

An international conference to consider the stabilization of silver is favored by the House committee which has been studying the cause of the decline, abasement and demonetization of the metal.

As Bernard Baruch, the well-known financier, told the committee: "It seems quite clear to me that the matter requires international cooperation and study, the reaching of conclusions and the taking of action. . .

"I believe that anything we can do to retrace the steps of excessive deflation and restore the purchasing power of all countries is a right thing to do so long as it is absolutely in-

> **Charters** Granted New Corporations

Austin, Texas, May 12-Charters were granted during April to 154 new corporations, with authorized capital stock of \$3,206,000, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

"Since there was a substantial decline in the number of firms having authorized capital stock of less than \$5,000, the total authorized capital stock of all the new corporations registered a decline of only 4.1 per cent as compared with March, as against a drop in number of 8.3 per cent, or slightly less than the normal seasonal decline," the Bureau's report said.

"Comparisons with last year of the total authorized capital stock are greatly influenced by the \$2,000,000 cattle concern incorporated last April. Total capital stock authorized in that


month amounted to \$5,396,000. "Oil, manufacturing, and merchandising firms account for about two thirds of the total number of new corporations, with both the oil and the manufacturing group showing gains over the number for March. One public service company and four transportation companies were incorporated during April, and the number of new banking and finance companies dropped from nine in March to only four in April.

"Thirty-four out-of-State corporations were granted permits to operate in Texas; in March, 27 foreign permits were granted. Last year in April, 52 out-of-State corporations were granted permits to do business in Texas.2




