#### USE NITROGLYCERINE TO OPEN STORE SAFE

The Texas Grocery store owned and operated by H. G. Sanders, on W. Garza street, was burglarized Sunday night, the loss amounting to approximately \$200.

The burglars gained entrance to the safe by using nitroglycerine, it is believed. A hole was drilled in the locking device just above the combination. Through this hole the fuse entered and the charge blew the combination out and wrecked the door of the safe.

From the safe more than \$100.00 in further delay the movement of the thousand cigarettes were taken. The getaway but left some valuable clues according to a statement by Chief Tom Abel.

Entrance to the store was made by breaking a skylight just above the awning in front of the store. Exit was made by way of the back door. Apparently there were no eye witnesses to the shootng which took place in Dr. Adams' office. 


