

The following taken from the Dallas News of December 7th expresses the views of most true blue citizens of this nation.

Defense Secretary George Marshall, speaking at Fort Benning, Ga., said: "The basic error has always been with the people themselves. The fault has been with their refusal to sanction an enduring posture of defense that would discourage aggression and, if war come, would reduce the casualties, sacrifices, excessive viewing American history in general, he is right. But if he is referring to the last five years—specifically, to the terrible crisis now confronting us—he is wrong.

The American people can not be blamed for the crisis. They supported the Truman Doctrine and Marshall Plan, They have given 90 billion dollars of their own money for defense and for foreign aid against Communism in the last five years.

Not one penny have they denied the military. Louis Johnson, with approval of the President, did the only economizing.

It was not the American people who announced that Korea would not be defended if attacked. It was not the Ameri-can people who prevented enlarging the Air Force to seventy

Chinese Nationalist troops while their own sons were dying.

It was not the American people who hired Communist ympathizers in the State and Commerce Departments and tried to cover them up, once they were revealed.

The American people did not sit at Yalta and Potsdam. These are history, Unity now is a must. But let history, for the record, cite a fine co-operation by the people after World War II in whatever direction their leaders took them.

Was it only six years ago we were arming Russia and China against Germany and Japan?

ragain this week we have a Chrimas recipe. This one, a Christs Pie, is the favorite of Mrs. A. Worley, jr. She says it is out the most heavenly concoctanyone can imagine. She devibes it as a deliciously differt delight for topping off, apopriately, a scrumptious holivy meal. She suggests that you kee the pie the day before Xmas gain time for other chores. These are the instructions to low:

Step 1. The afternoon before the sliday, shell enough Brazil nuts bout 3/4 lb.) to make 11/4 cups nut meats. Next, set up the food inder, using the fine knife. Grind e nuts, feeding them into the sincer a few at a time, until you kee 1½ cups of ground meats. Step 2. Now to make the picell. To 1½ cups ground nut leats, add 3 tablespoons granuited sugar. With the back of a poon, press this mixture to both mand sides of a 9" ple plate, p to the rim. Bake in moderately of oven of 400 degrees F, for 8 inutes or until lightly browned. Step 3. Next, make filling: Soak senvelope unflavored gelatine in 14 cup water. Beat a egg yolks with fork; add 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 ups scalded milk. Cook in double soller over very hot, (not boiling) water, until it coats metal spoon. Remove at once; stir in gelatin. Step 4. Cool; then chill custard mill it mounds when some is dropped from a spoon. Beat with an egg beater until smooth. Add ½ cup by thinly sliced, glazed cherries, 2 ths. white rum. Now beat 3 egg whites until they peak; add 1/4 cup sugar gradually, while beating until stiff; then fold into custard.

Step 5. As soon as egg whites are folded gently but thoroughly into custard, pour it into the col-

ing until stiff; then fold into custard.

Step 6. Garnishing this pie is really gliding the lily. But for an extra holiday touch, whip ½ to 3/4 cup cream, sweeten to taste, and spoon around top edge of pie. Then with a sharp paring knife, shave over pie 1/4 cup Brazil nuts that have been soaked ½ hour in bolling water. This makes them easy to shell.

Step 7. Now the pie is put back into the refrigerator until dessert time.
