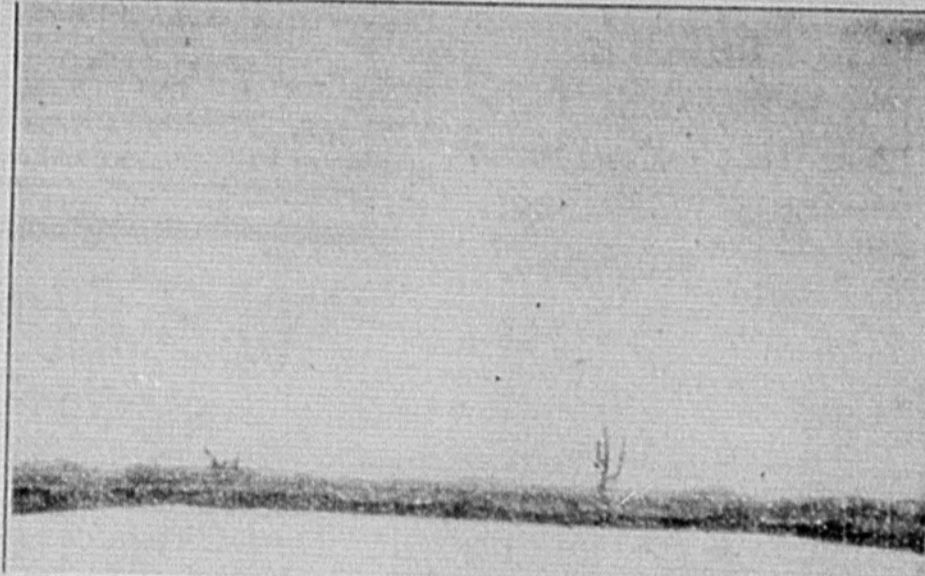

Murals Are Smart Artists Do Original Paintings At Slatonite

"Murals are smart," said a recent magazine article, and so when the Slatonite Editor threatened to clean up, and paint up the gloomy office of the local sheet, two members of the local art club proposed a series of murals around the walls of the office. Miss Cordelia Grantham has completed two panels in the style of the Southwestern semi-arid section of Texas and New Mexico.

Low, rolling hills lend distance to the narrow room, cactus and other western plant life give refreshing color to the foreground. Cloud formations sketched from the windows give a lightness and airiness to the work that are most effective on any day. The engraving shown here of one panel of the work does poor justice to it since black and white photography can not in any measure show the colorful painting Miss Grantham has done.

Mrs. C. F. Anderson has in process a panel of the room where she is doing reproduction of an original sketch of a scene in the Yellowstone Canyon near Slaton. Between bold prominences of the caprock a vista of the canyon is seen where lies the Santa Fe tracks. The green of juniper and algarita show on the

rough peaks and on the steep slopes that fall away to the floor of the canyon. The artist was pleased to catch in the scene the Santa Fe's Number 91, The Texan, limited flyer from California to Galveston. Beyond the railroad and toward the caprock to the north lie the rich farms of the "breaks" surrounded by the rougher grazing lands of the ranches. All in tiny patterns blending into the dimness of the distance.

Though not yet finished, the decorations are being seen by scores of visitors who are liberal in their compliments of the unusual and original thought and work that make the place of business a distinctive contribution to the town and community.

Christian Church Rapidly Going Up New Structure Fruit Of Years Of Planning

The Christian Church building at the corner of Eighth and Lubbock is looming up on the east Slaton skyline as the roof is being completed this week. The building, a completion of the basement structure started fifteen years ago, is a joyful achievement to the members of the local congregation who have been faithful to the hope of this accomplishment for many years.

The outside measurements of the church are 40 x 70 feet. The new walls are being built ten feet above the concrete sub-construction which makes the eaves sixteen feet above the ground. A shingle roof gives assurance of twenty years of service. Broad, gentle concrete terraces lead up to the front door, and down into the basement which will be used for Sunday School and other church activities.

The new construction will provide an auditorium, capable of seating three hundred with ease, and chairs placed in aisles will accommodate 150 more. At either side of the entrance are commodious cloak-rooms, and at the west, or chapel end, are pastor's study and church office.

A four-foot wainscot of tile board is planned as interior finish in the auditorium, above which the wall will be celled and papered. The overhead ceiling will be done in celotex of some approved pattern for appearance and acoustic qualities.

P. M. Porter is chairman of the building committee and is leading the church in the undertaking that is showing up so splendidly. Other members of the committee are J. G. Wilhite, H. H. Edmondson, A. H. Shelton, H. S. Crews, E. A. Gentry, J. D. Norris.

Improved Uniform International SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By HAROLD L. LUNDQUIST, D. D., Dean of The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago. (Released by Western Newspaper Union.)

PAUL SOLVES CHURCH PROBLEMS

LESSON TEXT - I Corinthians 1:1-3, 10, 11; 4:14-21; I Thessalonians 5:12-15. GOLDEN TEXT - Only let your conversation be as it becometh the gospel of Christ. - Philippians 1:27.

Victory over the destructive powers of sickness is achieved by an orderly attack of the problem. The doctor first makes a study of the condition of his patient, observing not only the outward symptoms, but the general condition of the body. He proceeds to isolate and identify the evil forces which are causing the disease, and then he is ready to apply his curative remedies and procedures.

The Church is sick today even as it was in Paul's day. We are in need of the sound advice and the effective example of "Doctor Paul" and therefore do well to apply to ourselves and to our churches the lesson of today. As we do this honestly we may find in ourselves that which is making our own church weak and ineffective. Let us apply the cure even though the process of healing may be a painful one.

I. The Condition. What's wrong with the Church? The excerpts from the letters of Paul which make up our lesson reveal three fundamental difficulties which exist in essentially the same form today.

1. False Teachers (Gal. 3). This passage is a part of our lesson although not included in the printed portion. It tells us of Paul's mastery dealing with false teachers. Erroneous teaching and the substitution of the philosophies of men for the Word of God are responsible for much of the trouble in the Church. It is decidedly not a matter of indifference what your pastor teaches, what your Sunday School lesson helps teach, and what your Sunday School teachers present to their classes.

2. Divisions (I Cor. 1:10). Sometimes these occur over doctrine, sometimes over church procedure, but all too often over the most insignificant things. Frequently they center around personal likes and dislikes. Cliques and little closed groups have no place in the Church. Man-worship in place of the worship of God will also wreck a church.

3. Contentions (I Cor. 1:11). For some unexplainable reason the people who love a fight seem to want to do their fighting in the Church.

II. The Cause. The internal troubles of the Church cannot be blamed on its testimony or on its responsibility in the world, and certainly not on its Lord. The real cause of the Church's problems will be found in men and women who are not living as they should.

1. The Contentious (I Cor. 1:11). These are the fighters. 2. The Puffed Up (I Cor. 4:18). They have an exaggerated idea of their own importance. 3. The Disorderly (I Thess. 4:14). Unruly and erratic folk trouble the Church. 4. The Faint-Hearted (I Thess. 5:14, R.V.). Timid and uncertain individuals limit and hinder God's work. 5. The Weak (I Thess. 5:14). They are feeble in spiritual insight and power.

III. The Cure. Diagnosis and location of the cause of a disease is practically useless unless a course of treatment is carried out. Consider the steps in the treatment of the sickness of the Church and then apply the remedy. 1. Remember that it is a "church of God" (I Cor. 1:2). 2. Recall and follow the true teaching of God's Word (I Cor. 4:17).

3. Receive grace and peace from the Father and the Son (I Cor. 1:3). 4. Recognize those appointed by the Lord to be over the church as leaders and teachers (I Thess. 5:12-16). 5. Be ashamed of ungodly misbehavior (I Cor. 4:14). 6. Deal plainly with sin and disorder (I Cor. 4:21). The knife of the surgeon may cause pain but it is often the way to healing. 7. Warn those who are unruly (I Thess. 5:14). The word of spiritual admonition is too often lacking in the church.

8. Comfort and encourage the faint-hearted (I Thess. 5:14). Unregenerate man has no patience with such folk, but God does. A note of encouragement needs to be stressed in these trying days. 9. Be patient toward all men (I Thess. 5:15). If you feel that you must be impatient, be impatient with your own faults. Patience is a Christian virtue which has almost been lost in the dizzy, high-pressure age in which we live. Let us cultivate it both in the church and in the hearts of believers.
