Water And Paving Temporarily Cared For Says Mayor Wootton

Paving projects for summer in Slaton have about been completed, reports Mayor Lee Wootton. The contractor who completed the paving on South 5th Street and on North 8th Street, has shipped some of his equipment to other localities and it is likely that no further activity in this line will be worked out here.

The Mayor reported the new water well southwest of the city limits has been connected to the water supply and that the well that is located in the rear of the Klanser home has been put back into operation with a smaller pump. Altogether there are twelve water wells being operated by the city and the Mayor says that should there be a dry summer the town would still have ample water supply.

It is believed that eventually the city will have to secure bigger and better wells than they now have, and that the main line will have to be extended quite a distance in order to secure the amount of water that will be needed.

VA Direct Loan Program To End June 30, 1950

World War II veterans planning to apply for direct home and farm loans from the Veterans Administration are reminded by the VA that the Direct Loan Program ends by law on June 30, 1951.

VA states it would scarcely be possible in most instances to process applications before the June 30 deadline that are received by the VA Regional Offices after June 15.

The Housing Act of 1950 authorized VA to make direct loans up to \$10,000 at four per cent interest to World War II Veterans with which to buy or build a home, or to build or improve a farmhouse. The Act stipulated that VA was to make these direct loans in those areas of the country where the regular GI Loans were not available from private lenders. The law further required VA to designate the areas as eligible for direct loans.

Since the program got under way last summer, more than 2,600 counties or parts of counties in the United States have been designated as eligible for direct loans. An estimated 5,000,000 World War II veterans live in these designated areas.

As of May 10, about \$90,000,000 of the \$150,000,000 authorized for the program had been disbursed or reserved under pending applications for direct loans to veterans.

While the Direct Government Loan Program ends June 30, 1951, the regular GI Loan Program does not expire until July 25, 1957. Both programs are subject to the same minimum down payments imposed by the credit controls announced October 12, 1950.

Oran McWilliams of the McWilliams Dry Goods, believes the price war will not flood the country because merchants cannot continue to sell their merchandise for less than it costs them. He thinks it is an advertising stunt to get rid of some old merchandise in the stores.

J. M. Burton of Bain Auto Store said he believes the factories are so flooded with merchandise that prices will come down all over the

Fifteen Minute Parking Asked For Post Office

Postmaster Scudder reported this week that a proposition has been presented to the City Commissioners to put a fifteen minute parking limit on the space in front of the Post Office.

"There is not a day passes that numerous complaints do not come to the Post Office employees about the lack of parking space at the Post Office," said the Post Master, "and most of the folks who complain say that they feel that Slaton is getting to be big enough to have better traffic regulations. They compare Slaton with other towns and report that the traffic congestion in front of the Post Office would not be tolerated in towns like Post, Hereford, Brownfield and other towns not even as large as Slaton."

The plan to paint the curb in front of the Post Office with 15 minute parking limit signs has been brought up before the City Commissioners, but no action has been taken on the plan.

In commenting on the suggestion Mayor Lee Wootton reported that such regulations might or might not remedy the congestion on the West side of the Square. "Such problems are always coming up before City Commissions and to date the traffic problem is the biggest headache that all towns now have," said the Mayor. "We want to do all that can be done to relieve congestion and cut down traffic hazards, but quite often when you endeavor to make corrections you make things worse instead of better. So far as I can see the traffic congestion around the Lubbock Post Office is most alarming and it keeps a lot of policing to even keep it half way workable. Someday maybe things will be all worked out fine both in Slaton and elsewhere. Until then we will all have to keep our eyes open, our cars erect, and our feet on the brakes."

The big event of the afternoon will be an act of western comedy and singing by "Wylie and Gene" from Oklahoma. They are well known in this territory having appeared here many times in the past.

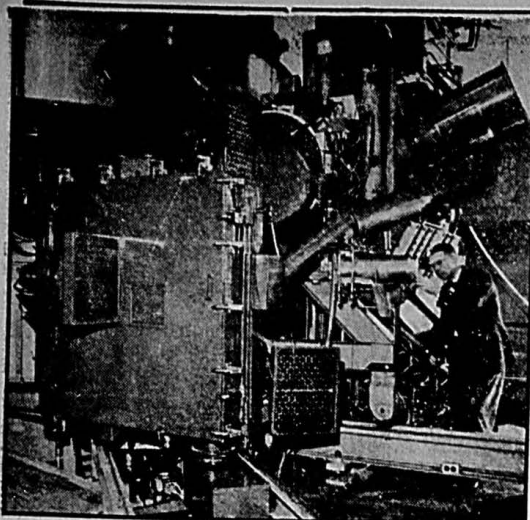

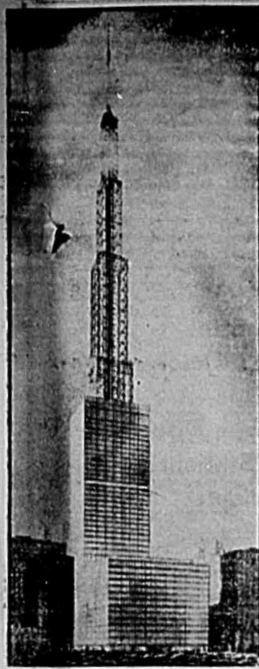

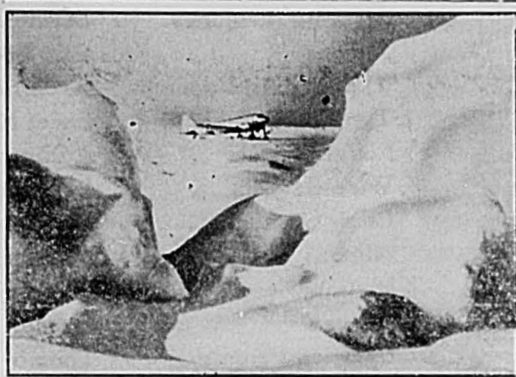

Empire Cotton Is Good Producer

COLLEGE STATION, June 4—With 403 pounds of lint per acre, the Empire variety of cotton produced the highest yield in the 1950 variety tests conducted at the Denton Experiment Station, announced J. H. Gardshire and D. I. Dudley, station research men. Lockett 104, Deltapine (TSPA), Lankart 57 and Mebane 8G, Floyd, were the four next highest yielding varieties, in that order. All produced more than 350 pounds of lint per acre. The research men report that Empire produced an average of 30 pounds more lint per acre than any other cotton variety in the tests conducted at Denton since 1946. The next highest yielder for the five-year period was Northern Star, with a 307-pound average. Deltapine (TSPA), Deltapine 15 (Miss.), Dorth 1 (Roldo Rowden) and Mebane 8G, Floyd, followed closely behind Northern Star in average yields for the five-year period. Also included in the 1950 variety tests were Hi-Bred; Rowden 41B (TSPA); Stoneville (TSPA); Stoneville 2B (Miss.); Texacala, Rogers; Mebane, Watson; Western Prolific; and Acala 442 (Calif.). All varieties tested produced yields of 239 pounds of lint or more per acre last year. These results are given in Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Progress Report 1366, available from the Publications Office, College Station, Texas. In addition to the yields of lint per acre, the report gives the grade, lint length, percentage of lint and boll size for each variety tested.

Don't Sell Slaton Short . . .

Having no accurate figures on the number of miles of paved streets that other towns the size with Slaton have there is not close estimate as to how the paving in Slaton compares to other places, but the first things that visitors notice about Slaton is the number of streets in our town that are paved.

Not only is our town one with well paved streets, but practically all of the homes in the town are of fairly modern vintage. Our home owners and folks who live in rented houses take exceptional pride in their abodes, and Slaton is unique in the fact that there are no delapidated mansions that look picturesque from a distance, but are ramshackled old places that harbor rats, germs and broken down plumbing, or have no plumbing at all.

Many of the older towns in South and East Texas have many old two and three story places that at one time were the homes of the rich, but have been allowed to go to ruin. They not only make the towns look old and gone to seed, but they also give a town a reputation for being dead and gone.

Slaton has advanced in many ways within the past ten years, shows signs of even greater activity for the future, and the business men who are planning for the future should not underestimate what Slaton will be by 1960.

Slaton will have more paving, more water, more business expansion and when folks from Slaton visit in other parts of the country they will not have to explain that Slaton is a town fourteen miles South of Lubbock.

It's Time To Check Up . . .

It is close to the time of the year when the merchants in this section of the country will have to make up their minds as to how much merchandise they will need for the fall market.

As usual the farmers are very skeptical concerning the cotton crop and to date the weather conditions have not been quite as good as could be hoped for, but farmers never do quit groaning and moaning even when the cotton crops are better than any of them had hoped for because when good crops do come the labor problem becomes acute, the gins become over worked, the farm machines break down and folks get hard to get along with.

The merchant at the present time is faced with the danger that prices may drop, there is some likelihood that prices may even go higher on some items and there is still shortages on some goods. Most merchants have unfilled orders on the books of the wholesale houses and if all of their back orders should be filled at an early date there would not be enough storage space in any town in West Texas.

Some of the old time merchants can still remember the 1920's when thousands of business firms went out of business when the wholesalers dumped millions of dollars worth of merchandise on the market so that many of the retailers had to get it off their hands at far less than actual cost to them.

Particularly rough was the womens shoe market for it was then that womens high shoes went out of style almost overnight and many shoe merchants tried to sell shoes that cost from ten to twelve dollars a pair at one dollar a pair. Clay Oates has sold some of them from the Kessel stock at that price as museum pieces.

Such things could happen again, but they are not likely to do so for history seldom repeats itself, especially on womens shoes.

Lavon Water District . . .

There is a pattern for the future in the formation of the North Texas Municipal Water District Tuesday. That the people in the ten towns who formed it are aware of this fact is shown by the vote of 1,972 to 14 by which it was approved.

This is the second extensive intercity water district formed in Texas. The other is the Snyder-Big Spring-Odessa district which has started building a network of water pipelines from a lake to be constructed in Scurry County and an underground water supply in Martin County.

The ten cities and towns of Dallas, Collin, Kaufman and Rockwall Counties will profit immensely from the great supply of water that will be available to them from the Lavon Reservoir. Water is the No. 1 need of most new industry today.

The pattern they are helping to set is one that will be adopted eventually in many parts of Texas and other states. But it should show the way particularly here in the environs of Dallas. The census of 1950 showed that there were then 432,852 people living in corporate Dallas and 177,925 in the metropolitan area outside the city limits. There should be a water supply plan for this entire metropolitan area. Attention should be given to such a plan now regardless of whether the future will bring an extension of the Dallas city limits to this area, a county-wide corporate municipality or some other arrangement.

Much modern industry prefers to be near a big center with its facilities, but just far enough out to have elbow room for its operations and its employees' living quarters. A metropolitan water supply plan would greatly encourage both industrial and civic development in the Greater Dallas area. —The Dallas News.

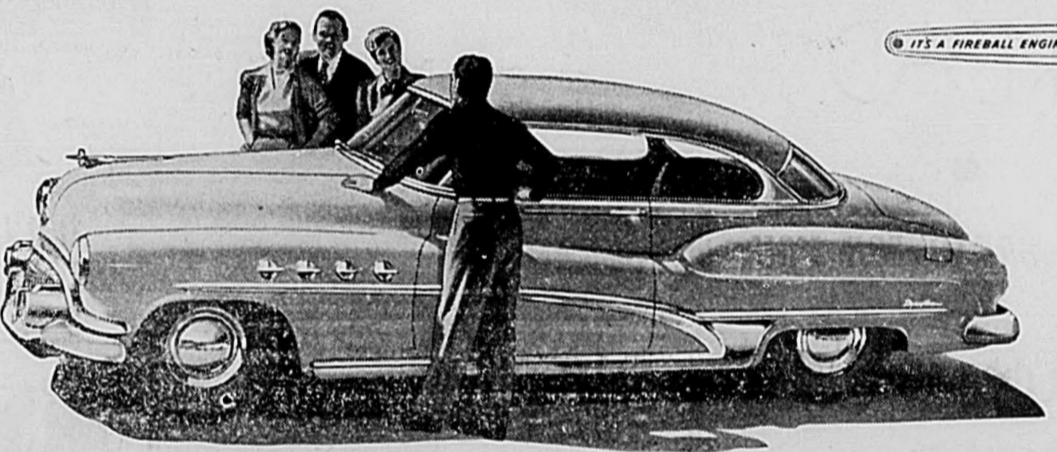

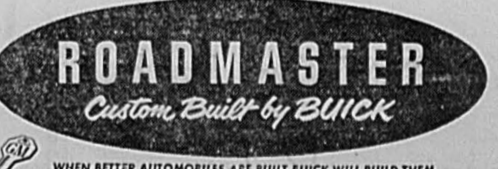

JUST TALK

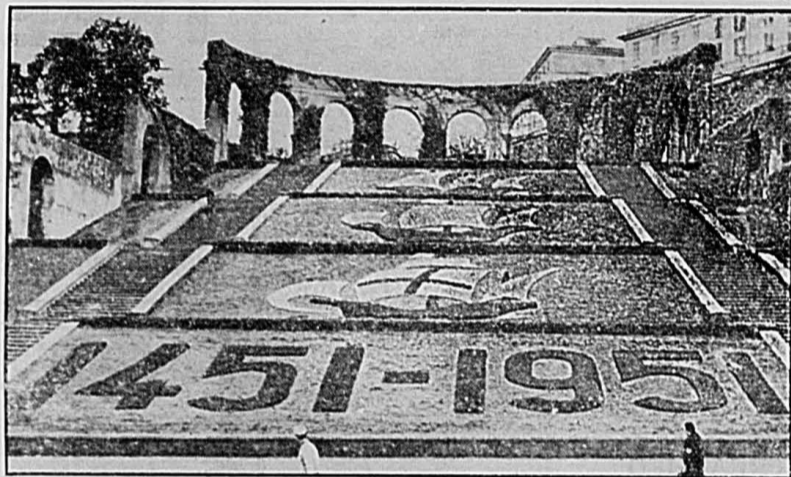
