TECH LOCATERS HONORED SLATON WITH VISIT TUESDAY AFTERNOON

Although Slaton was not an applicant for the Texas Technological College, the locating committee honored this city with a visit on Tuesday afternoon and a brief meeting was held in the City Hall auditorium, which was packed to capacity and many hundreds were on the outside.

R. J. Murray, president of the Chamber of Commerce, arranged the program for entertainment of the visitors, and headed a large party of Slaton people who left here at noon Tuesday, met the committee at Wilson and escorted them to Slaton.

Hon. R. A. Baldwin of this city, joint author of the Tech College bill, by invitation went to Post City and accompanied the committee to Wilson, Slaton, and Lubbock. Judge W. A. Koons, a personal friend of Mr. Bralley, a member of the committee, also accompanied Mr. Baldwin.

At Wilson the presentation was made by R. E. Key, superintendent of the Wilson public school, and Representative R. A. Baldwin of this city. The business session of the board was held in public school building, the pride of Wilson. Following the presentation a home cooked dinner was served to the party by the Mothers' Club of

Arriving at Slaton an immense throng greeted the party. After assembling at the City Hall an address was made by Mr. Murray, followed by Rev. B. W. Dodson, both of which were timely



MARY MAGDALENE

LESSON TEXT-Luke 8:1-8; John 9:

LESSON TEXT—Luke 8:1-3; John 9: 25; 10:11-18.

GOLDEN TEXT—"Our soul waiteth for the Lord: He is our help and shield."—Psalm 33:21.

PRIMARY TOPIC—How Mary Magdalene Showed Her Love for Jesus.
JUNIOR TOPIC—How Mary Magdalene Showed Her Gratitude to Jesus INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—A Woman's Grateful Service.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Mary Magdalene, Saved and Serving.

I. Mary Saved (Luke 8:1, 2).

While Jesus and His disciples were preaching throughout the villages of Gaillee, Mary and certain other women heard the good news of salvation and were saved. Evil spirits were cast out of them. Mary had been possessed with seven demons. The number seven indicates the completeness of her affliction. Bodily affliction usually accompanied demon possession. Doctor Erdman says: "It is a cruel error to confuse Mary Magdalene with the sinful woman of whom Luke has just been writing. Mary had suffered from demon possession, as here stated, but there is nothing in the gospels to indicate that she had ever been a woman of notoriously evil life." So widespread is this false impression that many rescue homes for fallen women are named unjustly, "Magdalene."

II. Mary Ministering (Luke 8:3). She, with certain women who had been saved from Satan's power, out of a heart of gratitude looked after the comfort of the Lord and His disciples. These women must have been in easy circumstances, as they were able to buy food and other necessities and, doubtless, lodging for Jesus and His disciples. These women were the forerunners of that large company of saved women who have throughout the Christian centuries been ministering to the Lord through kindness to His ministers. How poor would be this world

without the ministry of godly women. III. Mary's Steadfastness (John 19:

After the men and disciples had forsaken the Lord a group of faithful women remained at the cross, among whom was Mary Magdalene. Others lingered, prompted by natural affection, but she lingered out of grateful love for salvation from Satan's bondage.

IV. Mary at the Empty Tomb (John 20:11-18).

1. Mistaken Tears (11-13). She had come to the tomb to weep and to pay respect to the body of her Lord. She

was weeping over what she regarded as a tragle loss. In spite of her love and faith, she was in a state of confusion. If she had known what was revealed to her a short time afterward, she would not have thus wept. Staggs, secretary of the chamber of commerce. At the at a cost of \$50,000. It has a large at a cost of \$50,000. It has a large at a cost of \$50,000. present time about twelve new residences are being erected, and about 250 have been built in the last twelve months. In a town of less than 5,000 this amount of construction is regarded as extraordinary.

The Santa Fe railroad recently in-stalled an overhead steam heat sys-tem for the Harvey House, the station tem for the Harvey House, the station and division office buildings. It is rumored that this system expects to add four stalls to the sixteen-stall roundhouse here. The company has also completed oil storage for two million barrels, as well as relaid the entire road from Lubbock to Sweetwater with 90-pound steel rails.

Other Improvements. Many extensive additions will shortly be announced to the large machine shops maintained by the company at this point. These machine shops are to take care of the repair work of the system, including the Amarillo-Slaton, Clovis-Slaton, Sweetwater-Slaton, Seagraves, Floydada, Crosbyton, and Lamesa divisions of the road. Ground is now being broken for the postoffice building on Eighth Street, just in the rear of the Slaton State Bank. It will be of brick, 50 by 90 feet in dimensions.

Slaton was the first city to take ad-Slaton was the first city to take advantage of the new law prescribing highway districts. It voted \$25,000 in bonds for the building of a good road across Yellowhouse canyon to put more than sixty sections of farming land in juxtaposition to Slaton and increase trading here.

Avoid Watermelon Loss in Transit

Brings About Decay Still Is Important Factor.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Watermelon growers should give serious consideration to their responsibilities in connection with prevention of losses in transit, Edvises the United States Department of Agriculture. Examination of carloads at destination has shown that, provided shipments are properly loaded in clean. well-ventilated cars, and delivered within a reasonable length of time, any losses experienced usually result from the shipping of:

(1.) Melons affected with bad anthracnose pock marks.

(2.) Severely sunscaled or stale fruit.

(3). Melons that carry cuts and bruises as a result of careless handling.

(4). Melons, the stems of which have not been reclipped and treated for prevention of stem-end rot. Rot Coming Under Control.

The stem-end rot fungus, which not only causes stem-end rot, but also brings about decay following bruises and cuts in the rind, has been a source of heavy loss in the past, and is still a factor of great importance. In 1919 campaign of education concerning methods of control for this disease was initiated in the Southeastern states, the United States Department of Agriculture and the state extension services co-operating. As a result of the interest taken in this work by farmers, distributors, and rallroads, stem-end rot is coming under control. This conclusion is borne out by records from the food products inspection service, which indicate that in Georgia shipments losses from stem-

Stem-End Rot Fungus That end rot have been cut from 14.4 per cent in 1920 to 8,3 per cent in 1921, and 6.2 per cent in 1922; and in Florida shipments from 16.6 per cent in 1920 to 10.1 per cent in 1921 and 5.3 per cent in 1922.

Timely Suggestions.

In order that stem-end rot and losses in transit due to other causes may be reduced, farmers should make every effort to carry out the following suggestions at harvest season:

(1.) If possible avoid working while the vines are wet.

(2.) Never permit labor to handle rotten melons in the field and then work with fruit for shipment.

(3.) Never permit clipper to handle or to touch knife to rotten meions in the field.

(4.) Never permit clipper to cut into meions while pushing knife through the stem.

(5.) Never permit clipper to stand melons on end to mark them in the field. (6.) Insist on careful handling by

the tote boys and wagon men. (7.) Pad wagons thoroughly in order to avoid nall or spiinter punctures.

Flaxseed Production Will Show Increase crop.

Prices Fluctuate to Disadvantage of the Growers.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) There is an increasing spread between the production of flaxseed in the United States and the demand for home consumption, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. Until 1908 this country produced, on an average, more than it consumed and therefore was able to export a surplus in nearly every year. Beginning with 1909, however, our production began to decline, while our requirements began to increase with population. Net imports consequently have increased. The reduction in consumption in 1917 and 1918 was due to war restrictions, and that in 1920 and 1921 to business depression. It is ground. fairly certain that the figures for 1922, when available, will show an increase in consumption.

Clear Moss From Fruit Trees by Proper Spray

Moss can be quite readily cleared from the trees. The solution of strong bordeaux is one of the best sprays. The old formula of lime, sulphur and salt, where the same weight of salt is used in the spray as of time and sulphur, namely 15 pounds to 50 gallons of the concentrated spray, is also very efficient in removing moss. But a substance which is very good to use is common lye. The lye can be used straight by dissolving in plain water, or it can be used in the lime sulphur spray. The rate to use is about one pound can of lye for every six or seven gallons of spray. It cleans off the moss quite readily, seems to soften the bark and gives it a clean, bright appearance.






