Local Bank Deposits Show Increase

Rhonda King Wins Local Spelling Bee

Local Bank Increase Over \$1 Million Each

Winner Will Advance To Regional Bee

The annual Bailey County Spelling Bee was held Wednesday, April 4, in the Muleshoe High School auditorium. Winning first place this year was last year's runner-up, Rhonda King. The second place winner was Jarroll Layton, last year's county champion.

Rhonda spelled the word grievance correctly after Jarroll misspelled it and then spelled groceries to become the winner. Rhonda is a Muleshoe Junior High seventh grader and is the 12 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle King of Muleshoe. She has participated in the county Spelling Bee in the fifth, sixth, and seventh grades. She was the school winner in the fifth grade, second place winner in the County Bee last year and champion this year.

Rhonda will represent Bailey County at the Regional Spelling Bee in Lubbock on Saturday, April 14, at the Smiley Wilson Junior High School. She will compete with other

county winners in this area for the right to spell at the National Spelling Bee to be held later this summer in Washington, D.C.

Miss King received a plaque, \$15 cash, a ribbon and a fountain pen for being named Bailey County Champion Speller.

Jarroll is a Bula sixth grader and the son of Mr. and Mrs. J.E. Layton. His sponsor was Mrs. Zoy Risinger. Layton was presented a check for \$7.50 for second place and a pen.

Third place winner in the Bee was Beatrice Edmundson, a Muleshoe Junior High sixth grader. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Edmundson of Muleshoe. She received a check for \$2.50, a pen and a ribbon.

Each school in the county, Muleshoe Junior High School, Mary DeShazo, Three Way and Bula entered their top three students in the event.

Judges for the Bee were Bailey County Judge Glen Williams, Kenneth Henry, Miss Marion Morris and J. K. Adams.

Arthritis Drive Collects \$1849

The Muleshoe Chapter of the West Texas Arthritis Foundation conducted a fund drive in Muleshoe recently, collecting \$1848.93. Coin collectors are still out, so the total should increase within the next week.

In the city of Muleshoe, \$971.63 was collected. In the rural areas, \$877.30 was collected. The rural figure is broken down into divisions as follows: North of the Clovis highway, \$62; West Camp, \$35; West of the City Limits, \$52; Needmore, \$53.50; Progress, \$109.05; Maple-Goodland, \$116.25; Bula, \$133.50; Enoch, \$113.00; YL Community, \$99.00; Western part of the county, \$32.00; and Pleasant Valley, \$72.00.

The steering committee of the Muleshoe Unit expresses its appreciation to the team captains of the rural areas for a job very well done.

Goose Creek ISD in Baytown. Clark is presently president-elect of the state organization and will take office as president in June. He is also one of the four district vice-presidents of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers.

In 1971, he served as chairman of the Harris County Administrators Association and helped to develop it into a district TSTA organization. He has served as president of two local TSTA units, as well as held many other offices on the local level of TSTA.

Clark still finds time for ranching and other business interests and participates fully in a variety of professional and civic endeavors. In Baytown, Clark is a director of the Chamber of Commerce, and a member of the Lions Club, and on the Executive Board of the Sam Houston Area Council of Boy Scouts of America. He is life member of TSTA, NEA, and the American Association of School Administrators. He has been named by former House Speaker Gus Mutscher to a seven-man Texas House Interim Study Committee to study the administration of public school education in Texas and appointed by Lt. Governor Ben Barnes to a Senate Interim Committee to study and develop recommendations regarding public school financing.

During past sessions of the Texas Legislature, Clark was a frequent visitor to Austin discussing education bills with legislators and testifying before various legislative committees. In 1971, he was instrumental in getting a bill passed by the Texas Legislature that allows the Goose Creek Schools-- and other schools as well-- to provide their own classes for the deaf.

City Council Approves Bid On Gasoline

The Muleshoe City Council met Tuesday morning and accepted the Gulf bid on gasoline. The prices were 17.90 cents per gallon for regular and 20.90 cents per gallon for premium, all prices plus tax.

A motion was made and passed to authorize the Muleshoe Country Club to lease the golf course for one dollar for 99 years.

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Late cotton harvest, cattle activity and industrial growth have all contributed to the increase in deposits at the local banks. Bank calls dated March 28, show over a million dollar increase at both the Muleshoe State Bank and First National Bank.

At Muleshoe State Bank, total assets of the bank increased \$1,822,969.16 over the 12 month period and the total deposits increased from \$9,185,899.66 to \$10,877,618.54 in 1973 for a total increase of \$1,691,718.88.

At First National Bank, total assets increased from \$10,212,618.64 in 1972 to \$11,567,988.62 in 1973 for a total increase of \$1,355,369.98.

Deposits at the bank also increased from \$9,111,232.31 at the same time last year to \$10,411,198.55 this year for an increase of \$1,299,966.24.

Area banks were also showing marked increases in deposits and assets.

Macky McCarty, president of the Citizens State Bank, Earth, announced that the Citizens State Bank has realized tremendous growth during the one year period from March 30, 1972 through March 30, 1973. This growth was evidenced in the fact that the bank's deposits rose for \$3,533,907.81 in 1972 to \$4,752,432.75 at the close of business March 30, 1973. This \$1,218,524.94 growth of deposits represents a 34.4 increase. During this same period total assets of the institution grew from \$3,885,412.17 to \$5,148, Cont. on Page 3, col. 2

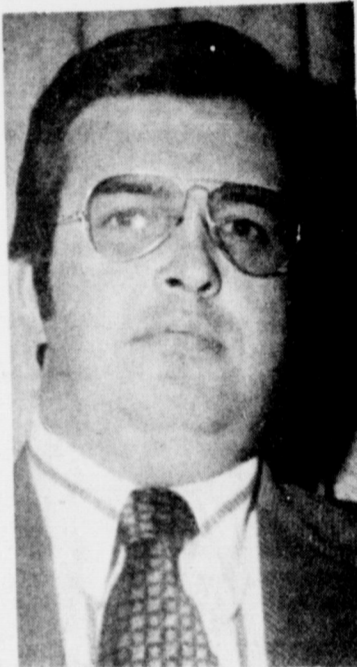
America has found out that this evil force can not be stopped by armed forces.

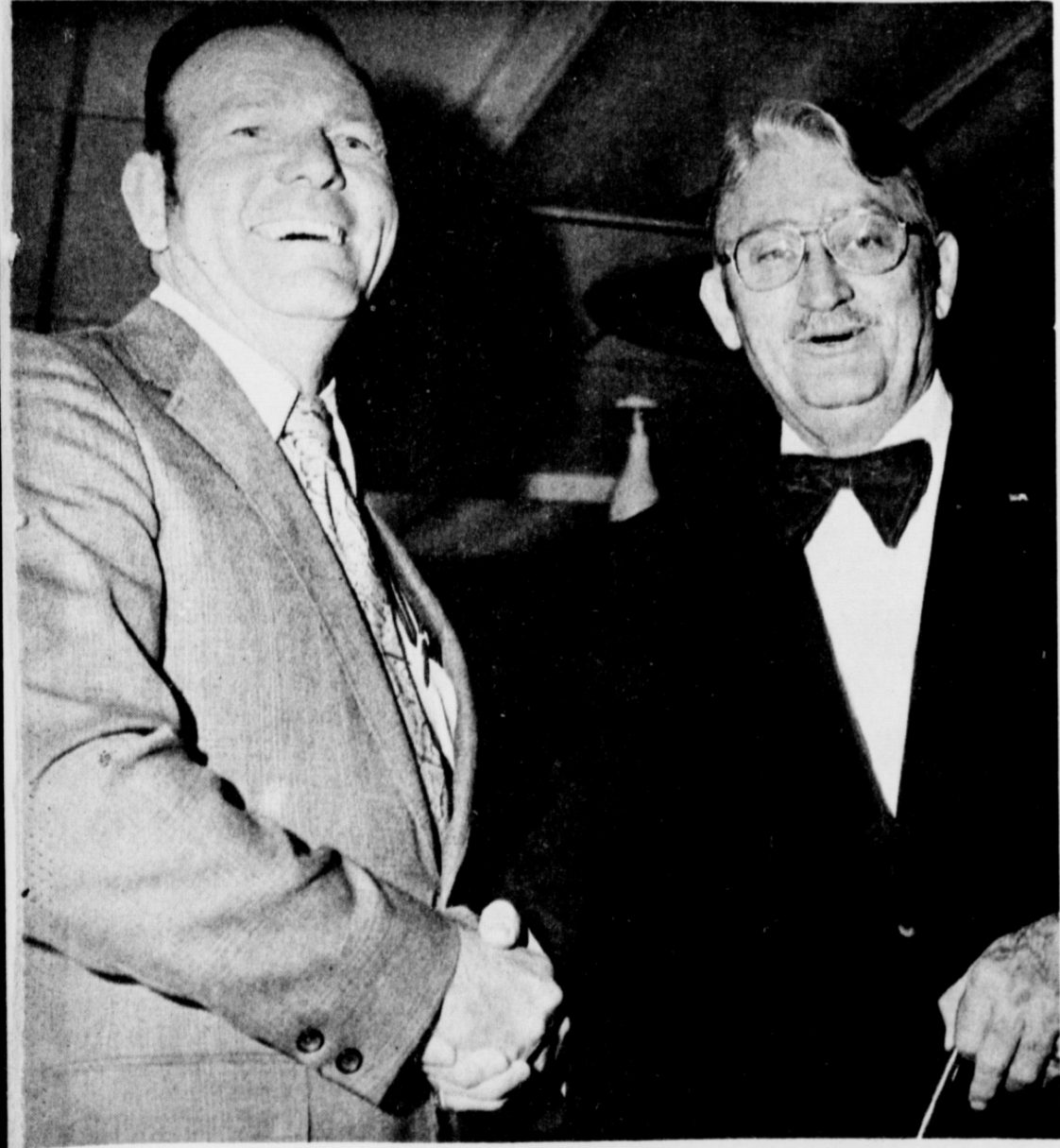
Benny Watson of Canyon, formerly of Lazbuddie, was in Muleshoe last week with the Canyon High School play cast.

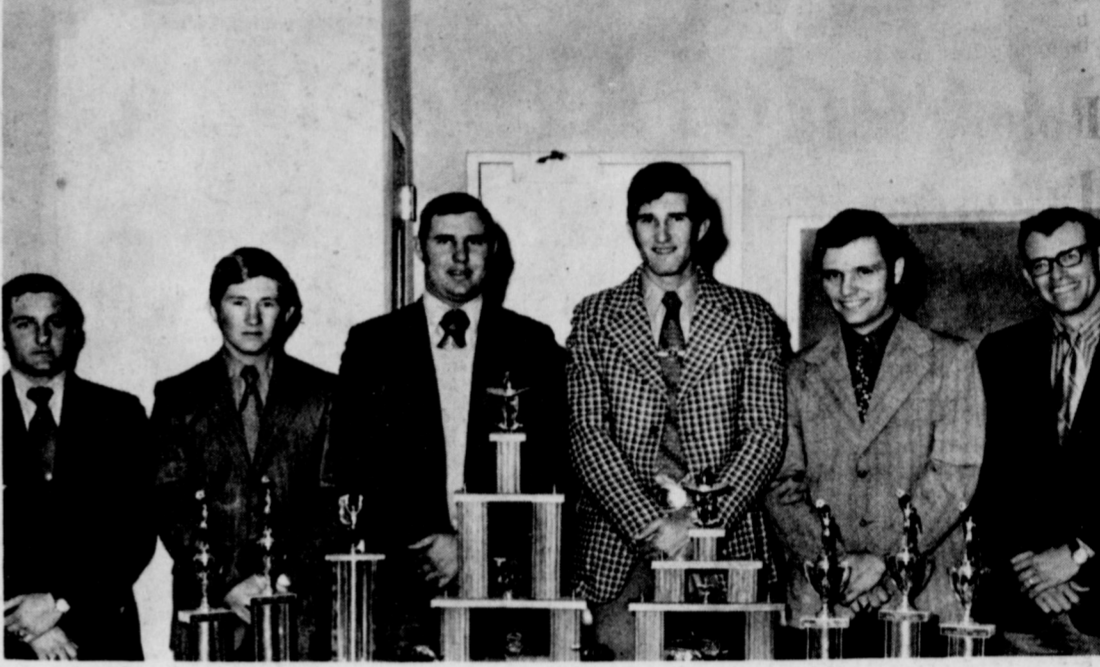

155.18 a 32.5 per cent increase. McCarty attributed this growth to continued confidence in the Citizens State Bank and to the economic growth of the area. He said "Of course, you would expect the banks deposit to increase somewhat due to the period of inflation our economy has experienced during the past year, but that inflation rate is no where near 34.4 per cent. The great majority of the increase was real even when adjusted for inflation". When asked what he felt this growth meant to the bank McCarty answered, "I think this is only the beginning of favorable growth for the bank and the area".

"This might sound optimistic,

but I truly believe our area will continue to grow economically, and as our bank continues in its efforts to give the best service to the community, we will continue to grow".

The First National Bank of Sudan also recorded an increase. Deposits increased from \$4,192,983.97 in 1972 to \$4,534,334.28, a difference of \$341,350.31. Guy Waldon, president, reported that the increase was probably due to the late cotton harvest and the cattle industry.

Priona State Bank showed a whopping increase of over \$4 million in deposits and over \$3 million in loans.

Emergency Blood Donor Files To Be Updated

The Muleshoe Hospital and Nursing Home Auxiliary has organized a drive to secure the names of people willing to donate blood in the extreme emergency which arises occasionally at West Plains Memorial Hospital. The hospital maintains a supply of blood through its association with Blood Services of Lubbock. Since blood can only be used within 21 days after its donation, only a limited supply of the most common types can be maintained locally. Patients who are to have elective surgery are scheduled so that blood can be secured from the blood bank. Unusual situations arise, however, when time is a factor, and the only way to supply the needed blood is from local donors. These conditions include a variety of

emergencies ranging from the automobile and farm machinery injuries to the obstetrical emergencies.

The "walking donor" files have not been revised in several years, resulting in a donor list which includes names of people who have moved away or have died.

The West Plains Memorial Hospital laboratory will perform blood type and Rh factors without charge on any adult in good health who would be willing to donate blood in an emergency. Persons interested in this service may register in the main lobby at the hospital from 1 to 5 p.m. any afternoon during the week of April 9 through April 13. Members of Hospital Auxiliary will staff a table in the lobby to register prospective donors. Wallet

cards will be mailed to all participants showing blood type and Rh factor results.

It is emphasized that this program is not intended to replace the present system. Blood bank requirements must be met on all blood drawn except for life or death emergencies. These requirements include testing for one strain of hepatitis, and are prohibitively expensive on a low volume basis. Also, this program is not intended to provide blood for persons unable to pay for blood bank blood. The Jaycees, through their blood donation program to the blood bank, are able to issue blood credits to any person unable to pay for blood upon approval of their

board.

"Go by the hospital and have your blood typed. It is a free service to you and you will receive a card by mail showing your blood type which can be carried in your wallet at all times. At the same time, you can be of service to your community by being available for a blood donation. 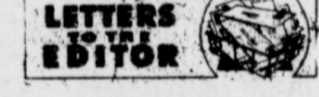
Mrs. Ellison, 53, of 5507 16th Place, Lubbock, died about 6 p.m. Thursday at her home after a lengthy illness.

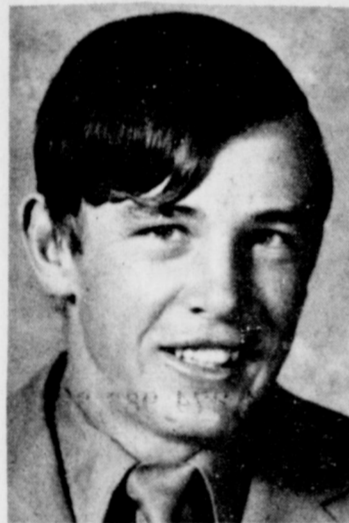

AUSTIN, Tex. --The complex job of rewriting the 97-year-old State Constitution began officially last week with initial work sessions of the new Constitutional Revision Commission.

Commissioners outlined plans for a series of public hearings in 18 areas.

The hearings will be held between now and next fall in Houston, Dallas-Fort Worth, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, McAllen, San Angelo, Lubbock,

Longview, Wichita Falls, El Paso, Amarillo, Abilene, Midland-Odessa, Laredo, Tyler, Lufkin, Beaumont-Port Arthur-Orange and Austin.

Chairman Robert W. Calvert, former Texas Supreme Court judge, said the hearings may determine largely whether people accept the final product.

The 37-member Commission heard advice from a large group of experts, then divided into seven sub-committees to study specific areas of the Constitution which one of the advisors

labeled an "apalling" document.

Revision Commissioners received these key bits of advice:

"Do the best job they can of streamlining the Constitution, but be prepared for the Legislature to 'water down their recommendations.'

"Don't try 'to solve the problems but make clear who solves the problems.'

"Sweep out detailed property tax provisions...get rid of the grants and loans prohibi-

tion and provide "home rule" for counties.

The Commission will be backed up by a statewide advisory committee.

Revision drafts must be completed by November. The Legislature will convene January 1 as a constitutional convention.

OPEN MEETINGS BILL PASSES-- An amended version of legislation to strengthen state laws requiring that the business of state government be con-



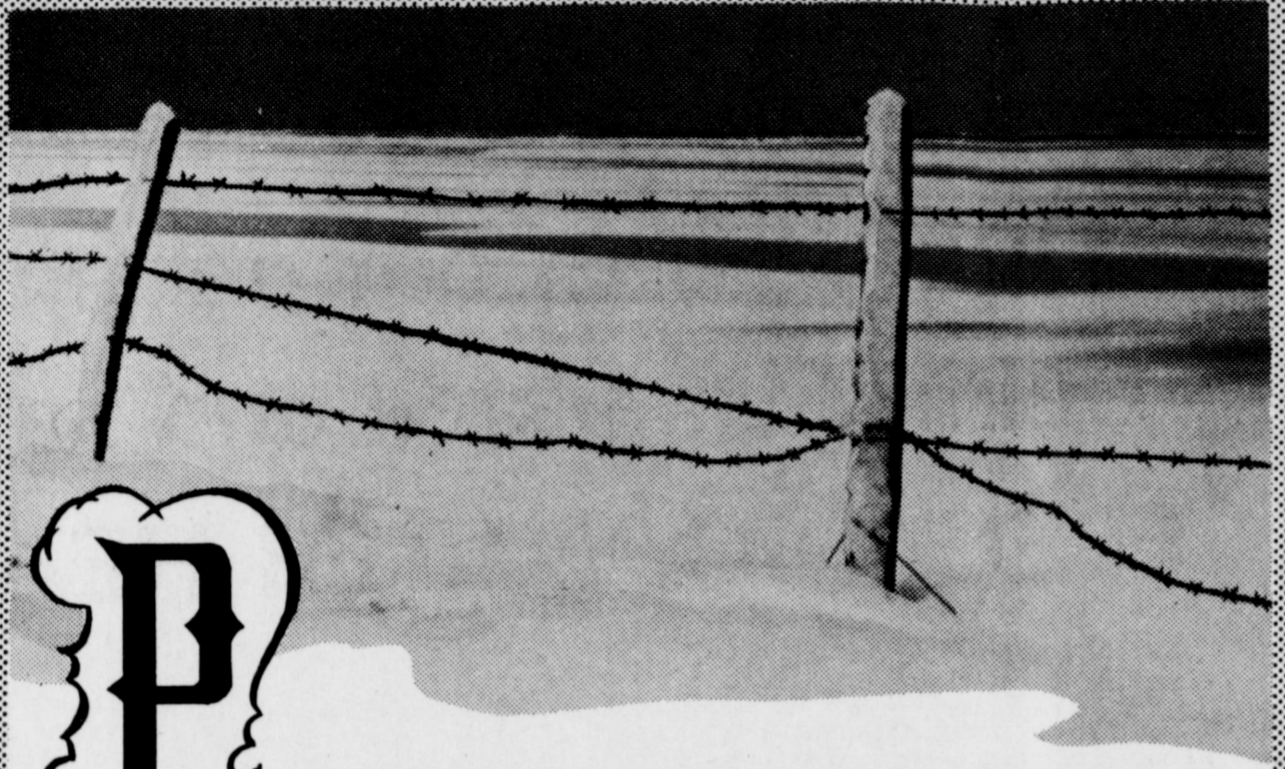
