## MOODY MAINTAINS HEAVY LEAD OVER OPPONENTS

### Bud Johnston Piles Up Heavy Lead In Race For Sheriff

#### BRADLEY LEADS FOR DISTRICT ATTORNEY; WITCHER IS SECOND

RUN-OFF APPEARS CERTAIN WITH RETURNS NOT YET COMPLETE

#### HIS LEAD ASSURED

#### MOODY CARRIES COUNTY STRONG; DAVIDSON SECOND

While it is not possible to name all of the successful candidates in Lubbock county at the time this story is being written (3 a. m. Sunday) incomplete tabulations indicate that H. L. (Bud) Johnston, will lead all his opponents with plenty of votes to spare. Of course a run-off will likely follow as he would have to make even greater gains to avoid this.

Incomplete returns from 17 of the 26 boxes in the county give Sheriff Johnston 2,018 votes, while his nearest opponent has only 1,162 votes to his credit.

The district attorney's race, also one of the most hotly contested campaigns ever waged in this county will result in a second primary unless Mr. Bradley, the leading candidate, makes some very large gains as other boxes are heard from. Mr. Bradley led the ticket in Lubbock and in most Lubbock county boxes as well as in several out-of-county boxes. Mr. Witcher polled a good vote in Lubbock county, carried Ralls with an excess of votes and captured his share in both Cochran and Hockley counties.

Of course there are many precincts to be heard from and Mr. McWhorter has a chance to forge ahead and capture second place, though this does not seem likely at this time.

In the district clerk's race it seems that Louie Moore will be defeated by his opponent, Miss Flora Green. He is quite a little behind, but should he carry two or three large boxes he would have a chance to win.

Dan Moody captured a safe majority over all his opponents and it is thought this will be true when all the votes are counted. Mrs. Ferguson carried only one box in the county, Woodrow.

A message from Slaton at 3:15 stated that Moody was leading all his opponents at that place, and that Alred was given a hearty vote for attorney general. Marrs led his opponents in the contest for superintendent of public instruction.

Witcher carried Slaton in the race for district attorney, his vote being 443. Bradley was second. Howard was first in the county attorney contest with Wilson second.

Tom Able was first in the sheriff's race, with Bud Johnston second and Holcomb third.

Burns and Payne, candidates for assessor divided the vote pretty well with Burns slightly ahead. Pevehouse polled a considerably larger vote than Brown.

Pinkston, it seems, will be elected commissioner.

#### BIG VOTE IS CAST

#### YOUNG ATTORNEY GENERAL SWEEPS TEXAS ELECTION

DALLAS, Tex., July 25.—Whether Moody for governor will have a clean majority over all five opponents or whether he will go into the August run off primary with Governor Miriam A. Ferguson was in doubt when the Texas Election Bureau suspended tabulation of returns at 1:30 Sunday morning.

Early in the night Moody maintained a growing lead over the opposition field but this shrank to less than a thousand shortly after midnight and finally disappeared. The Ferguson vote is noted for coming strong after midnight on election night.

Later returns will determine the high pair of the attorney general's race. The three candidates are running close, Alred, Brachfield and Pollard.

Marrs apparently has a safe lead over his two opponents for superintendent of public instruction.

Hatcher and Ball seem certain of going into the run off for state treasurer.

For railroad commissioner indications seem to favor a majority for Terrell over his two opponents.

Terrell for commissioner of agriculture, Robison for land commissioner, and Hawkins for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals have apparently safe leads.

In the Republican primary, scattering returns received at republican headquarters gave Haines 3084 and Scott 492. Bureau totals gave Haines 2194 and Scott 1825.

More counties reported and more votes were tabulated on election night than in any previous July primary. The highest previous July election night totals were in July 1924 when it reached 180,582. This time it reached 319,809.

To have them feel that way above it is worth more to you than winning the office.

It is a virtue to be able to forget the unpleasant in life. In fact, it tends to lengthen life in one who develop such a temperament. We are never so happy as when we feel ourselves entirely at peace with God and our fellow man. We lack much of being happy when we fail to feel so at peace.

He who is a good forgetter of unpleasant things is always a good rememberer of things that are good, wholesome and pleasant.

In a wonderfully big sense that is what life is—a forgetting of the bad and a remembering of the good. It is the foundation of a happy life; it is essential to a successful life; it is indispensable to a useful life.

Life is too serious to harbor hate; too short to practice revenge; too full of worthy things to concentrate on the unworthy; too full of opportunities for noble, honorable deeds to permit one to stoop to anything that is ignoble and dishonorable.

The past few days rumors have been floating about Slaton that it was the purpose and plan of the managers of the Slaton fair to hold the fair this year in Santa Fe Park out in the residential district.

We hope this rumor is wholly false. We believe that it is, because it would be very unwise to hold a fair in that park.

It would not be fair to those who reside in that vicinity, and anyone who stands for fair play will oppose holding it there.

The park is public property that would be greatly damaged by turning it into a fair ground.

The young grass would suffer. The trees would be damaged.

A nuisance would be placed under the noses of citizens residing in the vicinity of the park if any livestock was placed on exhibition in the park.

Another nuisance would be created by giving a permit to a cheap carnival company to carry on in the residential district. No carnival ever came or was ever brought to Slaton that was not a nuisance and an insult to the morals of the community, even when placed far from any residential section.

To permit a cheap, immoral carnival of gamblers and lewdness to squat in our best public park to prey upon the people would be an outrage to the citizenship of this community—leastwise, to the self-respecting citizenship.

We predict that such nuisances will not be foisted on the people living in the vicinity of Santa Fe Park.

And if it is, that it will be at the end of some well fought litigation.

The City Commission of the City of Slaton could render a real service

He remarked that we had to have these county officers whether we wanted them or not, and that all of them were necessary, whether we thought so or not. In fact, we cannot recall anything just now he didn't promise. If his vote had been in proportion to his promises he should have received a majority, rendering a second primary unnecessary. Yet, it now looks like he has played pigtail to the whole bunch. It's just too bad. Too bad! Too bad!

Hurrah for the land of the free!

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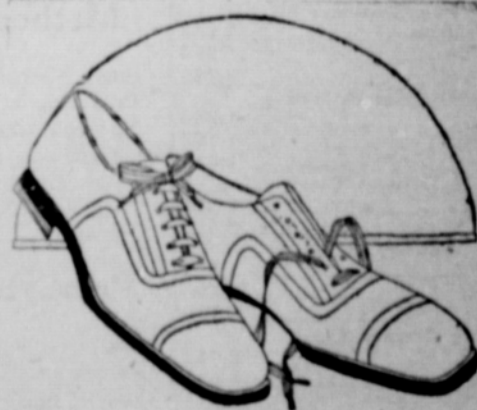
