### Local Bank Increase Over \$1 Million Each

Late cotton harvest, cattle activity and industrial growth have all contributed to the increase in deposits at the local banks. Bank calls dated March 28, show over a million dollar increase at both the Muleshoe State Bank and First National

At Muleshoe State Bank, total assets of the bank increased \$1,822,969.16 over the 12 month period and the total deposits increased from \$9,185,899.66 to \$10,877,618.54 in 1973 for a total increase of \$1,693,718.88.

At first National Bank, total assets increased from \$10,212, 618.64 in 1972 to \$11,567,988.62 in 1973 for a total increase of \$1,355,369.98. Deposits at the bank also in-

creased from \$9,111,232.31 at the same time last year to \$10,411,198.55 this year for an increase of \$1,299,966.24.

McCarty attributed this growth to continued confidence in the Citizens State Bank and to the economic growth of the area. He said "Of course, you would expect the banks deposit to increase somewhat due to the period of inflation our economy has experienced during the past year, but that inflation rate is no where near 34.4 per cent. 





The High Court turned down an appeal of a Dallas Lawyer who lost his license after a jury found he asked a client for \$500 more than his legal fee, allegedly to prosecute an assistant district attorney.

The Supreme Court set a hearing April 25 over whether Austin could sell 32 acres of park land to a school district without an approving vote of local residents.

The Court of Criminal Appeals overturned convictions for sale of heroin (an 1,800 year sentence from Ector County) and possession of marijuana (25 year sentence from Tarrant County) due to judicial er-

A Lipscomb County youth ordered fined and jailed for aggravated assault on a deputy sheriff he called a "pig" won a new trial on appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals, which held the boy's contention that he was resisting what he considered unlawful arrest should have been presented to the trial jury:





### Lloyd Bentsen

Lloyd Bentsen today said a public admission by the postmaster general, that mail service has 'deteriorated seriously' in recent weeks was a "refreshing bit of candor.'

But Bentsen, awaiting results of a General Accounting Office investigation he ordered into mail delivery in Texas, added "I'm afraid this moment of candor will be lost in the fog of postal service propaganda with which we are constantly bom-

"The mass media are filled with so-called public service announcements, telling us what a great job the postal service "We hear reports that the

postal service spent almost \$300,000 on mailings to businessmen, trying to persuade them to use air mail," Bentsen Senator Bentsen said he con-

tinues to receive disturbing reports from Texas about deterioration of mail service. He cited one instance in which a public service announcement from the postal service mailed to a Texas radio station for use on January 4, did not arrive until January 6.

"And I constantly receive complaints from our dedicated postal workers, and from others, regarding horror stories of managerial ineptness and confusion within the postal operation," he said.

As an expample, he pointed out the recent revelation by Congressional investigators that the postal service plans to scrap most of an estimated \$18 million worth of equipment at a processing center in Kearny,






