mother with her child in her arms. Motherhood, and the spirit, goodness and benevolence of motherhood, furnishes to man his most definite conception of Heaven. If no spirit save that typified by the noblest aspirations of motherhood ruled the earth, mankind could conceive of no world, place or condition more heavenly, more perfect or more desirable.

Mother, we salute thee! Motherhood, we bow down in awe and reverence before thee; we offer up to thee our respect, our homage and our veneration!

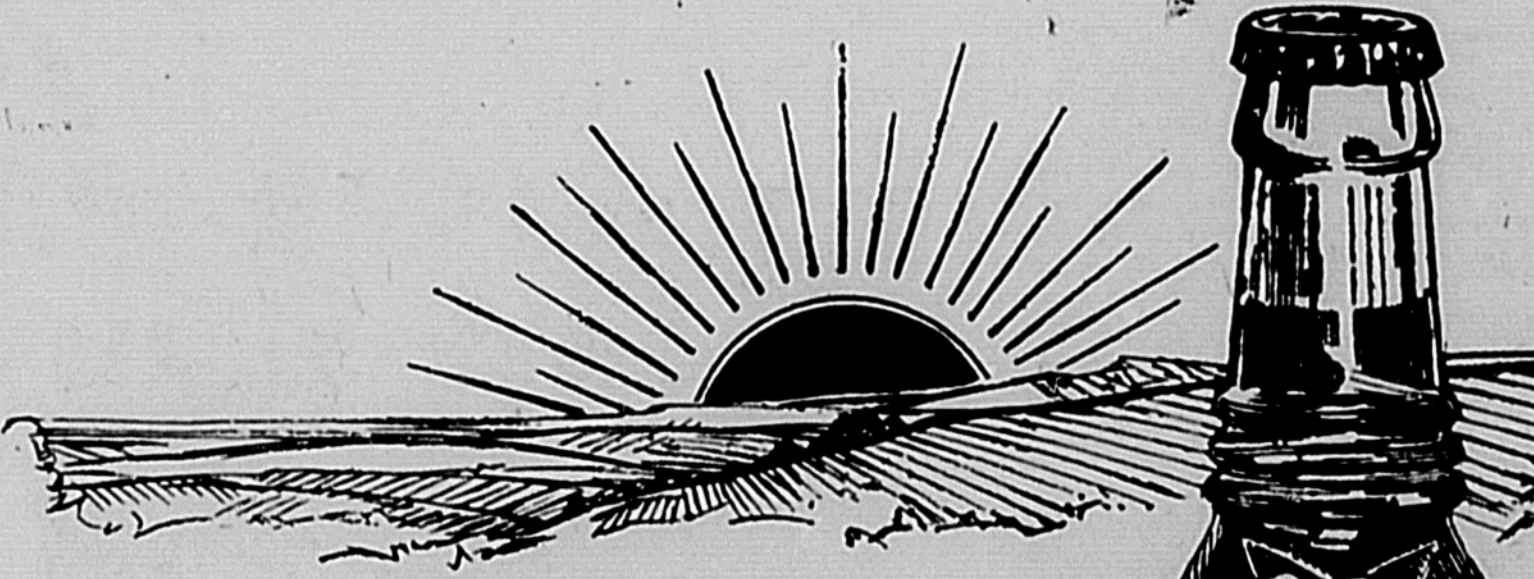
